

New Lunchroom System

By Betty Tucker

How many parents are wondering just what new system at the school lunchroom involves and is all about? The new system is called "Offer vs Serve.'

Very simply, it is a system where the children CHOOSE what they put on their plates, rather than have the lunchroom workers put everything on their plates for them.

The government regulations call for five different food items or components on each daily menu.

In the new system, a child must take at least three of the five food items or components. They may take all five of the items if they choose to do

The menus are always well-balanced, and meals with food items or components from each of the basic food groups. The government also states how much of each item must be offered. The food groups and the requirements are as follows: Classes 3 - 12

Meat or meat alternate - 2 Oz.; 2 vegetables or 1 vegetable and fruit - 1/4 cup; bread - 8 servings weekly (1 Oz. servings);
