School Board Meeting Held

Head Coach, Athletic Director Hired

Odis Summers has been selected by the Santa Anna School District as Head Coach and Athletic Director for the local schools. He will be coming here from Seagraves.

Summers was named to the new position at the Tuesday, July 12, meeting of the Board of Trustees.

He has served the past four years as assistant coach at Seagraves and has a total of 16 years experience. He is a graduate of Texas Tech University and also will teach social studies.

Summers and his wife, Alice, are parents of a son, Kyle, who will be a freshman in high school.

Two elementary teachers are still needed to complete the faculty for the new year.

In other business by the ISD Board, one copying machine was purchased to replace a current model.

Scott Patterson was named to be in charge of bus maintenance for the coming year.

The Board discussed surplus property of various items that are stored in the bus warehouse. An inventory will be made and presented

to the Board, then disposition of the surplus items decided.

Superintendent R. C. Smith was named to represent the local school on the Joint Committee of Region XV Education Service Center. Mr. Smith also reviewed the current year's progress on the Texas Education Association's five-year plan.

The renovation work on the Band Hall was accepted, with carpeting to be installed to complete the work. Joe Deal was contractor for the work.

Donnie Neff, president, led the session, with all members of the Board present. The next regular meeting will be Tuesday, August 9.

City Sales Tax

Is Reported

For Past Month

Santa Anna's city sales tax is running 17 percent under the comparable period last year, according to a recent report from the office of State Comptroller Bob Bullock.

The local sales tax receipts for the period ending July 8 totaled \$1,227.91, making a total for the year of \$14,339.70. The receipts for the same period last year was \$17,304.91.

Sales tax receipts in Houston and El Paso are slightly less than last year, but most other major cities in the state have shown an increase after a decline in previous months. Border cities and oil and gas producing areas are still substantially behind, Bullock said.

The election will be held from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Saturday, August 13, at the Lions Club building. Election judge and clerk will be named at a later date.

Santa Anna ISD Salaries Comparable With Area Schools

Salaries of school administrators and teachers in Texas have been compiled from school district records and have been published as debate continues on public education and the proposed teacher pay increases.

According to the report from State Comptroller Bob Bullock, the highest-paid school superintendent is at Houston with an annual salary of \$96,000, while the lowest is at Cranfills Gap where the administrator receives an annual salary of \$24,416. The figures do not include any fringe benefits such as automobiles, expenses, housing or insurance that might be included by the individual districts.

Houston also listed the highest average daily attendance with 175,329 students in the system. Allamoore ISD had the fewest students with eight listed.

Deer Park teachers received the highest salaries in the state with \$27,090 and \$28,818 for elementary and secondary teachers

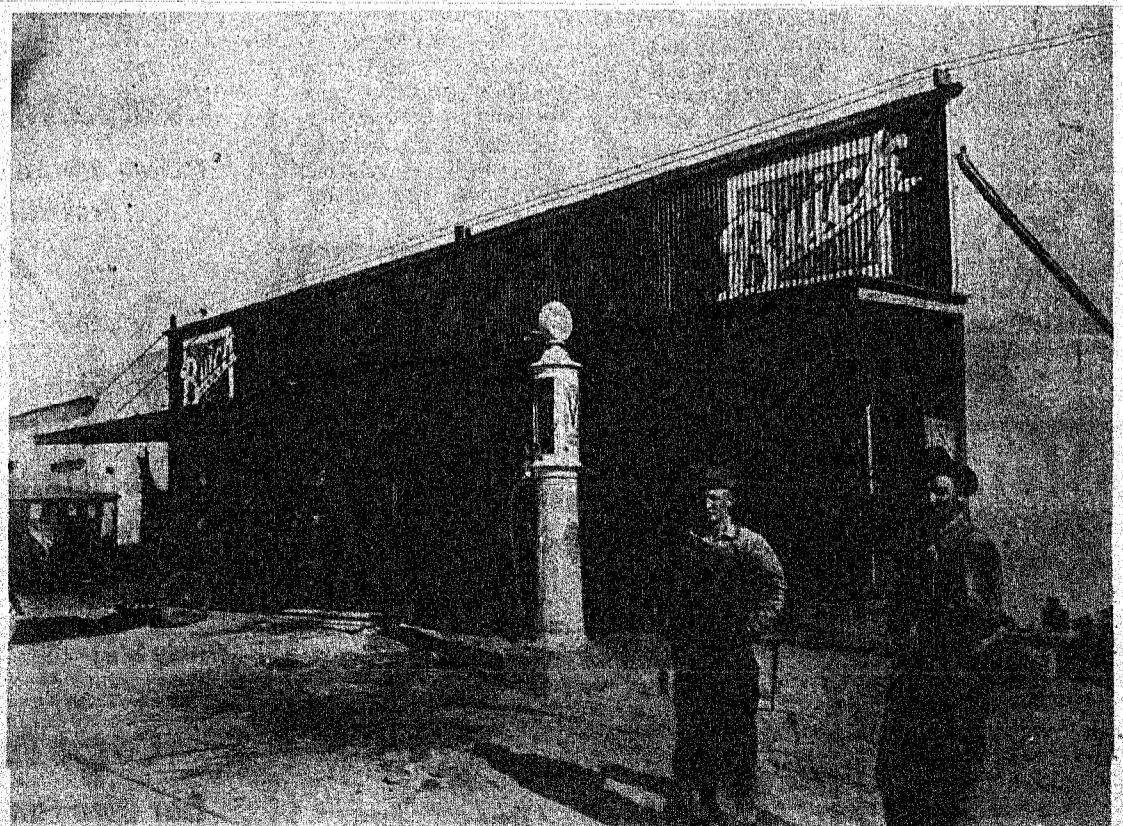
respectively, while Newcastle elementary teachers received \$11,848 and Sulphur Bluff secondary teachers received \$10,934 for the lowest in the state.

City View schools had the highest ratio of administrators to teachers with 1 - 17, while Walnut Bend had 1 - 1 for the lowest ratio.

In the Santa Anna ISD, the superintendent's salary was listed at \$33,724 annually, almost the same as schools the same size in the area. Elementary teachers received an average of \$15,874 per year, and secondary teachers \$16,394.

At Rising Star, the superintendent's salary is less than at Santa Anna, but teachers receive higher salaries. At Cross Plains, the superintendent's salary is almost the same as Santa Anna but teachers receive higher pay. Goldthwaite ISD's salaries are almost identical to Santa Anna.

The ratio of administrators to teachers in the local school system is 1 - 8, with average daily attendance listed at 363.

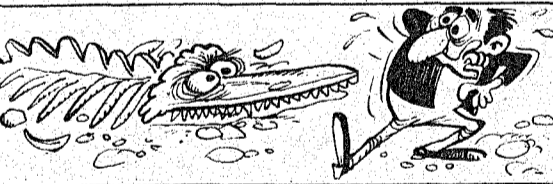

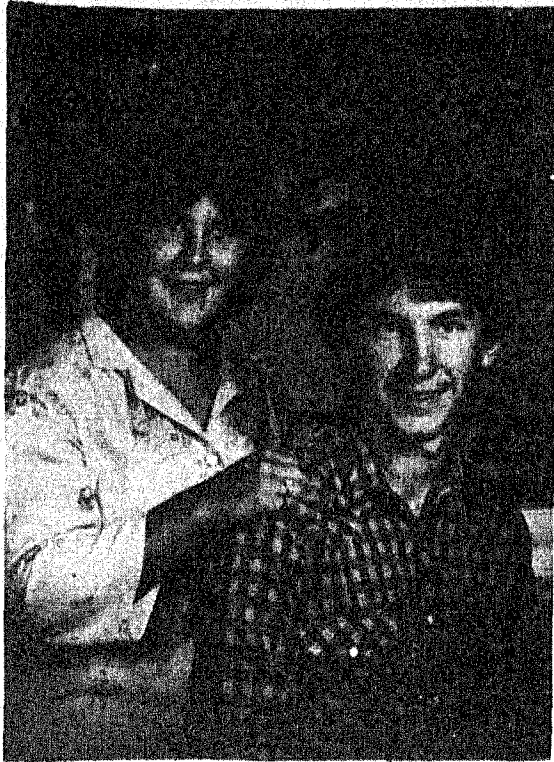

Area Oil News

Shield Energy Inc. of Austin completed No. 1 Shield Ranch Inc. in the Coleman County Regular Field three miles east of Santa Anna on a 15 1/2-acre lease.

Wellsite is in the Mary Ann Fisk Survey A-195. Completed on a pump, it had a daily potential of six barrels of 40 gravity oil. Production is from perforations at 1,471-79 feet, fractured with 100 sacks of sand and an unreported amount of gelled water.

Operator set the 4 1/2-inch casing at 1,684 feet, and the hole is bottomed at 1,700 feet, and plugged back to 1,500 feet.

The elevation is 1,584 feet.

James D. Rice of Santa Anna completed No. 1 Little Stephenson in the Coleman County Regular Field located five miles southwest of Santa Anna.

Wellsite is in the Cred Pendleton Survey 274, producing from perforations at 1,748 - 51 feet.

Operator set the 4 1/2 inch casing at 1,800 feet, total depth.

TEXAS GAS PRODUCTION

AUSTIN, May 19 - Railroad Commission Chairman Mack Wallace announced that Texas oil and gas wells produced 432,402,219 Mcf of gas in February, down 11.9 percent from field runs a year earlier.

Marketed gas production totaled 356,859,036 Mcf and reflected a 14.63 percent decrease from the February 1982 volume. Marketed production is the total gas to transmission lines, carbon black and plant fuel and lease use.

Gas discoveries in June included 52 in deep South Texas, 37 in the Refugio area, 20 in West Central Texas, 18 in Southeast Texas, 16 in East Texas, five in the San Antonio area, four in East Central Texas, three in North Texas, two in the Panhandle, and one in the San Angelo area.

Oil discoveries included 23 in West Central Texas, 16 in Southeast Texas, 10 in deep East Texas, eight each in North Texas and the San Angelo area, six in East Texas, four in the Refugio area, three each in the Midland and Lubbock areas, and two in the Panhandle.

In June, operators reported 435 exploratory and field tests wound up as dry holes.

New applications for permits to drill oil and gas tests totaled 2,684 in June, as compared to 2,586 during the same month a year ago.

Applications to drill, deepen, plug back and for service wells in June amounted to 3,085 against 2,945 a year earlier.

Operators filed 744 amended applications to drill.

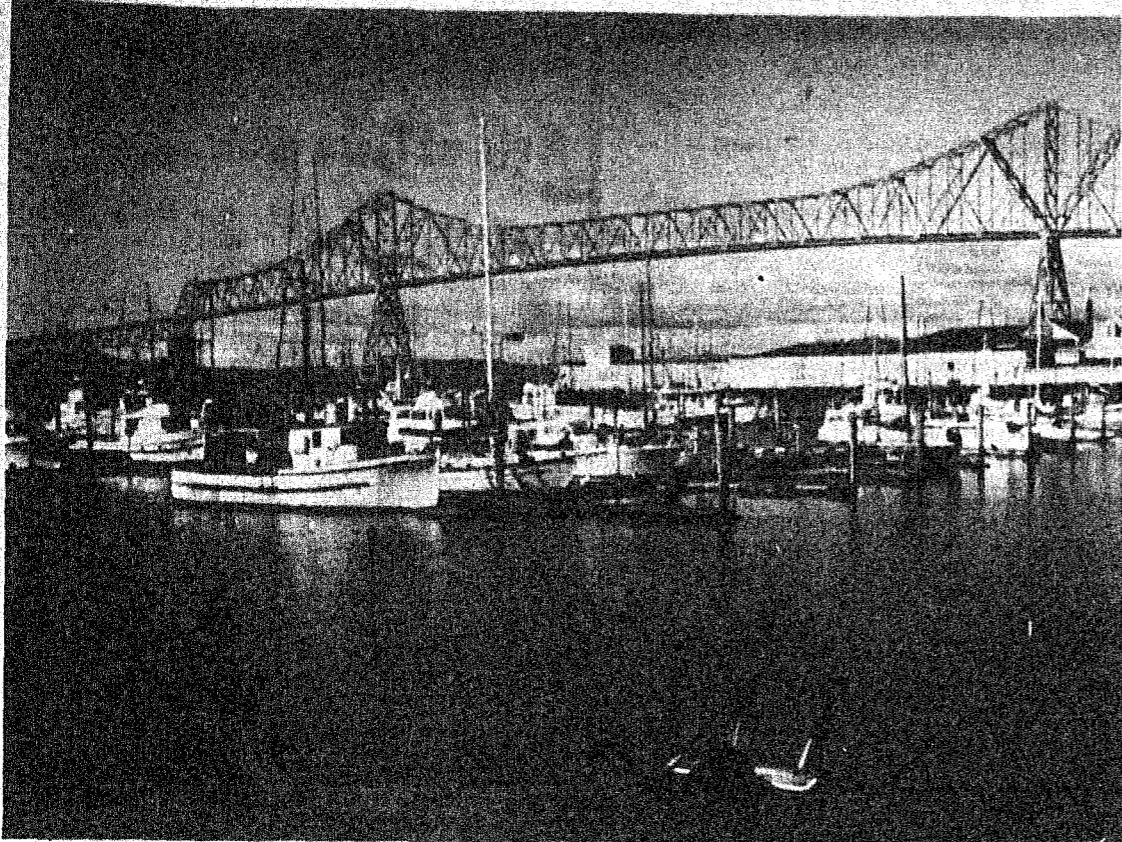

Broken Bones Most Frequent In Older Women in Minor Falls

"Many women say they don't like or can't drink milk. And they're not unlike the average American women," says Marilyn Haggard, a foods and nutrition specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. Recent studies suggest that women would benefit from drinking more milk.

Men also need the calcium provided by dairy products, but women have a greater need, Haggard says. Of the six million broken bones caused by minor falls in 1981, over 80 percent occurred in older women. As they grow older, women become more vulnerable to the weakening of their bone structure -- a condition known as osteoporosis. The best prevention is good nutrition,

including an adequate supply of calcium daily over the lifespan. All adult women should have at least two cups of milk daily, or its equivalent in cheeses or yogurt.

Stress affects entire families, not just individuals. The key to mastering family stress is flexibility.

The highly stressed family is tense, rigid and inflexible when it comes to adjusting rules or expectations, so it can't respond to a "pile-up" of changing family events. Most families know unexpected events such as moving to another city, the serious illness of a child, or loss of a job are stressful.

But many don't realize that even pleasant unexpected events such as a relative's surprise visit or

the long-awaited birth of a baby can create stress as well.

Stress is a natural part of life which cannot be avoided, but planning family coping strategies for expected events can eliminate some pressure.

He suggested that controlling negative attitudes by viewing unexpected events optimistically, trying to analyze and understand them, or utilizing one's religious beliefs are effective in reducing stress.

Families must learn flexibility, or to act in a way different from their usual style in certain situations. For example, highly stressed family members might work off their tensions by playing ball together on a Saturday afternoon rather than doing their regular house-

hold chores. Families should not be reluctant to use a network of relatives and friends, church and community resources including medical services, educational opportunities, support groups and family counselors to help them through a particular situation.

IT'S A FACT!

Oil field technology is being utilized to move coal faster and more safely from the underground mine face to the surface.

The first-of-its-kind system—developed by engineers of Conoco Inc.—transports a slurry of coarse coal and water through a pipeline snaking its way through mine tunnels.

Centrifugal pumps push the slurry up an 850-foot vertical pipe to the surface at a rate

of up to 14 tons a minute. The slurry is then pumped overland 2.4 miles through a 12-inch pipe to a preparation plant where the coal is separated from the water and loaded into railroad cars. The water is recycled to the mine for another trip.

The system, which took more than a decade to perfect, is improving productivity at Conoco's Loveridge mine in West Virginia.

Health Notes

Americans Like Salt

Americans like salt. In fact, it's second only to sugar in popularity as a food additive. The human body uses only about one-half teaspoon of salt per day, but the average

American eats three to eight teaspoons of salt a day, says Mary K. Sweeten, a foods and nutrition specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

The sodium in salt causes concern, because excess sodium can contribute to high blood pressure and other health problems, says Sweeten. Much of the sodium in diets come from processed food, including non-salty favorites like instant pudding, and commercially prepared cakes and pastries, she adds.

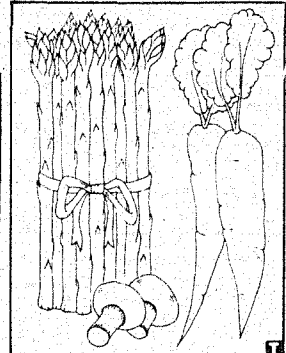
Labels Must Indicate Contents of Package

The food and Drug Administration requires that packaging which makes a specific nutritional claim must have the product's nutritional content printed on the label, says Marilyn Haggard, a food and nutrition specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. The label must show the serving size, calories, and amounts of protein, carbohydrates and fats per

serving. It must also indicate the percentage of US RDA provided per serving. The RDA stands for 'recommended daily allowance' or the approximate amounts of protein, vitamins, and minerals needed by adults for good health. To eat an adequate diet, the total amount of food consumed in a day should add up to about 100 percent of the US RDA for nutrients, says Haggard.

Social Security Notes

Estimating Your S-Security Income

People who want to know how much they can expect their Social Security payment to be when they retire can do so a lot easier than they may think, depending on how old they are. The closer you are to retirement age, the easier it is for Social Security to figure out how much your benefit will be. It is possible for even a young worker to get at least some idea of what to expect in retirement benefits in the future.

Social Security benefits increase automatically with the cost of living once a person is eligible for them.

Younger workers should know that benefits are figured as a uniform percentage of prior earnings. A younger worker retiring in the year 2020 who earned the maximum amount taxed by Social Security may expect to receive a benefit equal to about 29 percent of his or her earnings preceding retirement. A worker with

average earnings may expect to receive 42 percent, and a worker earning at the minimum wage level over his or her working life may expect to receive 54 percent of prior monthly earnings. Benefits being paid to today's workers fall roughly into the same earnings replacement rates.

Almost all Social Security questions can be handled by phone. The Brownwood office is 646-7533, or toll-free number is 800-442-2620.

Your exact Social Security payment can't be computed until you're ready to retire, since all your earnings covered by Social Security up to that time will be included. Social Security benefit amounts are based on a worker's annual earnings over his or her working life, indexed for inflation. The maximum benefit payable for a person retiring at age 65 today is \$729, and the average retirement benefit being paid is \$406.

People can get an estimate of their benefit at age 65 by calling the Social Security office and requesting a form which can be used to send for the information. The form is sent to the Social Security Headquarters in Baltimore, Maryland, and will be returned with a statement of the earnings credited to his or her record and a benefit estimate if requested.

The estimate is based on earnings now shown on the person's record. The benefit you will actually receive at 65 will take into account any additional earnings covered by Social Security that you have before age 65. In addition,

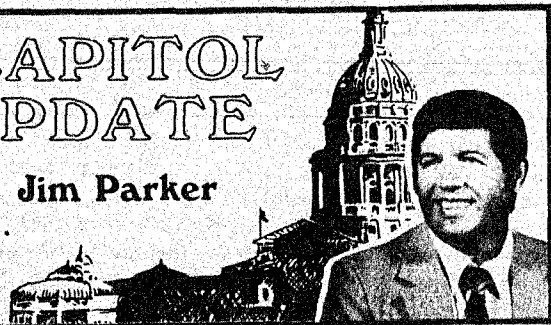

Since the Select Committee on Public Education has begun their meetings, it might be best to postpone further discussion on different aspects of our educational system until the committee is ready to make recommendations. According to Ross Perot, chairman of the committee, meetings are going to be scheduled throughout the state and are planned through October. It is very apparent to me that a special session cannot be called until after that time.

Let me make you aware of some facts which were astounding to me and which were presented to the members of the Select Committee at their first meeting this week.

Fact #1. Russia is #1 in math and science educa-

tion with Japan (whose entire educational system was revamped along the lines of the U.S. System after W.W. II) not far behind.

Fact #2. The U.S. is now ranked 15th.

Fact #3. Following 9th grade, most Japanese students have the same education as 90 percent of our high school seniors.

Fact #4. In the U.S. there is a 10 percent illiteracy rate among 17 year olds, and 40 percent among minority 17 year olds.

Fact #5. Paul Copperman was quoted in "A Nation at Risk" as saying: "For the first time in the history of this country, the educational skills of this generation will not surpass, will not even ap-

proach, those of their parents."

I wonder if these facts are as surprising to you they were to me. I do not envy the committee the monumental task before them.

Before closing for this week, let me tell you of some plans I have in the district. Prior to my election I heard many of you complain about having candidates visit you towns but never "darken your door" after election. 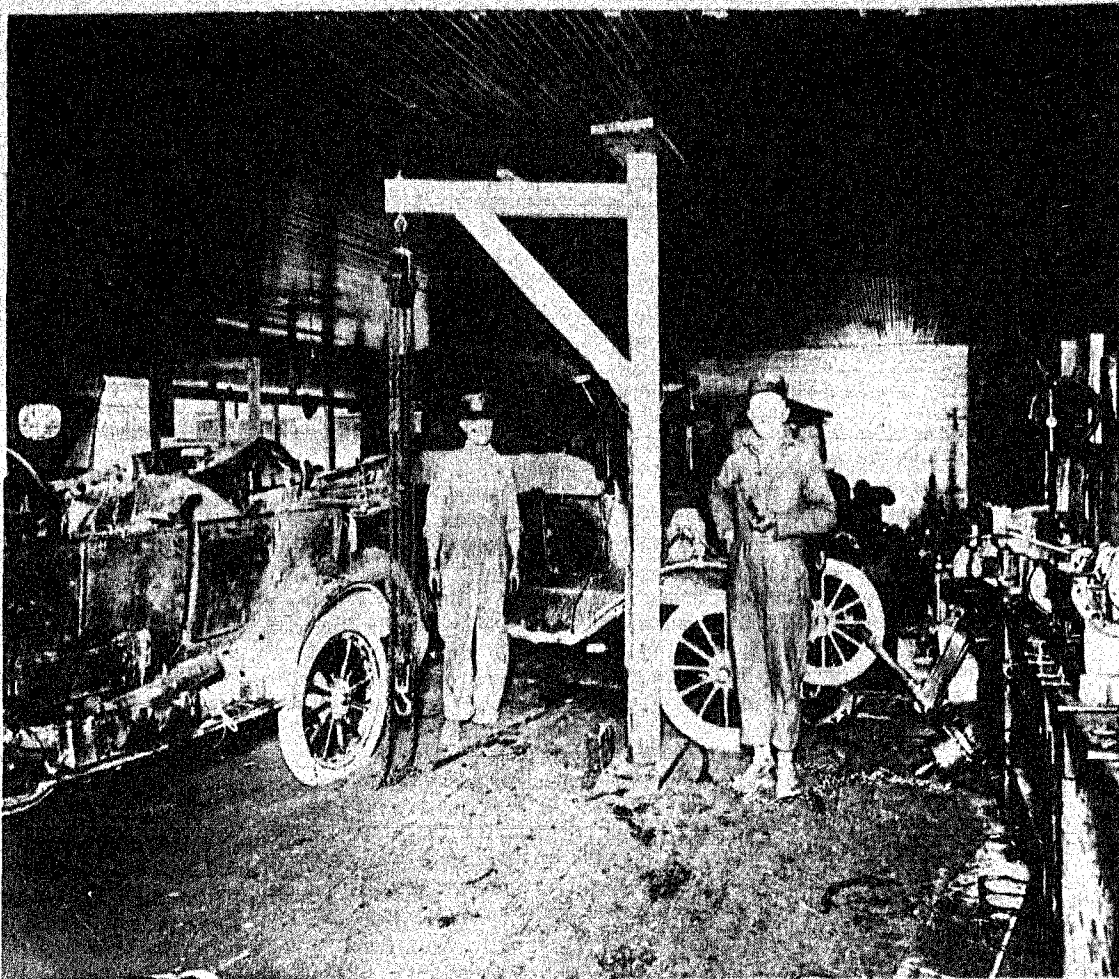
