Permenter Resigns, John Smith Elevated To Athletic Director

The Santa Anna I.S.D. Board of Trustees met in regular session on Tuesday of last week. The newly elected board members, Marty Donham, Roy Joe Harvey and Edwin Hipsher, were sworn in and the board reorganized for the new year. Marty Donham was elected president, Roy Joe Harvey, V.P. and Roddy Dean will serve as secretary.

The board recognized exceptional achievement in track and tennis, with students who had competed in regional competition present at the meeting to receive compliments of the board.

John Smith, an assistant coach for the past two years was elevated to the position of Head Coach and Athletic Director. Coach Mike Permenter, who had held that job, had submitted his resignation at a board meeting the previous week.

Superintendent Jim McPherson made a statement to this reporter that Coach John Smith is well known and well respected in coaching circles and the board saw no reason to look elsewhere for a replacement when Permenter decided to make a change. "Smith is a coach who will not allow the classroom to suffer in support of athletics," he said. "The students are al-

ready well acquainted with him and respect him."

Mike Permenter tells this reporter that he plans to enter the business world. He will be opening a consignment sports store in Brownwood where he will also sell customized golf clubs and will repair golf clubs.

In other action the board approved a calendar for the coming school year which will be published in this paper at a later date and they considered an additional school vehicle.

In other matters of personnel, the board, upon recommendation from Mr. McPherson, unanimously agreed to extend two year contracts and salary increases to principals Frank Gray and Dean Bass and to school business manager, Judy Hartman.

McPherson who had been hired recently with a 15 month contract had his contract extended to three years in a unanimous vote by the board.

The school board has met several times for policy workshops and will continue working to bring the present policy up to date according to State law.

Landfill Will Be Open To Public Tuesdays & Thursdays

A message from City Hall advises citizens that the City landfill will be open to the public on Tuesdays and Thursdays of each week from 9:00 a.m. to 4:45 p.m.

It has become necessary for an attendant to be on duty to regulate where and what is dumped at the landfill in order for the facility to remain in compliance with State laws. Because the attendant has other duties within the city crew, it is not possible for him to be at the landfill every day. City officials regret any inconvenience this may cause citizens but deemed it to be a

necessary change. You are again reminded that tires, batteries, and motor oil are among those items that can not be accepted at the landfill. Please check with City Hall if you have questions about other items.

Citizens may dump trash at the landfill if they can show a current water bill or a special permit which can be obtained at City Hall. There have been instances of people dumping trash on the road to the landfill when the facility is found closed. You are reminded that such violators will be prosecuted.

Mayor Brock called the regular monthly meeting of the Santa Anna City Council to order on Tuesday evening of last week with all council members present.

In trying to think of some way to observe Memorial Day, long known as Decoration Day, I ran across the following written by Senator Phil Gramm about marking the day that has been observed since 1868. Memorial Day 1992 marks the 125th official commemoration

Senator Gramm says: "A country that forgets the heroes who have given their lives to preserve its life will itself be forgotten," quoting an ancient philosopher.

Memorial Day, he said, "is a time to pause and commemorate the gallantry of those thousands of American heroes who have fought and died to preserve our liberty."

"As Americans we have much to be thankful for on this Memorial Day, but nothing more than the fact that ours is a nation worth protecting," the senator said.

Memorial Day was born in the wake of the Civil War as a reunited nation sought to honor the sacrifices of soldiers from both the Union and the Confederacy.

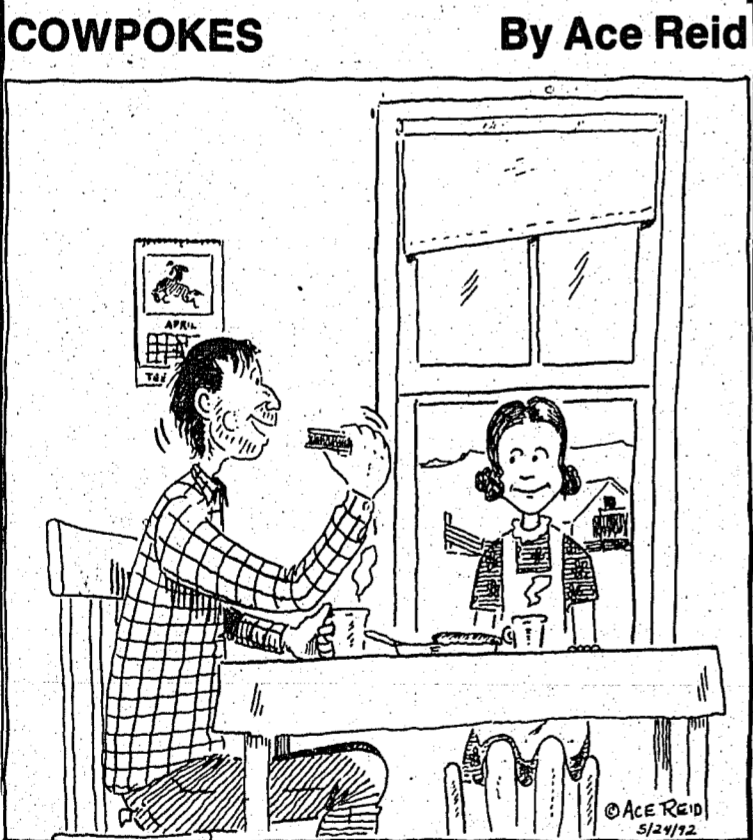

Washing Away Sins

Question: Please explain Acts 22:16, "Arise, and be baptized, and wash away thy sins, calling on the name of the Lord."

Answer: This verse does not teach that the washing away of Paul's sins was to be accomplished through his being baptized. He is commanded to do three things: (1) arise, (2) be baptized, and (3) have his sins washed away. The verbs are all aorist imperatives. They are followed by the participle "calling" which may modify all three verbs, meaning that Paul called on the name of the Lord simultaneously with his rising, being baptized, and having his sins washed away. This doesn't yield good sense, however, and therefore it seems best to take the participial phrase as instrumental in usage.

Other examples of this use may be seen in Acts 16:16; Matthew 6:27; 1 Timothy 1:12. The text would then read, "Rise up, be baptized, and wash away your sins, by calling on the name of the Lord." It is the "calling on His name," not the rising up or the being baptized that brings forgiveness.

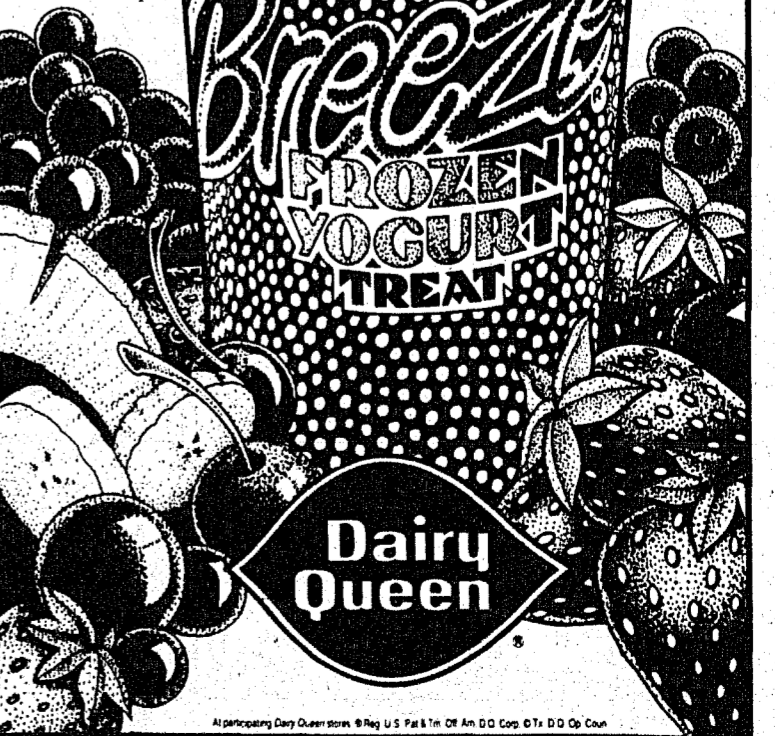

Ag — Roundup

By Bruce Kingsbery

Grain harvesting has started in Coleman County with quite a few oat fields already cut. The wheat should start turning within the next week or so and by ready to combine by the first of June. If we don't have a bad hailstorm between now and then, we should see a good yield.

A week or two ago, I mentioned in this column that the Texas Water Commission had changed the designation of the Edwards Aquifer from an aquifer to an underground river, thus putting it under TWC regulations. Last week John W. Jones, Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association President and Brady ranchman, issued a statement on behalf of the Association. Following the TWC decision, the TSCRA asked a Travis County state judge to reverse the ruling citing the loss of private property rights taken without due process or compensation.

Jones said, "We believe the Texas Water Commission is guilty of excessive force. Agency officials and staff have ordered us to not believe

what our eyes see (an aquifer), but what they tell us (an underground river). A stroke of a pen overturning 150 years of water law is an inexcusable act of bureaucratic impudence and impertience. No one

in this state can rest easy until this seizure of private property without due process or compensation by state regulators is reversed." Jones said that the cattleman's group is unmoved by threats from state officials that they had not acted, "the

federal boogeyman would hammer us into submission." He was referring to a federal lawsuit in Midland that asks that US Fish and Wildlife Service to take over the Edwards Aquifer to protect certain endangered species in Comal Springs in Hays County.

"We don't believe it is the place of the state or federal government to regulate ground water in Texas," Jones said. "If the landowners and the Texas legislature determine that regulation is needed, the local underground water conservation districts may be created."

Surface owners in Texas can pump ground water under the state's "rule of capture" law, a part of Texas case law supported by the courts and the Legislature for decades. This infringement on your rights by Austin regulators is a dangerous step by urban officials against rural landowners. Governor Richards showed little regard for West Texans and private property rights by not speaking out against the TWC's decision.
