flowing breast;

A tree that looks at God all

Santa Anna Woman Among Area's First To Win Big Money In State Lottery

Cleta Bowen of Santa Anna, who works as a restaurant cook in Brownwood, was one of the area's first big money winners in the Texas Lottery. Cleta is reported to have purchased her \$1,000 winning ticket at a convenience store in Brownwood at about 6:30 a.m. while on her way to work on Friday, the first day for sale of the tickets. When asked how she planned to spend her winnings, Cleta responded that she would probably take a vacation trip to Oklahoma.

Checking with Sherry French, manager of Allsup's in Santa Anna, a couple of \$50 winners have been

redeemed at the local store. Ms. French says that other than those two, there have been a number of winners turning in tickets of amounts from \$2 to \$20. She said they sold about 1,500 tickets the first day but it has tapered off to about 700 per day since.

Eddie Hartman at H&H Food Mart, the only other business in Santa Anna where lottery tickets are available, reported that well over a 1,000 tickets were sold there on Friday with subsequent sales dropping to about 500 per day. He told us there had been about 120 winning tickets turned in there, all within the \$2 to \$20 range.

Coleman County Medical Center Operation Being Studied In Order To Increase Efficiency

Following action of Holiday Hill directors in late April to take over operation of the hospital on an interim basis, an interim board has been named and an interim Administrator employed. This group with assistance from Shannon Medical Center and the Texas Hospital Association is analyzing the current operation and developing plans to increase hospital efficiency and cash flow.

The interim period of operation also provided time to allow for a tax district election to be called, and at the same time kept the facility open.

Shannon Medical Center representatives had earlier offered assistance and this support is currently in progress. Medical records specialists and business office personnel from Shannon have been here and have submitted their report on findings and recommendations. Two local employees, Kathy Turner and Tandra Mills, spent time at Shannon, receiving

instruction. They brought back video training film which is currently being used. In-service representatives from Shannon are here this week. Last week the Director of Laboratory Services for Shannon was here, working with Ted Boatright and Bill Mann. His report and recommendations will be received this week.

Marvin Cole with the Texas Hospital Association has been here several times and has made important recommendations for the future operation of the medical facility. When advised that some people had suggested that just an emergency room be operated here, he advised that "you can't afford it, as it is the most expensive part of a medical center operation".

Concerning the emergency room operation at Coleman County Medical Center, the interim board has worked out an arrangement with Dr. Orhan Oral and Rod McKenzie, P.A., on emergency room staffing, to run through June 30 which will

save the medical center about \$12,000 during the period.

Currently the operation of the medical center cafeteria is being analyzed, and that report and recommendations will be received soon.

Shannon is working to secure more resident doctors for Coleman. As expressed earlier, their intention is to locate three medical doctors in the clinic building acquired from Dr. Donald Pope, located on south Concho Street. They hope to have one doctor here very soon.

Involved with the tax district election coming up, Holiday Hill has named a tax district board of directors who would serve until director elections are held next year. These members are Bruce Pittard, Danny Keller, Virginia Jamison, Clyde D. Allen, Janet Johnson, Don Rhone and James Barr.

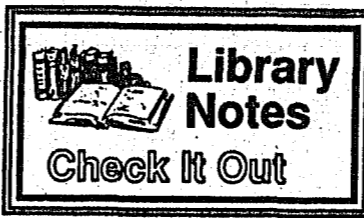

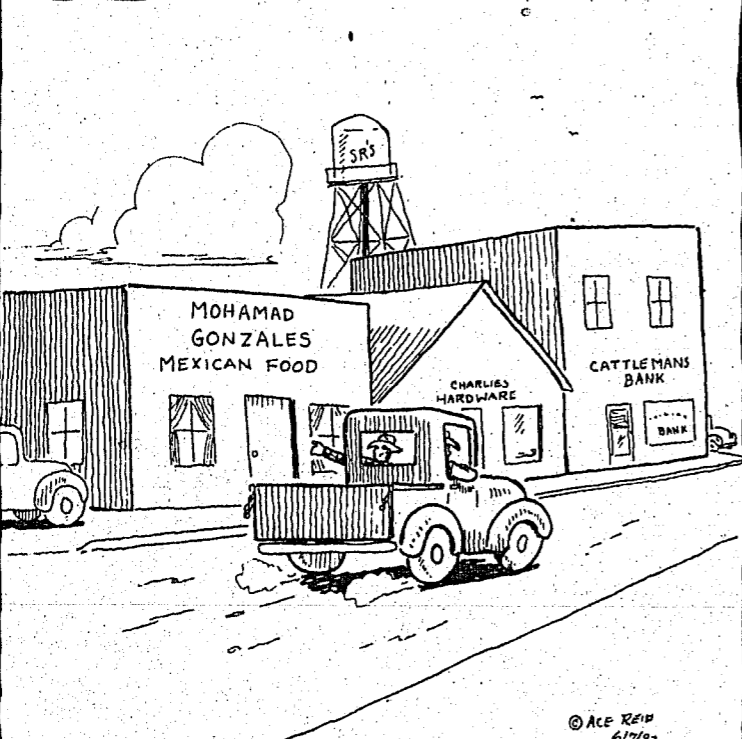

Fed cattle prices slipped again last week. In active trading Monday, steers and heifers brought \$73.-73.50/cwt on 20,000 head confirmed sold. Feeder cattle showed a fair improvement Monday at San Antonio, up two to three dollars.

Slaughter lambs and ewes were up one to three dollars at Goldthwaite Friday, and in Midwest trading Monday.

Good rains in the area over the last two weeks have helped keep hay grazer growing well. Wheat producers are not as happy with the moisture though. Wheat is ready to cut in many parts of the county, but the fields are too wet to get into and without several days of sunshine, we may see some wheat seed sprout, ruining the crop. When we do finish combining, the price should be fair, wheat has been trading in the \$3.20/bu range lately, but could change rapidly as total U.S. harvest is confirmed.

The screwworm outbreak in Mexico has moved north rapidly over the last few years. Another live sample was confirmed last week in the Aldama area of Tamaulipas State, about 180 miles south of the Texas border. That represents penetration of more than 1000 miles into an area only recently considered clean. Both the U.S. and Mexican governments have reacted slowly to this threat that could cost livestock producers dearly if not contained quickly.

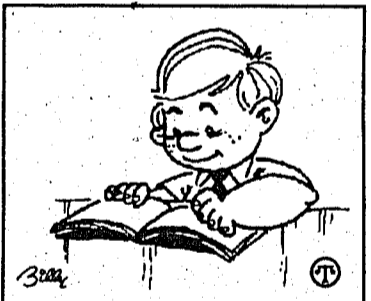

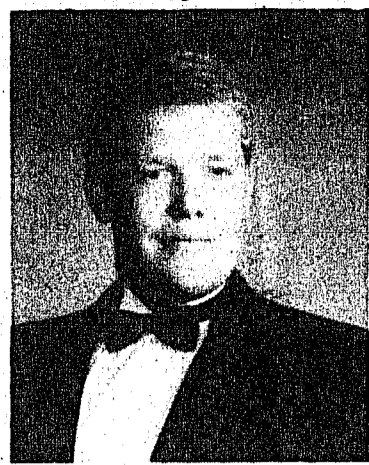

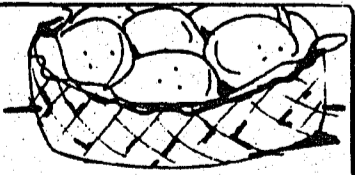

AUSTIN — Texas Railroad Commissioner Lena Guerrero, along with Texas oil and gas producers, vented anger against Congress for voting last week to restrict the TRC's role in regulating that industry.

The new law passed by predominantly non-oil state lawmakers to protect cheap natural gas prices "would create chaos in the natural gas system," Guerrero said.

It created some confusion about Guerrero, who days earlier scorned rumors she was siding with a "Bubba cartel" to fix higher gas prices.

Her remarks seemed to put Guerrero, who has postured as the consumers' commissioner, out front favoring higher prices to benefit the state's gas industry.

Perot on More Ballots

Texas Secretary of State John Hannah said Dallas billionaire Ross Perot had more than enough valid petition signatures and would be on the Texas presidential ballot.

Perot also qualified for the Florida ballot last week, but riled gay and lesbian groups nationwide with his vow to exclude them from top jobs in his administration.

Perot also included "adulterers" in the types of people he would avoid hiring, if he knew about their activity.

Lane Denton Indicted

Former Waco lawmaker Lane Denton, whose Austin-based telemarketing firm has been under investigation for more than a year, was indicted by a Travis County grand jury on two felony charges.

The indictment alleged that Denton misappropriated more than \$67,000 in 1988 and 1989 while he was executive director of the Texas Department of Public Safety Officers Association, a statewide troopers' group.

Denton was charged with theft and misapplication of fiduciary property. Each count carries up to two years in prison and a \$10,000 fine.

Denton, 50, a longtime Democratic Party figure, whose wife is state Rep. Betty Denton, denied wrongdoing and predicted he will be cleared.

Bullock Wants Mail-Order Tax

U.S. Gov. Bob Bullock urged Congress to pass a new law allowing states to tax in-state mail order sales by out-of-state companies.

The U.S. Supreme Court said states could pass laws to force such taxes, now voluntary, if Congress permits.

Comptroller John Sharp, who also wants the new tax, said such a tax could raise \$150 million for Texas government.

Runoff Election Voided

State District Judge John Delaney voided the result of a runoff election and ordered a new one for the new congressional seat created for Hispanics.

State Sen. Gene Green, D-Houston, who narrowly defeated former state representative Ben Reyes, said he will appeal Delaney's ruling.

Reyes had sued for a new election on the grounds that several illegal crossover votes for Green provided the basis for his narrow margin of victory.

Mattox And Crazy Horse

Former Texas Attorney General Jim Mattox, now in private practice, is defending the new Crazy Horse malt liquor against irate American Indian groups.

Their leaders claim the New York-based brew, which will reach Texas stores this month, evokes racism and debases one of their great leaders.

Mattox contends the label is protected as commercial free speech.

Lewis Eyes Comp Rates

Lame duck Texas House Speaker Gib Lewis asked a Senate committee to investigate why workers' compensation insurance companies are raising rates if their losses are going down.

An industry spokesman said insurance officials are not confident the trend will hold, and they have years of over-regulation to make up.

The time is here for landowners to start controlling mesquite. Every year we have to wait for all the conditions to get right before we can start treating our ever present brush problem.

Those conditions depend on days from bud break, leaf color and more importantly the soil temperature. Research has shown that the most important consideration the soil temperature. We have been that you **Must** have a minimum soil temperature of 75 degrees. If you don't have this, don't treat mesquites, it's that simple.

Many failures we see in treating mesquites and other brush species is due to using the wrong chemical or treating when weather or soil conditions are not optimal. There are many different ways to treat mesquite. These two major categories are broadcast and individual plant treatment. Some of the products labeled and used for mesquite control include: diesel fuel, kerosene, Grazon ET, Banvel, Reclaim, Grazon PC, and mixes of the products listed above chemicals.

As you can see, your options are great in selecting a mesquite control

so make sure you know what you are doing before you spend your money and lose it.

If you have any questions on when or how to control mesquite or other brush species, you can contact Kerry Shropshire, County Extension Agent at the County Courthouse, 625-4519.

Despite strong opposition from rural Texans and anti-nuclear groups, the Texas Low-Level Radioactive Waste Disposal Authority voted 4-1 to build a waste dump on a 16,000 acre ranch near Sierra Blanca, about 90 miles southeast of El Paso.

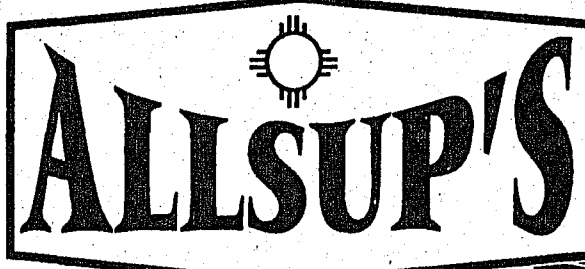

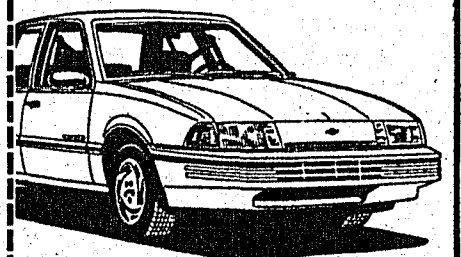
