Ex-Students Elect New Officers

Homecoming Termed Successful

Santa Anna Ex-Students, their families and friends met here last weekend for the 31st annual Homecoming. Activities and events got underway Friday and continued through Saturday night for the large group of people attending.

Terry McIver, a member of the Class of 1964, was elected president

of the Ex-Student Association. He has served the past year as first vice president of the group. Other new officers for the next two years are Eddie Paul Voss Jr., first vice president; Dickie Horner, second vice president; Leanna Pollock Hartman, secretary-treasurer; and Pete Simmons, director. Hold-over direc-

tors are Bettie Blue Henderson and Roberta Morgan Tomlinson.

Simmons is the retiring president of the Association, and also retiring from the executive board is Pam Garrett Anderson, who served as second vice president the past two years.

William Brown, Santa Anna stockfarmer and community leader, was honored as "Ex-Student of the Year." He spoke briefly, reminiscing about school days at Santa Anna High School. A plaque was presented Mr. Brown by the Ex-Student Association.

Donna Walker Goodrum of Midland, a graduate of 1963, was honored as "Coming Home Queen." A hand painted china plate with her name and honor was presented her. Both honorees were also introduced at the Friday night football game.

A special guest at the meeting was Cullen Perry, a long-time school administrator and teacher, who now resides in Brownwood. Other former teachers were recognized.

Eugene and Christine (Marshall) Watkins of Nashville, Tennessee, members of the Class of 1930, were recognized as having traveled the farthest to attend the annual meeting. Fannie Whetstone Bryan of San Angelo was attending from the earliest class, 1912. Mrs. Mae Allen

Blue was the earliest teacher, having been on the faculty here in 1916.

Classes from years ending in "3" were recognized. It was noted that there was no graduating class in 1913, as the number of years in school was raised from 10 to 11 that year.

Supt. R. C. Smith gave a report on the school, and a request was made for old annuals, pictures, etc. to be placed in the trophy case at school.

Lucile Kirkpatrick Wylie requests names and addresses of each class be given her for a permanent record when they are available.

Prior to the meeting, the Mountaineer Band played a concert, and also accompanied group singing of the Alma Mater and the National Anthem.

The Band Booster Club prepared and served a luncheon at the school cafeteria, and the special events committee of Epsilon Sigma Alpha sorority sponsored the Homecoming dance at the Civic Center that evening.

Registration reports showed 192 listed for the Saturday morning events. Many more former students and guests attended the various events but were not registered.

Many classes met for reunions during the weekend, adding to the activities on the schedule.

Campus Traffic To be Limited

School officials have announced this week that traffic within the school campus will be limited, effective immediately. Traffic and parking will be permitted at the gymnasium and band hall, but no vehicles will be allowed past that

point by parents or others bringing their children to and from school. The traffic between the gym and tennis courts and parking at the back door of the elementary school creates a hazard to students walking across the paved area.

Antlerless Deer Permits To Be Issued Next Week

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials will be in Coleman Wednesday and Thursday, October 26 and 27, to issue antlerless deer hunting permits. They will be at the County Courthouse from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Landowners or their authorized agents may obtain the permits in person by presenting proof of ownership and a description of the property. Issuance rates are based upon estimated deer population in the county or portion thereof.

Much of Coleman County is eligible for antlerless deer permits, with the number depending on acreage in the different areas. Maps are posted at the Courthouse showing the areas and numbers of permits available.

The landowner may distribute the permits to hunters as they see fit, and hunters are required to immediately attach the permits to animals taken in the field.

Issuance rates are generally

higher this year than during the past hunting season, except in portions of West Texas where drought conditions have reduced deer populations.

County Tax Rep Here Oct. 25

Santa Anna area people will have an opportunity to pay their 1983 taxes when a representative of the County Tax Office is here next Tuesday, October 25.

Henri Gilbreath of the County Tax Office will be at Santa Anna National Bank from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. for the convenience of local people. Taxes for the City of Santa Anna, Santa Anna ISD and Coleman County may be paid, with a three percent discount received for payment during October.

Santa Anna Student Chosen Brownwood Area 'Ideal Miss'

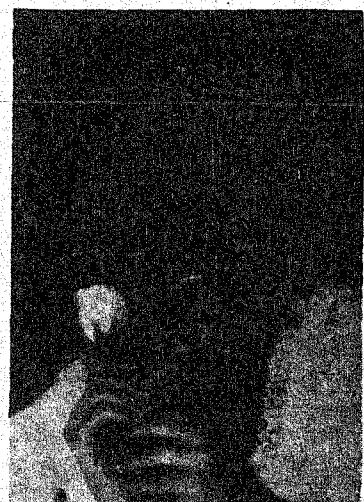

Halloween Coronation, Carnival Planned Saturday, October 29

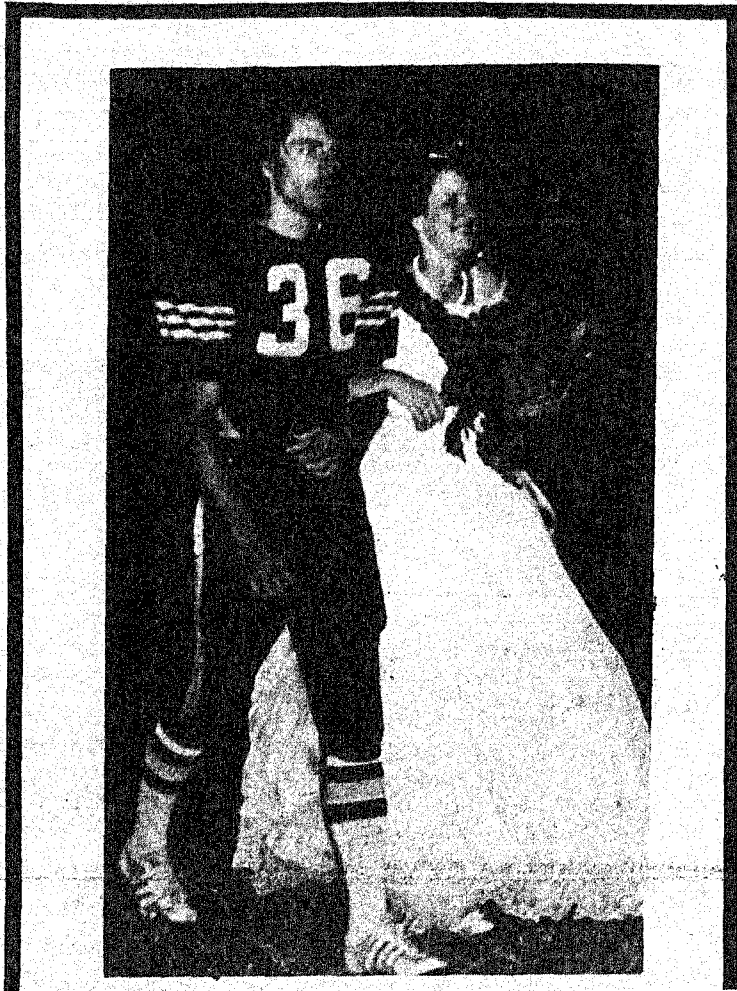
The annual Halloween Coronation and Carnival will be held Saturday, October 29, sponsored by the Junior Class.

City Sales Tax For Past Month

Santa Anna's city sales tax for the month of September totaled \$1,229.40, an increase over the same period last year. In September 1982, the tax was \$887.60 in Santa Anna.

The city sales tax for the year now stands at \$19,913.03, a 13 percent drop from the first nine months of 1982 when \$23,028.25 was received here.

Statewide the city sales tax has increased by seven percent over October 1982, but the year-to-date total is still down from the previous year.

Mountaineers Win Another Game; Gorman Panthers Next Target

The Santa Anna Mountaineer football team did their part to make the 1983 Ex-Student Homecoming a success, and defeated the Cross Plains Buffaloes 40 - 8 in the Friday night game.

The Buffaloes scored first in the opening minutes of the game, but from that point it was the Mountaineers in command.

Ramon Vasquez was the outstanding player on offense, gaining an

impressive 204 yards and accounting for two touchdowns and kicking two extra points. Chris DeLeon gained 105 yards on 13 carries and made two of the Santa Anna touchdowns. The Mountaineers had 443 yards rushing and 49 yards passing.

The Cross Plains score came on a 65-yard pass play, followed by a two-point conversion play. The outstanding Mountaineer defense thwarted the visitors after the first score and held them to less than 100 yards the rest of the night.

Doug Warnock caught a 19-yard pass from Ramon Castillo for the first Mountaineer score, but the two-point conversion play failed.

The lead went to the local team when James Bass took the ball across the goal line on a one-yard run in the second quarter. DeLeon was next on the scoreboard with a 30-yard TD run as the second quarter ended, giving the Mountaineers a 21 - 8 lead.

Ramon Vasquez scored two touchdowns in the third period on nine and 10-yard runs. The final TD was a six-yard run by DeLeon in the last quarter.

best game of the season, according to Coach Odis Summers. The defense was outstanding, with James Bass making 20 tackles, eight unassisted. John Casey was in 12 tackles, four alone. Rodney Guthrie and Maurice Castillo also had a superior evening on defense. The offensive line was given credit for the good record, blocking well for their teammates. The Mountaineers had a total of 27 first downs compared to five for Cross Plains. The Mountaineers held the visitors to 156 yards offense, only 30 on the ground. Santa Anna had only one punt for 30 yards, while Cross Plains had five that averaged 24 yards. The Mountaineers completed four of nine passes, with one interception. The Buffaloes completed four of seven with no interceptions.

Santa Anna had more penalties than they wanted, with 13 for 115 yards. The Buffs had only two penalties for 30 yards. The Mountaineers will travel to Gorman Friday for what may be the most important game of the season. The Panthers have also lost to Goldthwaite in district play, and the winner of this game will likely be the second representative in the playoffs. Gorman has a quick team and one of the best running backs in the area. Coach Summers says the Mountaineers must put together a good defense to hold the Panthers, but the team is blocking better every game and should be able to contain the team. The Friday night victory gives Santa Anna a 4-1 record in district competition and 6-1 for the season.

City Police Report

Burglars struck the Santa Anna High School again during the night of October 12th, Principal Gerald Brister reported to police. Chief Russ Ellis and Coleman County Deputy Eddie Odom investigated the burglary. Ellis said that the candy vending machine was pried open, but very little, if any, coins could have been taken, as school officials had emptied the coin box Tuesday.

The soft drink machine was apparently opened with a key, as there was no money left in it Wednesday morning. Mr. Brister estimated between \$75 and \$100 in coins were taken from it. Mr. Brister also said that the office door was still locked when he arrived, but he found a small safe in the office with its door open. Evidence of forced entry was found on the safe which Mr. Brister said was sprung during a prior burglary at school. Mr. Ellis said there were no signs of forced entry to the school building. The investigation is continuing, he said.

Seventeen-year-old Ed-

ward 'Bo' Loper and 16-year-old Cynthia Rene Terry escaped serious injury early Friday morning in a car crash on South 8th Street. Chief Ellis said a 1975 Toyota station wagon, driven by Mr. Loper, ran off the left side of the road and struck a cement culvert in the pre-dawn accident.

Mr. Ellis said Miss Terry refused medical treatment, but Mr. Loper was transported to the hospital in Coleman where he was treated for multiple cuts about the head and released. Mr. Ellis said the car, owned by Jose Oroasco of Hobbs, N. M., was a total loss.

Loper was fined by Judge Joe Taylor \$50 for driving without an operator's license and \$50 for driving without lights when required. Judge Taylor then ordered Loper jailed when he was unable to pay the fine.

Ellis said that other than one accident and a few other traffic violations in which several tickets were issued, the homecoming weekend went very well. He commended the good behavior in general of those in town for the festivities.

A fire about 7:30 p.m. Monday evening caused an estimated \$500 damage to the residence of Virginia Roach, 509 S. Lee. Mr. Ellis said it was quite fortunate no one was hurt in the fire which spread quite rapidly in the kitchen. He credits the efforts of those in the house and the quick response of the Fire Department. He said the fire apparently started on the kitchen range and spread to the wood cabinets. Fire damage was contained to the cabinets and the ceiling, with some smoke and water damage to other parts of the house.

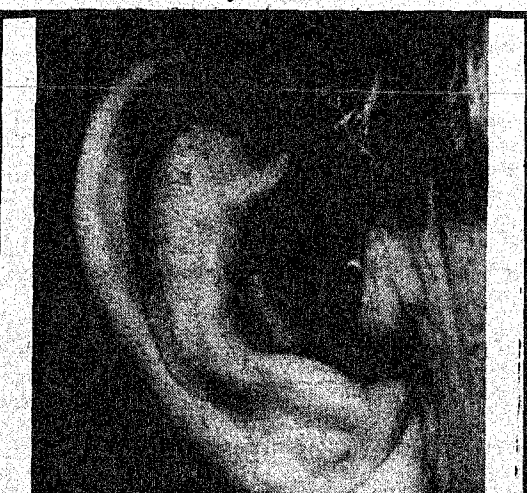

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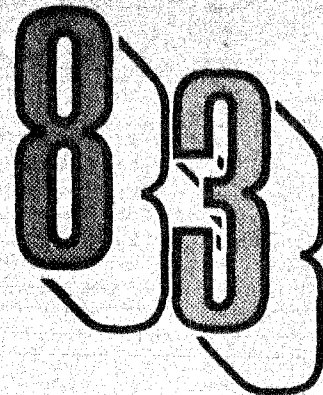

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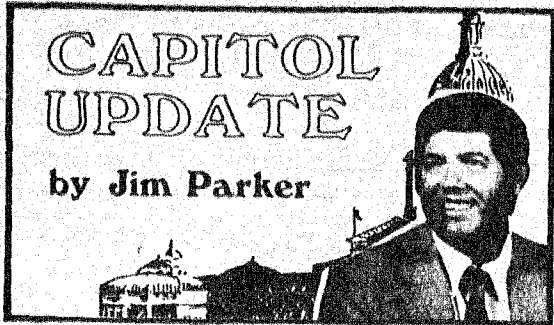

CAPITOL UPDATE

As mentioned last week, I will continue giving a brief, but hopefully full, concise and understandable explanation of the next three proposed amendments (No. 4, 5 and 6) appearing on the November 8th election ballot.

Proposition No. 4 would authorize the Legislature to enact laws to provide for succession of members of the Legislature in the event of an enemy attack and allows for suspension of Constitutional procedural rules in the event of, or immediate threat of, enemy attack. Contingent upon passage of this proposition, last session the Legislature enacted H.B. 1216 which sets out the specifics for "emergency interim successors." Should the proposition fail, H.B. 1216 has no effect.

Supporters feel Texas lacks necessary powers needed to respond to an attack and that proper civil defense planning, of which this proposition is only a small part, would save lives and insure continuation of our democratic form of government. They believe it will strengthen other civil defense efforts in Texas and they believe that being prepared is a responsible and sensible direction to take. Supporters also say almost all states and U.S. territories have succession laws for state and local officials. Only three states do not provide for legislative succession.

Opponents to this proposition feel a nuclear war would be unrestrainable and that state government, following obliteration of most of the population and major resources, would be unnecessary and insupportable. They believe it would give the Governor dangerous powers under

the "immediate threat of an enemy attack" especially since "immediate threat" is not defined. Opponents also feel that this proposition encourages the theory that a "limited" nuclear war is possible.

Proposition No. 5 would allow use of the Permanent School Fund (PSF) to guarantee bonds issued by school districts. The PSF program is made up of income mainly from grazing and oil leases and royalties from state land and is constitutionally set aside to support public schools. This money is invested in government and corporate securities and interest from these investments, plus money from certain taxes, make up the ASF which is distributed to school districts each year through the Foundation School Fund going mainly for employee pay, maintenance, and operating expenses of the schools. The Constitution bars use of the PSF or ASF for anything other than support of public schools.

Supporters say a bond-guarantee program would improve school districts' bond rating thus saving them money on interest on bonds necessary for school construction. SB 384, which is contingent on passage of this proposition, allows the guarantee of school bonds only for construction, equipment or site acquisition. Only up to two times the value of the securities acquired or interest earned from the PSF, excluding real estate, can be bond-guaranteed.

Opponents say that if Texas uses the PSF to guarantee school district bonds, it should be prepared to spend part of the bond in the event of a default since, for the state to get its money back from

a defaulting school district by reducing state money due that district in the future, as proposed, would be harmful to the school children of that district.

Proposition No. 6 allows the garnishment of wages to provide child support.

Supporters feel garnishment will benefit Texas by removing many families from welfare rolls. D.H.R. figures indicate that of the child support cases under their jurisdiction, over 70 percent of the parents fail to pay up. They believe Texas lacks adequate tools to force payment. Right now their options are either to put the parent failing to pay child support on probation or in jail or render a judgment on the debt, which to be enforceable, takes time and money. Supporters say Texas is 46th in ranking of its enforcement policy showing its ineffectiveness.

Opponents believe that Texas' long tradition of legally protecting a wage earner's paycheck from creditors will be threatened and that creditors will seek other exceptions to the ban on garnishment. They believe garnishment is an intrusion into the lives of citizens resulting in employers being made aware that an employee is divorced or has an out-of-wedlock child. They say employers could discriminate against employees because of this knowledge. Because of the administrative bother for employers, opponents feel they may hesitate to hire or retain workers under the garnishment order. They feel it would be unfair, too, because garnishment would be ineffective against debtors who are self-employed or who are paid in cash.

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Social Security Notes

Benefits are Taxable

Starting in 1984, part of the Social Security benefits received by people with substantial other income may be subject to the Federal Income tax, Priscilla Ely, Social Security branch manager in Brownwood, said recently.

This change in the law was part of the 1983 Social Security amendments which were designed to strengthen the Social Security program for many years in the future, Ely said.

Up to half of the person's Social Security benefits for 1984, and/or later years, will be subject to tax if his or her adjusted gross income, plus nontaxable interest income and half of the Social Security benefits exceed a base amount.

The base amount is \$25,000 for an individual, \$32,000 for a couple filing a joint return, and zero for a couple filing separate returns. The amount of benefit subject to taxes will be the smaller of:

- +One-half of the Social Security benefits, or
- +One-half of the amount the person's combined income - adjusted gross income, nontaxable interest income, and half the Social Security benefit

-exceeds the base amount. Some adjustments in benefit payments may be possible, Ely said. Any overpayment that person repays during the year can be deducted. Also, any lump sum received can be prorated to the year for which it was paid if that is an advantage, Ely said. Any Medicare medical insurance premium deducted must be included in total benefits.

Almost all Social Security matters can be handled by phone. Medicare questions or filing of medicare claims can be taken care of by calling toll free 800-442-2620. You may file application to establish your eligibility by calling Brownwood, 646-7533.

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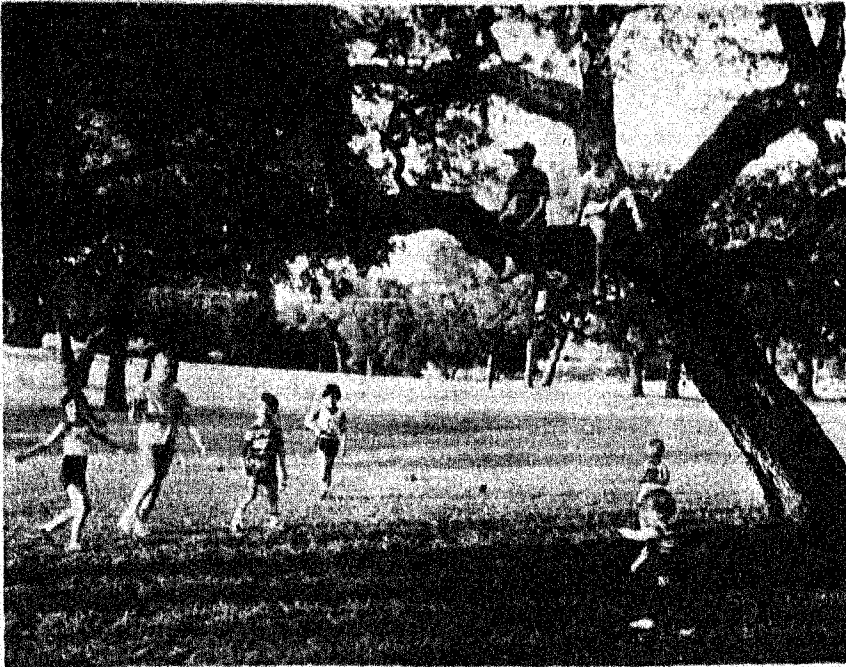

Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower will invite the current owners of the 171 properties to an awards

ceremony at the State Capitol November 10.

Instituted in 1974, the Family Land Heritage Program now has registered 1,729 farms and ranches. Three of that number have been from Coleman County.

A short history and pictures of the farms and ranches to be honored this year will be published in the "1983 Family Land Heritage Registry." The annual registry is proving to be an invaluable source for Texas genealogists and historians, Hightower said.

State legislators, county judges and county historical commission chairpersons have been very helpful in finding and registering family properties, Hightower said.
