## CCTC Membership Meeting Slated

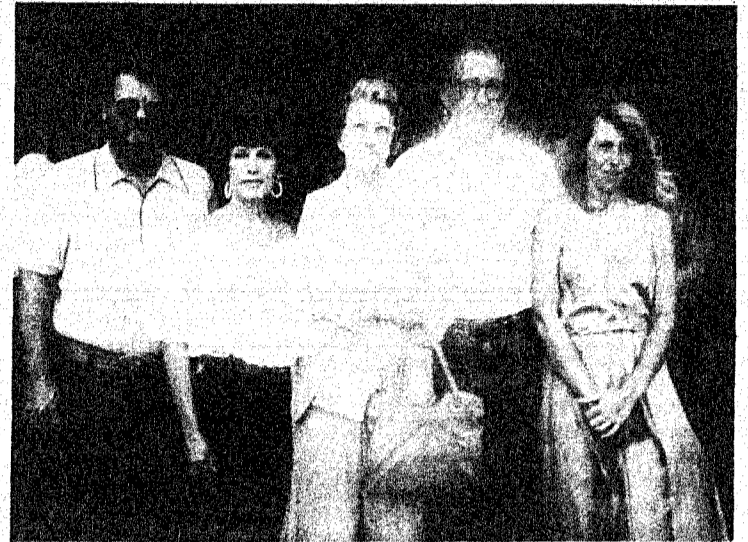
Following the business meeting,

## School Enrollment Listed For First Week of New Term

Enrollment at the Santa Anna schools during the first week is almost the same as last year, with 65 students in high school and 296 in elementary school.

The 1983 year ended with only 80 in high school, so there is a slight increase. There are 15 seniors, 22 juniors, 20 sophomores and 28 freshmen enrolled.

In the elementary school, there are 31 students in the kindergarten class; 34 in first grade; 38 in second; 33 in both the third and fourth grades; 26 in fifth; 41 in sixth; 35 in seventh; and 25 in the eighth grade.

There are two sections of the first, second, third, fourth and sixth grades this year.

School officials expect a few more students during the next week.

## Cisco Pastor is Speaker At First Baptist Revival

## Open House Held Monday At Remodeled Band Hall

School patrons and band parents had an opportunity to see the newly remodeled Band Hall Monday night with the Band Booster Club sponsored an open house at the facility.

The renovation was done during the summer at an approximate cost of \$28,000, making an up-to-date facility for the music department.

The area was remodeled so that

outside doors open onto porches on the south of the building, with one ramp and loading dock for instruments and equipment.

The interior is carpeted and finished in acoustical finish in colors of blue and blue-gray, with four practice rooms, a music library, storage rooms for instruments, and an office for the band director.

Dressing rooms for boys and girls include restroom facilities and racks for storage of band uniforms.

The Band Hall now has central cooling and heating and a water fountain.

The building, attached to the old gymnasium, was built in the late 1950's and has had very little renovation since that time. The gymnasium was remodeled last year.

Patti Musick, Band Booster President, was in charge of the open house, that included refreshments of home made ice cream and cookies for the many people who attended.

## James Memorial Park Dedicated Saturday

A large group of people were on hand Saturday, August 20, for the dedication of the Gary James Memorial Park. The new city park, located east of the Civic Center, has been a community project and was recently named in honor of the Santa Anna native who lost his life in the Vietnam War.

Mayor Edd Hartman welcomed the group and read a tribute to Gary James, noting he was the first Coleman County serviceman to be killed in the Vietnam War and the only

Santa Anna man to lose his life in that conflict. He told of the planning for the park and work by groups and individuals, with contributions of money, labor, materials and equipment. Appreciation was expressed to all who helped make the park a reality. Mayor Hartman stated that the park was not to be a reminder of Gary's death, but a place for families to enjoy.

The Rev. John Stanislaw, pastor of First Baptist Church of which James was a member, gave the dedicatory prayer.

Dixie James Alvey of San Angelo, a sister of Gary, spoke for her mother, Mrs. Madie James, and others of the family, thanking the friends and community for the love and honor shown Gary by naming the park for him.

Mrs. Alvey spoke of Gary's love for his home town, and of the community's love and support to the family at the time of his death. She noted that Gary started school in a (See PARK DEDICATION, Page 2)

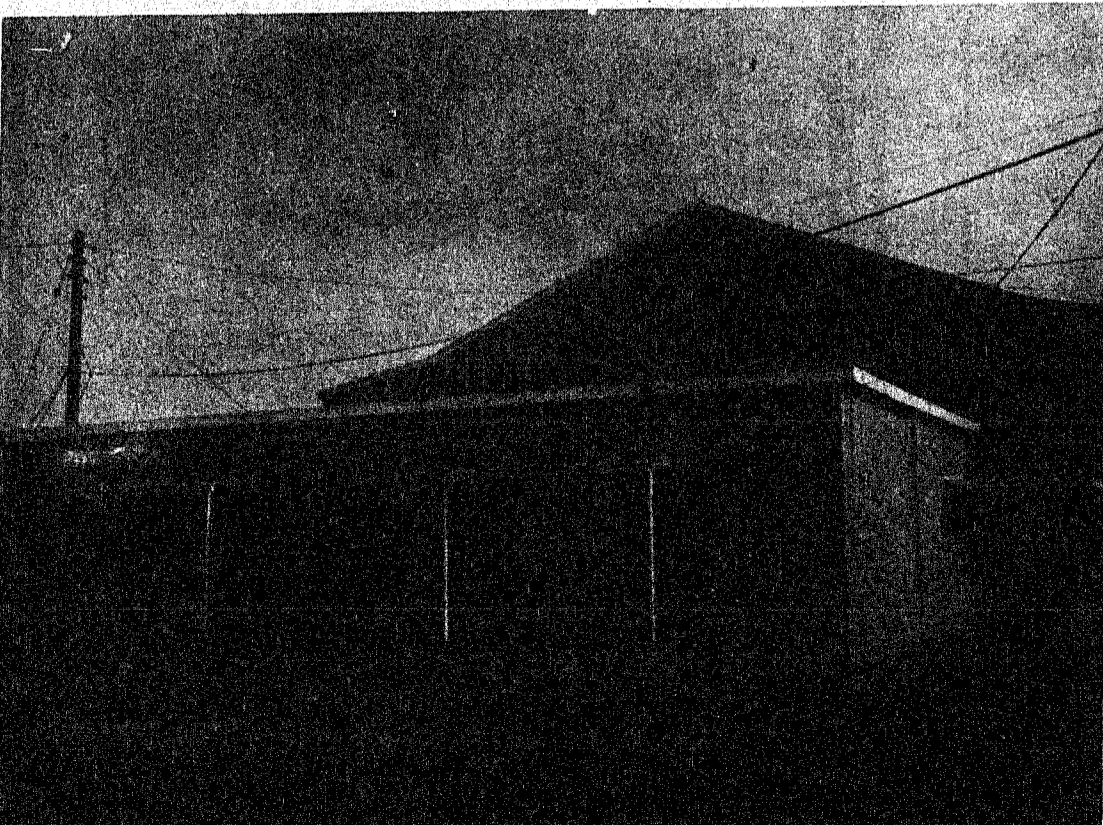
She majored in accounting at HPU, completing her degree requirements in three years.

## City Sales Tax Listed For Month of June

The City of Santa Anna received a sales tax rebate of \$3,627.26 for the period ending August 6. The payment came from the office of State Comptroller Bob Bullock and was collected with the state sales tax from local merchants.

The June total, reported to the State Comptroller in

July, was slightly lower than the same period last year when \$3,647.31 was collected. The total to date for 1983 is \$17,966.96, which is 14 percent below the figure from the same time last year when \$20,952.22 had been collected.

Across the state, the current collections for 1983 are slightly ahead of the previous year despite the decline in tax collections from seven of the 20 largest cities in recent months.

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# Record Electricity Use Noted By WTU On Monday, July 25

The fact that hot weather and high utility bills go hand in hand apparently is being proved again by West Texans.

Electric energy usage in the West Texas Utilities Co. system soared to new records within the past two weeks as temperatures throughout the territory hit the 100-degree mark.

A new record was set on Monday, July 25, when WTU customers used 19,286,000 kilowatt-hours during a 24-hour period. This record was broken the following day when consumption totaled 19,318,000 kilowatt-hours. The old record was 19,216,000 KWh recorded on July 32, 1981.

The peak demand this year still had not reached the all-time record of 994,000 kilowatts, which was set at 5 p.m. August 27, 1982. Peak demand is the largest amount of electricity being used at any given moment during the day. Highest peak so far this year was 982,000 kilowatts on Tuesday, July 26.

"We expect the demand to go higher, but we should have no problem supplying our customers' needs," said Don Welch of Abilene, WTU vice president and director of customer services.

"But we do hope our customers realize that the more energy they use, the higher their bills will be."

Welch added. "We urge them to use electric energy wisely and to conserve when possible."

WTU's on-system generating capacity currently is 1,059,000 kilowatts. This means that with last year's peak demand the Company had a reserve capacity of 6 percent, while the safe reserve is considered to be 15 - 20 percent.

percent.

To assure a reliable supply, WTU has contracts to purchase power when necessary from neighboring electric companies until the Oklahoma Power Station comes on line in late 1986. This station, now under construction near Vernon, will increase WTU's generating capacity by about one-third.

Calvin Fuller Jr., 80, died Sunday, August 21, in Brownwood Regional Hospital after a long illness. Funeral services were held Tuesday, August 23, at United Methodist Church with interment in Santa Anna Cemetery.

The Rev. Bobby Weathers, Methodist district superintendent, was assisted by Dr. Vaughn Baker, pastor, with Henderson Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

The son of the late J. C. and Laura (Alvey) Fuller, he was born December 7, 1902 in Bell County. He married Addie Evans June 18, 1927 in Santa Anna. She died in 1968. He attended the Brown Ranch and Santa Anna schools and spent most of his life in Coleman County. He was a retired stock farmer and a member of the Methodist Church.

Survivors are one daughter, Bobby Fuller of Santa Anna; one sister, Mrs. Rufus Farris of San Angelo; a brother, Alvey Fuller of Camp Wood; and a number of nieces and nephews.

## Grand Jury True Bills Returned

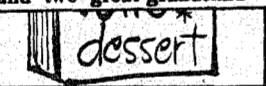

# Growing Up at Whon, Texas

(Fourth in a Series)

Election day was a big day at Whon. Jim Carter was usually the election judge, and when the polls closed, Daddy would often help bring the voting box to Santa Anna. A large board was always hung on the side of the bank building, and results for each voting box were written on it. We always stayed in town until all the returns were in.

REA brought electricity to Whon about 1937. Eddie Paul Voss and his uncle, Roy Voss, wired our house, with the drops costing \$1.50 each. You can't believe how bright our house was that night.

We bought a General Electric refrigerator from George Johnson in Santa Anna, and of course had ice cream that night.

We bought a radio from Sears-Roebuck, and it soon became a big part of our lives. I remember the programs - Pepper Young, Maw Perkins, Stella Dallas, Jack Armstrong - the All American Boy, Orphan Annie and Daddy Warbucks, and of course the news.

In 1936 there was a flood on the Colorado River, and we went down to the Rehm place to the new rock house and looked at the river that had risen high up on the bank. I remember Daddy

scolding me because I said aloud that I wished a house would float down the river.

Back in that time, people didn't go to the doctor unless it was a matter of life or death. I remember in 1934 I fell out of our Ford car just out of Whon, and was bruised and skinned. I had wanted to go home with Edith Ramsey and my cousin, Eva Trull, and was crying so hard I hadn't shut the door of the car. Dr. Williams lived at Rockwood but was pretty old and it was 18 miles to Santa Anna, so anyway my mother and I spent the afternoon with Aunt Madie.

In 1932 my grandfather fell off Aunt Nettie Blackwell's porch and broke his hip. My dad and Aunt Nettie took him to the Sealy Hospital in Santa Anna where an X-ray was made, the first I had ever seen. Grandfather had surgery but died March 31, 1932 and was buried in the Fiveash Cemetery.

I recall Mrs. Ed Spencer had to have an eye removed, and I went with Daddy as he drove Mr. and Mrs. Spencer the 25 miles to Brownwood to Dr. Shelton, an eye, ear, nose and throat specialist. The doctor took the eye out and we brought her right back home. We drove her to Rockwood every three days for awhile where Dr. Williams checked on her.

his arm caught in the gin roller one year, and Alfred Bible used our '34 Ford to take him to the Sealy Hospital. The next morning the car had about one inch of blood in the floor. The man lived but lost his arm.

I talked to some of nieces at Houston Saturday morning and some of them were without electricity, but they did not have any damage from the storm, and none of them were hurt. It was sure a bad storm. We did not get a good rain from it -- just enough to run off the house twice. East of us got one inch. It is dry and hot here.

Researches at the United States Department of Agriculture's consumer nutrition laboratory compared a variety of foods prepared in preheated and non-preheated ovens and found few significant differences in the quality or size of the items, reports home economist Bonnie Piernot.

The non-preheated ovens required five minutes or less extra baking time than the preheated ovens, says Piernot, who is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

The energy savings from not preheating averaged about 10 percent.

The foods used in the research study included pies, cakes, casseroles, souffles and meat loaves. The dishes were prepared in preheated and non-preheated standard gas, continuous-cleaning gas, standard electric and self-

cleaning electric ovens. The variability in baking times reported between preheated and non-preheated ovens was often less than that reported among the different types of ovens, adds the specialist.

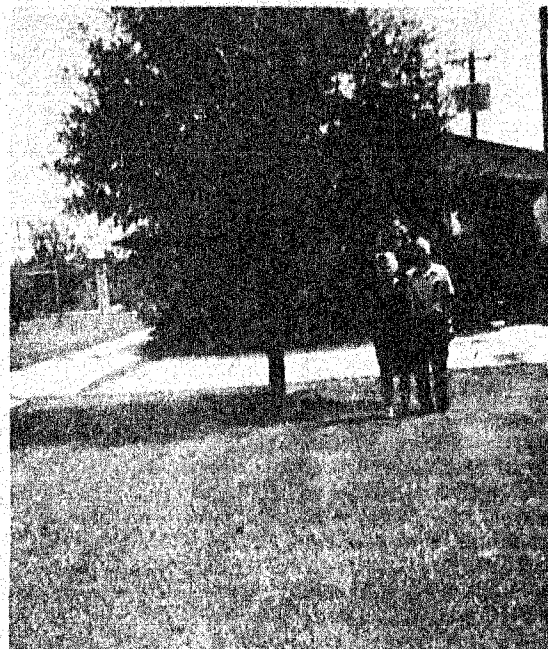

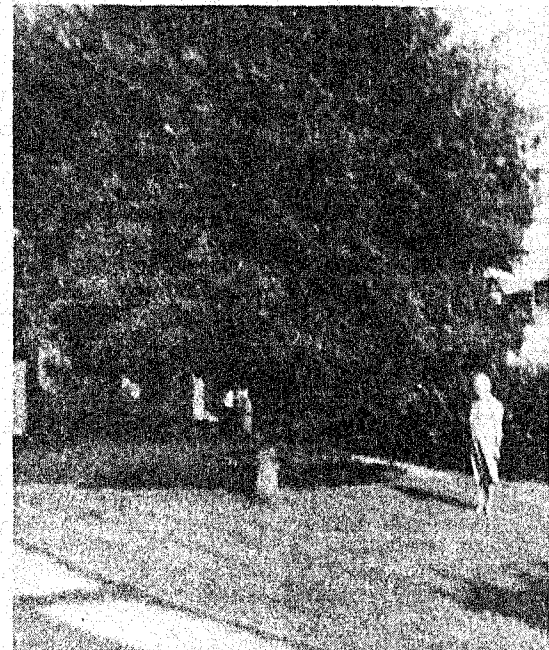

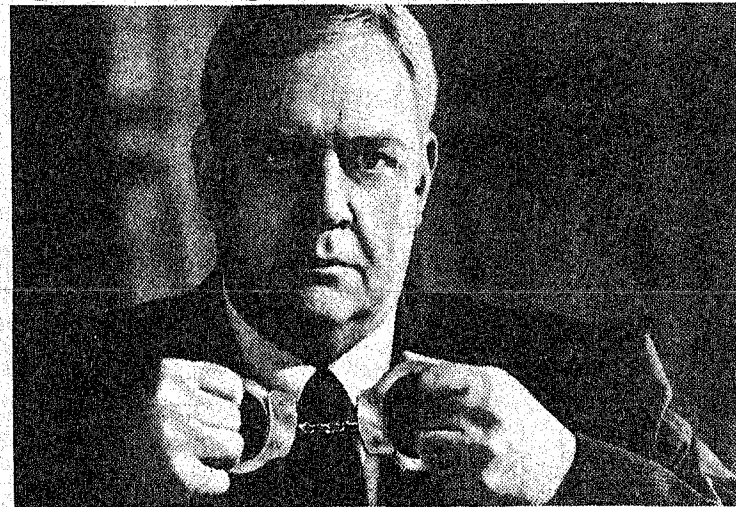
