Ellis Seeking Re-election As District Attorney

Steve Ellis, District Attorney of the 35th Judicial District of Texas, which includes Coleman, Brown and Mills Counties, has announced that he is a candidate for re-election. Ellis was elected as District Attorney in 1980 after having served as Assistant District Attorney in the 35th District since 1976.

"Although it's a tough job, I have done my best as District Attorney to serve the people of this area in the honest, fair, and efficient manner they deserve and expect. I will continue to do so if re-elected," Ellis

Ellis graduated from Baylor University in 1973 with a Bachelor of Arts Degree. He received his Juris Doctorate in 1976 and upon graduation from Baylor University School of Law, was appointed Assistant District Attorney, serving under Gary Price for several years.

"I have represented the State in the prosecution of hundreds of felony criminal cases and the record of our office is as good or better than any other District Attorney's office in this State. I am proud of the fact that even though we have tried numerous felony jury cases since my taking office, we have not lost a single trial in this District in the last three years. Over 95 percent of the defendants who have been indicted by Grand Juries have been convicted. At the same time, we strive to see that people are treated fairly. Our job is not to just get convictions, but to see that justice is done," Ellis said.

In addition, Ellis is a partner in the private practice of civil law with William W. Bell in the Brownwood firm of Bell and Ellis, Attorneys at Law.

Ellis is past president of the Brownwood Kiwanis Club, a member of the Brownwood Municipal Airport Board, and a member of First Baptist Church in Brownwood. He is married to Debby Ellis, also a lawyer, who is Vice President and Trust Officer at RepublicBank Brownwood. They have a daughter, Rebecca Elizabeth, aged two, and a son, John William, born December 2, 1983.

Cold Weather Grips Area

Cold weather that has set records throughout the south has had our community in its grip, causing much inconvenience and discomfort.

Almost two weeks of below-freezing temperatures kept the area in a "deep freeze" and caused yet-unknown damage to water pipes at many homes in the community.

The freezing weather moved into our community on the Saturday, December 17, and since that time the thermometer has moved to above the freezing mark only a few days at mid-afternoon, dropping back to the freezing mark during the evening.

Several homeowners reported zero degree readings one morning, with the temperature hovering at the 10 - 12 degree mark several days, then rising to only 20 or 25 degrees during the afternoons.

The freezing weather has caused many

homes to be without water, or limited the supply to one or two faucets, and often the drains have been frozen, further limiting water usage.

Broken water lines have created artesian wells in the streets all over town where the pipes have broken by the freeze. Damage from the freeze - and subsequent thawing is expected to plague city employees for days to come and may well disrupt water service while repairs are being made.

Area stockfarmers had extra work during the week, providing water for their stock. Thick ice had to be cut daily from

Very little moisture accompanied the cold spell, so roads were not dangerous in this area and traveling not hampered dur-

The ten consecutive days of freezing weather and extremely low temperatures set a record for this area.

Due to the numerous breaks in the water lines in Santa Anna and the priority of repairing the lines to keep the residents with water service, the regular sanitation routes may be delayed or changed. City employees will be taken off the routes to assist with the

water line repairs as needed. Residents are asked to be patient if the garbage truck does not come to their home on the scheduled day. However the routes will be operated as normally as possible, said City Secretary Pat Rutherford.

In order for homeowners to bage, trees etc., the City dump ground will be open daily with no charge for disposal of trash and refuse. The only regulation is that all trash MUST be placed in the open pit at the facility:

City officials regret the inconvenience, but will be working to get the city services restored as quickly as possible.

Sanitation Pickup Routes Scheduled to Begin in January

Routes and schedules for the City of Santa Anna Sanitation Department have been completed and are to be in effect the first week in January.

The town has been divided into five sections to be worked once each week. Garbage routes are to start at 8 a.m. each morning, and residents are requested to have their garbage at the curb or in the alley at that hour on the specified day. Garbage is to be in metal containers or heavy plastic bags in compliance with a

City Secretary Pat Ruterford said this week that the day for pickup is to be noted on individual water bills that will be mailed about January 1. Residents may notice the day of the week that the garbage route will come to their home if not otherwise

Divisions of the town are somewhat confusing, so a map showing the sections is included in this issue. Those having questions should contact City Hall for information.

Order Deadline is Near For County History Book

Deadline for ordering copies of the Coleman County history book is at hand, with the orders to be placed by December 31.

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Ralph Terry, Coleman County Historical Commission chairman, said this week that approximately 1,100 books have been ordered, and several hundred more are expected by the deadline.


The books of Coleman County history will be at least 1,000 pages, covering a general history of the county, a history of towns, clubs, churches and schools, and histories of Coleman County families.

The publication committee is com-

pleting the editing of the materials and will have it to the publisher in January. The actual publication of the book will take several months.

The books are being sold only in advance, with the prepaid cost being \$42 within the county and \$45 for those to be distributed by mail. Checks or money orders must accompany the orders, made to Coleman County Historical Commission, and addressed to Post Office Box 958, Coleman, Texas 76834.

Any additional books ordered after December 31 will cost approximately \$55 plus tax and handling.
