Three Arrested For Recent Break-ins

Rural Burglaries Solved

Coleman County Sheriff's Department will file charges this week against three men in connection with a series of burglaries that have taken place in the community during the past several months. The investigations involve burglaries at five rural homes and farmsteads and at the City Cemetery equipment building in Santa Anna.

Sheriff H. F. Fenton and his deputies have been investigating the burglaries since the first incident about six months ago. Deputy Sheriff Mike Bowers of Santa Anna

has headed the local investigation. The break in the case came when information was received by the officers and some of the stolen merchandise was recovered and identified.

What was said to be several thousand dollars worth of stolen goods were recovered at a rural home in Comanche County, near the Brown County line. Two of the suspects were arrested at the house, and the merchandise, including jewelry, appliances and equipment, was taken to the Comanche County Sheriff's of-

fice. Most of the items were soon identified as having been taken in break-ins in Comanche and Coleman counties.

Two of the men were arrested last weekend in Comanche County and the other, a relative of the two, was arrested in Oklahoma and returned to Texas. All three are currently in custody in the Comanche County Jail and will be bound over for the Coleman County Grand Jury.

According to Sheriff Fenton, some of the stolen merchandise was taken to Arkansas and Oklahoma where it was sold. However the local officers are attempting to locate and recover the items and return them to their owners.

Officers have been working almost around the clock on the burglaries that have caused much concern in the community during the past several months.

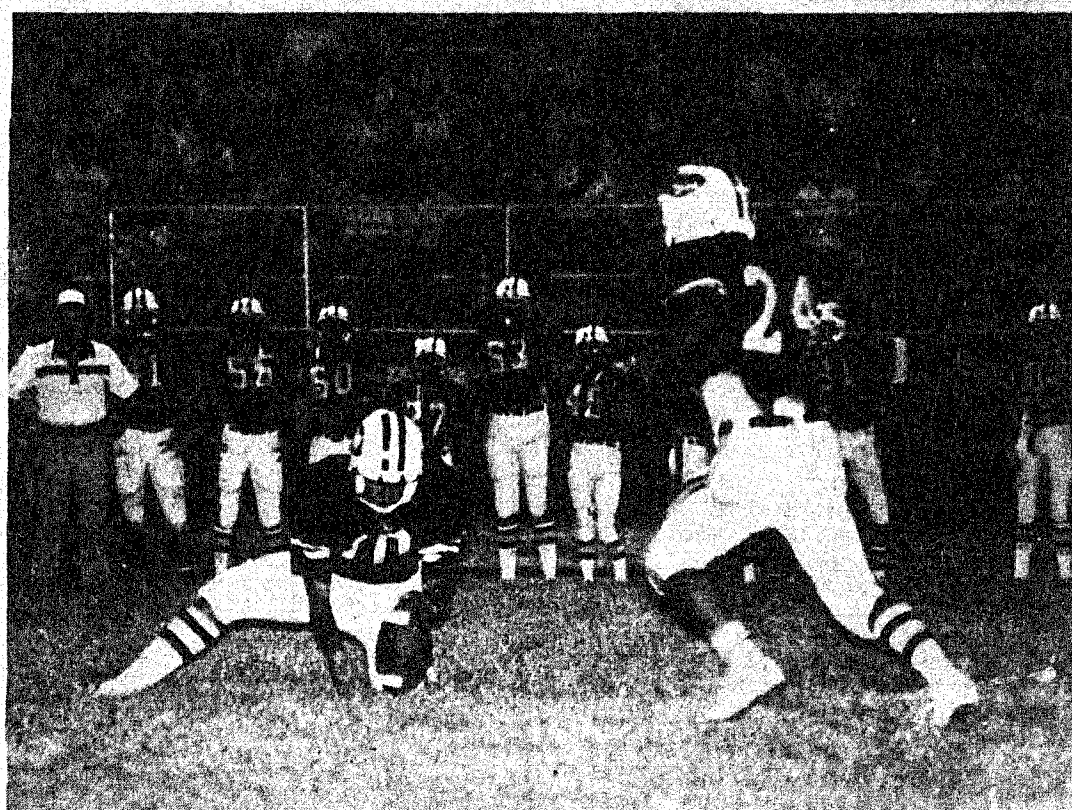
Saturday events will include a coffee, the business meeting and program, a buffet luncheon, and the Homecoming dance that evening.

Mountaineers Lose Game

The Goldthwaite Eagles showed their experience and strength Friday night when they defeated the Mountaineers 35-10 at the Santa Anna stadium. The victory left the Eagles with a perfect district record and dropped the Mountaineers to 2-1 in district and 4-1 for the season.

The Mountaineers played a superior defensive game and first scored with a 35 yard field goal by Ramon (Bebe) Vasquez in the first quarter that followed James Culpe-

per's recovery of a Goldthwaite fumble and a 50-yard drive.

The Eagles soon got in control of the game by scoring two touchdowns before halftime and adding two points on the first one for a 14-3 halftime lead. Another TD in the third quarter gave Goldthwaite a 22-3 lead.

In the third quarter Ramon Vasquez hit Doug Warnock for a 27-yard scoring pass, and Vasquez' PAT cut the Eagles' lead to 22-10. The final Eagle scores came late in the third quarter and in the last quarters.

The Goldthwaite superior passing game accounted for 244 yards in the air, while another 207 yards were added on the ground. Goldthwaite had 27 first downs during the game, with 15 of 22 passes completed.

Santa Anna had 12 first downs, with 122 yards rushing and 57 yards passing with five of 17 completions.

The Mountaineers showed improvement in the penalty department, with only three penalties for 15 yards on their record.

Vasquez and fullback James Bass led the Mountaineer rushing with 57 yards each. Vasquez, a sophomore, entered the game as the ninth-leading rusher in West Texas with 464 yards. Vasquez suffered a

hairline fracture in his arm in the Friday night game and will be sidelined for a week or two except for kicking duties.

Coach Odis Summers praised the Mountaineers for their good game against the powerful Goldthwaite team, currently ranked seventh in the Associated Press Class A ranks.

The Mountaineers will be on the road this week, traveling to Rochelle for a 7:30 p.m. game. The RHS team has not won a game this season and will be looking for a victory on their home field.

Highlights of the day will be games, pony rides and train rides for children, arts and crafts, go-cart rides, a cake walk and a drawing for one-half beef or cash.

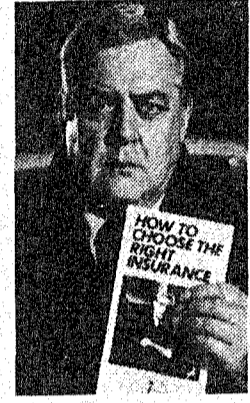

Coleman County Tax Rate Set the Same as Last Year

Coleman County Commissioners have set the county tax rate for 1983 at 40 cents per \$100 valuation, the same as the previous year. Of that amount, 26 cents is designated for the general fund and 14 cents for lateral road and flood control fund.

County Judge Pete Skelton said last week that a slight increase could have been made without a hearing, but that was not deemed necessary. The \$100,000 borrowed by the county in 1982 has been repaid and that the financial condition is good.

The 1984 budget for Coleman

County was approved last week at \$1,410,667. A great portion of that amount is for capital improvements, Judge Skelton stated this week. The current year's budget is \$1,283,706.

The county also approved use of Revenue Sharing funds if available this year. An estimated \$78,900 is anticipated from the funds, allocated as follows: \$2,400 for the county fire department; \$5,000 for the Coleman Library; \$34,000 for Social Security taxes on present employees and county commissioners; \$35,500 for retirement fund; and \$2,000 for road machinery maintenance.

Santa Anna Coed Awarded Tech Music Scholarship

The Texas Tech University Music Department has announced that Teresa Rolfe of Santa Anna is among the recipients of scholarships for the academic year of 1983-84. Teresa is a junior music education major at the university studying trumpet.

A graduate of Santa Anna High School, Teresa was an outstanding musician through her school years and was chosen to tour Europe in the summer of 1981 with the American Collegiate Band. She is a member of the Texas Tech Red Raider Band.

The Music Scholarship fund was

established at Tech in 1954 for music majors and is supported through gifts from friends of the music department. Scholarship recipients must maintain satisfactory musical and academic progress, including a grade point average of at least 2.85.

Over \$50,000 is awarded to students from the department in amounts ranging from \$100 to \$1,250. Scheduled auditions for the scholarships were held in February and are awarded on a competitive basis.

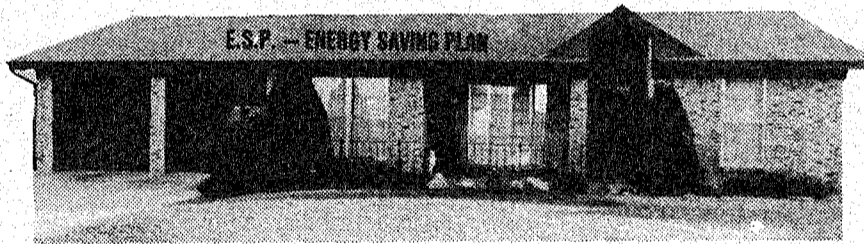

Social Security Notes

Eligibility for SSI

The records of people getting supplemental security income (SSI) payments are reviewed periodically to determine whether they continue to be eligible for payments and to make certain that their payments are in the correct amount. These reviews are required by law. The SSI program is based in part on financial need; recipients who are no longer needy are no longer entitled to their monthly SSI payments.

The review may be conducted by means of a personal interview, either in the person's home or in the Social Security office, by telephone, or by mail. In general, much the same ground is covered as when the person first applied for SSI. People are asked about their income, resources, and living arrangements. A blind or disabled person may also be asked to provide information about his or her condition.

Any Social Security representative who visits a person's home will have proper identification and will be prepared to show it. A person who is uncertain about someone who claims to be a Social Security Representative should phone the Social Security office to confirm that a home visit had been scheduled.

These periodic reviews are not a substitute for prompt reporting by people themselves of any changes in their circumstances that might affect their eligibility. Any such change should be reported immediately without waiting for Social Security to initiate a contact.

Although changes in a person's or couple's financial condition are important, changes that should be reported are not limited to income and resources. For example, a change of address or marital status should be reported, as well as any change in the number of people in the household.

The purpose of these reviews is to make certain that all those who are eligible under the SSI program - but only those who are eligible - actually receive monthly payments.

Almost all Social Security matters can be handled by phone. Medicare questions or filing of medicare claims can be taken care of by calling toll free 800-442-2620. You may file an application to establish your eligibility by calling Brownwood, 646-7533.

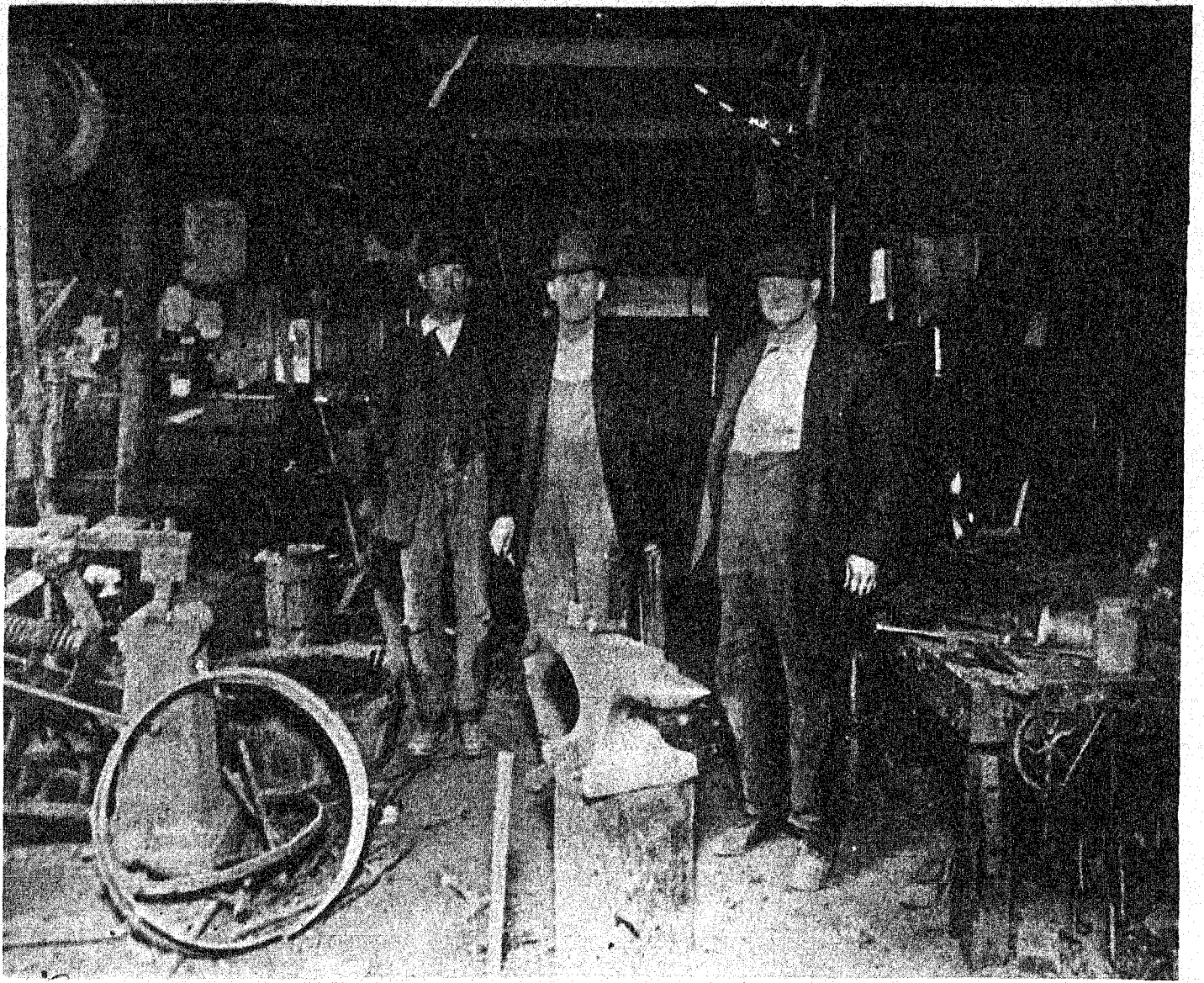

CAPITOL UPDATE

by Jim Parker

Last week's newspaper article discussed some of the things which a state representative does during the interim such as talks and visits within the district and committee hearings out of the district. While time consuming, these meetings keep constituents and me informed of problems and changes affecting our district and are necessary to keep us all updated on issues and working toward good representation for our area.

Another critical and very necessary but not so glamorous aspect of my position is the supervision of my staff in Austin who do the day-to-day job of assisting constituents who write letters, and even sometimes call, with problems or questions regarding any governmental agency, law or policy. I am most fortunate to have some very capable and eager staff people in Missy Jackson, Administrative Aide; Karla Bowers, Administrative Secretary; and Vernon Jordan, a part-time Research Assistant. My staff have all either lived or grown up in the district and are familiar with our area. Let me give you an example of a typical day's activities for them during the interim.

Everyday we receive requests from constituents who need either information or assistance. For example, we have been asked to find out the requirements for serving on certain boards; how to establish a nursing home; who to talk to regarding a suspected child abuse case; why someone was denied unemployment compensation; who regulates cemeteries and what rules govern perpetual care funds; when a particular person goes before the Parole Board; how to apply for welfare assistance; who to report neglected children to; and how a law passed by the Legislature might effect a particular person or occupation. Mrs. Jackson's job is to find the answers to these questions and relay the information back to the district. Sometimes I or my staff do this by letter; however, many times it is done by phone calls, particularly if the answer is complicated or if the situation is of a critical nature. Mrs.

Jackson also attends meetings of other committees and follows their activities while in Austin so that she is able to keep me informed of matters of interest to me or the district. When a particular issue, such as schools, is coming up for study, I have requested suggestions from members of that profession.

Ms. Bowers is responsible for sending out the letters to these people. Did you know that there are over 1,000 teachers in our district? Ms. Bowers is also responsible for keeping a calendar of important meetings, events, etc. which I am to attend and to 'hold down' the office when Mrs. Jackson is attending meetings and seminars.

Sometimes a large project develops when a constituent asks what sounds like a simple question. A history teacher from Coleman stopped by my Capitol office last spring to get a list of all the amendments to the Texas Constitution. In trying to obtain this information for him, we learned that there has never been a compilation of all the Texas amendments. The State Constitution had the amendments incorporated into its body but the amendments were not found listed anywhere in one place. So Mr. Jordan has the task right now of going back through the past 67 Legislative sessions and listing all the amendments that passed to the original Texas Constitution of 1876. This has been an interesting, time-consuming project; but I found it hard to believe that it had not ever been done from the beginning. Mr. Jordan plans to have completed the project in about a month. We would be happy to send copies to any teachers, schools, libraries or individuals who are interested in having one. Just let us know.

The jobs described should give you an idea of the day-to-day goings on in the representatives office. I believe that most often we have been able to assist each constituent who has requested help. Occasionally there really was not anything that we could do; however, I feel a very strong obligation to do what we can and we certainly do try hard.

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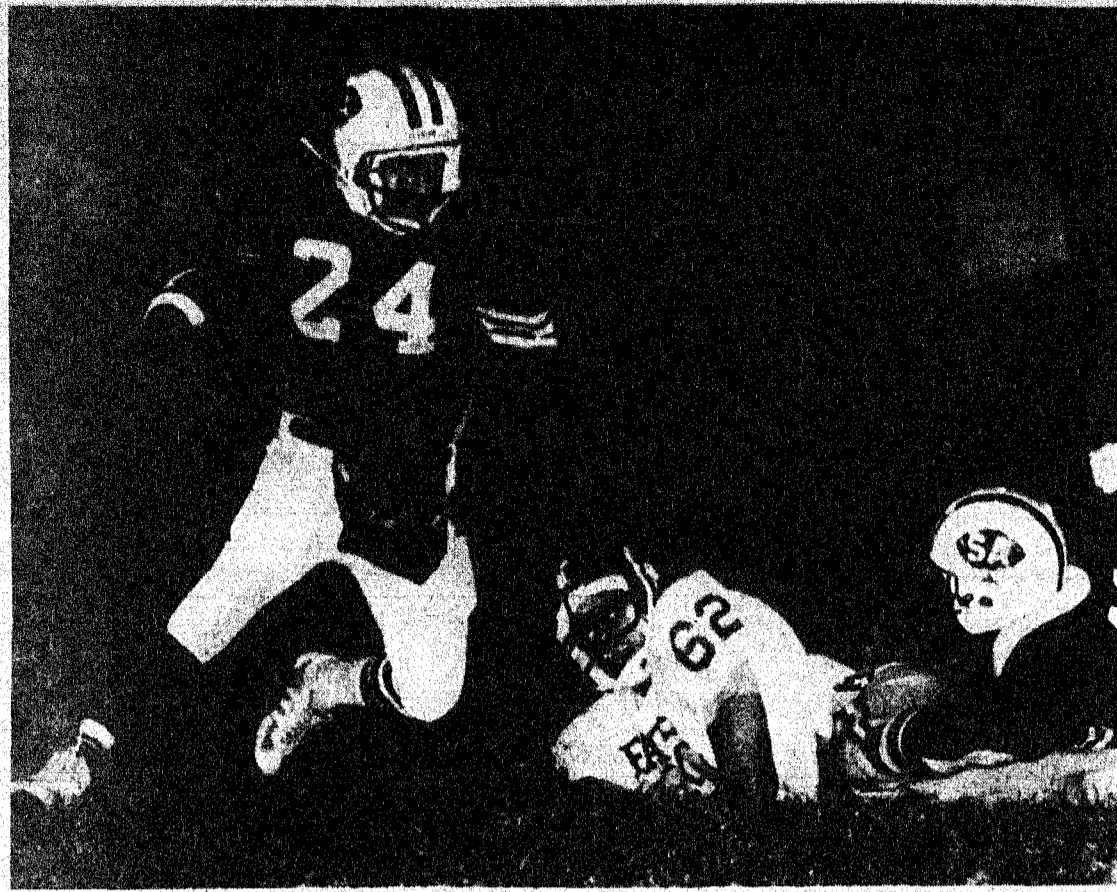

CRUDE PRODUCTION LISTED FOR JULY

AUSTIN, September 27-Texas crude oil production totaled 71,991,989 barrels in July, according to Railroad Commission Chairman Mack Wallace.

This figure compares with June production totaling 70,324,492 barrels and July 1982 production of 73,487,527 barrels.

Texas oil production averaged 2,322,322 barrels daily in July, down from 2,344,150 barrels daily in June and down from 2,370,565 barrels daily in July 1982.

The July 1983 production allowable totaled 94,083,593 barrels. Texas oil production was 23.48 percent under the allowable for the month.

Pecos County was the leading county in production in July with over four million barrels. Others with three million and above were Ector, Gaines,

Wilson Minerals Inc. of Houston completed No. 4 Rutherford - Wilson in the Rockwood (Fry Sand) Field three miles northeast of Rockwood.

Wellsite is in the Beunita Alderata Survey 275. The well had an absolute open flow of 180,000 cubic feet of dry gas daily with a gas-liquid hydrocarbon ratio of 196,000 - 1 of 61 gravity.

Gas Production

AUSTIN-Railroad Commission Chairman Mack Wallace has announced that Texas oil and gas wells produced 446,439,498 Mcf (thousand cubic feet) of gas in May, down 10.41 percent from field runs a year earlier.

That brings total production for the year through May to 2,268,876,425 Mcf of gas. Through May of 1982, Texas had produced 2,586,557,821 Mcf of gas.

Marketed gas production in May totaled 369,820,700 Mcf and reflected a 8.56 percent decrease from the May 1982 volume. Marketed production is the

AUSTIN-A total of 12,320 drilling applications were processed by the Railroad Commission in August as oil and gas operators sought to avoid paying a \$100 drilling permit application fee that went into effect on September 1. In July, 3,860 applications were processed.

The drilling application fee was approved by the Texas Legislature to provide funds for plugging abandoned wells and general enforcement of state pollution prevention laws involving oil and gas operators.

The August total included 10,301 applications for permits to drill new oil and gas tests, 132 applications to deepen existing holes, 502 applications to plugback existing holes, and 184 applications for service (non-producing) wells. Operators also filed 1,201 amended drilling applications.

The July total included 2,826 applications for permits to drill new oil and gas holes, 75 applications to deepen, 231 applications to plugback, 72 applications for service wells, and 656 amended applications.

Applications for new oil and gas holes in August included 2,541 in the San Antonio area; 151 in the Refugio area; 452 in Southeast Texas; 244 in South Texas; 271 in East Central Texas; 295 in West Central Texas; 440 in the San Angelo area; 704 in the Midland area; 531 in the Lubbock area; 2,316 in North Texas; and 529 in the Panhandle.
