Second Consecutive Year for Superior Rating

Mountaineer Band Wins Award

The Santa Anna Mountaineer Band was well rewarded for their hours of practice when they were awarded a Division I rating for their marching routine last Saturday in Brady. Under the field direction of drum

major Casey Anderson, the band performed a seven-minute marching routine. Osiel Hernandez is band director. In addition to the superior rating, the Mountaineer Band was certified for the State UIL marching contest

to be held in Austin on November 14. Only two bands from each district are allowed to take part in the state event, and Santa Anna and Goldthwaite will represent this area. The local band also won a Division I rating last year, the first step toward the coveted Sweepstakes Award. Winning the superior rating two years in a row is most unusual

for the local group, and winning another sweepstakes trophy is on their agenda. Division I ratings must be achieved in concert playing and sight reading in contests next spring. Alys Pelton and Deborah Bodine, twirlers with the band, competed in the solo twirling contest and received Division III ratings.

'Stop and Check' Program SAHS Sophomore Chosen Beginning Immediately 1983 Halloween Queen

Chief of Police Russ Ellis announced this week that beginning immediately, he is starting a Traffic 'Stop and Check' program. At various times of the day and night, Mr. Ellis will randomly choose a city street to stop vehicles and check for valid driver's licenses, current insurance coverage and vehicle safety inspection.

Four vehicles stopped in recent days for traffic violations were being driven by unlicensed drivers, Mr. Ellis said. He is concerned that too many people do not realize the possible financial consequences of operating or allowing their children to operate a motor vehicle without a driver's license, proper insurance coverage, or driving an unsafe vehicle.

The fines levied by a court for these infractions of the law may not amount to more than a hundred dollars or so, Mr. Ellis said, but the increased insurance rates can cost you several hundreds of dollars over a period of years. The greatest risk, however, is being involved in a traffic accident without the mandated

insurance coverage, or without a valid driver's license. This can and has driven many families into bankruptcy because of civil suits arising out of an accident.

Mr. Ellis said he is issuing this warning because he would like to have our citizens voluntarily comply with the laws, rather than have to be issued citations for the violations. He said he will be issuing citations, not warning tickets, for violations of these and other vehicle traffic laws during these 'Stop and Check' situations.

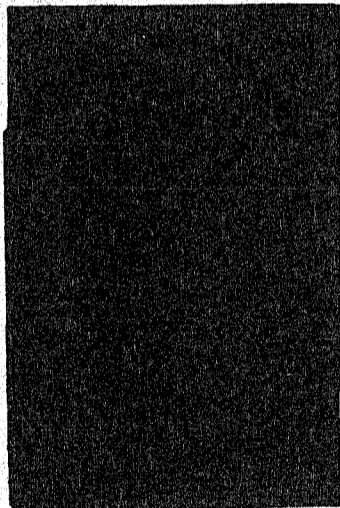
Rosa Costillo, the 1982 Halloween Queen, crowned the winner during the ceremony at the High School auditorium.

Santa Anna to Remain in District 8-A

UIL Allignment Released

Santa Anna will remain in District 8-A for the next two years, according to the release from the University Interscholastic League following the biennial realignment meeting last Saturday.

Although the local school has not changed, the composition of the district is changing considerably, with 16 teams on the list, divided into two zones.

Santa Anna will be included in the West Zone, with other schools being Sterling City, Miles, Eden, Irion

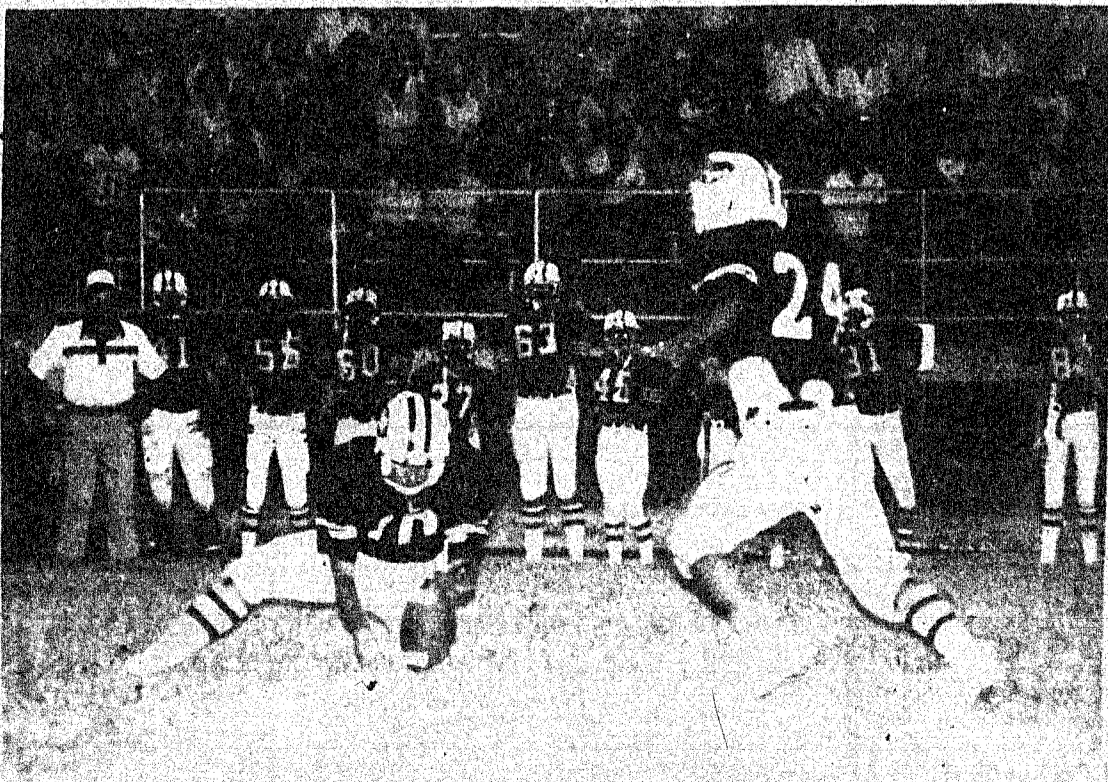
County (Mertzon), Robert Lee, Water Valley and Bronte. In the East Zone will be Blanket, Cross Plains, Evant, Goldthwaite, Gorman, Rising Star, Rochelle and Lometa.

Administrators from the 16 schools met in Brady Monday to organize the zones and make district football schedules for the next two years.

The Mountaineers will be in another district for basketball, assigned for the next two years to

District 28-A. Rochelle has been added to the present list that will also include for the next two years Santa Anna, Brookesmith, Mozelle, Lohn, Novice and Talpa-Centennial.

For the football districts, Class A includes all high schools with enrollment of 134 or below. The Santa Anna High School enrollment is approximately 89. The enrollment figure for Class A has changed in recent years, with the division between Class A and AA being 119 students ten years ago. The 1984 football schedule will be published soon.

City Police Report

The Halloween weekend passed without any major or serious incidents in Santa Anna, Chief of Police Russ Ellis reported. He had no reports of tainted or unsafe candy or treats or of vandalism.

Ellis said that many juveniles, as well as a surprising number of adults, were seen toasting water balloons and "wrapping" residences with bathroom paper, but most complied with his warning not to throw the balloons at or from a moving vehicle or otherwise cause any property damage in their mischievous activities.

Mr. Ellis said he only had to stop a few vehicles for violations and excessive noise after midnight.

Many parents accompanied their children on the "trick or treating" rounds, and although several near misses were reported by kids crossing the streets in front of traffic, no one apparently was injured.

Dale Bradley, owner Bradley Lumber & Building Supplies at 508 North First Street, reported a burglary of the business on October 27. Apparently entry was gained to the business from the rear of the building during the night, by breaking in the door.

The burglars damaged the cash register, candy machines and other equipment and took an undetermined amount of coins. The damage and theft totaled approximately \$1,600, Mr. Ellis said.

The investigation is continuing with the assistance of the Coleman County Sheriff's Department. Mr. Ellis said there may be a connection with the recent burglaries of the High School, and several suspects are under investigation.

One traffic accident was reported Saturday afternoon in Santa Anna, Mr. Ellis said. A car driven by Lera Guthrie, 57, of Santa Anna was struck on the right side by one driven by Nicomedes Vasquez, 19, of Talpa, at the intersection of Wallis and Fourth Street.

Ellis said a passenger in the Vasquez vehicle, 81-year-old Venino Vasquez of Santa Anna, complained of a bump on his head, otherwise there were no injuries.

Ellis said the Guthrie vehicle was making a left turn onto Fourth Street when it was struck by the Vasquez vehicle. Citations were issued to both drivers in the accident.

CAPITOL UPDATE

By Jim Parker



To conclude the series on the Constitutional amendments, I will explain the final propositions, Number 10 and 11, on the ballot.

Proposition No. 10 would enable the Legislature to authorize cities to spend public money for replacing sewer lines on private property to assist the owner with the cost, if the owner consented to the arrangement. S. B. 595 was enacted by the Legislature contingent on passage of this proposition.

Proponents say this amendment is needed so the city can lend their credit or money to provide for replacing sewer laterals, charge customers for the work, and allow the customer, if he agrees to the loan, to pay back the city in installments. They say the property owners still have the option of going to a private contractor but that since many people can not afford the \$1,000 - \$3,000 cost, it is to the homeowners' advantage to pay in installments if they so choose. The amendment is permissive to both cities and homeowners.

Opponents believe, while the idea is good, it belongs in a statute (law) and not in the constitution. They say even should an amendment prove to be necessary, it should not be restricted to a five-year pay back time. They believe the terms should be left up to local ordinances better suited to local circumstances.

Proposition No. 11 would change the Board of Pardons and Paroles from a constitutional agency to a statutory agency and give the Board the power to revoke paroles.

Proponents feel it will speed up the parole process and save taxpayers money.

They believe eliminating the Governor's power to deny parole would prevent duplication of the Board's review process and that the Board has the staff, resources, and expertise to determine who should be granted parole. They say the Governor's staff is less qualified and reviews only the offender's file without interviewing the inmate, which adds more time to the process and can jeopardize any job which has been found for the parolee upon release. They say the Governor would still retain control over the parole process by having the authority to appoint all members of the Board rather than sharing appointments with Chief Justices of the Court of Criminal Appeals and the Supreme Court as is done now.

Opponents feel that the Governor's veto power over paroles is an important safeguard to ensure that only rehabilitated of-

fenders are released. They believe his veto power gives him the discretion to be tougher than the Board if that is what the public wants.

I have attempted to explain all eleven propositions objectively and concisely, offering views of both supporters and opponents of each issue. Hopefully the series, while it may have been boring, at least has made the issues clearer to you so that you can be an informed voter. Realizing that a subject such as proposed amendments is a dull topic and does not sell newspapers, I wish to sincerely thank your kind editors for allowing these articles to appear in their papers. It indicates to me that they realize the importance of the upcoming election as I trust you readers do too. I appreciate both the editors and you for bearing with me through this series.
