Simmons, Morris, Hays Get The Nod In The City Council Election

Emmitt Simmons, Karen Morris and Thomas Hays were returned to their seats on the Santa Anna City Council when voters went to the polls on Saturday.

The unofficial results showed Simmons and Morris with 86 votes each and Hays with 71. The only other candidate in the race, John Pearce, received 46 votes.

The three elected will each serve another two-year term on the City Council.

Only 99 voters turned out to voice an opinion in the City election. Votes were to be canvassed at a meeting of the Council on Tuesday evening. The newly elected Council members will be sworn into office later this week.

Harvey, Donham And Hipsher Take School Board Seats

In Saturday's school board election, Edwin Hipsher and incumbents Roy Joe Harvey and Marty Donham were elected to the three at-large seats on the Santa Anna Independent School District Board of Trustees.

According to unofficial results, Harvey led the field with 122 votes. Donham received 110 votes and

Hipsher 97. Incumbent Ruth Ann Wise, received 84 votes in the election which brought out only 139 voters in all.

The newly elected members received the oath of office at the school board meeting on Monday night after the votes were canvassed by the board.

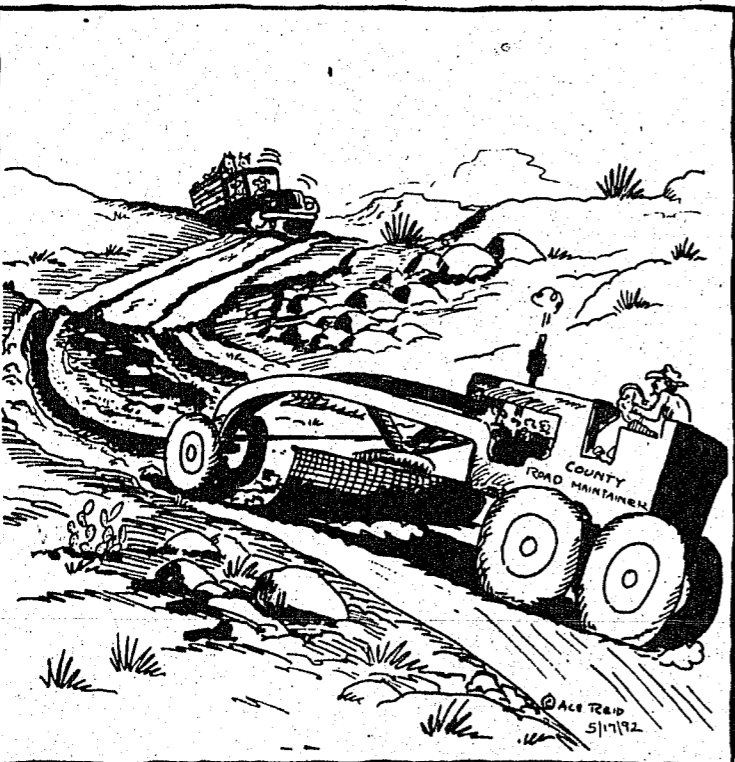

Gardening and Canning Seminar May 9 in Coleman

By Kristin Cranfill, CEA-H.E. The Texas Agriculture Extension Service will be hosting a Gardening and Canning Seminar on Saturday May 9. It will be held in the Mrs. J.A.B. Miller Library Building on the Courthouse lawn.

Pesticide License Training and Testing

By: Kerry Shropshire, CEA-AG Many of you are aware of the new changes in the Pesticide Laws and how they affect buying restricted use chemicals. The following information is only for those producers who DO NOT already have a Private Applicators License.

If you have a Private Applicator's License as of right now, it is still good. If you do not have a Private Applicator's License, you will need one to purchase restricted use chemicals.

A Private Applicator Training and Testing date has been scheduled for Coleman on Tuesday, May 12, 1992 in the Courthouse Courtroom at 5:30 p.m.

This training and testing is only for individuals who do not currently hold a Private Applicator License. A private pesticide applicator license enables a producer of farm products to buy a restricted chemical for his own use. Some restricted chemicals include hormone type herbicides and some highly toxic pesticides.

If you are interested in attending this training, you must call the County Extension Office at (915) 625-4519 or go by their office, located on the 2nd floor of the Coleman County Courthouse.

This office will provide you needed study material prior to the training and test date.

Remember, the date is Tuesday, May 12 at 5:30 p.m. in the Courthouse Courtroom.

Panhandle feedlot trade was active Monday with steers firm to a dollar higher. Slaughter steers weighing 1100-1250 sold at \$76.-77./cwt. At Union Stockyards, San Antonio, on Monday feeder steers were down \$2./cwt, with the fleshiest calves dropping the most. Feeder heifers were steady.

Sheep shearing is in full swing in Coleman County, with the number of shearing rigs in the south part of the county rivaling boat trailers on the way to Ivie. Wool has been trading at a little above last year's price with good demand. With lamb marking recently completed, the damage caused by coyotes and other predators can be assessed. The lamb crop over most the area is down again this year with a 60 to 70% drop about the average. Quite a few lambs showed up in the marking

pen with evidence of close calls with death, grisly scars on the throat and neck inflicted by coyotes. Cattle and sheep producers need to be sure to pay their \$.10/acre assessment to fund our local predator control program. They may pay at any of the county banks. Without producer help, we will lose one of our two trappers.

Protection from animal rights' jackasses might come from the U.S. Legislature in the form of H.R. 2407, The Farm Animal and Research Facilities Protection Act. The resolution, introduced by Charles Stenholm (D-Texas), provides for penalties of up to 20 years imprisonment and fines for theft of animals or property from animal facilities and damages to such facilities.

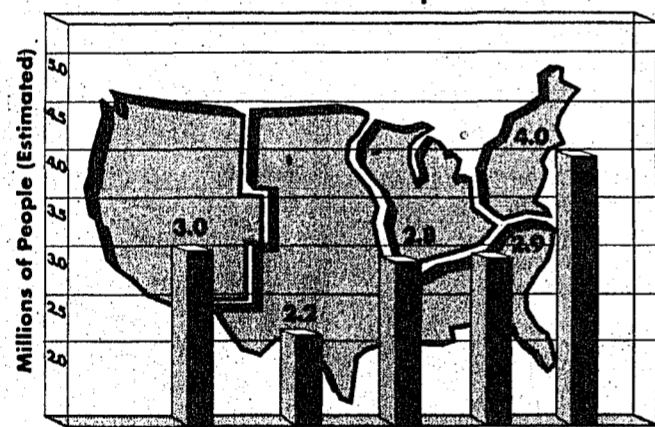

Public Hearing On Proposed Hospital Tax Scheduled For Monday

Commissioners approved a Public Hearing on the proposed County Wide Hospital Tax District for May 11, at 10 a.m., which will be held in the main courtroom. The election itself is proposed for June 30. Speaking for the special election last Thursday were: Steve Autry, Joseph Johnson, Don Rhone and Clyde D. Allen.

A petition, with over 200 signatures, requesting such an election, had been presented to County Judge W. W. "Pete" Skelton earlier. County officials had checked and determined that it contained more than the necessary 100 signatures of registered voters. That being certified, the commissioners are required by law to set a hearing date for an election.

This second attempt to form a county hospital taxing district is quite different from the earlier effort which failed to receive voter approval. Then, the proposal was for up to a maximum 50c tax rate per \$100 valuation. Now, the tax rate is set for a maximum of 24c. Then, ambulance subsidy costs were not included. Now, 4c of the 24c proposed maximum rate is designated for operation of the ambulance service by the hospital.

There are other substantive differences in the new proposal. The hospital operations will be considerably altered by scaling down the number of hospital beds in use, and by adding Home Health Care, Rural Health Preventative Medical Care, and "Swing Bed" programs. An Emergency Room will continue to be operated. According to Steve Autry, "These significant changes will cut costs, and cut losses. The

long range prospects for the future are excellent". There is even a name change to Coleman County Medical Center.

Joseph Johnson, speaking for the Holiday Hill, Inc. board, said that HH Inc. would get all those changes started in the next 120 days while they are operating the hospital facility on an interim basis. HH, Inc. is underwriting operations until some more permanent funding is available.

Autry said that a number of requests for funding grants are being prepared. "If these requests are to be successful", he continued, "We must demonstrate that we are investing in a meaningful way ourselves. This tax district will show our common interest". Clyde Allen said that Holiday Hill is "...spending this money from its depreciation fund. We are in this for an emergency...the (hospital) facility will serve the needs of the nursing homes."

Don Rhone and Joseph Johnson described some of the numerous helps that Shannon Hospital in San Angelo is providing in the effort to continue hospital services in Coleman. Shannon has said they will send efficiency experts to improve the hospital operations, they will train new personnel, and they will continue to bring in medical doctors. Good news and bad news! When the Texas Department of Criminal Justice made their public announcement on April 10, the good news is that Brownwood was selected for the location of a 500 bed substance abuse treatment center--but the bad news is that Ranger was not chosen as a site. There was a recent article in the DALLAS MORNING NEWS regarding the process by which the prison sites were chosen and it raised many questions as to the fairness of the system.

There is a great deal of controversy over whether or not the Governor will call a special legislature session this spring, as the Legislature must attempt to fix the horrible public education finance mess. Some speculation is that there will likely be a special session on May 11. To be honest, there is certainly not a consensus of opinion on the numerous proposed plans for financing Texas public schools. With this in mind, there is a promise of a couple of special sessions and a couple of very hot months in Austin coming up.

Health care accessibility, availability and affordability continue to plague Texas and our Nation. The Governor's Health Care Task Force has proven to be an immense undertaking with a yet-to-be-determined final result. Locally, in Coleman, the recent problems encountered in keeping the Coleman Hospital open is an excellent example of the unique health care problems that continue to face our rural areas in Texas. You may have read out the newly approved health coverage which is being provided by the State of Minnesota for all citizens currently not insured in their state. This coverage has been made possible as almost 95% of all citizens of Minnesota already have insurance. In Texas a very large portion of our population are not insured, and the price tag in Texas to accomplish the same end as achieved in Minnesota would be totally outrageous for our state's taxpayers. We must continue to strive to find answers for this perplexing, frightening problem.

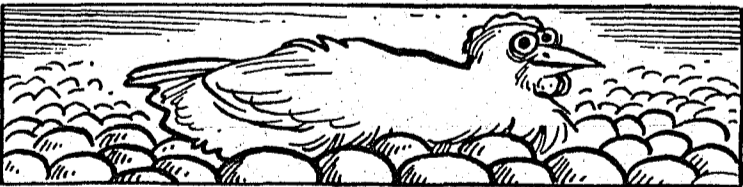

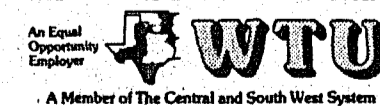
