Fire Prevention Poster Contest Slated for Students

The Ladies Auxiliary of Santa Anna Volunteer Fire Department will sponsor a poster contest for elementary children this month, a project held in conjunction with the annual Fire Prevention Week October 9 - 15.

The contest is open to all children from grades kindergarten through fifth, with the deadline being Monday, October 31.

First, second and third place winners in each grade will be awarded cash prizes and their posters submitted for area judging.

Children in grades kindergarten through second will compete in the primary division, and grades three through five in the intermediate division. Posters must be original and may be on any phase of fire prevention. Only one entry per stu-

dent will be accepted, and the work must be that of the individual.

Elaine Brown, VFD Auxiliary spokesperson, said the posters must be 14 by 22 inches in size, and no objects over one-half inch in height may be placed on the posters. Painted, cut out or any forms of pen and ink work may be mounted on the board, but no live matches or glass is accepted on the posters.

Sealed envelopes containing the student's name, address, name of school and grade, name of the local fire department and district association must be attached to each poster.

All the local entries are to be turned in to Bradley Lumber Co. by the October 31 deadline. They will be displayed at the Lions Club building following the judging.

Activities and Events Slated During Weekend

Former Santa Anna students and teachers will meet this weekend for the 31st annual Ex-Student Homecoming. Students from classes ending in "3" will be recognized during the event.

Opening the activities will be a parade in downtown Santa Anna Friday at 2:30 p.m. The parade will end at the school campus, where a pep

rally will be held.

The Student Council is sponsor of the parade, with several floats and decorated cars to be included, as well as the band, Homecoming Queen candidates and the 1983 honorees of the Ex-Student Association.

The Santa Anna football team will play Cross Plains in the Homecom-

ing game starting at 7:30 p.m. During halftime activities, the Coming Home Queen will be presented and the Ex-Student of the Year introduced. The high school Homecoming Queen will be crowned, the selection made by the student body.

Saturday events will begin at 9 a.m. with registration and a coffee. Lois Ann Shields Harper is in charge of the registration that will be at both the elementary and high school entrance halls. Tickets for all the events will also be available upon registration.

The coffee will be at the school cafeteria from 9 - 10:30 a.m. Roberta Morgan Tomlinson is chairman of the coffee.

The Mountaineer Band will play a short concert at the high school auditorium at 10 a.m. prior to the 10:30 business meeting and program. The Ex-Student of the Year will be presented, and the Coming Home Queen introduced.

Pete Simmons, Association president, will lead the meeting that will

include the election of new officers. Patrick Hosch, immediate past president, is chairman of the nomination committee. Officers will be elected for two-year terms.

Other officers of the group whose terms expire are Terry McIver, first vice president; Pam Garrett Anderson, second vice president; Leanna Pollock Hartman, secretary-treasurer; and Dickie Horner, Bettie Ruth Blue Henderson and Roberta Morgan Tomlinson, directors.

The Band Booster Club will serve lunch at the school cafeteria starting at 12 noon, and class reunions and visitation is scheduled during the afternoon.

The Homecoming dance will be held at the Civic Center (former Armory) from 9 p.m. to 1 a.m. Clear Fork, a progressive country-western band from Hawley, will provide music, with admission to be \$5 for singles and \$8 per couple.

The doors will open at 8:30 p.m., and a room at the building will be open for those who wish to visit.

Local Man is Selected 1983 Ex-Student of the Year

For the first time in the history of the Ex-Student Association, a local person is being honored as "Ex-Student of the Year." Chosen for the honor for 1983 is William R. Brown, a Santa Anna stockfarmer and community leader.

Mr. Brown was born in the Leedy Community ten miles south of Santa Anna and attended the Leedy School through his sophomore year, transferring to Santa Anna as a junior. He is the son of Mrs. John Brown, now residing in a nursing home in Brownwood, and the late Mr. Brown.

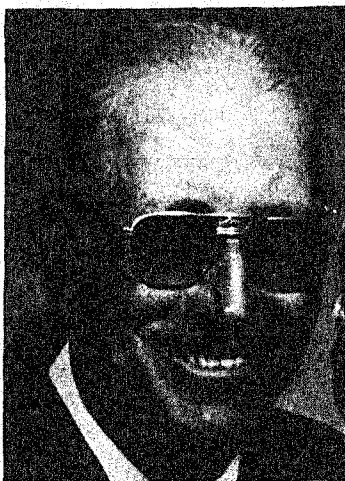
While a student at SAHS, Brown took part in the FFA program and showed calves under J. M. Binion, who was also his track coach. J. R. Locke was coach of the basketball team of which he was a member.

After graduation from SAHS, Mr. Brown farmed with his father and worked in the meat department of Piggly Wiggly grocery store in Santa Anna. He married Aurelia Tweedle, also a SAHS graduate, in 1936, and they moved to the Buffalo Community where they have resided since that time.

One of the most active civic and church leaders in the county, Mr. Brown has served on almost every board and organization, being one of the original directors of the Santa Anna Wool Warehouse, and the only remaining original director of Santa Anna Co-Op Gin where he also served for a time as manager.

A great supporter of education, Mr. Brown has served on the Board of Trustees at two schools. He served at Buffalo for eight years and at Santa Anna for 12 years, part of that time as president. He has been a director and officer of the Santa Anna Livestock Association and is currently a director of the Coleman County Farm Bureau.

Mr. Brown worked at one time with the county AAA program, now the ASCS, and served on the County Draft Board and the Farmers Home

Administration.

He is deacon at First Baptist Church and currently a teacher in the Junior High School department. He is a member of the church choir and on several other committees, including the Missions Committee that is assisting the new Mexican mission with their building program.

Mr. Brown, who raises cotton, small grain and crossbred cattle, is never too busy to help a friend or neighbor. He is well-known as a community leader and an outstanding citizen of the area.

A former president of the Santa Anna Ex-Student Association, Mr. Brown has attended almost every school reunion since the organization of the group.

The Browns are parents of one son, Randy, a 1963 graduate of Santa Anna High School who resides with his wife and children on the family ranch in the Cleveland Community.

The Ex-Student of the Year will be introduced at the Friday night football game, and the official presentation will be made at the Saturday morning program and business meeting.

Gas Rate Increase Proposed

City Council Meeting Held

A 6.47 percent increase in Lone Star Gas Company rates will be charged to customers in Santa Anna starting on October 28. The increase was applied for several months ago and has been tabled by the City Council. The proposal will be brought again to the group at the next meeting, but in the meantime, the Company has the authority to include the additional rate on the monthly bills.

Although the rate increase will go into effect, the increased amount will be refunded to local customers if the increase is later denied.

J. C. Wilkerson of Lone Star Gas Company met with the Council at the Thursday, October 6, meeting to discuss the issue.

The City Council approved the use of the Civic Center (former Armory) for the Senior Citizens Nutrition Pro-

gram, with renovations planned at the Center to accommodate the program.

Although the project will continue for the time being at the downtown Mountain City Center, it will be moved to the new site where more room and parking space are available. The move is expected to take place in early 1984.

Patrick Hosch met with the Council concerning the disposition of the old Blue Hardware building on Wallis Avenue. Ownership of the building has been questioned, but the City is listed as owner of the property. The Council agreed to investigate funding from historical agencies to restore the exterior of the rock building.

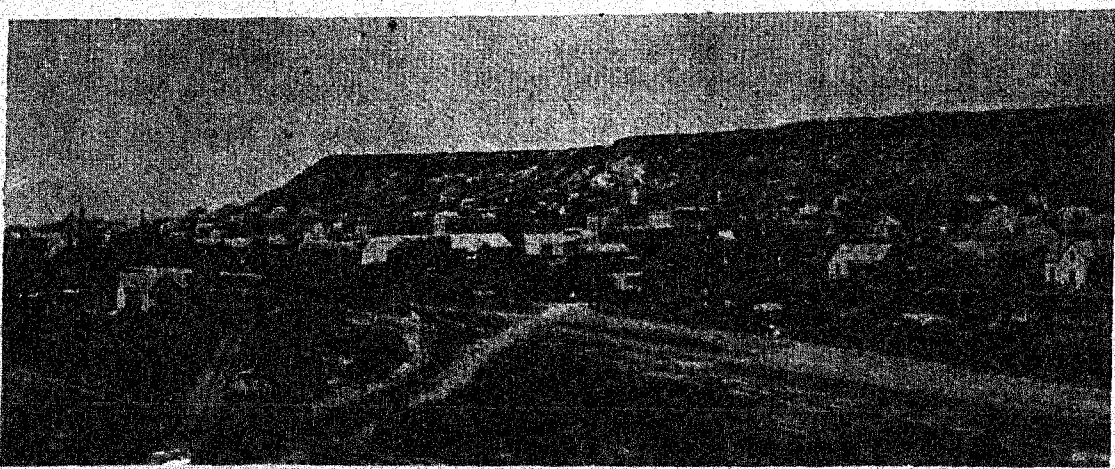
Police Chief Russ Ellis gave his monthly report to the Council and requested the City purchase an addi-

tional police car. The one vehicle is used at night by the night watchman, leaving Ellis without an official vehicle.

The Council approved the purchase of a second car, and discussed the addition of another policeman.

The Council approved at first reading the one per cent sales tax proposal for gas and electricity customers in Santa Anna. The tax was levied on local customers in former years but discontinued in 1968. Revenue from the one per cent utility tax will amount to approximately \$2,000 per year, according to Pat Rutherford, City Secretary. With two additional readings and a mandatory waiting period, the tax would go into effect in April 1984.

Other routine business was attended to by the City Council, with Mayor Ed Hartman presiding.

Saturday Rain Brings Relief to Community

The Santa Anna area received rainfall Saturday night, with the official gauge at the R. W. Balke home recording 1.65 inches. Unofficial reports from the town listed up to two inches during the downpour.

High winds accompanied the rain, and tree limbs were blown down throughout the town, but no damage reported.

Utility company crews removed tree limbs from overhead lines, and homeowners were cleaning yards and driveways

following the storm. The rainfall was the first recorded in Santa Anna since mid-September when one-tenth inch was reported.

In the Cross Roads community northeast of Coleman, four inches of rain was reported Saturday night. The Buffalo community had from 1.5 to two inches, and that amount was reported south of town.

The rainfall did not cover a great amount of territory, as Rockwood and other southern parts of the community did not receive any moisture.

Mountaineers Win Again!

Rochelle Defeated by 65 - 8 Score

The Santa Anna Mountaineers scored another victory last Friday night, defeating the Rochelle team 65 - 8. Coach Odis Summers' squad put together a fine effort, and with the good lead, every boy on the team spent some time on the field. The first team defensive squad allowed only one first down while they were on the field.

The Mountaineers took over early in the first period, scoring during their first possession when Chris DeLeon ran from the one yard line for a touchdown. The extra point by Ramon (Bebe) Vasquez gave Santa Anna a 7-0 lead.

During the next possession, Shelby Tuttle ran 29 yards for another TD, with the PAT adding another point. Vasquez added his third consecutive PAT following the next touchdown, a seven-yard run by Doug Warnock on a pass play from Raymon Castillo.

The first quarter ended 28 - 0 for Santa Anna after James Bass scampered 28

yards for the fourth TD, followed by a bonus point by Vasquez.

Shelby Tuttle scored a second time in the next quarter on a three-yard run, and Chris DeLeon made another touchdown from the ten before halftime. The PAT's were not good.

With a lead of 40-0, the Mountaineers returned to the field and Castillo again hit Warnock on the second play after halftime for a 48-yard run and another score. Kyle Summers made another TD on a 14 yard run, but neither PAT was good.

Paulie Vasquez took over the kicking duties from his brother in the final quarter, making the PAT after a 36-yard touchdown run by Summers. The final TD was made by Russell Williams on a one-yard play.

Rochelle was able to put together a drive late in the final quarter for their only touchdown and two conversion points.

Shelby Tuttle led in yards gained with 89 on 14 plays.

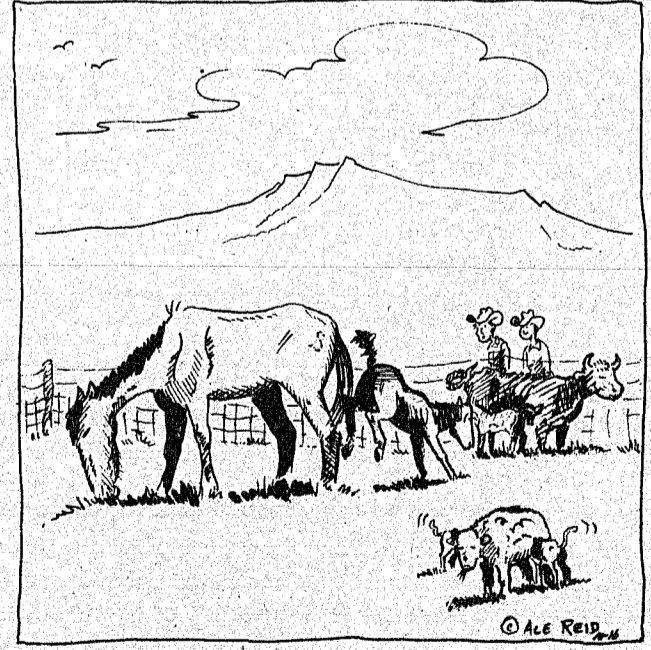

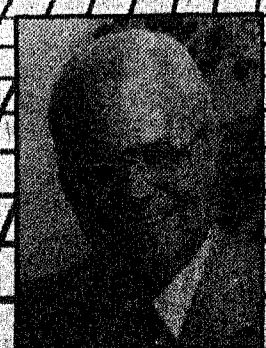

City Police Report

There were no new criminal cases filed with the Police Department last week, according to Chief Russ Ellis. A 10-speed bike was recovered by Mr. Ellis at a vacant house. He said that so far he has not received a report of a missing bike. It is being stored at the Police Department.

One minor traffic accident was reported. A pickup truck driven by 36-year-old Pat Dowdy of Santa Anna struck a parked car owned by Quinton Daniel of Santa Anna. The accident occurred October 5 in front of H&H Grocery. Police cited Mr. Dowdy for improper backing and for driving with an expired driver's license. Damage was estimated at \$250 to the Daniel car and none to the pickup truck.

Chief Ellis warns motorists that there is a solid yellow line in the 100 block of South 2nd Street in front of H&H Grocery, and that it is illegal to turn across the yellow line to park on the other side of the street. He has observed many drivers doing this, and said he is going to have to start issuing citations to violators.

The practice of making U-turns at that location is, very dangerous, Mr. Ellis said, and he is afraid a more serious accident will occur if it continues.

Chief Ellis said he is expecting a large turnout for the high school homecoming this weekend, and he will be patrolling as much as possible in order to insure that everyone has a good time without getting hurt or causing problems for others.

He said citations will be issued for traffic violations and he will be watching especially for drivers under the influence of intoxicants.

Fire Prevention Rules During Special Week

If a fire breaks out in your home do you and your family know what to do? Do you have the phone number of the local fire department readily available?

A recent article reminded everyone that the answer to those questions may save your life. Also listed were some important things to remember, and to review with your family during Fire Prevention Week and at other times during the year.

The key word is prevention. Check around your house for fire hazards. Old rags, papers or other trash, faulty electrical wiring and containers of flammable liquids are dangerous.

Make plans in the event of a fire. Have an escape route mapped out with your family, and an alternate route planned in case the normal exits are blocked. Have practice runs so

everyone is familiar with the plan.

Fire is never planned - so plan ahead on what to do, where to go and whom to call.

The Santa Anna VFD encourages everyone to have fire extinguishers available in their homes and vehicles. Also vitally important to homeowners are smoke detectors, now readily available and reasonably priced.

The Arm & Hammer Company are offering a Fire Pail label free of charge. It is bright red and has valuable information on what to do in case certain types of fire break out.

On the label are pictures of a fire truck, police car, doctor's bag, etc., and spaces to insert the telephone numbers of each one. Even children who cannot read can learn the emergency numbers and be taught to call them if necessary.

The label can be placed on an ordinary coffee can or other container and filled with baking soda - a good fire extinguisher for many types of fires.

Multi-ethnic Books Improve Reading Skills

COLLEGE STATION — When it comes to teaching minority children to read, stories about Juan and Little Running Bear may be more effective than Dick, Jane and Spot.

Initial studies by Texas A&M University education professor Dr. Donna Norton have shown that a multi-ethnic reading curriculum improves children's reading skills and their attitudes about ethnic groups.

The total reading program is a combination of prepared teachers, good materials and follow-up activities that Norton has correlated with more than 300 books at various reading levels about the cultures and lives of American Indians, hispanics and blacks.

"Basically the previous reading materials used in the schools said to minority children, 'You don't exist,'" said Norton. Consequently children may have low opinions of minority groups

and of themselves if they happen to be a member of one of those groups."

During initial research Norton and an advisory group of teachers, parents and Texas A&M College of Education faculty defined three major areas of concern: lack of teacher preparation to teach minority materials and the low reading progress of ethnic minorities.

Norton said her program tackles each of these problems.

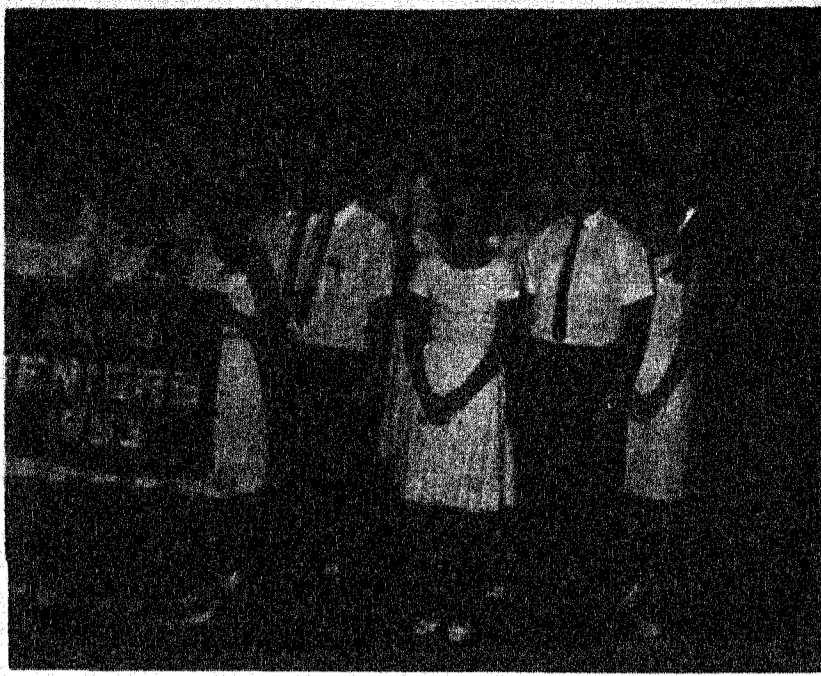

Hunter Safety Urged By Medical Association

As the main hunting season begins in Texas, safety should be the foremost concern in using a firearm, says the Texas Medical Association.

This applies particularly to hunters under age 21, who cause almost 60 percent of gun casualties. Persons in this age group also make up about 40 percent of all accident victims. For this reason, hunter safety programs in Texas concentrate on the young hunter.

But safety while hunting applies to all ages. As guidelines, the Texas Department of Parks and Wildlife lists the Ten Commandments of Firearm Safety:

-Treat every gun as if it were loaded.

-Be able to control the direction of the gun's muzzle even if you should stumble.

-Be sure the barrel is clear of obstructions. Use only ammunition of the proper size for the gun you are carrying.

-Unload guns when not in use. They should be carried in cases to the shooting area.

-Never point a gun at anything you do not want to shoot. Avoid all horseplay with a firearm.

-Never climb a fence or tree or jump a ditch with a loaded gun. And never pull a gun toward you by the muzzle.

-Be sure of your target before pulling the trigger.

-Never shoot a bullet at a flat, hard surface or at water. During target practice, be sure your backstop is adequate.

-Store guns and ammunition separately beyond the reach of children and careless adults.

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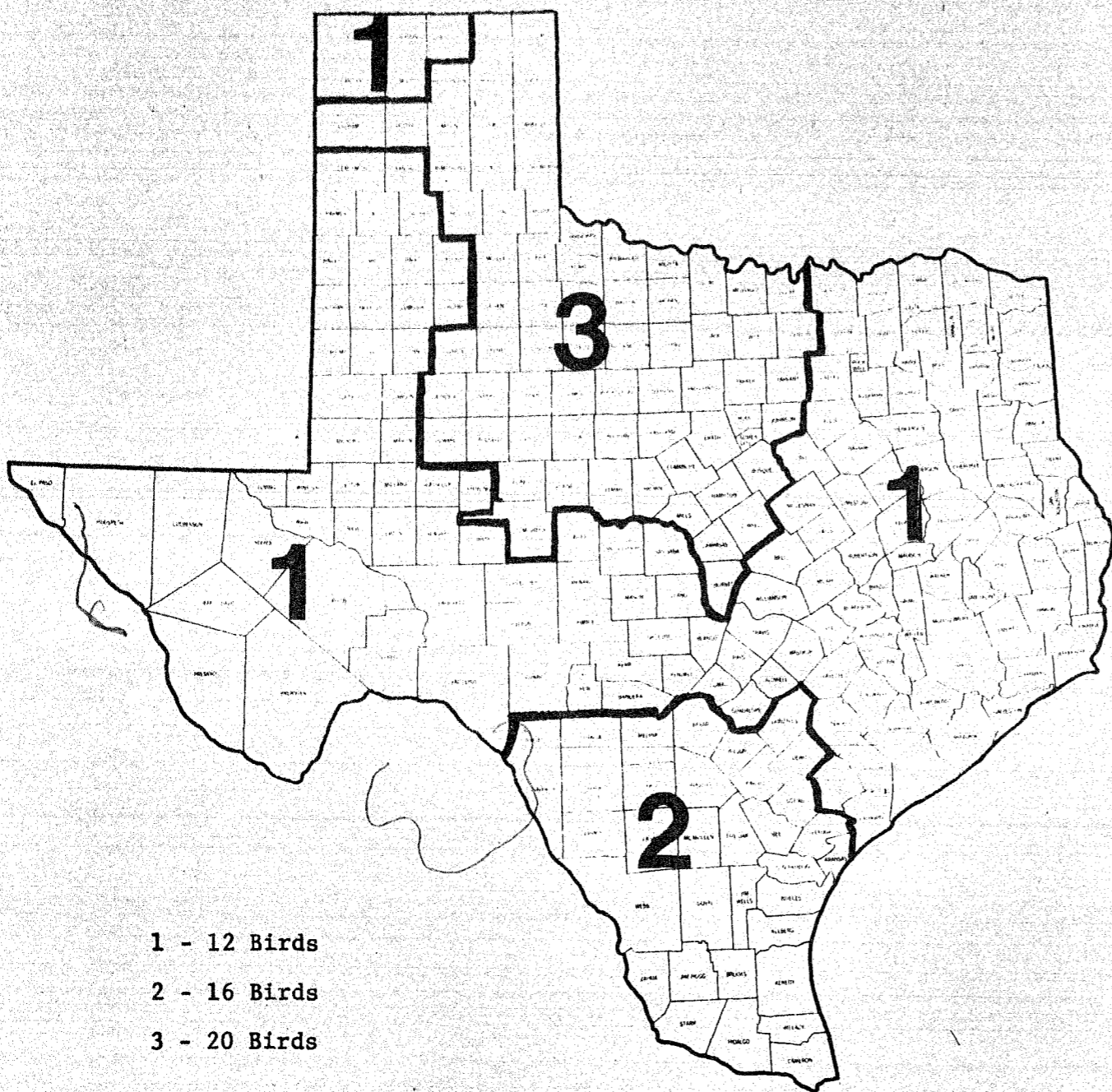

Quail Bag Limits 1983



Information Antlerless Deer Permits Will Soon Be Available Listed For Quail Season

The 1983 quail hunting season will open in mid-November, and Texas Parks and Wildlife officials have recently set the bag limits for the state.

Coleman County, and most of the central north Texas area, is in Zone 3, where hunters may kill 20 birds per day and have as many as 60 in possession. Zone 1, that includes parts of the state that reach from the Big Bend area and far west to the entire far eastern part, has a 12 bird limit. A five-county area in the panhandle also is zoned for the 12 bird limit. This also includes 36 in possession.

The south-most part of Texas in Zone 2, with the limit of 16 birds daily and 48 in possession.

The drought in much of the state may affect the quail harvest this year, but earlier reports indicated there would be a good quail crop for the current season.

Although Coleman County and other counties on each side and to the north have the maximum bag limit, counties just south are in the 16-bird limit group. Hunters in the area will need to be aware of the differences in hunting regulations in the immediate area.

AUSTIN- Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials remind hunters and landowners that dates and locations for issuance of antlerless deer hunting permits will not be announced until October.

Department field personnel currently are collecting deer census data to be used in determining permit issuance rates in individual counties and portions thereof.

Landowners may obtain their permits, normally issued at the county courthouse or other public facility, in late October or early November.

As a result of passage of the Wildlife Conservation Act by the Texas Legislature in its last session, the Park and Wildlife Department now has authority over wildlife resources in all counties. Some counties may offer antlerless deer harvest were it was not allowed in the past.

Another result of the Wildlife Conservation Act was the removal of the special protection for "spike" bucks in all counties having a deer hunting season. Spike bucks are treated as any other buck under the current system, officials said.

Texas A&M professor passes on ideas for coal-fueled future

COLLEGE STATION — A seasoned engineering researcher at Texas A&M University is passing on his ideas for coal-fueled engines to younger researchers whom he hopes may make the dreams a reality.

Dr. William Harris, professor of chemical engineering and an expert in alternate fuels such as methanol, says he's figured out "some really neat ways" of designing engines that would burn coal, including one with no sliding parts.

"These are just ideas, however," Harris cautions, "I haven't built any of them yet. I don't have time."

"I once figured out that I could drive my car to the Atlantic Ocean and back on \$7 worth of coal," he said.

Eradication Program Shows Progress Local 4-H Members, Leader Awarded at County Event

The Texas livestock industry has achieved a milestone in its continuing battle relating to animal health: this state has as of August 31 gone 12 months without a confirmed screwworm case within its borders. That's the first time that has happened since man first started raising livestock centuries ago in what is not Texas.

Just a decade ago, about 100,000 cases of screwworms were reported yearly by cattlemen in this state. Screwworms at one time cost the livestock industry \$10 million annually.

While it is a time to celebrate, it is also a time to continue to be on the watch for possible screwworm infestations. U. S. Department of Agriculture officials at the fly laboratory at Mission report that submission of possible screwworm samples this year is running behind a year ago.

Sample submission is a year-round chore. The only way in which the government workers can know of possible screwworm out-

breaks is via the submission system. An undetected case of screwworms can spread rapidly, thus it is essential that producers throughout the state send in possible screwworm samples to be identified.

The Texas screwworm eradication program began on Valentine's Day in 1962 in Austin when an airplane dropped sterile screwworm flies to demonstrate what might be done to combat that pest.

In the ensuing years, livestock producers have donated more than \$3.5 million of their own money to the program and worked hand in hand with government personnel in setting up the system that led to the eradication in this state.

A sterile screwworm fly plant was built at the old Moore Air Force Base in Mission with producers money. As many as 200 million sterile screwworms were air-dropped in strategic areas in Texas. The sterile flies would mate with native populations, but no offspring would result. About three

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Population Increases in Texas During Past Decade

Common sense and rush hour in most Texas cities would indicate that the state's population is growing.

During the 1970's, Texas' population grew by three million persons - moving Texas from the fourth to the third most populous state in the country.

Texas grew nearly three times as fast as the rest of the nation, according to a fresh look at the 1980 U.S. Census figures. Texas' population grew by 27 percent, from 11.2 million in 1970 to 14.2 million in 1980, outstripping the national growth rate of 11 percent.

Since 1980, Texas has gained more than one million new residents, according to the U. S. Bureau of the Census.

The Bureau divides the country into four main regions - Northeast, North Central, South and West. During the 1970's, 54 percent of the national population increase occurred in the South and a quarter of the South's 12.5 million increase took place in Texas. Fifth-eight percent of

Texas' gain was due to migration, up from 13 percent in the 1960's.

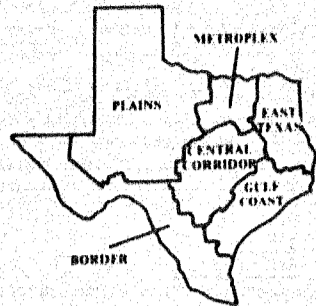
All six of the State Comptroller's economic regions of Texas grew during the 1970's.

THE GULF COAST gained one million people, a 34 percent increase. The expansion was particularly strong in the Houston area. Harris County alone by 666,000.

THE CENTRAL CORRIDOR grew by 28 percent with a population increase of 550,000. Expansion was evenly distributed across the region, with all but five of the region's 39 counties growing by at least 10 percent, and none losing population. Bexar and Travis counties experienced population increases of over 100,000 each.

THE METROPLEX, with an average of 263 persons per square mile, had the highest population density in Texas. Despite a growth rate below the state average, the Metroplex' population increase was over 625,000. Dallas and Tarrant counties increased

375,000, and Collin, Hood and Rockwall counties more than doubled their population. THE BORDER REGION registered the state largest population increase, 36 percent. Border counties of Hidalgo, El Paso and Cameron accounted for almost 300,000 of the region's 370,000 increase. EAST TEXAS had a 27 percent growth rate. The 230,000 increase pushed the region over the one million mark. Like the Central Corridor, growth was evenly distributed over the area's 35 counties.



Texas Census Bureau Regions

THE PLAINS region has the most elbow room of any Texas region, with an average of 17 persons per square mile. This region was the slowest growing during the 1970's, adding only 175,000 to its population, with one third of its counties losing population. According to one state agency, the number of Texans is expected to top 22 million by the year 2000, an increase of 45 percent from the current population.

AUSTIN-The Texas Water Commission has approved an application by Amistad Fuel Co. for a discharge of stormwater runoff from its sub-bituminous coal surface mining operation in Coleman County.

southwest of Rockwood, one mile north of the Colorado River, and one half mile west of U. S. Highway 283.

Stormwater runoff will be discharged from impoundment basin to Little Bull Creek, thence to Bull Creek and the Colorado River.

Census Information For Big Country Area

Information from the 1980 census listed interesting information about Coleman County, with a recent chart also giving the same information for other counties in the Big Country area.

Of the 10,439 Coleman County people listed in the most recent census, the median age was 42.5 years. Of the total population, 2,669 were over age 65 and 2,031 were under age 15.

In the 15 - 19 year age group, 799 were counted in 1980. The number of older persons increased from the 1970 census, and the counts for those 19 and under decreased during that decade.

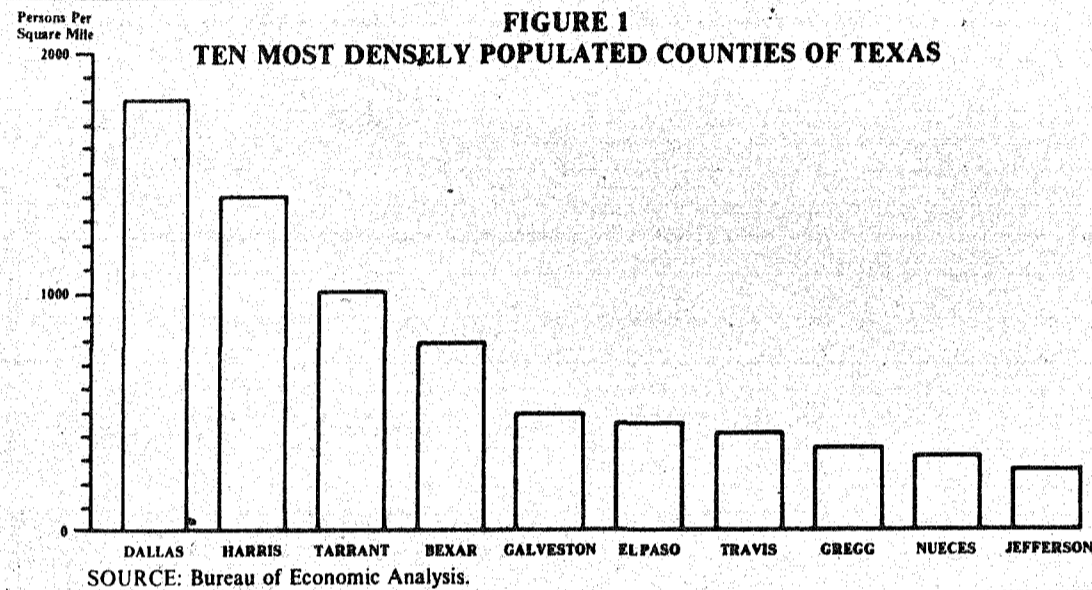
Of the county population,

44.4 percent were high school graduates.

Of the population, 18.3 percent in the county were counted as having incomes in the poverty level. The statewide average is 14.7 percent. The statewide average listed 62.2 percent of the state's population with high school diplomas.

Only Coke County - in the Big Country listings - had a higher median age level than Coleman County, where the 3,196 residents were of the average age of 44.2. The county in the area with the youngest population in 1980 was Reagan County with the median age of 24.8.

Tom Green County has the highest average of high school graduates; Taylor County, the largest population listed in the area report, tied with Scurry County for the lowest percentage in the poverty income level. Menard County had the largest percentage in the low income level in 1980, with 28.3 percent in the poverty bracket.

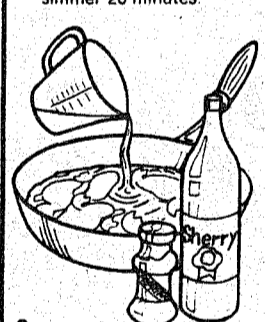
PAPRIKA PORK WITH RICE FOR FOUR

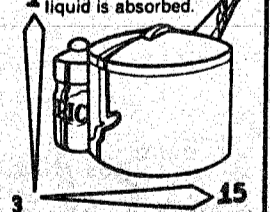

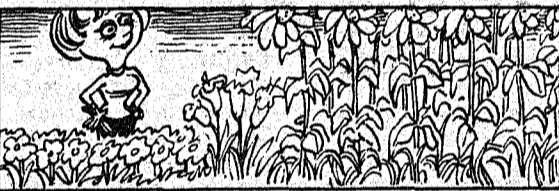

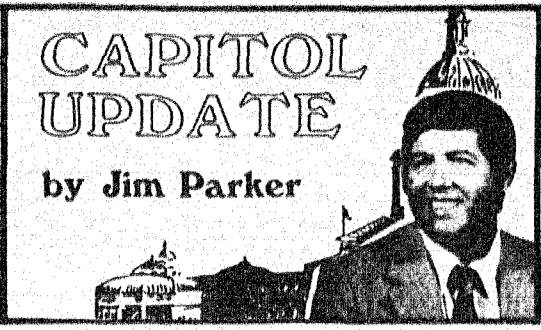

CAPITOL UPDATE

by Jim Parker

Let me begin by saying that you are in for some very "dry" reading. There is no way to make constitutional amendments sound exciting but please do read about them.

On November 8th, 11 constitutional amendments will be on the ballot for the people to vote either for or against. For the benefit of the voters in my district, over the next few weeks I will be explaining each proposal stating the views of both supporters and opponents of each. I do this in hope that you will all get out to cast an informed ballot whether or not you are in favor or opposed to the proposed amendments.

Proposition No. 1 on the ballot would allow counties with a population of less than 30,000 to have fewer than four constable and justice-of-the-peace precincts. Counties with a population over 30,000 would continue to have from four to eight constable and JP precincts.

Supporters say many small counties do not need four constables and four JP's and requiring that many for smaller counties serves no purpose and wastes the county's money. They feel it is much better to have one qualified and be found to be unconstitutional. Some opponents feel the \$10,000.00 is too generous since it does not include improvements, such as a home, and a homestead claimant can invest large sums of money making improvements yet creditors would not be able to get money owed to them because the investment was in the homestead.

Proposition No. 3 would authorize the Legislature to enact legislation (which it has already done contingent on passage of this

adequately paid JP and constable rather than four to eight who are under-qualified and underpaid. Opponents say lowering the number of elected local officials sets a bad precedent and could be cited by a future Legislature to help justify cutting the number of county commissioners.

Proposition No. 2 would replace the urban homestead exemption from a \$10,000.00 limit to a one acre limit and would be retroactively applied to all homesteads in Texas. Supporters feel since urban land values are inflated, the constitutional exemption is protecting a fewer and fewer urban homesteads from forced sale for debt. The \$10,000.00 exemption used to be reasonable but now may represent just a fraction of the value of a newly-purchased lot, leaving anyone purchasing a lot for more than that amount without homestead protection. Since more and more often creditors stand to gain something by forcing a sale, naturally they are doing so and the current exemption does not protect people's homesteads as it was intended. Supporters also say basing the exemption on land area instead of value would make periodic revisions of the exemption limit unnecessary. Rural homestead exemption has always been figured by area, not dollar value.

Opponents feel one-acre for an urban homestead is too much and treats claimants in different locations unfairly. Land in an affluent section of a large town is more valuable than land in a poorer section. They feel making it retroactive would be harmful to creditors who now have contracts and might

proposal) that permits commodity boards to collect a refundable fee on product sales if the fee is approved by a referendum of the producers. The fee would be used by the board to promote the production and marketing of that agricultural product. Passage of this proposition would allow SB 7 to take effect. This legislation which was passed last session permits commodity boards established before September 1, 1983 to adopt a rule denying an exemption of the fee at the time of process or sale of the product; however, the producer may still apply for a refund of that fee. Should any commodity boards be established after September 1, 1983 or should the territory of an existing board be expanded, producers, themselves, could vote to deny the exemption. Refunds of the fee would still be allowed. Should this proposition fail SB 7 would have no effect.

Supporters say that commodity boards do a good job which is beneficial to producers and that they need the fees to carry out their programs of promotions, marketing and researching their products. If revenue is cut, the influence of Texas boards will be diluted at a time the national commodity organizations are enlarging or expanding foreign markets for their members.

Opponents say that even though the fee is refundable upon request, it is still a forced fee if there is no option for exemption in the first place. They feel commodity boards are not so popular with agricultural producers that they should be granted special taxing powers. Opponents say Texas voters have rejected similar propositions twice before and it should be permanently laid to rest.

Hopefully these admittedly very brief explanations have been informative and will help you in making a decision on how to vote on the propositions. Next week I will continue discussion on propositions 4, 5, and 6. It is not my intent to sway you in any way; however if you would like additional information on a particular proposition, please contact my Austin office for a more complete analysis which has been done by the House Study Group, a research group funded through money from many representatives' office budgets.

Social Security Notes

PEOPLE HAVE REPORTING RESPONSIBILITIES

People in the local area who receive Social Security checks have the important responsibility to report events to the Social Security Administration that could affect payment of those benefits, a Social Security spokesperson said recently.

Failure to report could mean that a needed check might not arrive on time or it could result in an overpayment a person can ill afford to repay, the representative said.

Things everyone needs to report are:

Change of mailing address, even if the person's checks are deposited directly into a checking or savings account.

Earnings of more than the annual limit—\$6,600 for people 65 or over and \$4,920 for people under 65.

If the person goes outside the U. S. for 30 days or more.

If the person works outside the U. S.

If the person is imprisoned after being convicted of a felony.

Receipt of Government pension.

In addition disabled people must report:

Any improvement in condition

Any work

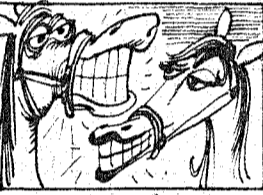
