
All this just to say that we newspaper people are certainly not perfect. And it seemed a good way to lead into my next



The reason that many people are just now noticing fire ants is because of the amount of rain we have received during the last year. When you have this kind of rain, the fire ant mounds increase in size. This particular pest is one that homeowners and businesses would love to be rid of. Although we probably never eliminate the pest, there are various things you should know and several techniques used to control them.

Slaughter cattle in the Texas Panhandle opened Monday \$.50-1.00 higher, on active trade. Both steers and heifers reached the \$80.00 mark, continuing the upward trend we've seen over the last several months. Panhandle feedlots sold 21,000 head Monday, average price at \$79-80.00/cwt.

Texas slaughter lambs were steady to \$2.00/cwt higher last week in a good market. Shorn, 90-120 lb. lambs brought \$66-70.00/cwt, with wooled lambs at \$70-72.00/cwt.

The new guidelines for operating commercial vehicles may not affect Texas farmers and ranchers. The guidelines, which went into effect April 1, include a test that must be passed by those operating trucks weighing over 26,000 lbs. or more. Farmers and ranchers and members of their family, and their employees may be exempt from the regulations when hauling goods, equipment or products within 150 miles of their operation.

Disaster payments for crops destroyed by two years of record floods, drought and violent storms throughout the United States should be mailed out the middle of this month. Estimates of what farmers will receive range from 10 cents to 50 cents for every dollar lost. It's not much and may insure the demise of many Texas farmers. Should the government be responsible for making a farm profitable? There are no guarantees in farming.

The recent "Meat Out" vegetarian protest sponsored by the Farm Animal Reform Movement got a less than enthusiastic response from Americans. The "Meat Out" is patterned after the annual "Smoke Out" protest against cigarettes, and is supposed to convince the public to forego meat for a day. It received little publicity, and by the time I heard about it I had to hurry to eat an extra piece of steak.









"Remember, every pentry of interest you pay on your mortgage can be deducted when you file your tax return " he said.

He also noted that mortgage interest on a second home is often deductible, too, and that the interest paid on home equity loans can be deducted.

"If you're buying or selling a residence, don't forget that you can deduct the 'points' you pay, which are considered mortgage interest by the IRS, " the senator said.

Gramm also pointed out that homeowners aged 55 or older can take advantage of a one-time chance to exclude as much as \$125,000 in

Going Into Business: Start-up Costs May Be Deductible

Getting ready to go into business can be expensive, but some of those start-up costs may be deductible.

All the costs you have to get your business started are usually treated as capital expenses and become part of the basis of the business. But you may elect to amortize, or write off, certain qualifying expenses over 60 months or more.

Amortizable costs include business start-up costs, and certain organizational costs for a partnership or corporation. The costs must also meet the following tests:

1. They would be deductible if paid or incurred to expand an existing trade or business, and

2. You must pay or incur them before you begin business operations.

Start-up costs may include such expenses as a survey of potential markets; advertisements for the opening of business; salaries or wages of employees in training; costs for contacting suppliers, distributors or customers; and fees for professional

Generally, these qualifying expenses are deductible in equal amounts over a period of not less than 60 months. Make the election to amortize start-up costs on Form 4562, "Depreciation and Amortization." File Form 4562 with your return for the year you start doing business.
