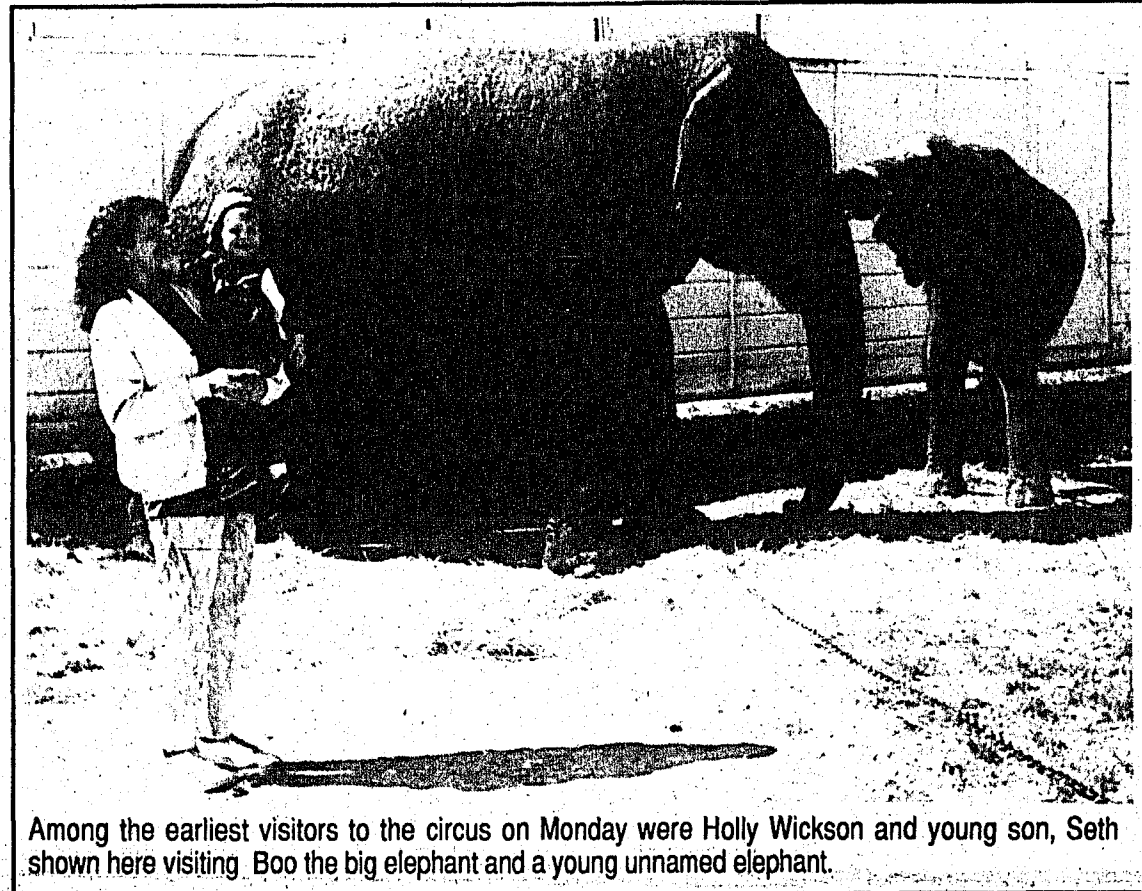

## Adopt-A-Highway Volunteers To Participate In "Great Texas Trash-Off"

Local Participants are Rockwood Community, Delta Omicron, Liberty Lanes Ranch, Jenson Family

On April 4, more than 20,000 Adopt-A-Highway volunteers will spend their Saturday picking up roadside litter during the seventh annual "Great Texas Trash-Off", the nation's largest cleanup effort, sponsored by the Texas Department of Transportation.

Local organizations participating are the Rockwood Community, Delta Omicron and Liberty Lanes Ranch and the Jenson Family.

Liberty Lanes Ranch has participated in the Trash-Off since it was first organized in 1987.

Thirty-three gallon garbage bags, provided by Coca-Cola, will be used by the volunteers to pick up an estimated 2.5 million gallons of trash. Additionally Coca-Cola will reward all Adopt-A-Highway participants with special coupon-saving booklets to Texas' restaurants and entertainment spots.

According to Tina White, Brownwood District Adopt-A-Highway Coordinator, when you drive around on the day of the Great Texas Trash-Off and see thousands of volunteers clean up after the lit-

ters, you can't help but get behind the program. Texans have tremendous pride in their state and they want to keep it beautiful. The groups involved participate in the Adopt-A-Highway program, developed and sponsored by the Texas Department of Transportation. Civic, community and business groups "adopt" two mile stretches of Texas highways and take responsibility for keeping them clean.

The Great Texas Trash-Off is part of TxDOT's aggressive "Don't Mess With Texas" program, which is credited with a 72 percent reduction in litter since 1985.

## Spring Turkey Hunting Season Opens Saturday

Saturday, April 4 begins the spring turkey hunting season. According to reports from Texas Parks and Wildlife, it's going to be a very, very good season. Texas turkeys had superb hatches the past two springs. So the woods are full of turkeys. And because last spring was a relatively poor season, thanks to unfavorable weather, among all those turkeys will be lots of gobblers, including a few big, bold, bossy long-beards. "We are seeing good sized groups all over. As far as birds are concerned, the numbers are there,

although there may not be quite as many mature adult gobblers in some areas," said Larry Holland, Texas Parks and Wildlife supervisory biologist for this region. "We are seeing this in particular in the western part of this district, in Coleman, Concho, Taylor, Runnels and Tom Green Counties, and I expect that about the same thing would apply in other areas." 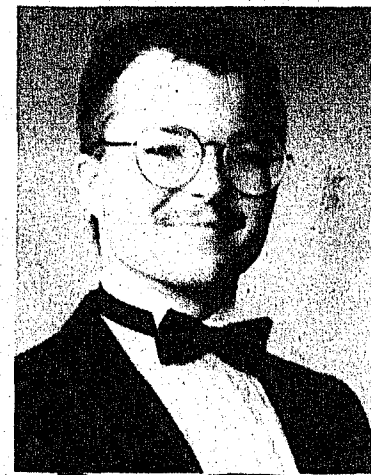
## "Spring Illusions of Style" Fashion Show April 4

Register for door prizes. There will be no sales taking place at the show.

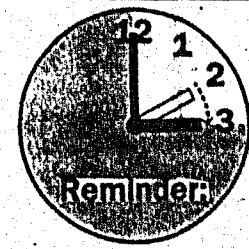


## Tommy Williford Receives ESA Award

## Thoughts From Our Pastors

**G. W. McFadden, Pastor Northside Baptist Church**

*A Dancing Foot and a Praying Knee*

In this article the portions within quotation marks, unless otherwise designated, are from an article Brother Ron Mitchell wrote a few years ago. His article was entitled "The Senior Prom".

Brother Mitchell wrote, "It is fast approaching the days of the senior prom and for that reason I want to make an appeal to our Christian young people...It is the dance portion that I wish to encourage you to give up for the sake of your Christian witness. What's wrong with dancing? Didn't people dance in the Bible?"

"First, people did dance in the Bible. God's people danced to celebrate war victories and to worship God. However, the dancing was never done with partners of the opposite sex; dancing was performed in the day time, in the open air, and spontaneously. The Bible reveals problems with Christians and dancing, too. Israel danced before the Lord in Exodus 15 and before the devil in Exodus 32. David danced before the Lord in just his undergarments in II Samuel 6:14-20, and his wife became jealous as she notes the other young maidens enjoying her husbands gyrations; the conflict was never resolved. David's motive was pure, as yours may be, but his testimony was misconstrued."

People of the Bible danced either religiously in praise to God or sensually before an idol and/or before someone of the opposite sex.

"Dancing is an expression of sexuality and its body language is spoken with shaking shoulders and breasts, and a gyrating pelvic area. Though modern dances have changed through various stages - waltz, jitter bug, twist, lindy-hop, disco, etc the purpose of it has not changed; and, in fact, sexual expression has become bolder."

Another stage called the lambada has developed since Brother Mitchell's article. This dance actually looks like two people trying to have sexual intercourse while standing upright on the dance floor.

"...There is no doubt that the dance is a sexually oriented activity. That's why no one wants to dance with their sister, brother or parents. Notice that men do not dance with men, unless they are somewhat perverted. Dance is an activity used to provide unholy pleasures..."

Paul warned Timothy to "Flee also youthful lusts." (II Timothy 2:22). To the Thessalonians Paul wrote, "Abstain from all appearance of evil." (I Thessalonians 5:22). He advised Timothy to see that "women adorn themselves in modest apparel." (I Timothy 2:9). If women are to wear modest clothing, they are also to act modestly. To the Romans (14:1-23) and to the Corinthians (I Cor. 8:1-13) Paul advised against doing things that are not wrong in themselves but may cause others to do wrong.

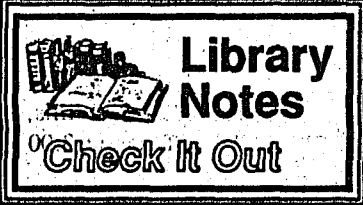
"Young people, a dancing foot and a praying knee do not grow on the same leg. I pray you will leave the prom before the dancing begins and take your date to a place or activity where you can take Jesus. Parents, I pray you will discourage your youth from going to any dance and will remember the scripture in Job 21:7-14, 'Wherefore do the wicked live, become old, yea are mighty in power?...They send forth their little ones like a flock and their children dance...They spend their days in wealth, and in a moment do down to the grave. Therefore they say unto God, depart from us; for we desire not the knowledge of Thy ways.'"

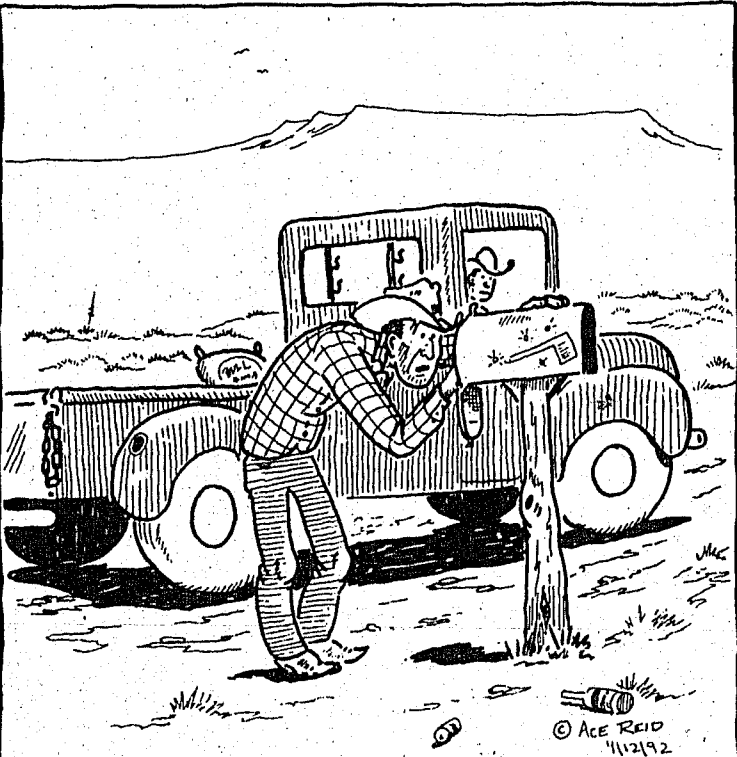

## Pond Management Seminar Scheduled

 With the recent rains many people are thinking about their tanks/ponds, for different reasons. Some are looking at the possibility of restocking and growing fish while others are experiencing a major problem with weeds in and around their pond. Both of these topics will be addressed at an upcoming pond management seminar. This seminar will be held on Friday, April 10 beginning at 11 a.m. at the Coleman City Park.  
 The program will begin with a session on weed control in and around a pond. Following this will be a complimentary fish fry meal paid for by the program sponsors which include Purina Mills, Coleman County Extension Ag Committee and the Central Colorado Soil and Water Conservation District.  
 The afternoon program will cover the topics of management and raising fish in our farm ponds. This should be an excellent program for anyone interested in the farm pond.  
 We also encourage anyone who is having a weed program in the pond to collect a sample of the weed and bring it with them that day to be identified and suggest control practices.  
 This meeting will be worth 2 CEU credits for any Private Applicators interested.  
 If you have any questions or if you plan on attending, please call the County Agent, Kerry Shropshire at 625-4519, so they can have enough fish for everyone.

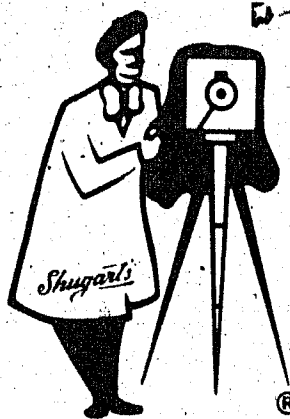

Republicans are still pushing for a federal probe, putting little faith in the Travis County courthouse officials controlled in part by liberal Democrats.

That failing, Republicans will almost certainly target Mauro when he is up for re-election in 1994, but it better be a stronger candidate than the GOP has served up in the past.

**Perot's Campaign Phones**  
Speaking of campaign phones, Texas billionaire H. Ross Perot said the toll-free numbers he set up to get signatures on his petition to run for president is taking 90,000 calls per hour.

Perot told CBS he has 100 open lines and will add more.

Seeking to add his name as a third candidate for president, an independent, Perot faces staggered deadlines in the various states, the first being May 11 in his home state Texas.

**Electronic Welfare Card**  
State government is preparing to test an electronic welfare benefits card — like a welfare credit card — this summer, which Comptroller John Sharp thinks will reduce fraud and save \$10 million annually.

Plans are to start a six-month test this summer for services ranging from food stamps to aid for dependent children.

Recipients will use a credit card at grocery stores; one good effect may be to stop the use of food stamps as currency for drugs and sex.

**National Guard Cuts**  
Proposed federal cuts to the national reserve force will trim \$43 million annually from the Texas National Guard as the Pentagon seeks to save \$20 billion over the next five years.

Capt. John Stafford, spokesman for the Texas National Guard in Austin, said individual guardsmen will not lose their jobs if they are willing to retrain.

**Ellis Now Lobbyist**  
State Sen. Rodney Ellis, D-Houston, has been hired by the Mexican government to lobby Congress for their interests in the North American Free Trade Agreement.

He ran the Washington, D.C. office of the late Congressman Mickey Leland before his own election to the state senate.

The proposed pact would dissolve trade restrictions between the U.S., Mexico and Canada.

**Other Highlights**  
■ Texas Lottery director Nora Linares promised the Hispanic Women in Leadership conference she will hire more minority workers than any other state agency, more than 20 percent.

■ Gov. Ann Richards killed a proposal to close the state school which is the largest employer in Mexia: "I cannot destroy a town," she said.

■ A grand jury declined to indict former Texas Department of Commerce director Bill Taylor on charges of fiscal wrongdoing used by Richards to sweep clean the appointments by her predecessor, Bill Clements.

■ Meanwhile, a second group of former agency employees, also hired under Clements, has filed a federal lawsuit against Richards, claiming they were fired because they were Republicans.

■ State Treasurer Kay Bailey Hutchison ended her agency's practice of cashing personal checks for state lawmakers. Traditionally, the agency warned the lawmakers of insufficient funds, allowing him/her time to cover them without a penalty.

■ Texas Libertarians say Ross Perot's presidential bid would hurt their party's top candidate, Andre Marrou, but would help down-ballot Libertarians because Perot's money will get out the vote.

■ Gov. Richards appointed two judges elected in the March 10 primary to fill temporary seats created by resignations. Susan Larson of El Paso was appointed to the 8th Court of Appeals; Bill Peek of Texarkana was appointed judge of the 202nd District Court in Bowie County.

### Santa Anna ISD To Be Testing For Scoliosis

The Legislature passed a law in 1985 that requires all 5th and 8th grade students to be screened for spinal deformities. Early detection of abnormal spinal curvature can prevent serious health problems. This is a problem that may begin during the early adolescent years (from 10-14 years of age), with an estimated 1 in 10 adolescents having some degree of abnormal curvature. Curves that are detected early may only require periodic observation by a specialist. Moderate curves may require the wearing of a brace, which is usually supervised by an orthopedic specialist. In most cases, the need for major surgery for this deformity can be eliminated through early detection.

Spinal screening for the Santa Anna ISD school children has been scheduled to begin on Thursday, April 2 and Wednesday April 22, 1992.

Children will be screened for two types of spinal deformities: Scoliosis and kyphosis. Scoliosis is a condition in which the spine is twisted, causing misalignment of the upper body or lower back. This condition can worsen and lead to much pain, as well as complications of the heart and lungs. Kyphosis is an exaggerated rounding of the spine. Progression of these two conditions can often be arrested if detected early.

**AUSTIN** - Capitol eyes last week focused on Land Commissioner Garry Mauro, criticized by the news media for using state phones as campaign manager for Democratic presidential front-runner Bill Clinton.

Speculation was rife on both sides of the political fence.

The Texas Republican Party called on federal authorities and the Travis County district attorney to investigate illegalities by Mauro and his staff on Clinton's behalf.

Meanwhile, Texas Democrats worried whether Clinton, who won the Texas primary last month, would keep or dump Mauro.

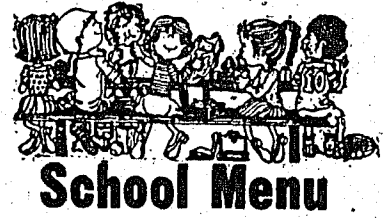
Mauro apologized, calling it "stupidity" on his part, and his office began cooperating with the Travis County probe.

But he squelched rumors of being dumped; Mauro hosted a Clinton fundraiser in Austin which raised about \$100,000.

The Texas dollars will pay for Clinton's media ads in this week's New York primary, where a big win could possibly sew up the nomination.

## WIC Program Can Serve More Than Half a Million Pregnant Women, Infants and Children

Each month, more than half a million pregnant women, babies and children younger than 5 now can benefit from the state's Special Supplemental Food Program for Women, Infants and Children (WIC). The program provides free, nutritious food, nutrition education and counseling, as well as general information and referrals to other health and social services.

Debra Stabeno, chief of the Texas Department of Health's (TDH) Bureau of WIC Nutrition, said, "The Texas WIC program has expanded in the past year because we have begun highly effective cost-containment measures and because the cost of WIC foods has not risen as quickly as projected. The savings allow us to serve more eligible participants."

Stabeno said that the combined factors have produced an over-all increase of nearly \$33.4 million dollars for the program.

"We have for years aggressively sought to extend services throughout the state. Just five years ago, we were only able to serve 182 of Texas' 254 counties—about 21.2 percent of the state's eligible

clients. With improvements in the program, we now serve all Texas counties, and can reach more than 33 percent of those who are eligible," Stabeno said.

Among the state WIC programs, only California now serves more clients than Texas.

By the year 2000, WIC expects to be able to serve at least 80 percent of eligible applicants anywhere in the state, Stabeno added. "To do that, we need to dispel some public misunderstanding about who is eligible for WIC. Many lower income pregnant women, their infants and children younger than 5 are eligible—if our nutritionists find they have nutritional need."

A large proportion of our clients learn about the program when they apply for other public assistance, such as AFDC, Food Stamps, and unemployment benefits, but other prospective clients may not realize that WIC may be available for them also," she explained.

Working families, college students and families of enlisted military personnel are among groups who may not know that WIC is an important resource. Stabeno said that WIC, now 18 years old, "has a responsibility to serve every eligible woman and child it can."

She said that even many working families, unable to stretch their resources, cannot afford nutritious foods. Others know little about choosing the best foods to ensure healthful diets for their babies and children. "WIC serves as a safety net for these people," she said, adding that, beginning in April, a family of four can have an annual income up to \$25,808, and still be eligible for the program.

Although the main benefits of WIC are better health for newborns and young children during critical periods of their growth, the program also saves state and federal dollars that otherwise might have to be spent on hospitalization and other health care for the very young.

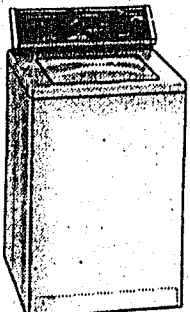

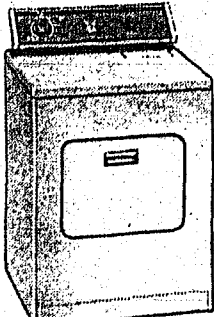
