improvements or changes they would like to see initiated and also asked them to offer a proposal for helping to solve any problems they see the district facing. They

were invited to tell us of their families, education, occupation, experience, etc., and to make us aware of their community involvement. The following are their statements.



Edwin Hipsher

Jan and I are both graduate of SAHS and are members of the First Baptist Church. We both work for the Postal Service, as Jan is Postmaster of Talpa and I work as a clerk in the Bangs Post Office. Coleman County Community Hospital In Crisis, But Open

EDITOR'S NOTE: We tried all day Monday and again on Tuesday to get some first hand information from officials at the hospital but were told no one was available to talk to us. We offer you this reprint from Monday's edition of the Abilene Reporter News.

COLEMAN — Coleman Hospital was open Monday with three patients, but its viability remained uncertain as hospital officials met behind closed doors to search for a way to keep the facility open despite its financial woes.

Beverly Simpson, administrative secretary, said hospital officials have been studying several alternative means for running the facility since its management company, Life Med Inc. announced Friday that it would close the hospital Saturday. Local business leaders managed Friday to persuade Life Med President Gene Hisey to keep the hospital open a few more days and negotiations are under way for the Coleman Development Company to assume the lease and turn control over to a hospital board with representatives from each community in the county.

Bob Turner, executive director of the development company, said Hisey has been fairly cooperative in the efforts to wade through the myriad of accounts payable and receivable that complicate the transfer and a deal may be closed — or called off — by the end of the week.

"There are a number of reasons for him (Hisey) to be extremely cooperative in making this deal work," Turner said.

He also said he has been as-

sured by officials of the Health Facilities Licensure and Certification Division that a new entity can assume control of the hospital without it losing its permits or Medicare certification, which would plunge the facility into almost certain financial ruin.

The hospital closed temporarily before Life Med took over in July, and nearly six months passed before it could be recertified and begin receiving reimbursements from Medicare. The losses incurred during that period from treating Medicare patients gratis and the inaccurate assumption that the hospital could charge Medicare retroactively is largely responsible for the present crisis, Turner said.

If the deal works out, the future of the hospital looks good, given that San Angelo's Shannon Medical Center has plans to open a clinic in Coleman to be staffed by two doctors.

Accounts have been set up at all three banks in the county to take donations to help the hospital meet payments during the transition and suppliers have indicated they would be flexible once Hisey is out of the picture, Turner said. The key, he said, will be to regain the community's trust and confidence.

"I think a lot of people are finally convinced that we very nearly don't have a hospital... and now they're ready to work with and support the hospital," he said. "I believe a county with 10,000 people can support a hospital. If we don't keep it open, we're in deep trouble."

From City Council Minutes

Mayor Gale Brock called the City Council meeting to order at 6:33 p.m. with councilmen Danny Kellar, Emmitt Simmons, Tom Hays, Karen Morris and Jim Spillman present. Others present were Scott Patterson, Rev. Waide Messer, Rev. Don Elrod, Polly and Derriel Warnock and Alys Pelton.

Derriel gave the invocation. Minutes were read and approved.

Scott Patterson representing the City to consider checking into getting a second pumper truck. The fire department has agreed that a used pumper would be more obtainable than a new one that cost \$80,000 to \$90,000. The fire department will donate \$4,000 towards purchasing the truck and the ladies auxiliary will donate \$1,000 and any profits from Funtier Days. A used pumper truck would probably cost anywhere from \$30,000 to \$40,000. The fire department would like to have three of its fireman to help in locating a pumper.

Mayor Brock appointed three councilmen to serve on a committee to look into this purchase. Councilpersons appointed were Emmitt Simmons, chairman, Danny Kellar and Karen Morris.

The Ministerial Alliance represented by Revs. Don Elrod and Waide Messer asked for the City's permission to meet in front of City Hall at May 7, 1992 from 12:20 to 12:40 for prayer for a Moral Rebirth of America. Councilman Jim Spillman made the motion to give the alliance permission. Councilman Emmitt Simmons seconded with the motion carrying.

The project of enlarging the police department offices and installing restrooms has been postponed until Carlos and Derriel have time to check into it further. No action has been taken due to the busy schedule of both. The police department uniform allowance was discussed and councilman Danny Kellar asks that the City check with

This season following Easter would be a good time to start *Dear and Glorious Physician* by Taylor Caldwell. This is fiction but, so well written that Luke of the bible truly lives. Taylor Caldwell also wrote *The Great Lion of God*. This is the story of Saul of Taurus, Paul and his travels to spread the story of Christ. *The Silver Chalice* by Thomas B. Thoughts From Our Pastors

HE-LOOK SO NATURAL

A chaplain friend of mine used to tell about experiences he had with people who had experienced a death in the family. Frequently, while standing next to an open casket, viewing a corpse, some one would say, "O, doesn't he look natural?" or "She really looks natural, doesn't she?"

This chaplain said each time he heard this, or similar statements, the same thought came to him. "Yes, they look natural, because in their natural state, they were DEAD in sin." Of course, he never said that, he was far too polite to do so.

Another statement sometimes heard is, "Well, ole Joe (or Josephine) has gone to his or her 'just rewards.'" This statement, as well as the other leaves too much unsaid.

We tend to forget, that without a rebirth, without a conversion, without the claiming of the blood of Jesus Christ for salvation, people are dead in trespasses and sin. They may be still walking around, but they are DEAD. Only an acceptance of Jesus Christ as personal Lord and Saviour can produce life. And, if one has never made that decision to trust Christ, we had best not talk about their going to any "just rewards", they are going into eternal punishment. And eternity is a long time.

In our society we place far too much emphasis on a corpse, and far too little on "dead people" still walking around. The Bible makes it very clear that without the life in Christ Jesus, we are nothing more than dust and ashes (Gen. 18:27) and that in death we return to dust. (Gen. 3:19)

Why then, do we spend so much time, effort, and money on dust and ashes, shaped like a human body lying in a casket? A decent funeral and burial are commendable to be sure, but that can be accomplished without opening the casket for every one in parade around and gaze at the dust and ashes. If we, as Christians truly believe that the personality, the mind, the soul, the spirit has already gone to be with the Lord (and Paul makes it clear that Christian absent from the body are present with the Lord) then why all the emphasis on dust and ashes in the casket? And why not more concern for the walking dead while there is still an opportunity for them to receive Christ as Savior and Lord if we would just be more faithful to share the Good News.

Sometime ago, in a different community, I attended a funeral that was conducted by three (3) ministers. Each with a full length message. No doubt it was felt that this honored the deceased, but in fact it did just the opposite. (It was a hot summer day and service lasted over two hours).

I encourage you to rethink how our society handles the death of a Christian person. Let us give some roses and smell some roses while there is still life around. Be thoughtful and respectfully enough to request the current minister to officiate rather than asking a former minister (though beloved he may be) to travel several hundred miles go to extra expense and consume a lot of time unnecessarily.

Let us HONOR life in Christ and the hope we have in HIS and OUR resurrection, and let us do so continually. Let us HONOR Christ himself by sharing His saving message of love and forgiveness with those walking dead we meet every day. Let us remember that ashes are ashes, dust is dust and flesh is flesh, but it is the Spirit that gives life. Let us show the world that it need not remain, "looking so natural" for we are naturally dead. All can be made alive in Christ Jesus.

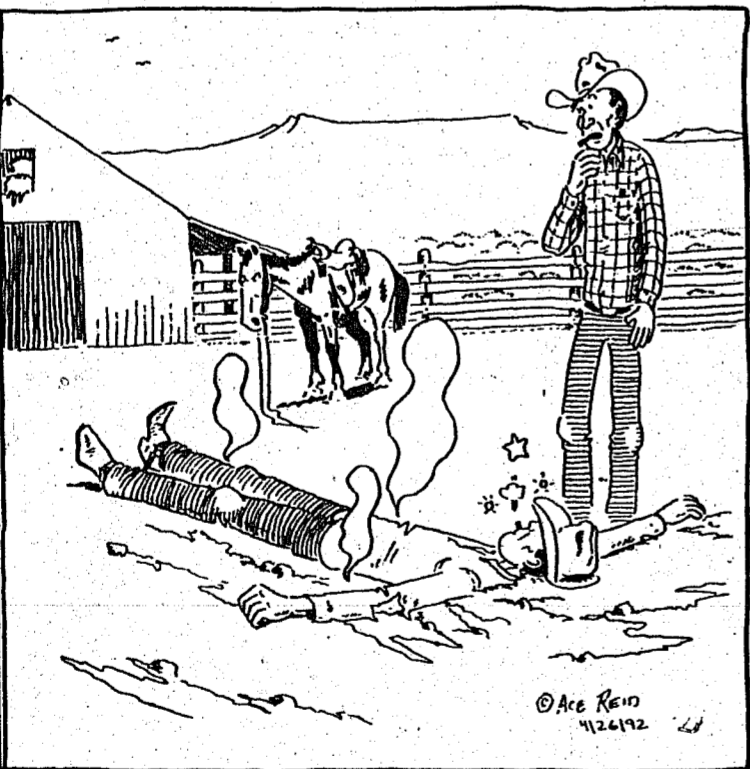

Ag - Roundup

Trade was at a near standstill in Panhandle feedlot trading Monday. Only 300 head were reported sold. Average price was \$77.00/cwt, off \$1.150/cwt. from a week ago. Midwest slaughter lambs brought \$68-69.50/cwt. in direct trade Monday.

Wheat futures traded up Monday, \$.02-.05/bu. of wheat. Hopefully is a continuing upward trend. Wheat prices have dropped steadily the past several weeks as harvest nears.

The state agency charged with overseeing Texas' water supply has stepped on private property rights again. Last week under the guise of saving us from the horror of federal control, the Texas Water Commission classified the Edwards Aquifer as an underground river, making it subject to state regulations.

The Edward Aquifer is one of South Texas' major sources of underground water. Coleman County is not directly affected by rulings made in regard to the Aquifer, but the decision, if upheld by the courts, will set a dangerous precedent on the rights of property owners, both rural and urban. The "rule of capture" that allows surface owners to capture underground water has been a part of Texas case law which has been supported by the courts and the Legislature for decades.

The Texas Water Commission, without the direction or approval of our elected officials, assumed the power to create the law saying that the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service would put the aquifer under federal regulation. However, a brief filed by the U. S. Justice Department in a pending endangered species lawsuit states that the Fish and Wildlife Service has no authority to regulate underground water.

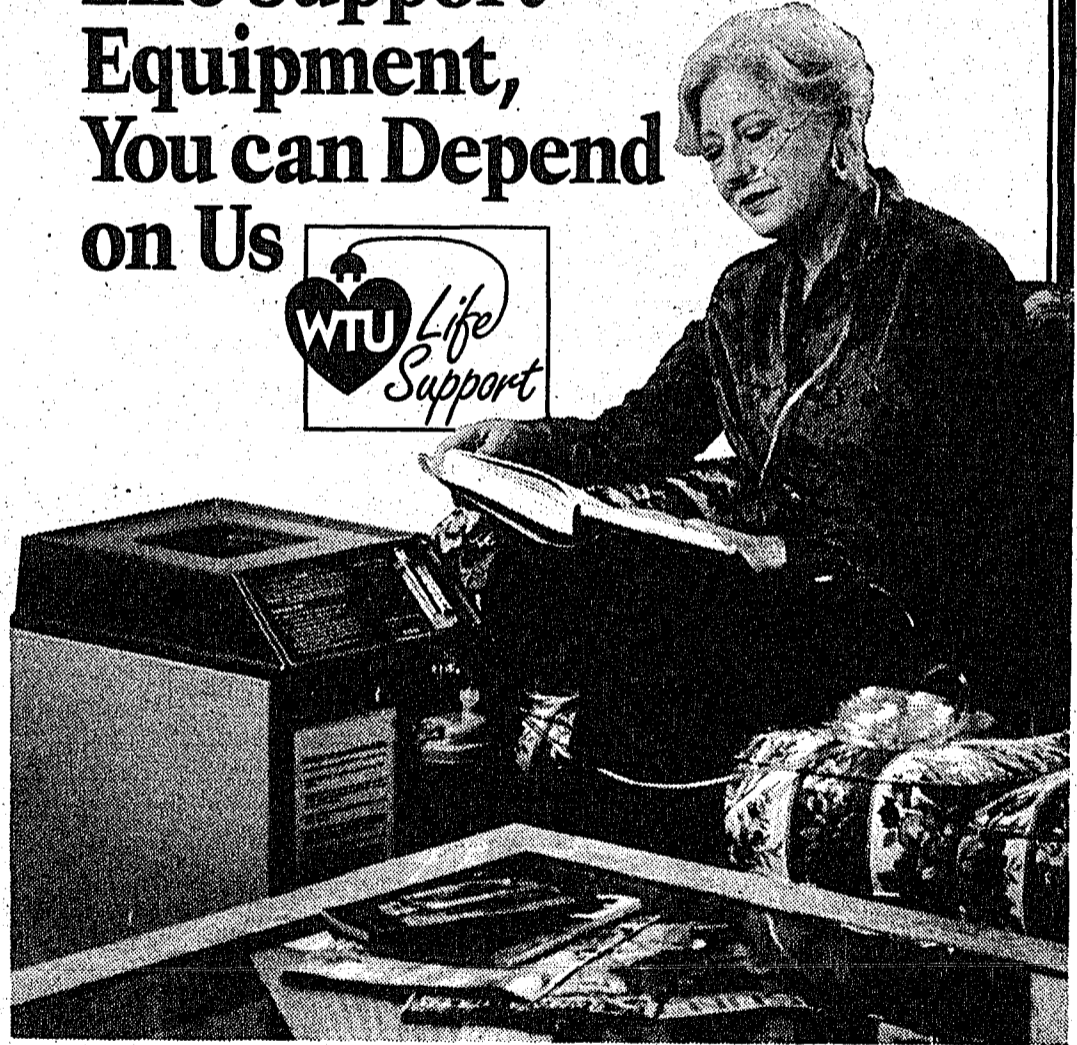

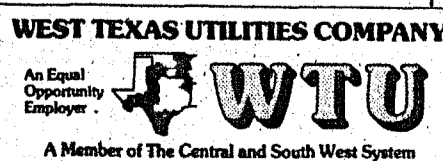

Dispelling Myths About Food and Athletic Performance

By Sandra Avant
COLLEGE STATION -- Whether a person is a professional football player or exercises only once a week, food is a key factor in athletic performance -- but too many advertised products mislead and misinform, according to a registered dietitian.

"Everyone needs to eat a balanced diet, which provides energy to complete an exercise routine and all the nutrients necessary for tissue growth and replacement after a workout," said Dr. Mary Kinney Bielamowicz, nutritionist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "However, there are too many misleading advertisements and fad diets that can cause consumers to stray from the healthful choice."

Many people who put their hopes in health products that claim to build their muscles and give them stamina often end up with a diet that lacks some important nutrients but has an excessive amount of others, she said. Nutritional practices based upon half-truths and misconceptions can even be dangerous if taken to the extreme.

Bielamowicz said some of the most common myths about how to get energy include:

- Eating more protein helps build more muscle -- Protein is important in building and protecting muscles, but high-protein diets or supplements have not been proven to increase muscle mass. Without proper exercise, excessive protein is often converted to fat and stored. Excessive protein intake may also strain kidney function.
- Eat a lot of carbohydrate before each workout -- A high carbohydrate diet is not necessary for a regular workout. If preparing for a long-distance event (lasting an hour or longer) such as a marathon or bicycle race, a high-carbohydrate diet may be needed -- Starting several days before the event. For events lasting less than 90 minutes, a high-carbohydrate diet for One

Developmental Screening To Be Held In Coleman

On April 29, 1992, a developmental screening will be held for young children ages zero to three (0-3). This screening will be conducted at the First United Methodist Church at 500 W. Live Oak in Coleman from 10:00 until 12:00 in the morning.

This screening, which takes about twenty minutes to complete, tests a young child in four areas: personal/social skills (playing, eating, dressing, etc.), fine motor skills (ability to manipulate small objects), gross motor skills (running, jumping, etc.), and language development (speech, following instructions, etc.). If a child is found to have two or more delays in one area, there is further testing available or referral to the appropriate agency.

The purpose of Early Childhood Intervention (ECI) is to identify and correct as many problems as possible for young children. Early detection of young children's delays have proven beneficial to the child, parents and teachers.

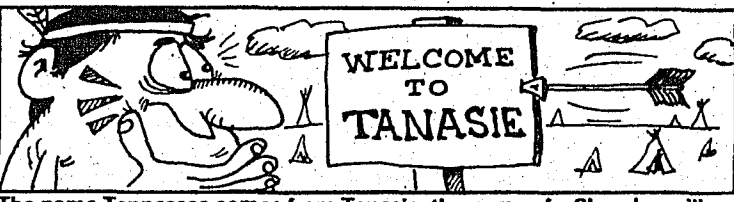

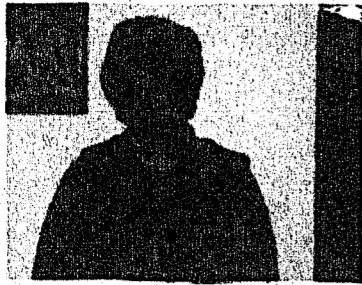

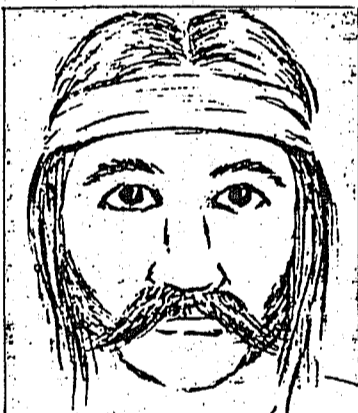

AUSTIN—Whether Gov. Ann Richards calls state lawmakers to Austin for a special session on public school finances will probably depend on a federal court judge's actions.

U.S. District Court Judge James Nowlin is considering a class action lawsuit on whether the state can collect an illegal tax. Nowlin last week asked attorneys from the state and taxpayers to try to settle their dispute within two weeks.

Should Nowlin rule that the state can collect the tax, the governor said the heat is off her to schedule the special session. Richards thinks the state would have to act immediately, though, if the judge decides the state cannot collect the tax.

The Texas Supreme Court ruled in January that the current system of paying for schools using the County Education District tax is unconstitutional. However, the high court did say the tax may be collected this year and next so the Legislature can put together a new finance system.

"If the federal court rules against the collection of that tax, then we very definitely will be (in Austin) on May 11," Richards told reporters.

Meek Resigns from PUC
Public Utility Commissioner Paul Meek headed the advice of Gov. Ann Richards and Attorney General Dan Morales and resigned his position from the state regulatory agency.

Meek, an appointee of former Gov. Bill Clements, had been accused of violating state law while serving as a member of the PUC and chairman of Fina, Inc., a company that sells fuel to utilities. Votes Meek cast will not be nullified, though, and Meek will not be prosecuted because he was unaware of the conflict of interest.

Since 1989, Fina has sold more than \$11 million of natural gas and co-generated power to utilities

regulated by the PUC.

The AG's office said Meek could have been prosecuted if he had clear prior knowledge of a conflict of interest. But Morales' staff feels confident such knowledge did not exist until Meek received a letter from the attorney general. That letter said, under state law, Meek had to step down from the PUC or sever his ties with Fina.

The resignation means Richards will be able to make her second appointment to the three-member commission.

Tax Group Files Lawsuit

A taxpayers group is suing to stop the state government from paying its bills because the Legislature "flagrantly disregarded" the Texas Constitution in writing the 1992-93 budget.

The suit was filed by Texans for Limited Taxation, four private citizens and state Reps. Warren Chisum, D-Pampa, and Talmadge Hefflin, R-Houston.

They allege that the budget approved last year violated a 1978 constitutional amendment designed to limit growth of government spending to the growth rate of the state's overall economy.

9 Cities on Burglary List

Of the 25 U.S. cities with the highest burglary rates in 1989, nine were in Texas, said Jerry Johns of the Southwestern Insurance Information Service Inc.

He said a partnership comprising individuals, businesses and government is needed "if this out-of-control situation is to ever be corrected."

Texas cities on the list were Wichita Falls, Waco, Dallas, San Antonio, Fort Worth, Arlington, Midland and Houston.

Property and auto theft losses in 1990 exceeded \$1 billion, Johns stated. He said losses drive up the cost of insurance.
