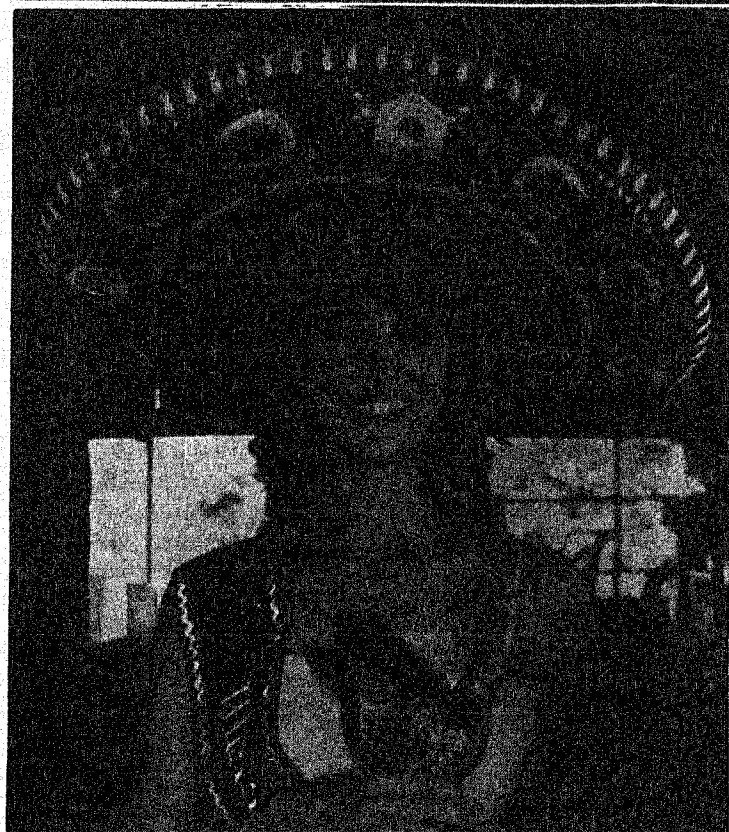

Santa Anna High School students selected school favorites recently, with the honorees to be featured in the school yearbook.

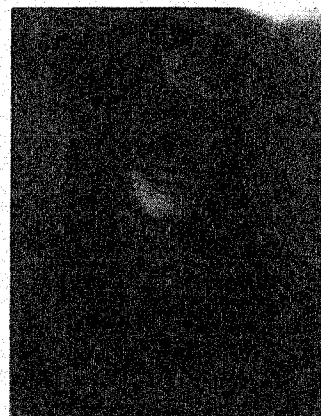

Ramon Castillo, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ramon Castillo Sr. Both are seniors at SAHS this year.

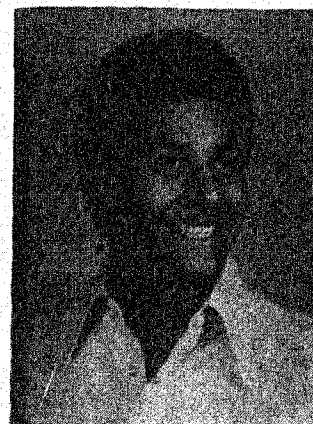
Robin is head cheerleader and active in athletics where she was an entry in the state tennis doubles con-

tests last year. Ramon is a member of the varsity football team and a member of the FFA Chapter.

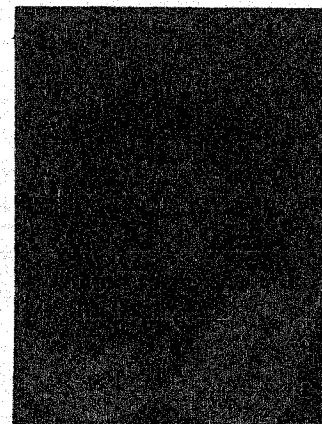

Latin American Mission Starts New Building

Construction began last week on the Cordero Baptist Mission, located at the corner of South Sixth Street and Avenue C. Ground was broken last week, and the concrete slab foundation is to be poured soon.

The Latin American mission was organized in January 1982 under the sponsorship of First Baptist Church. Later that year, the Texas Baptist Home Mission Board also agreed to assist, pledging \$15,000 toward the construction of a building. The Coleman County Baptist Association also gives the group financial help, and \$6,000 has already been raised by members of the congregation.

Pablo Serna Jr., a senior Bible major at Howard Payne University, is pastor of the group. A native of Sanger, he has formerly pastored churches at Lampasas and Lingleville. He spent two summers as a student missionary to the Bronx in New York City with the Home Mission Board.

Salome Guzman was pastor of the group for over a year, moving in June to Taylor.

The new building will be 2,244 square feet of frame construction and contain an assembly room, five classrooms and restrooms. Don Pritchard is builder, with members of the group to assist with much of the work.

Val Garza is chairman of the building committee. Others on the committee are Gabriel Rosales, Joe Frausto Jr., Joe Diaz, Simon Martinez, Victoria Trinidad and Betty

Rosales. Joe Frausto Jr. drew the plans for the building.

Since organization of the mission, its members have met at New Hope Baptist Church, the Lions Club building, the Civic Center, and currently at the First Baptist Church annex. They meet at 1 p.m. on Sunday and at 7 p.m. each Wednesday. Membership is approximately 45.

Lometa Hornets Defeated 13 - 6

SAHS Team Wins Again

The Santa Anna Mountaineers held on to their perfect season record when they defeated Lometa 13 - 6 in a home game Friday night. Although the Mountaineers outplayed the Hornets and held them to three first downs, they were almost jinxed by fumbles and penalties.

The Santa Anna team started out well, making a touchdown during the first four minutes of play on an 18-yard play by Chris DeLeon to climax a 76-yard drive. Ramon Vasquez' PAT gave the Mountaineers a 7-0 lead.

The local team made a good defensive stand, and after one series took over the ball after a Lometa punt.

The Mountaineers went backward from Lometa's 45 yard line to their own 30 by way of four penalties. A punt put the ball in Hornet hands just four yards from where the series started.

The Santa Anna defense was

super, according to Coach Odis Summers. Lometa had 91 yards rushing and 15 yards passing. Their only score came in the second quarter on a 15-yard play that resulted from an Mountaineer fumble. The PAT was stopped by James Culpepper.

The Mountaineers did not score again until the final quarter, when Ramon Castillo passed to Doug Warnock who ran 33 yards to the goal

line. The PAT failed.

Rodney Guthrie was the standout for defense, with Doug Warnock and Maurice Castillo also playing a fine game. Chris DeLeon in the secondary broke up several passes by the Hornets.

Ramon (Bebe) Vasquez earned 102 yards in 19 carries, having gained over 100 yards in each of the four

Funeral services were held Tuesday, September 27, in Hurst, with interment in the Clifton Cemetery. A native of Arkansas, Payne earned B.A. and B.S. degrees from Texas Wesleyan College and did graduate

work at Perkins School of Theology and Southern Methodist University. He was awarded an honorary doctor of divinity degree from TWC in 1967. During his career he served a number of ministerial appointments, including pastoring the Santa Anna church in the early 1950's. He returned here a few years ago to conduct a revival meeting, and had many friends here. He served 13 years as senior pastor of First UMC of Arlington before being named superintendent of the Weatherford District in 1980 and superintendent of the Temple District in 1982.

He was also a Captain (Chaplain Corps) of the U. S. Naval Reserves. Survivors are his wife, Lillie Payne; two sons, Bryan and Barry, both of Fort Worth; two daughters, Shauna Payne of Arlington and Dana Turner of Humble; three brothers, five sisters, and one grandson.

Parking Zones Changed At Downtown Intersection

Santa Anna residents are reminded that No Parking Zones have been designated at the main intersection at Wallis Avenue and North Second Street.

With the installation of the new traffic signals, a wider zone has been made to keep vehicles from interfering with the traffic-activated signal light. The metal from vehicles parked in the immediate area causes the traffic lights to be activated continuously, resulting in the improper

operation of the signal light. The new zone at each corner is painted with a wide white stripe, and everyone is asked to cooperate with the regulation and help keep traffic moving properly through town.

The new signals also have pedestrian-operated buttons at each corner in addition to the vehicle-activated signal in the street. The new traffic system was designed and installed by the Texas Highway Department to aid in traffic flow through the downtown area.

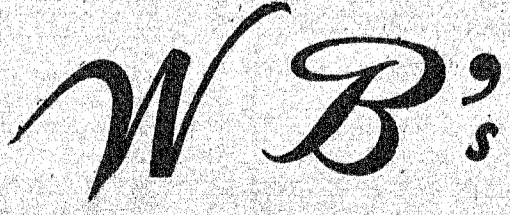

City Police Report

Seven complaints were filed with the Police Department during the week of September 13 - 20, according to Chief Russ Ellis. They included two burglaries, two thefts and three assaults.
18-year-old James Peacock was arrested Thursday on assault and disorderly conduct charges filed by Teressa Swafford, 43. He appeared before Municipal Judge Joe Taylor September 16 and was fined \$100 on each charge. Peacock then filed assault charges against Mrs. Swafford. Both complaints resulted from the same incident on Thursday afternoon at a residence on Bowie Avenue.
Charges of assault and disorderly conduct were filed Thursday, September 15, at a senior citizen's Friendship Dinner, at the Mountain City Center. A 70-year-old woman apparently was assaulted by another woman during the meal. Both ladies were to appear before Judge Taylor last Friday but the hearing was postponed until this week due to illness of one of the ladies. (So much for 'friendship' dinners).
The principal of the Elementary School, Charles Brewster, reported that the building had been entered over the weekend. There were no signs of vandalism, but several small items were apparently taken, including a knife from the nurse's office and a wristwatch from one of the classrooms.
Authorities believe entrance was gained by the use of one of three sets of keys either lost or stolen from the school over the past year. The investigation is continuing with several suspects yet to be interviewed, according to Mr. Ellis.
Amber Cove Restaurant was broken into during the night Wednesday, September 14, according to the manager, Mrs. Dorothy Hernandez. Entry was apparently gained by jimmying the front door lock. Ap-

proximately \$47 in quarters was taken.
Gertrude French reported to Police that a man's Elgin 17-jewel wristwatch belonging to her late husband was stolen from her residence earlier this month. The watch held quite a bit of sentimental value to Mrs. French, and she said she is hoping for its return rather than the prosecution of the person taking it.
Mr. Ellis said there were no reported traffic accidents in Santa Anna during that week.
(Current week's report)
Chief of Police Russ Ellis attended a meeting with District Attorney Steve Ellis and his staff on Wednesday evening, September 21, along with other area law enforcement officers. The meeting, at the Brown County courthouse in Brownwood, was presented by the District Attorney's office to inform the officers of the many changes in various laws, most notably in the drunk driving law that went into effect September 1.
At least one downtown property owner has begun cleaning up outside around his building, Mr. Ellis said. He reminds Santa Anna residents and property owners of the new Nuisance and Junk ordinance that went into effect earlier this month.
Mr. Ellis said that enforcement of the ordinance will begin soon, but he is encouraging everyone to voluntarily clean and straighten up their property in public spirit and cooperation to help make Santa Anna a clean and safe environment in which to live.
Bob Rutherford of 412 Avenue C reported the theft of two plants from his front porch either Friday evening or Saturday. One was a six-foot fig tree in a cream colored plastic pot, weight 50 to 75 pounds, and the other was a 'Mother-in-law' plant about four feet tall in a red clay pot. 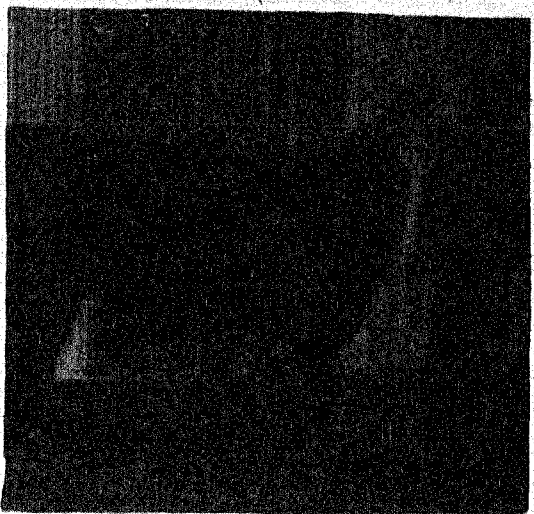
Ellis is asking that anyone who may have seen these plants to notify him at the Police Department, 348-3147.

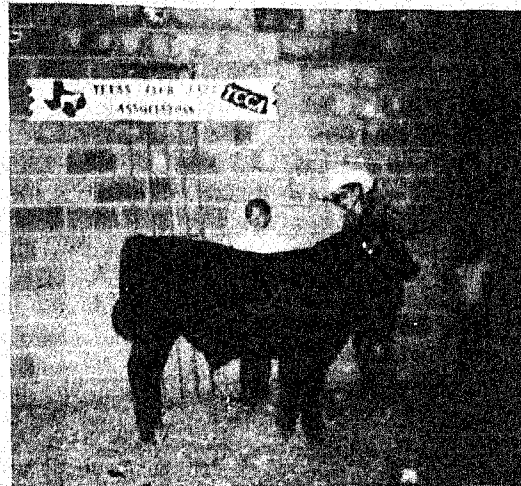

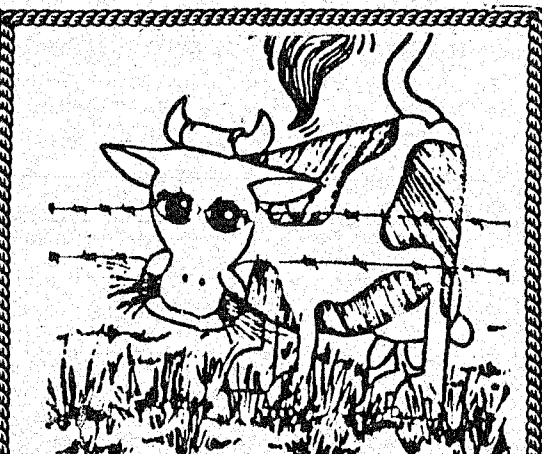

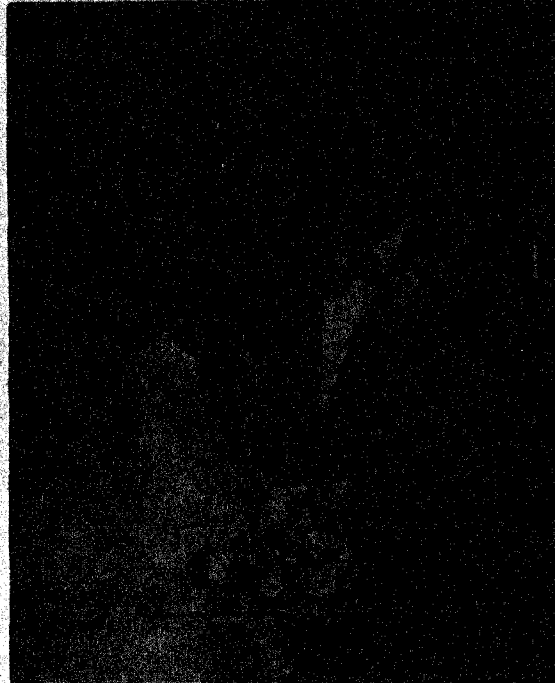

To complete her ensemble she wore a two-tiered fingertip length veil attached to a tiara headpiece trimmed with pearls to match her dress.

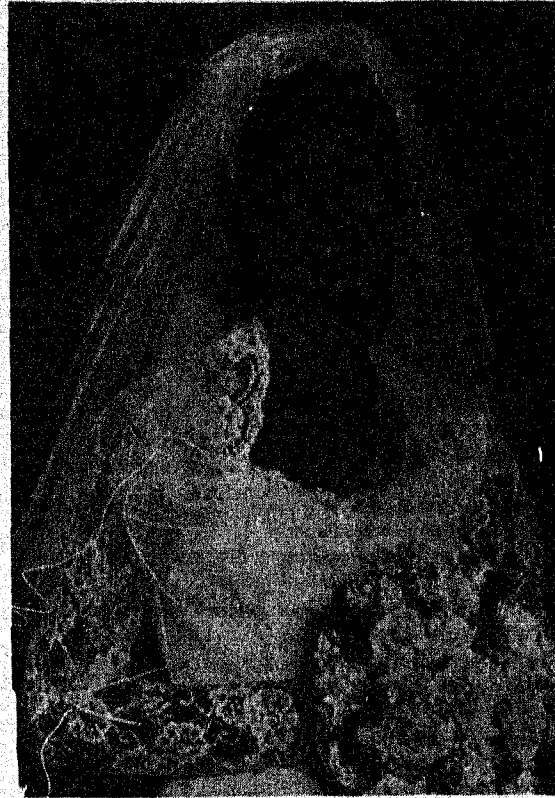

The club met at the Donham Cafe Club Room, the Merritt Hotel and Service Cafe clubroom, and in the Methodist Church basement, before buying the former variety store building for a permanent home.

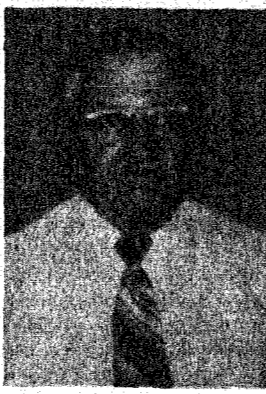
Officers elected at the first meeting were D. J. Johnson, president and Fred Battles, secretary-treasurer. Johnson served April 1923 until July 1927, the only president serving a two-year term.

Patrick Hosch is currently president of the Lions Club. Monique Spillman is Lions Club Sweetheart.

John C. Gregg is one of the outstanding members, having joined August 1945, the oldest member in length of service. He also has a perfect attendance record of thirty-six years and is a past president of

the group. The Lions Club is very active in community affairs. Their primary objective is sight conservation—buying many eye-glasses for the needy.

Peak membership was ninety-two in the middle 1950's, with present membership of thirty-four, according to secretary Jim Gooch.

Checking the old records we find the Rockwood Community invited the Santa Anna Lions Club and their wives to a banquet at the Rockwood School Auditorium April 27, 1926.

President Johnson accepted on behalf of the club.

Fred Turner received instructions for participating in the Susquecentennial Exposition in Philadelphia on March 31, 1926.

One letter is from a man wanting to build a three-story hotel here, asking about the community. He was told that water was plentiful, \$1.25 minimum for 2,000 gallons, gas was plentiful, and W.T.U. charged 15 cents per kilowatt for electricity.

On a humorous note, in a heated campaign selling tickets for the Christmas Opening and Pancake Fiesta in December 1955, the losing team had to dress as ladies and march in the parade. W. R. Mulroy was crowned King and rode on the float in the parade as King of the Lions Club.

Secretary J. T. Garrett (April 12, 1936) had a unique way of reminding fellow Lions of monthly meetings with letters with words of wisdom as "I have driven oxen and have driven mules and I know from experience, that if they sulk or balk that the whip will not make them go. However, we are all Lions, so come out to Lunch. I want you to do your Best."

Different organizations are serving the Lions luncheon each week. The ESA Sorority each first and second Tuesday, the Martha UMW group on the third Tuesday, and the Nitia Daniel UMW group the fourth Tuesday, and Windy B's Cafe helps out. Watch for further history of the Santa Anna Lions Club.

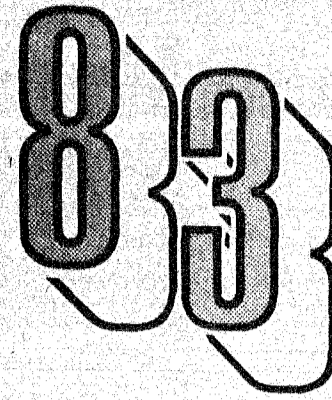

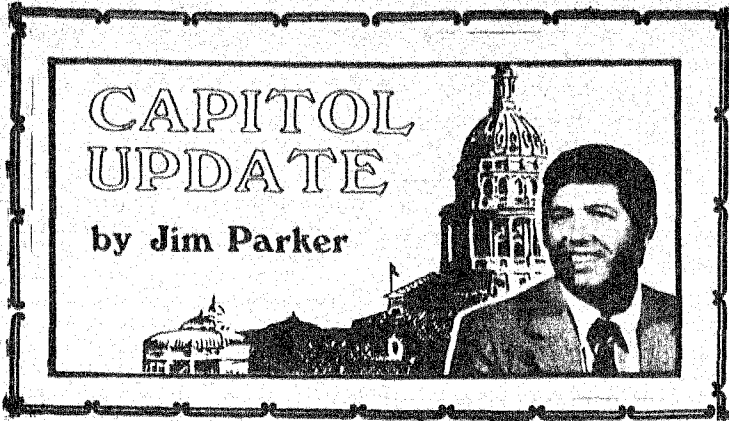

To keep you all aware of what I am doing and some of the things going on which may affect our district, I want to let you know what my schedule has been like in the past few weeks and what I will be doing in the near future. This should give you some idea of some of the responsibilities of the job of state representative which you elected me to fulfill.

Right off the bat, let me tell you this is not a 140-day job which ceases except while we are in session. In the last few weeks, I have made talks to the University Women's Club in Brownwood, the Professional Educators in Santa Anna, the teachers in Brady and the Rotary Club in Brownwood. I discussed issues they were interested in and answered questions which they had relating to many other state interests. (For your information, the most commonly asked questions have related to education problems and D.W.I.)

I have also talked to some government and history classes and hope to visit others in the near future. Next week I will be meeting with people at the Brownwood State School.

Besides keeping constituents informed, there are other responsibilities and meetings which must be attended out of the district. Following a regular session, the Speaker charges the House Committees with certain studies to be completed during the interim. Recommendations from each committee are made to the House at the beginning of the next Legislative session. All House members serve on the same committees to which they were assigned after the session convened. As a member of County Affairs and Judicial Affairs Committees, I will be studying the areas generally relating to these topics.

In addition to the standing committee studies made during the interim, there are also studies made by "select" committees which are charged with studying and making recommendations on a specifically selected subject. Generally the members of these select committees are composed of a few members from the House appointed by the Speaker, a few members from the Senate appointed by the Lt. Governor and a few citizen members appointed by the Governor. Recently Speaker "Gib"

Lewis requested that I serve as a member of the Select Committee on the Judiciary. This committee has been charged with making a comprehensive study of judges, their jurisdiction, salaries, retirement system; and courts, their creation, organization and jurisdiction.

Both the regular and select committees meet several times as a whole during the interim as do the subcommittees within each full committee. You can see this will involve both time in the actual meetings as well as time in preparing for the meeting; however, I look forward to the challenge and responsibilities involved in these studies and feel they will be both interesting to me and important to the district.

I have particularly enjoyed meeting people from my district and feel it is my responsibility as your representative to try to keep you abreast of current issues and answer any questions pertaining to state government. I want you all to be informed, take an interest in state government and share your views with me. Your input helps me be able to do a better job of representing you.

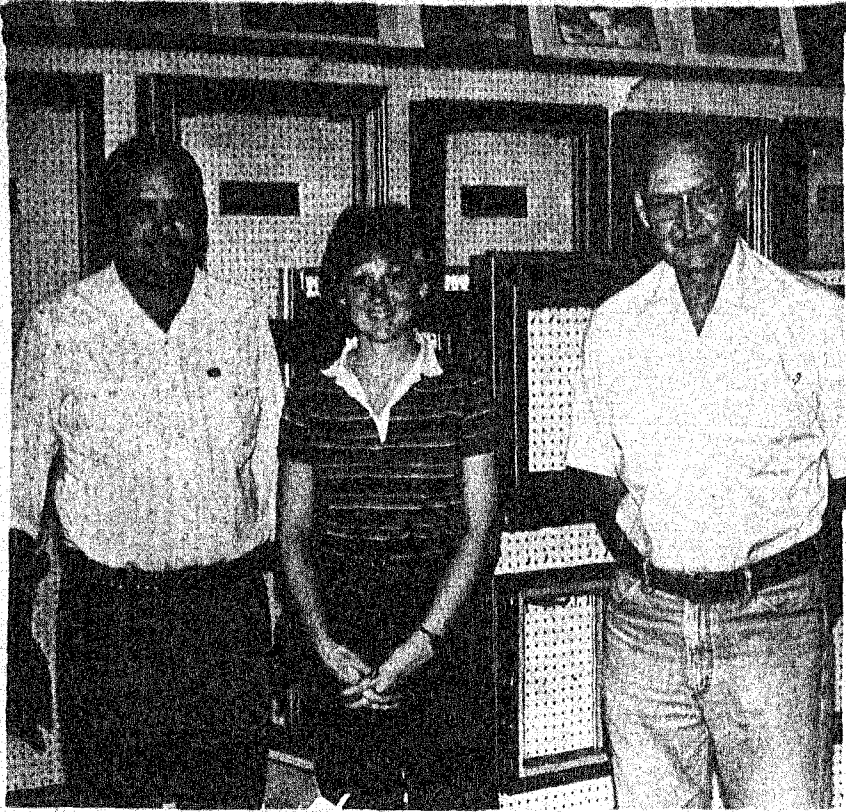
