

Spring Turkey Hunting Season Opens Saturday

Saturday, April 4 begins the spring turkey hunting season. According to reports from Texas Parks and Wildlife, its going to be a very, very good season. Texas turkeys had superb hatches the past two springs. So the woods are full of turkeys. And because last spring was a relatively poor season, thanks to unfavorable weather, among all those turkeys will be lots of gobblers, including a few big, bold, bossy long-beards. "We are seeing good sized groups all over. As far as birds are concerned, the numbers are there,

although there may not be quite as many mature adult gobblers in some areas," said Larry Holland, Texas Parks and Wildlife supervisory biologist for this region. "We are seeing this in particular in the western part of this district, in Coleman, Concho, Taylor, Runnels and Tom Green Counties, and I expect that about the same thing would apply in other areas." Thoughts From Our Pastors

G. W. McFadden, Pastor Northside Baptist Church

A Dancing Foot and a Praying Knee

In this article the portions within quotation marks, unless otherwise designated, are from an article Brother Ron Mitchell wrote a few years ago. His article was entitled "The Senior Prom".

Brother Mitchell wrote, "It is fast approaching the days of the senior prom and for that reason I want to make an appeal to our Christian young people...It is the dance portion that I wish to encourage you to give up for the sake of your Christian witness. What's wrong with dancing? Didn't people dance in the Bible?"

"First, people did dance in the Bible. God's people danced to celebrate war victories and to worship God. However, the dancing was never done with partners of the opposite sex; dancing was performed in the day time, in the open air, and spontaneously. The Bible reveals problems with Christians and dancing, too. Isreal danced before the Lord in Exodus 15 and before the devil in Exodus 32. David danced before the Lord in just his undergarments in II Samuel 6:14-20, and his wife became jealous as she notes the other young maidens enjoying her husbands gyrations; the conflict was never resolved. David's motive was pure, as yours may be, but his testimony was misconstrued."

People of the Bible danced either religiously in praise to God or sensually before an idol and/or before someone of the opposite sex.

"Dancing is an expression of sexuality and its body language is spoken with shaking shoulders and breasts, and a gyrating pelvic area. Though modern dances have changed through various stages - waltz, jitter bug, twist, lindy-hop, disco, etc the purpose of it has not changed; and, in fact, sexual expression has become bolder."

Another stage called the lambada has developed since Brother Mitchell's article. This dance actually looks like two people trying to have sexual intercourse while standing upright on the dance floor.

...There is no doubt that the dance is a sexually oriented activity. That's why no one wants to dance with their sister, brother or parents. Notice that men do not dance with men, unless they are somewhat perverted. Dance is an activity used to provide unholy pleasures...

Paul warned Timothy to "Flee also youthful lusts," (II Timothy 2:22). To the Thessalonians Paul wrote, "Abstain from all appearance of evil,"(I Thessalonians 5:22). He advised Timothy to see that "women adorn themselves in modest apparel," (I Timothy 2:9). If women are to wear modest clothing, they are also to act modestly. To the Romans (14:1-23) and to the Corinthians (I Cor. 8:1-13) Paul advised against doing things that are not wrong in themselves but may cause others to do wrong.

"Young people, a dancing foot and a praying knee do not grow on the same leg. I pray you will leave the prom before the dancing begins and take your date to a place or activity where you can take Jesus. Parents, I pray you will discourage your youth from going to any dance and will remember the scripture in Job 21:7-14, Wherefore do the wicked live, become old, yea are mighty in power?...They send forth their little ones like a flock and their children dance... They spend their days in wealth, and in a moment do down to the grave. Therefore they say unto God, depart from us; for we desire not the knowledge of Thy ways.



Some are looking at the possibility of restocking and growing fish while others are experiencing a major problem with weeds in and topics will be addressed at an up-This seminar will be held on Friday, April 10 beginning at 11 a.m. at the Coleman City Park.

The program will begin with a session on weed control in and around a pond. Following this will be a complimentary fish fry meal paid for by the program sponsors which include Purina Mills, Coleman County Extension Ag Committee and the Central Colorado Soil and Water Conservation District.

The afternoon program will cover the topics of management and raising fish in our farm ponds. This should be an excellent program for anyone interested in the farm pond.

We also encourage anyone who is having a weed program in the pond to collect a sample of the weed and bring it with them that day to be identified and suggest control prac-



Santa Anna ISD To Be Testing For **Scoliosis**

The Legislature passed a law in 1985 that requires all 5th and 8th grade students to be screened for spinal deformities. Early detection of abnormal spinal curvature can prevent serious health problems. This is a problem that may begin during the early adolescent years (from 10-14 years of age), with an estimated 1 in 10 adolescents having some degree of abnormal curvature. Curves that are detected early may only require periodic observation by a specialist. Moderate curves may require the wearing of a brace, which is usually supervised by an orthopedic specialist. In most cases, the need for major surgery for this deformity can be eliminated through early detection.

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Spinal screening for the Santa Anna ISD school children has been scheduled to begin on Thursday, April 2 and Wednesday April 22,

Children will be screened for two types of spinal deformities: Scoliosis and kyphosis. Scoliosis is a condition in which the spine is twisted, causing misalignment of the upper body or lower back. This condition can worsen and lead to much pain, as well as complications of the heart and lungs. Kyphosis is an exaggerated rounding of the spine. Progression of these two conditions can often be arrested if detected early.





Debra Stabeno, chief of the Texas Department of Health's (TDH) Bureau of WIC Nutrition, said, "The Texas WIC program has expanded in the past year because we have begun highly effective costcontainment measures and because the cost of WIC foods has not risen as quickly as projected. The savings allow us to serve more eligible

Stabeno said that the combined factors have produced an over-all increase of nearly \$33.4 million dollars for the program.

"We have for years aggressively sought to extend services throughout the state. Just five years ago, we were only able to serve 182 of Texas' 254 counties--about 21.2 percent of the state's eligible
