Candidates announce campaigns underway for election year 1984

The election year is upon us, and hopefuls for various offices locally and in the county are announcing their candidacies and beginning their campaigns.

Sheriff H. F. Fenton is seeking re-election to the office he now holds, as are County Attorney Joe D. LeMay, Tax-Assessor Collector Billie Baker, and Commissioners Jack

Strickland, precinct one, and Howard Stephenson, precinct three.

In the running against Stephenson in the precinct three Commissioner's race are Jerry Allen, Leon Griffin, and Vernon Slate.

In the race for Commissioner, precinct three, is O. V. (Cotton) Curry, opposing incumbent Strickland.

The period for filing to run for office on county, state, and federal offices is open through Friday, February 6.

On the state level, incumbents seeking re-election are Senator Grant Jones of the 24th District, State Representative Jim Parker of the 65th District, Judge Gordon Griffin of the 35th District, Judge Don

Lane of the 42nd District, and District Attorney Steve Ellis of the 35th District.

A number of the candidates are listed in the classified political column in this newspaper, and many will have statements for the public in the near future, as their campaigns develop.

Phone company hosts BBQ supper

A large crowd attended a free Bar-B-Q supper hosted by the Coleman County Telephone Company Saturday, January 28. The program, which was held in the Civic Center, featured a presentation by Danny Keller, director, entitled, "Changes in Telecommunications."

Keller presented a slide program and explained how local customers would be affected by changes in such areas as service and billing, and informed the group about access charges, which are fees assessed simply for use of the total phone system.

The Federal Communications Commission has postponed access charges until July of 1985, an action Keller attributes to a major

thrust to Congress made by rural communities like Santa Anna.

About 260 local residents were present for the program, which has also been presented in Trickham and Rockwood and will be given to residents of Mozelle, Valera, Lake Coleman, and Burkett at later dates.

Residents said they enjoyed the program, and were pleased to know the phone company considered their feelings and reactions to changes being made in the system.

Test scores sent home with students

All Santa Anna High School students will be given copies to take home Thursday of their scores on the Stanford Test, a standardized test of academic skills.

In addition to the results of the test, students will be given a letter to their parents which will explain those results. Principal Gerlad Brister has also urged parents to call him during school hours at 348-3136 if they have any questions concerning the test or the results brought home by students.

The Stanford test was taken locally November 29, 1983.

City election date set

About the letter to the editor in The Abilene Reporter-News from the man who said he is an alcoholic and wanted to print a written apology to the police for the trouble he had been to them: what courage!

The man, whose address was listed as a Medical Center, signed his name, and that would certainly convince readers he is coming to terms with his disease and trying to work through it. We all have problems, but we must surely feel a pang of emotion when someone facing such a terrible problem shows a real willingness to struggle against overwhelming odds.

My heart goes out to that man, and I am humbled by his courage.

About seniors in high school, who have just begun their final semester of public school: God bless them.

This is a special time for these young people. Some are aware and some are not, of what lies in store for

them. Some have decided on college, others will immediately enter the work force, and others are not sure what they want to do.

Right now, they are all probably excited about being the big seniors on campus, and being so close to graduation. They haven't yet felt that sting of realization that they really will miss their friends, and they will, believe it or not, miss some of their teachers. And, most of all, they will miss having the security of their mothers, who could always be depended upon in a pinch to iron a shirt or bake cupcakes, and their fathers, who knew just the right way to start their cars on cold mornings and who could provide just the right kind of slap on the back when the choice was to cry or to pick up and go on.

Mothers do not come to college dorms and iron shirts, and fathers do not come to college parking lots and start cold cars.

We are sending off a part of our community when we send our children off to college, and we are proud when young men and women take on responsible jobs in the community. It would seem important,

then, for us to let those young people know how much we care about them, how we wish good things for them, and how proud of them we are.

Those of us who feel this way should make a more concerted effort to verbalize our best wishes to graduating seniors, and those seniors should give some serious thought to how they will fit into the community they will be forming.

As a tribute to graduating seniors, this newspaper plans to print a special graduation issue in May, wherein we will wish those young people a bright start in the grown-up world. We hope everyone will become involved in that issue, and will express their feelings therein.

About the announcement made by Who's Who Among American High School Students: drugs and alcohol are on the list of "things to avoid" for the nation's high achieving teens.

The organization conducted a survey among students who are recognized as high achievers in their schools, and 80 per cent of those teens claimed they don't use drugs

because they have no desire to or don't think they need drugs. Sixty-nine percent of the group thought drugs are unhealthy and sixty-four percent are concerned about the impact of drug use on their futures.

Ninety percent said they never have tried cocaine, angel dust, hallucinogenic drugs, speed or barbituates. 32-34 per cent said they take an occasional sip of hard liquor but rarely drink to drunkenness. Twenty-two percent have never tasted hard liquor and twenty percent have never tried beer. And, perhaps most interesting, seventy-three percent of the achievers think teens are not as bad as adults think they are, and eighty-six percent feel teenagers deserve more recognition for the positive things they do.

I, for one, am with them.

And, about the American Heart Association, which celebrates Heart Month in February, of course: they are out to help improve your odds against heart attack.

The organization urges frequent

blood pressure checks, a healthy maintenance of weight (no comment), stop smoking (more on this at a later date - I can talk about this because it is not one of my own vices), exercise sensibly, and eat foods that are low in animal fats and cholesterol.

Most heart disease, says the Association, is preventable. This fact, if nothing else, should give us the needed push to take better care of ourselves, our hearts in particular. It is a matter of DECIDING to exercise, to eat responsibly, and to stop smoking. The problem seems to be in the deciding, and that is the most peculiar facet of all: that we have control of our own minds, and some of us still do not make them up to do what is best for us.

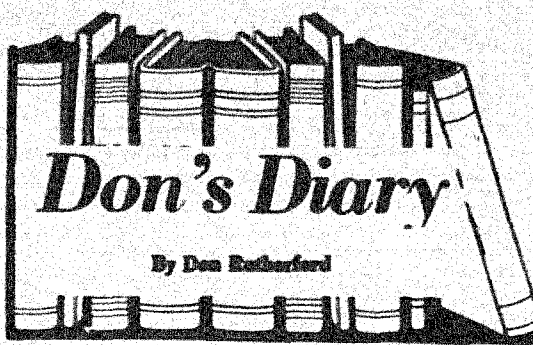

**Tax
packages
mailed**

If you haven't received
your tax package by now,
you probably won't receive
one this year, the Internal
Revenue Service says.

Tax packages are mailed
each year shortly after the
December holidays, and
are received by most tax-
payers during the first two
weeks in January or
earlier. Due to the postage
costs involved, tax
packages only receive
limited forwarding. Those
that cannot be delivered as
addressed are not forward-
ed outside of local carrier
routes, IRS explains.

Some taxpayers wait
well into February hoping
that their tax packages will
still arrive in the mail.
Although tax packages are
very helpful in filing
federal tax returns,
especially due to the com-
puterized peel-off address
labels and coded envelopes
they contain, these items
are not absolutely
necessary to file a return.
Taxpayers who do not
receive tax return forms in
the mail may obtain forms
from many libraries,
banks, post offices, IRS of-
fices, or by calling the IRS
at 742-2440 in Dallas.

AUSTIN—As income tax
time approaches many con-
sumers are considering start-
ing or adding to their In-
dividual Retirement Ac-
counts. (IRAs). You prob-
ably already know that you
are allowed to deduct from
your taxable income any
amounts you put into an
IRA — up to \$2,000 per
year for an individual and
\$4,000 for couples where
both husband and wife
work outside the home. (If
one spouse is not employed
outside the home, the max-
imum is \$2,250.)

There are several advan-
tages to setting up an IRA.
First, you will have money
set aside for retirement that
will not be taxed until you
withdraw it. You can start
drawing the money when
you reach 59 1/2 years old. Of
course, you can withdraw
the money earlier, in case of
an emergency, but you will
have to pay a ten percent
penalty to the federal
government.

IRA retirement funds
may be put into traditional
savings accounts, certifi-
cates of deposit, money
market funds, and mutual
stock funds, among others.

Because certificates of
deposit (CD's) are the most
popular vehicle for IRAs, I
will tell you about several
different kinds.

1. **Fixed-rate CD's:** These
are the more familiar kind
of certificate, offered by sav-
ings associations, banks
and credit unions. If your
bank or other financial in-
stitution is insured, which
most are, then your deposit
will be protected by that in-
surance. You will be assured

a specific rate of income
over a specific period of
time. Of course, the higher
interest rates are paid on
the longer term CD's. Be
sure to use the "effective
annual yield" when compar-
ing interest rates, because this
figure takes into account
how often interest is
compounded.

2. **Variable rate CD's:**
These certificates are also
insured along with your in-
stitution, but the interest
rate is not guaranteed. Fre-
quently the interest rate is
tied to some other money
indicator, such as the rate
paid on Treasury Bills. Rates
vary every week or
every month, depending on
your institution.

3. **Zero-coupon CD's:**
This new type of certificate
pays no interest until
maturity, but you can see
how much interest you will
receive by looking at the
"effective yield." These cer-
tificates are usually fairly
long term, so you may risk
being locked into a lower in-
terest rate than you could
get on another investment.

Remember, if you want to
make an IRA deposit for
1983 tax purposes, you
must do it by April 15 - or
if you get an extension on
filing your tax return, you
must make the deposit by
the time you file.

Alzheimer's meet slated

The next meeting of the
Support Group for
Alzheimer's Disease and
Related Disorders will be
held February 6, 1984, 7-9
p.m. at the West Texas
Rehabilitation Center, 4601
Hartford Street, Abilene,
Texas.

The general membership
will vote for officers of the
organization.

Several bills have been
introduced in Congress
recently to assist
Alzheimer's victims and
their families. The Bills
are:

H. R. 4272 - amends Title
IV of the Older Americans
Act to authorize the Com-
missioner of the Ad-
ministration on Aging to
give priority for student
grants to those who will
specialize in the skilled or

custodial care of Alzheimer
patients.

H. R. 4273 - designates a
new eligibility category for
hospital and/or nursing
home care for Alzheimer
victims who are also
veterans, and lowers the
age of eligibility of any
veteran suffering from
Alzheimer's Disease to 50.

H. R. 4274 - provides for a
tax deduction for expenses,
other than medical, related
to the home care of an
Alzheimer victim, in-
cluding home health ser-
vices, custodial and respite
care.

Police report busy week

A weapon recovered by the police in the investigations of several burglaries in Santa Anna, was identified last week according to Chief of Police Russ Ellis. He said that Jake McCreary of 1005 Ave. A reported the weapon stolen from a truck at his residence earlier this month. Mr. Ellis said the 12 gauge shotgun was turned over to him by a Santa Anna resident. Evidence in this and several other burglaries have been filed with Joe Dan LeMay, the

county attorney in Coleman.

Several reports of vandalism were reported over the weekend. An '81 Ford pickup, owned by Harbin supply had a window smashed while it was parked in the 600 block of Ave. D. Mike Hosch of 402 1st told Mr. Ellis he parked the truck Friday evening and a few hours later, discovered the damage.

Mr. Ellis said that late Saturday evening he discovered water running

from a public toilet at the armory grounds on Bannister. Vandals had broken the toilet tank.

Deputy Mike Bowers investigated similar vandalism at a Baptist Church on the Brady Highway Sunday. Vandals apparently struck Saturday night causing damage to the plumbing in the bathroom and other damage throughout the structure.

Chief Ellis said that he also assisted D.P.S. officers at the scene of an oilfield truck accident, in-

vestigated two prowler reports, one fight, and took several disorderly conduct complaints.

Mr. Ellis attended a one day training seminar yesterday in Huntsville, at the Criminal Justice Center. The seminar was on investigation techniques, and prevention of sexual exploitation of children. This is a growing problem for law enforcement officers even in small communities such as Santa Anna, according to Mr. Ellis.

Migraine headaches have been immortalized in television commercials showing an anguished face with lightning bolts radiating from a pounding head.

Unfortunately that picture often becomes reality for many people between ages 10 and 30, when migraines commonly begin, according to the Texas Medical Association.

First attacks rarely occur after age 40, and in some cases migraines will end when middle age begins. More women than men have them.

Despite extensive

research, no one knows exactly why certain people get this disorder or what triggers it, but some factors are commonly present. Migraines run in families in over half of the cases, suggesting a possible genetic connection.

In addition, attacks can result from foods and beverages such as cheese, chocolate, red wine, and coffee. The recurring headaches also can be related to menstruation, birth control pills, stress, the anticipation of relief following stress, or psychological problems. Then again, none of these may be involved.

Whatever these trigger-

ing factors are, they somehow affect the arteries leading to the brain. The arteries first become smaller and then swell, which disrupts blood flow.

Warning signs of an approaching migraine can include unusual tiredness, nausea, vomiting, diarrhea, and visual distortion in one eye. Bright lights may become intolerable.

These signs tend to disappear in several minutes or hours, when the throbbing headache arrives. It also can include bloodshot eyes,

a pale appearance, numbness or tingling in an arm or the side, dizziness, ring-

ing ears, and temporary mental confusion. When and how long these attacks occur varies, but they can be predicted based on past experience.

Quick action when warning signs appear can prevent a migraine. Splashing water on one's face, taking two aspirin, and lying down in a dark room for two or three hours can be effective. The person should relax, not worry about the migraine, and avoid reading.

Migraines cannot be cured, but a doctor can prescribe drugs for relief. In severe cases, the relaxation therapy called biofeedback is often used.

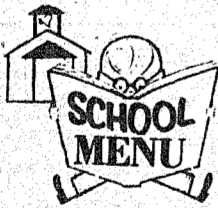
