

Tax Appraisal Board

Holds Monthly Meeting

The Coleman County Tax Appraisal District Board met on Monday, July 11, for the regular monthly session at the Tax District office in Coleman. Harold Pittard, chairman, presided at the meeting. All members of the Board were present except Bill Sned.

Minutes of the June meeting were read and approved, and bills and accounts for the month were reviewed and approved for payment.

John Skelton, Chief Appraiser, reported on the collection of 1982 taxes and reported on the recent sessions of the Appraisal Review Board in which property owners met to ask questions or seek changes in the appraisals.

The contract with Pickett

& Co. for mineral appraisals was renewed. The Company will furnish an appraisal roll for each taxing entity within the Tax Appraisal District.

Allocation of the cost of the 1984 budget was studied, with an alternate system approved. The proposed plan will be sent to each of the taxing entities showing their portion of the cost of the operation of the district.

Correspondence was read from the State Property Tax Board, including a notice of a workshop for area Appraisers and Board Members to be held at Cisco Junior College on July 22. Several from the local Board are expected to attend, as well as Mr. Skelton.



Route 1 Has Great Patrons**Rural Mail Carrier Retires**

Patrons on Santa Anna's Rural Route One are getting acquainted with a new carrier, as Leland Thompson retired from the position on May 27. He had carried the mail on that route since starting as a substitute carrier in June 1951.

Thompson started working on the route when the late Add T. Walker was the carrier, and was full-time carrier for eight months after Walker's death. He continued as substitute during the years Montie L. Guthrie Jr. had the route, assuming the full time position when Guthrie retired in 1978.

Mrs. Jacka Murray of Winters has taken over the route this week, with Tony (Allen) Watson filling in since Thompson's retirement. Mrs. Murray will be commuting from Winters for her new job here.

The son of the late Mr. and Mrs. B. E. Thompson, Leland, came to Coleman County with his parents in 1928 when his father was employed in the oil fields during the Fry oil boom. He attended school at Grosvenor and Thrifty and graduated from Buffalo High School.

Entering the Army with the 36th Division, he served five years and was a

soldier in the Infantry. He fought in the European Theatre and was wounded in action on the Rhine River, returning to action later.

Three days after returning home at the end of World War II he married Martha Harvey, the daughter of Mrs. Joe Harvey and the late Mr. Harvey, and they have made their home here since that time. He worked in the oil fields, had a mechanic shop for awhile and was in the custom combining business. He also owns and operates a farm, the old Parker place, just north of town.

Route One is a daily trip of 81 miles, starting from the Co-op Gin and leading east toward the Liberty community, then toward Buffalo and the area north of the mountain. The route continues west of town and into the Plainview community, with a total of 107 boxes at the present time.

Thompson recalls the terrible roads he traveled during the early years, when mud was pushed up into the radiator of his pickup when it rained. He also says he has probably killed more rattlesnakes than anyone—with 57 to his credit one year.

His courtesy and depend-

dability are verified in that he has never had any problems with his patrons. He expressed his appreciation for their courtesy and thoughtfulness while he was serving as rural mail carrier.

During his years on the route, he had only one accident—in 1981 when a Fort Worth man careened on a dirt road and collided with Thompson's vehicle.

Although Thompson's pickup was "totaled" in the mishap, he sent word for Martha to come for him—and the mail—to continue the route.

Farming, visiting, and going fishing with long-time friend and neighbor, Luther McCrary, are on Thompson's agenda at the present time. He and his wife are members of United Methodist Church and active in the Rural Letter Carriers Association.

He is also an officer in the Buffalo Reunion Association. The Thompsons are parents of a daughter, Mrs. Wendell (Sherry) Rice of Trickham, and grandparents of Jim and Brady Rice.

Social Security Notes

Report a Name Change

A frequent problem that may delay the payment of Social Security benefits is that the applicant did not report a change in his or her name. The problem crops up whenever the name the applicant uses in applying for benefits differs from the one used when he or she applied for a Social Security number years ago.

Sometimes the name change is not the result of legal action, such as marriage or adoption. Many people acquire a different name through usage. Frank Doe applies for benefits and finds that the Social Security records lists the person with that Social Security number as "Franklin' Doe." Frank Doe must prove he is the "Franklin' Doe" with that number in the Social Security records.

The bottom line is that a person must be able to prove that he or she is the person who is listed with the same Social Security number in Social Security records. A difference in the current name listed on the application for benefits raises a question of identity that must be resolved before benefits can be paid. The Social Security office can help you determine what documents are necessary to show who you are.

Women are the applicants most vulnerable to the name-change problem. Many forget to report a change of name to Social Security when they marry or divorce.

Another problem with name changes arises in the reporting of earnings. If you give an employer a name different from the one in the Social Security records, your earnings may not be properly credited, and you may not receive all the Social Security credit due you for

your work. Even people who do not work should report any name change so that their Social Security record will show the correct name when they apply for benefits.

Almost all Social Security matters can be handled by phone. Medicare questions or filing of medicare claims can be taken care of by calling toll free 800-442-2620. You may file an application to establish your eligibility by calling 915-546-7533 in Brownwood.

Make Fitness a Habit Good Exercise Program Essential

COLLEGE STATION

With warmer weather and the bathing-suit season drawing near, countless Texans will be joining the rush to trim down and shape up through exercise.

'But the exercise program you start today could develop into a lifetime health habit if done sensibly,' advises Dr. Mary Ann Shirer, a health education specialist with the Texas Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

To make fitness a habit that is hard to break, start with a physical activity you truly enjoy, says Shirer. That activity might be tennis, swimming, running, dancing, or even walking.

Shirer suggests trying different activities until you find one that is right for you on a regular basis.

Once you have selected an activity, get a friend to join you. Having a commitment to someone else can help provide motivation when you're not as eager to exercise.

The way in which you actually do the physical activity is critical for building the fitness habit,' says Shirer. The person who tions, you may become

discouraged about continuing on an exercise routine.

A cooling down period allows the muscles to relax. It gently returns your body to a less active state which helps prevent muscle cramps and sudden dizziness, says Shirer.

'Make sure that your physical activities are enjoyable and sensible,' says Shirer, 'and you will be motivated to make fitness a part of your life.'



TEXAS CRUDE PRODUCTION

AUSTIN-Texas crude oil production totaled 70,867,955 barrels in April, according to a report June 29 from Railroad Commission Chairman Mack Wallace.

The figure compares with reported March production totaling 73,171,921 barrels and April 1982 production of 72,854,773 barrels.

Texas oil production averaged 2,362,265 barrels daily in April, up from 2,360,385 barrels daily in March and down from 2,428,492 barrels daily in April of last year.

The April production allowable totaled 92,391,94 barrels.

The preliminary April summary indicated Texas oil production was 23.24 percent under the allowable for the month.

The state's top producing counties in April were Pecos, with over 4 million barrels; Ector, Yoakum, Gaines, Gregg, Andrews and Hockley, with over 3 million barrels; Scurry and Crane counties with over 2 million barrels, and Refugio, with almost 2 million barrels.

OIL TRANSPORT MANIFEST RULE

AUSTIN-The Railroad Commission has approved for public comment a proposed rule that would require oil tank trucks to carry identification papers for the oil they are transporting.

The proposed rule would require a cargo manifest for each load of liquid hydrocarbons loaded onto and transported by an oil tanker vehicle. The manifest must identify the lease or facility from which the oil was removed, the amount of oil removed, the date and hour of the removal, identification of the transporter, and the intended destination. Upon request by a Commission agent or other law enforcement official, the transporter must produce the cargo manifest immediately.

A copy of the manifest or a document with the same information must be left at the lease or facility from which the hydrocarbons were removed, or delivered to the lease or facility operator or his representative.

The manifest must be kept for two years by the transporter, and must be available for inspection.
