Ex-student Football Game Scheduled Here Saturday

While most football action is of professional status on television, local football fans will have an opportunity to see live action at Mountaineer Stadium on Saturday.

The Ex-student Booster Club teams from Santa Anna and Bangs

will meet for their sixth annual Thanksgiving game at 2 p.m. Proceeds from the game will benefit the clubs from the neighboring towns.

The 1982 clash ended in a 0-0 tie. In former games Santa Anna has won two and Bangs two. The 1983

game will give the winner the majority.

The local lineup has many outstanding players from former Mountaineer teams. The game is a full-contact contest, with very good playing shown in previous years. Referees from the Brownwood area donate their time for the benefit game, and the local club will have a concession stand open during the afternoon.

Local people are urged to attend the game and support the local team. Joining in the action on the sidelines will be former cheerleaders and twirlers to add color and interest in the event.

Admission prices will be \$3 for adults and \$2 for students.

Basketball Season Starts; Games Planned During Week

The Santa Anna High School basketball teams opened their season this week, hosting the Bangs teams at Perry Gymnasium on Tuesday night. Games were played by the A and B girls teams and the boys varsity team.

The teams will travel to Cross Plains Tuesday, November 29, for games with boys and girls varsity and junior varsity teams starting at 4 p.m. The first tournament action

will come that weekend at Talpa.

Odis Summers is coach of the boys team this year, and Gerald Brister returning as girls coach.

The Junior High teams also had games Tuesday night at Bangs, then will host the Junior Dragons at Perry Gym Monday of next week at 4 p.m.

Galen Privitt is coach of the boys team, and Alice Summers is JHS girls coach.

Cash Prizes are Listed For Holiday Events

Just over one week remains for local groups to construct floats for the Friday, December 2, Christmas parade in Santa Anna. The annual holiday opening will also include a contest for decorated store windows, and the Lions Club Pancake Fiesta will be held in conjunction with the event.

Parade time will be 2:30 p.m. Included will be the Santa Anna Mountaineer Band, just back from winning in the state marching contest, decorated vehicles and Santa Claus.

The Santa Anna Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring the parade and related activities, and cash prizes will be given winners in the contests. Float winners will receive \$100, \$75 and \$50 for first through third places. Window winners will receive \$50, \$75 and \$25.

Other events slated that day include a rummage sale and bake sale by the Ladies Auxiliary of Volunteer Fire Department and a bake sale by the Parent Teacher Organization.

Hundreds of people will be in town to watch the parade and enjoy the holiday opening. Several local stores will be staying open during the time of the Pancake Fiesta so that late

shoppers may shop while in town for the evening.

The Wednesday, November 16, meeting of the Chamber of Commerce, a report was given on the float construction, and plans were made to continue the membership drive. The date of the next meeting of the group will be announced later.

City Sales Tax Is Reported For Past Month

The City of Santa Anna received a check for \$4,188.96 from State Comptroller Bob Bullock, the city's share of the October sales tax.

The total one-percent sales tax was over the amount for the same period last year when \$3,845.92 was collected, but the total for the year is down from the previous year by 10.32 percent. The total to date for 1983 stands at \$24,101.99, with \$26,874.17 from the previous year.

The city rebates arrived a week early this month since city checks are now required by the 20th of each month. The earlier deadline, set by the State Legislature, will bring in \$500 million more for the current state budget without a tax increase.

Jim Laubhan Resigns From S-Anna City Council

Jim Laubhan, serving his first term on the Santa Anna City Council, resigned the position at a called meeting Tuesday night. He was elected in April 1982 and had four months remaining in his term.

Laubhan said Tuesday that he felt he could better serve the town and community as a private citizen, and he will continue to be a part of the town with his business and other interests. He is owner of Art Fabrics

and has been active in restoration of his real estate holdings in the downtown area.

No replacement for the post was named at the meeting, and the Council is not required by law to fill the post for that duration.

In other business Tuesday night, James Bowen, a Coleman attorney, met with the Council to discuss the position of City Attorney.

The next regular meeting of City Council is Thursday, December 8.

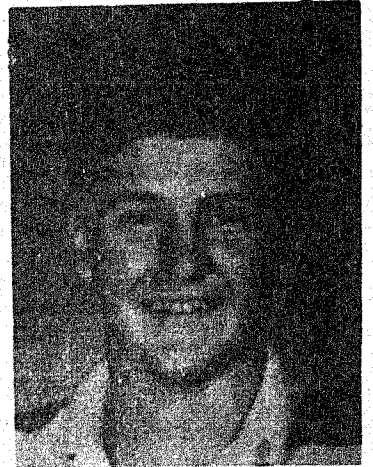
Santa Anna Student In College Who's Who

Today, the traditional day of counting blessings taken for granted throughout the year, we give our thanks for the blessings we enjoy as citizens of a free democracy.



Coleman Events Planned Saturday

The 1983 holiday season opens in Coleman Saturday with a 5 p.m. parade. "Christmas Past, Present and Future," is theme for the event.

Decorated floats and vehicles will participate, competing for prizes given by the Coleman Chamber of Commerce. Christmas pageant contestants will also be in the parade.

Out of town floats are also invited to compete in the parade in Coleman.

Cotton Harvest Continues Here

Most area cotton farmers are waiting for the season's first freeze to complete their cotton harvest. The major part of the 1983 crop will be harvested when the natural defoliation takes place.

J. T. Avants, Santa Anna Co-Op Gin manager, reported this week that 273 bales of cotton had been ginned to date, with the cotton coming in slowly. The first bale was ginned October 18.

Santa Anna has the only cotton gin in Coleman and Brown counties, ginning about 1,600 bales annually. The price of cotton is slightly higher than last year, averaging about 55 cents per pound. The quality of local cotton is good, but yields are low, according to Mr. Avants.

Coleman County Tax District Has Election of Directors

County Clerk Glenn Thomas announced results of the recent election of directors of the Coleman County Tax Appraisal District. Re-elected for two-year terms were Harold Pittard of Novice, current chairman, Barbara Kingsbery of Santa Anna, secretary; Bill Sneed of Coleman and Harold Bragg of Talpa. The only newcomer to the Board is Jerry May of Coleman.

Taxing units of Coleman County nominated candidates for the Board of Directors, and submitted them to Thomas along with their votes for board members. Directors are elected for two-year terms. They appoint the district's appraisal review board members, employ the chief appraiser, set district policies, establish its budget and contract for its major expenditures.

May, who received 1564 votes, succeeds James Isenhower of Coleman, a one-term member. Pittard received 1110; Sneed polled 845; Kingsbery received 795; and Bragg received 662.

The Coleman County directors have served without pay or remuneration

since the board was established, meeting at least once each month to conduct business of the district.

Each taxing unit in the county is allotted a number of votes based proportionally on its 1982 tax levy. The unit may cast all its votes for one candidate or may distribute the votes among any number of candidates. Taxing units in Coleman County include City of Coleman, City of Santa Anna, City of Novice, Coleman ISD, Santa Anna ISD, Mozelle ISD, Talpa-Centennial ISD, Novice ISD, and Coleman County.

An appraisal district board normally consists of five directors but may have as many as 13. The newly-elected directors will serve two-year terms starting January 1, 1984. To be eligible to serve on the board of directors, a person must be a resident of the appraisal district and must have resided in the district for at least two years immediately preceding the date he takes office. No more than one employee of a taxing unit may serve on the board, but this limitation does not apply to elected officials also chosen to serve as directors.

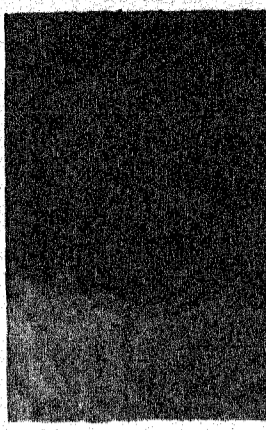
S.A. Child an Entry In Abilene Pageant

City Police Report

The theft of a pay telephone was reported to police last week by Coleman County Telephone Cooperative officials. Chief of Police Russ Ellis said that the phone was apparently ripped from the outside wall of the Dairy Queen sometime during the night Tuesday, November 15.

Quinton Daniel, Plant Manager of the Telephone Cooperative, told Mr. Ellis that it was unknown how much money was in the telephone, but he valued the phone itself at \$500.

Daniel described the missing phone as a 'Centurion' brand made of bright orange metal, with a black outer cover of plastic.

Jeff Bell of Santa Anna reported an attempted burglary of his son's home on the south side of Wallis just east of the Highway 67 Junction sometime the past week. He said the attempt was discovered this weekend when his son returned home. Entry apparently was not gained and nothing was apparently taken.

A small window at the

rear of the residence was broken, however. Mr. Ellis said that if anyone remembers seeing any suspicious activity in the vicinity of the house or the Dairy Queen in the past week to call him at 348-3147. Any assistance in these and other past burglaries will be greatly appreciated, he said.

Another auto accident was reported to Mr. Ellis last Thursday in front of H&H Food Mart. Mr. Ellis said that a car driven by Lorain Cole of Coleman struck a parked car, owned by Mrs. E. E. McClintock of Santa Anna. Mrs. Cole was cited for improper backing, as she had backed across the street from in front of the store in a U-turn in order to drive south on Second Street.

Mr. Ellis said this is the second accident at this location of this nature in the past five weeks. He reminds citizens that even though this has been a common practice for a long time to make a U-turn into or out of the parking spaces at the grocery store, it is a violation of traffic laws to do so, as there is a solid yellow center line and it is illegal to cross a solid yellow line.

Mr. Ellis said that several 'No U Turn' signs have been ordered for that location as well as for in front of the Post Office and on Wallis Avenue between First Street and Third Street. He said that because of traffic congestion in these locations, it is very dangerous for anyone to make U-turns there.

Mr. Ellis said he hopes that everyone has a safe and peaceful Thanksgiving, but he will be on hand if needed during the holiday weekend.

Ex-Student Football Team Includes Former Grid Stars

The Santa Anna Ex-Student Football Team has an impressive line-up for the Saturday game. Some of the outstanding players from former teams are on the roster.

Joining the team for the first year is Danny Valdez, a graduate of 1974 who has just completed his senior year on the Howard Payne University varsity team. Danny was an All-District linebacker while at SAHS and has been a starter on the HPU squad two years.

Representing the earliest class will be Roddy Dean and Arthur DeLeon from the Class of 1971. Roddy

has played with the team every year and Arthur has played four years. Dean was an All District selection while in SAHS and Arthur was a three-year letterman.

Others playing four years on the Booster Club team are Wallace Collins III, Tommy Harris, John Rendon, W. T. Young, Albert DeLeon and Jody Day.

Collins and Harris are from the Class of 1979. Collins received honorable mention and Harris was an All District selection safety and was quarterback of the Mountaineer squad.

John Rendon, '75, received honorable mention as All District. W. T. Young was a three-year letterman, and DeLeon was an All District running back. Day received All District and All Area honors, graduating in 1976.

Four-year members of the local team are Jerry Culpepper, Mike Warnock, Billy Diaz, Norris Lewis and Wayne Kuykendall. Culpepper and Kuykendall graduated in 1980 and were an All District picks; Warnock, '79, received honorable mention for All District as halfback; Diaz, a 1973 graduate, was an All District guard. Playing for the third year will be Robert Barton and Curtis Fellers from the Class of 1980; Rusty Buzzard and Dwayne Warnock from 1981; Albert Collins, '82, Terry Day and Bruce

Pape, '79, and David Huggins, '74. Barton and Fellers were three-year lettermen for the Mountaineers; Buzzard and Warnock were both All District and area honorees as backs. Collins and Huggins were both All District players while in SAHS. Day and Pape both received honorable mention for All District. Lynn Loyd, a Novice High School graduate of 1973, will play with the local team for the third year.

Mike Salazar from the Class of 1981, is an All District noseguard and will play for the second year on the Booster Club team. Ernest DeLeon and Junior Salazar, '82, will also be playing for the second year.

First-year members of the local team are Tommy DeLeon, Steve Hughes, Randy Casey and Bodie Stark, graduates of 1982. Bodie and Steve were All-district selections, and Tommy and Randy received honorable mention. Ricky Perry, from the Class of 1981, is playing for the first year. Crude Production Listed For Month of August

AUSTIN... October 25... Texas crude oil production totaled 71,376,732 barrels in August, according to Railroad Commission Chairman Mack Wallace. This figure compares with July production totaling 71,991,989 barrels and August 1982 production of 73,082,071 barrels. Texas oil production averaged 2,302,475 barrels daily in August, down from 2,322,322 barrels daily in July and down from 2,357,486 barrels daily in August 1982.

The August 1983 production allowable totaled 92,898,538 barrels. Texas oil production was 23.17 percent under the allowable for the month. The state's top producing counties for August were Pecos, with over four million barrels; Gaines, Ector, Yoakum, Hockley, Gregg and Andrews, with over three million; and Scurry and Crane, with over two million barrels; Refugio with just under two million barrels for the month.

Under procedures now in effect, an operator attempting to meet the requirement had to file additional copies to be sent to various gatherers or purchasers that may have been involved with production from a particular lease.

With the new procedure, only a single form will be required by the Commission. Information from the form will be entered into the Commission's computer file and a copy will be produced for all the gatherers and purchasers that may have an interest in the particular lease. The Commission receives approximately 200 new Form P-4's each day.

Drilling Applications Listed for October

AUSTIN- Nov. 3.... A total of 2,883 drilling applications were processed by the Railroad Commission in October, according to RRC Chairman Mack Wallace. In September, the Commission processed 2,367 applications, and 3,632 were handled in October 1982. The October 1983 total included 2,153 applications for permits to drill new oil and gas tests, 94 applications to deepen existing holes, 259 applications to plugback existing holes, and 58 applications for service (non-producing) wells. Operators also filed 319 amended drilling

applications. In September, the total included 1,820 applications for new holes, 55 applications for deepening, 193 applications for plugbacks, and 24 applications for service wells. There were 275 amended applications. Applications for new oil and gas holes in October included 338 in West Central Texas. The commission reported 38 oil and 71 gas discoveries in October. On September 25 oil and 98 gas discoveries were reported. A total of 548 dry holes were reported in October, as compared with 487 in September.

Local Drilling Applications

Pape Brothers of Coleman will drill No. 2 R. O. Mathews in the regular field two miles southeast of Santa Anna. The planned 2,990-foot venture is located on a 221-acre lease in the HT&B Survey, Section 60. Pape Brothers of Coleman will re-enter two abandoned projects in the same regular field area. Both ventures were originally drilled by Reserve Oil. No. 2 Mathews and No. 4 Mathews are located in HT&B Survey, Section 60. Comanche Resources, Inc. of Odessa has filed application to deepen to 1,950 feet two abandoned Col-

erman County wildcats four miles north of Trickham. No. 2 C. W. Fleming is located on a 160-acre lease in R. H. Graham Survey 108. The project was plugged in September 1982, at 1,345 feet, by J & R Exploration. The other venture is No. 3 Fleming in the same survey. It was plugged in September at 1,325 feet by J & R Exploration. Spotted in the regular field two miles southeast of Santa Anna is Precision Drilling Co. of Coleman the No. 7-A C. M. Moseley. The planned 2,990-foot venture is located on a 50-acre lease in Section 60, HT&B Survey.

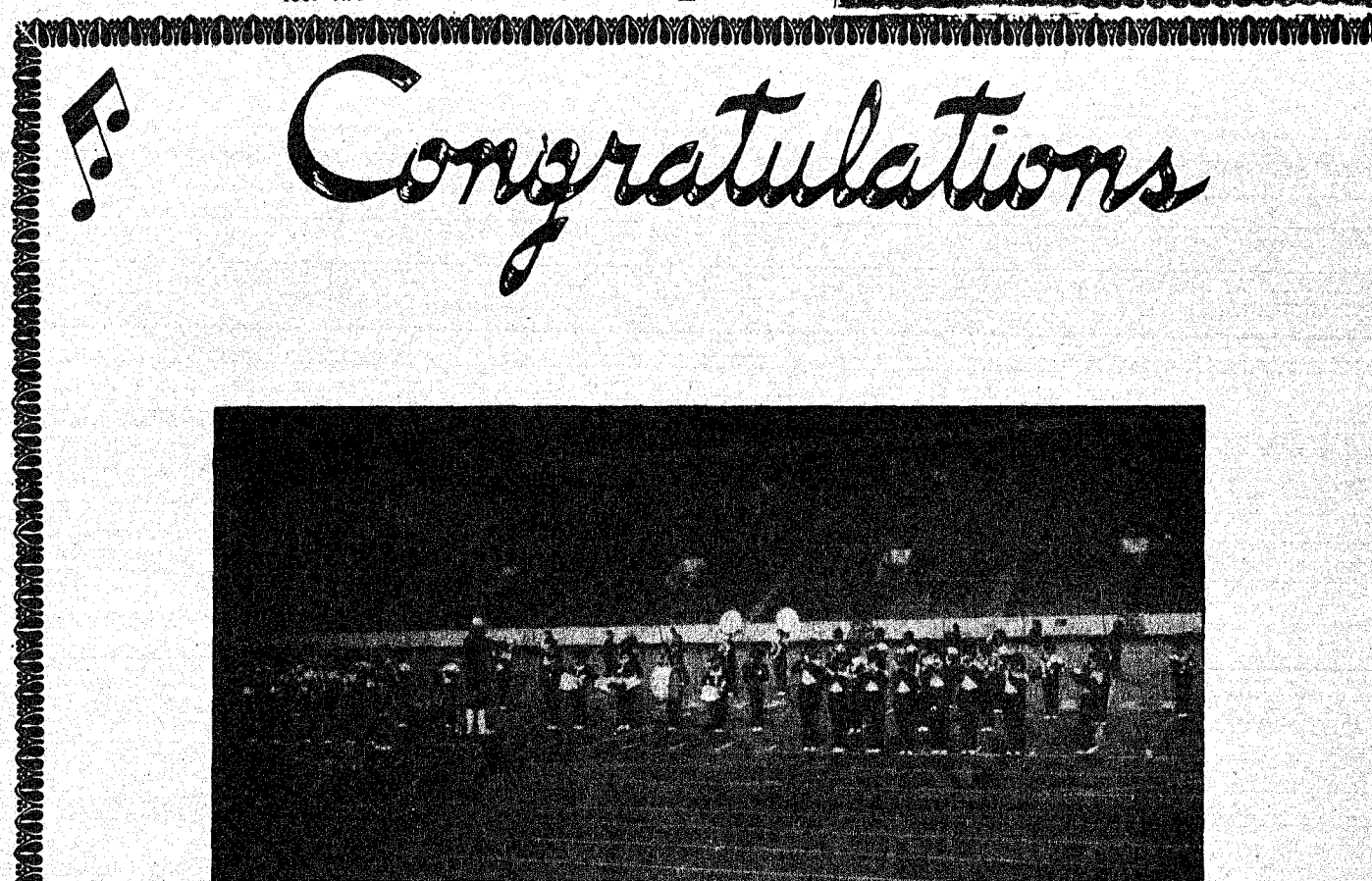
Procedure To Reduce Paperwork

AUSTIN, Nov. 2.... An estimated \$9,600 will be saved each year by Texas oil and gas operators through a new filing procedure to be implemented by the Railroad Commission for one of its forms. The change, which becomes effective Dec. 1, involves procedures regarding the Commission's Form P-4, which is a producer's authorization to transport oil, gas and condensates from a particular oil or gas lease. The form is required by the Commission before any oil or gas can be moved from a lease.

Social Security Notes

Changes are Made In Medicare Payment

Several important changes have been made in the Medicare program by a new law, Priscilla Ely, Social Security branch manager of Brownwood, said recently.

The changes include: + Payment for inpatient radiology and pathology services. While a Medicare beneficiary is a hospital inpatient, Medicare medical insurance will pay 80 percent of the approved charges for services by doctors in the fields of radiology and pathology, after the beneficiary has met the medical insurance deductible. The 80 percent payment applies whether or not the doctors accept assignment. Under the old law, medical insurance paid 100 percent of the approved charges for these services if the doctors accepted assignment of medical insurance claims for all Medicare inpatients. The change is effective with services furnished on or after October 1, 1982.

+ Special enrollment period for merchant seamen. Up until last year, a number of merchant seamen chose not to enroll in Medicare medical insurance because they were guaranteed free health care under the Public Health Service. On March 10, 1981, it was announced that Public Health Service hospitals would close on October 1, 1981. Some merchant seamen then enrolled for medical insurance, even though they had to pay an increased premium rate because they had not enrolled when they were first eligible to do so. Others still chose not to enroll because of the penalty for late enrollment.

+ Medicare secondary payor for older workers. Effective January 1, 1983, employers with 20 or more employees will be required to offer workers age 65 through 69 and their dependents the same health benefits that are offered to younger employees. If an older worker accepts the employer's health plan, Medicare will become the secondary health insurance payor for the worker and his or her spouse. Older workers can reject the employer's

health plan, however, and retain Medicare as their primary health insurance coverage.

+ Medicare for Federal employees. Also starting January 1, 1983 almost all Federal employment will be subject to the Medicare hospital insurance portion of the Social Security (FICA) tax. Federal employment will then count toward eligibility for hospital insurance protection in the same way that work covered by Social Security counts. People who are Federal employees both during the before January 1983 will be given credit for previous Federal employment if they need it to qualify for hospital insurance.

Under the new law, Federal workers may be eligible for hospital insurance at age 65, before 65 if they are disabled, or at any age if they have permanent kidney failure. To qualify on the basis of disability, they will have to meet the eligibility requirement of the Social Security disability program. Their Federal employment will not entitle them to any cash Social Security benefits, however.

+ Increase in medical insurance premium. The new law temporarily suspends the current limitation on annual increases in the basic Medicare medical insurance premium. On July 1, 1983 and July 1, 1984, the basic medical insurance

premium will increase to an amount which equals 25 percent of the medical insurance program costs for aged beneficiaries. Under present law, the basic premium can be raised only if there has been a general raise in Social Security cash benefits during the previous year, and the amount of the increase is limited to the percentage that cash benefits increased. This limitation will resume on July 1, 1985.

+ Coverage of hospice care. Starting November 1, 1983, Medicare hospital insurance will help pay for hospice care for terminally ill beneficiaries with a life expectancy of six months or less. These beneficiaries can elect to receive hospice care instead of other Medicare benefits, except services of the attending doctor. Covered hospice care will include nursing care, therapies, medical social services, homemaker-home health aid services, short-term inpatient care, outpatient care, drugs for pain relief, and respite care. Special benefit periods, coinsurance amounts, and coverage requirements will apply to the new hospice care benefit.

More information about these Medicare changes is available at the Brownwood Social Security office. You can get a free leaflet which explains the changes.

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CAPITOL UPDATE

This column has been too quiet too long, so let's see if healthy controversy this week.

Toward that end I will advise you that I have been requested by several people to sponsor a bill, in the next session of the Legislature, that would slightly amend and change the current laws dealing with the sale and consumption of alcoholic beverages. More specifically I have been requested to carry legislation that would effectively eliminate "private clubs" in otherwise dry areas.

As the law currently stands, a political subdivision may hold a local option election to legalize or prohibit sale of liquor. Assuming the sale is prohibited, there is another method whereby alcoholic beverages can be sold in a dry area, that method being generically known as a private club license.

The procedure for licensing a private club is relatively simple and unless certain safety objections can be proven there is virtually no way to keep a private club from being licensed, assuming, of course, it meets all the criteria set forth for member, temporary member, guest, etc. In practical operation virtually anyone can avail themselves of an alcoholic beverage at a private club either by payment of a nominal fee for temporary membership or signing in as a "guest" of a member, the member often being an employee of the private club.

Many of the people who have approached me about the matter I would have to characterize as good, levelheaded, rational thinking citizens who are not necessarily out to "rain on anyone's picnic". But they simply feel that if the majority of voters of a political subdivision determine that they want their political subdivision dry, then it quite literally should be dry. I have to admit that if you follow the theory that the democratic process mandates rule of the majority then these folks are absolutely correct.

At the same time, one must look down from the dizzy heights of democratic theory to the abysmal depths of the realities of human nature and realize that no law prohibits consumption of an alcoholic beverage in any public place, where the

owner agrees, and that, in fact, the simple prohibition of private clubs in dry areas may have the most undesirable effect of allowing the same or similar type establishments to operate under the guise of no sale of alcohol, simply consumption of alcohol. Under this scenario there would be absolutely no regulation. Drinking could be conducted at any hour of the day or night and authorities, under the Constitution, would not even have the ability to go on the premises to see what type of conduct was being carried on for the reason that they would likely never have "probable cause" to do so.

This is a controversial issue and maybe I should not bring it up this close to Christmas when there is supposed to be "peace on earth, goodwill towards men, but I do not want my constituents to lose the spirit of involvement that has been so gratifying to me as your state representative. So "give me your best shot" and let me hear what you think of this issue.

Disadvantaged American students are getting an extra educational boost these days through a program that is sending business experts back to the classroom.



Each year since 1971, dozens of employees of the International Business Machines Corporation leave their offices and laboratories to join the staffs of educational institutions that serve disadvantaged students. It's called the IBM Faculty Loan Program and through its framework, company employees with skills ranging from engineering to marketing, spend at least one academic year on campus, teaching, conducting seminars and advising on curricula.

Since the program's inception, more than 400 employees have been loaned at full pay to participating colleges. To qualify, the schools must have high percentages of disadvantaged students or programs to improve their education.
