

Hospital Has Third Name Change

After three name changes and the threat of another closure, the hospital in Coleman is still in business but with another name.

The hospital, which for years was known as the Overall-Morris Hospital until the mid-1991 when it was closed, then became Coleman County Community Hospital until last Friday night at midnight. "Trustees of the property, the former Overall-Morris Memorial Hospital board, terminated the lease of Life-Med, Inc. of Round Rock and issued a new lease to Holiday Hill, Inc. at that time," State Rep. Bob Turner of Voss, executive director of the Coleman County Development Corp., said Saturday.

Turner explained that Holiday Hill, which operates a nursing home in Coleman, does not intend to become permanently involved in the hospital business, but stepped in to keep the hospital open an an interim basis.

Life-Med operated the hospital since July 22, 1991 but experienced problems with Medicare certification due to the facility's closure on

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Holiday Hill, Inc. anticipates being the management company for the near future, but it is not intended to be a permanent situation.

Last Thursday a meeting was held in the board room of the Coleman Chamber of Commerce. Several health management persons from out-of-town attended. These included Maurice Shaw, director of Texas Department of Health, Hospital Licensing Division, and Marvin Cole, who heads up the Small Hospital Division of Texas Hospital Association, both of Austin; and Paul Adams and Lawrence Leonard of Shannon Memorial Hospital in San Angelo.

Others at the joint meeting were members of the board of directors of Holiday Hills, Inc.; the Overall-Morris Memorial Hospital board, which serve as the trustees for the facility: Coleman Development Corp. board of directors; and several of the hospital's administrative

It was at the this meeting that the decision was made to allow Holiday Hills to assume the management role for the local hospital.

Turner said he believes that the long-range future for the Coleman hospital looks better than it has in recent years for a number of reason including an agreement of Shannon Memorial Hospital in San Angelo and Texas Hospital Association to assist the new ownership in organizing a new accounting and administrative system for the hospital; the employment of John Martin, an interim administrator, who began work on Monday; the agreement by Shannon Memorial Hospital to send physicians to be located in the old Dr. Pope Clinic building in south Coleman in support of the Coleman hospital; and an awareness on the part of the Coleman County citizens of how close they came to losing the health care facility and that the need for its survival is real.

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
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
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
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A View From Santa Anna's Peak

About Santa Anna And Its People

Santa Anna's Peak! The name first appeared on maps of the wide unknown land between the Brazos and Colorado Rivers of Texas soon after Mexican independence from Spain in 1821. Some mapmaker, using information from Scouts and Explorers were told there was a high point of land at that place.

Between the Pecan River and Colorado there is a mountain you can see for miles; Santa Anna, the chief of the Comanches lives there with his band, it was said. The cartographer drew a small circle and called it Santa Anna's Peak.

The two low hills are mere flat-topped mesas, some three hundred feet high. If it were not that they are the only eminence above the miles of slopes that lift them up to sight for long distances they would have

been unnoted. But there they were, to guide the explorers, the armies, the Texas Rangers, the surveyors. Once they were visible, the location of the streams, the trails and places were certain, whether to go north of them, or east or west. They were the focus, the axis, of further travel.

Comanche Indians lived in this area, including Santa Anna and his band who camped at the springs near the foot of the mountains and used the elevated peaks as lookout and signal points. Chief Santa Anna died about 1849 of cholera but the town which bears his name lives on at the foot of those hills where he and his people once roamed.

The original town of Santa Anna was located at the gap of the mountain but later moved to the site of the present township with the coming of the Santa Fe Railroad.

The rock buildings which house a number of Santa Anna businesses were built at the turn of the century using stone brought from the mountains. The town was in-

corporated in 1906 and a water system established in 1910. Natural gas was piped in from Trickham in 1914.

Today the City of Santa Anna is governed by the mayor-council form of government with five councilmen. Mrs. Gale Allen-Brock is current mayor of the City. Council members are Karen Morris, Jim Spillman, Emmitt Simmons, Danny Kellar and Tom Hays. There is one full-time policeman, Carlos Torres, and a municipal judge, Bruce Kingsbery.

Water is supplied by two city-owned lakes and from Lake Brownwood.

The Legend Of Lovers Leap

Among the stories local people love to relate concerning our mountain is the story of Lover's Leap. This version is the one written by Austin Callan in the early 1900's.

Tradition tells us that in the long ago, a quaint little Indian village nestled at the foot of "Santana peaks" called Las Mesas. It was before the white man's ambition for new territory led him into the wild haunts of the savage; before Anglo-Saxon enterprise transformed the dreamy West, from a wilderness of romance to a vulgar land of farms and ranches. Herds of buffalo and deer roamed the prairies, wild turkeys, geese and game birds were as plentiful as the leaves on the trees, and the people were happy, prosperous and indolent.

Among the inhabitants was Fox-Deer, who had taken unto himself a pale-face for a wife; he had an only daughter, called Lentalopa, Laughing-Eye, and he loved her poor, heart-broken mother, whose soul he gave to the Great Spirit in the forest, and whose body was laid to rest among the flowers on the "Little Table".

One evil day a band of white men, with a great train of wagons and an Indian guide, passed through the gap of Las Mesas and were soon in view of the little village. Immediately the war-whoop rent the air and before the soldiers and teamsters hardly had time to corral their wagons and prepare for battle, the fierce red devils were circling round and round them, leaning low on their horses and gradually drawing in. The lieutenant gave orders not to fire until the enemy came near enough to the wagons to make every shot count a dead savage.

Each man stood in place, sighting down his musket, waiting breathlessly for the order. Fox-Deer, clad in a buckskin suit, ornamented with silver, turned his pretty steed towards the wagon corral, gave a signal which was understood, and in an instant every war-



rior was charging the temporary barracks, howling as an imaginary pack of fiends in hell. Then, from behind the wagons, there came a hundred puffs of smoke, and a hundred Indians fell lifeless on the

Fox-Deer led his red-skins back to the base of Las Mesas: the soldiers reloaded their muskets and made ready for a second attack. In the meantime several of the men reported to the Lieutenant that the savages had a beautiful white wife in captivity, and one fellow said that he had his musket aimed at her heart and was ready to fire, when he made the discovery. The gallant Lieutenant, a jolly old Irish bache-lor, said: "By th' hoily Soint Paterick, it's glod I am that those yelpin' divils air too dead to kick, but I'd raither they war all aloif an' around us, than to haf harimned one hair on thot girl's head." He immediately sent a couple of men, under a flag of truce, to the Indians, with the information that he would withdraw and leave them alone, if they would only surrender the white prisoner into his hands.

The answer came back, as quick as a flash of lightening, from the ashy lips of Wounded Hawk. He

said that Laughing-Eye belonged not to the pale-faces, that he had won her heart for bravery in fighting the battles of Fox-Deer. "We love each other," he said in tones of pathos to the Indian guide, who acted as interpreter; "we have asked the beautiful moon to melt our hearts into one, and its spirit came down and danced for joy on the bosom of the silvery stream, because we are happy. Go away and leave us alone, leave Laughing-Eye among the flowers and the birds, close to her mother's grave."

The men returned and reported the effort to compromise with the Indians, unsuccessful. Wounded Hawk's story was put down as one of those slick lies characteristic of his race, and it was decided to at once attack the village and finish the job of whipping the devils, who were rendered inferior by their first charge. As the soldiers drew up near the wigwams, the golden sun was hanging over the western point, of the mountain, a beautiful valley swept off for miles to the north, and in the green grass droves of snow-white antelope and fleetfooted dun deer were playing. Around the wigwams a number of squaws were seated upon buffalo robes and among them was Laughing-Eye, downcast and fright-

Fox-Deer asked permission to send his child to a cliff on the mountain where she would be out of danger, to watch the battle. "If the Great Spirit decides against the poor Indian," he said, "the white man can take her, but if He answers her prayer, she will remain in the forest with Wounded Hawk and be happy."

Laughing-Eye gave the signal for battle by waving a branch of cedar, from the brow of Las Mesas, and there went up a savage yell, as fierce as mortal ever heard. Fox-Deer led his warriors forth, playing for two of the highest earthly

stakes--the happiness of his daughter and his own life. In an instant the whites were surrounded and the Indians riding at full speed and lying low on the off side of their ponies, poured volley after volley of deadly arrows into their dismayed ranks. The Lieutenant fell mortally wounded; a dozen others were dead upon the ground. Closer and closer the savages came and more hideous grew their war-whoops. Laughing-Eye knelt upon the cliff to pray; no doubt she had learned to lisp the name of God at her mother's knee, and I fancy she asked Him to restore safe to her bosom the young chief she loved. But the tide of battle turned; turned at a moment when Wounded Hawk felt the flush of victory and was almost ready to wave his love back to the joy of the wigwam.

The surviving soldiers formed a little square, dropped to their knees and prepared to receive the last desperate charge of the savages. Fox-Deer led his men up this time in silence. Pointing to the girl on

the brow of the peak and giving a signal which they all understood, a mad rush was made. A deadly stream of fire poured forth from the little group of determined whites, and then they sprang to their feet with bayonets fixed. For a moment the fate of Wounded Hawk hung in the balance: the struggle was as fierce as opposing forces were waged; Indian and Caucasian fell together, locked in each other's arms, with the cold steel in each other's breasts, and their mingled blood crimsoned the grass-spears and the daisies. There was a hush; a little flag bearing the Stars and Stripes shot up above the field of carnage just in time to catch the farewell kiss of the setting sun. From the overhanging cliff a scream of agony rent the air. Laughing-Eye understood and leaped upon the rocks below, into the arms of death.



The Fire Department has stated that they would be willing to donate \$4,000 toward purchasing the truck and the Ladies Auxiliary will donate \$1,000 of any profits from Funtier Days. A used pumper truck would probably cost anywhere from \$30,000-\$40,000. The Fire Department is also presently in the



"The Old Rock House"

In 1873,-Mr. Brestow, a stone mason by trade, came West to let the dry air ease his chronic cough. He settled on the west side of Santa Anna Mountain, near a spring, which flowed from some unknown river under the mountain. There, he built his home, which stands today, testimony to his skill at his trade!

From the top of Santa Anna Mountain he took rock and processed it in a lime kiln he had built into the mountain side. the original construction was a one-room home 18x22 feet of solid rock with plaster inside.

A few years later, Mr. Brestow enlarged his home by adding a room of lumber. In the 1880's some unknown occupant built on three more rooms, using cut lumber and square nails.

The Rock House sits on the C. D. Bruce Ranch, just off Highway 84, west of Santa Anna. The Bruces had a sincere interest in restoring the old home, which has been awarded the Historical Building Medallion by the Coleman

County Historical Committee. At their own expense they renovated the rock house; the wooden additions have been dismantled, every

for reconstruction. Sometime in the house's history a fire destroyed part of a wooden mantle. The mantle was rebuilt with what was left of the original wood and enough new material to restore its form.

Texas Ranger Club House

The lobby and managerial quarters of the Texas Ranger Motel is the old Club House of the Texas Ranger Memorial Park. It is in the beautiful setting at the East end of the famous Santa Anna Mountain, backed by the mountain and facing the most breath-taking view in the world; the oak tree lined avenue leads from the Highway to the mo-

The formal dedication of the building was in 1939, when C. M. Grady, an Ex Ranger was recognized. The annual meetings of the group were held in Santa Anna for several years.

There were six companies of Rangers on the Frontier and they traveled from one company to another, being about 100 miles apart and Maltoy's Company E seemed to be in this area, with supplies coming from Camp Colorado.

A large granite stone at the front of the building on the driveway supports a large Texas Star, with State of Texas, 1936, at the time of Texas' centennial.

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





He goes on to say that "We continue to strive to have the best programs possible academically as well as extracurricular and we value every student. Every call and every concern is important to us.




Within the past year the City of Santa Anna has seen the closure of an old landfill, according to state closure standards, and the opening of a new one, also according to all current regulations.

After several years of negotiations with state agencies and landowners and many long hours of negotiations with General Electric Credit Corp., construction is now underway on a new wastewater treatment plant. The plant will utilize the two ponds already in use, but will also consist of two additional 1.7 acre ponds, one a facultative pond and the other an oxidation pond. The plant will include about 50 acres of bench level terrace system, triflex lift station, concrete work, piping and valves. Gravity flow will do away with approx. \$1300 a month electric bill for irrigation.

D & D Construction of San Angelo and Rowena is contractor for the project which will allow the City to stay in compliance even with a 10% growth per year until 2020.

The City crew has performed several preconstruction tasks such as building a fence around the property. They are also the ones who often go unthanked for the hours spent taking care of emergencies during the wee hours of the morning and on holidays when others are spending time with their fmilies.





and restrooms. Outside perimeter of the reservoir is at 1550 elevation and darkened area within the reservoir is from 1500 to river channel or the deepest waters.

Approximately 30-35 miles drive from Santa Anna can be found the new O. H. Ivie Reservoir which has become a fisherman's haven. The new reservoir southeast of Ballinger was supposed to take at a minimum of three years to fill but recently topped out in little more than a year. Stocked with Florida Bass in 1989, it was expected to be a decent bass lake. Anglers are now commonly catching largemouth bass up to four pounds in a half day of fishing. There weren't suppose to be any big bass in the lake for several years but a new lake record 9.5 pound bass caught a few weeks ago. Those who are seriously fishing for crappie and catfish are catching limits in a few hours, Facilities on the lake are still being built. But there are now three parks open and operated by the Water Authority plus a well-equipped fishing camp offering almost anything anglers might want.

Kennedy Park is at the north end of the dam off new FM 1929. The 409 acre park includes a 4-lane boat ramp and picnic facilities. Roads to all parks are still being built. All of FM 1929 is still dirt road, with crews working feverishly to get it completed. The road is due to be paved sometime this summer. In the meantime, plan on a dusty bumpy ride.

Kennedy Park includes Elm Creek Village, which is the only concession at the lake now offering overnight facilities.

Further north on the lake is Padgitt Park, a 312-acre park off FM 2134, off FM 503 from Voss. And 448-acre Concho Park is on the south side of the lake in Concho County. Take FM 1929 off 2134 or Hwy 83 to reach this park.

Elm Creek has RV parking, cabins, a good boat ramp and a wellstocked grocery store and grill. Recreation permits, applicable to all three CRMWD reservoirs, are now available at 17 places near full Lake O. H. Ivie.

These are \$2 daily individual, \$20 annual individual, \$50 annual guests (10 or less) and apply to picnicking, boating, fishing, camping, etc.

In Coleman permits may be purchased at J. E. Stevens Co., Geo. D. Rhone Co., Hord's Creek Grocery, Buddy's Convenience Store, Super S Foods, and Shoppin' Baskit Foods all in Coleman. Permits may also be purchased in Ballinger, Eden, Paint Rock and San Angelo. Around the lake permits are available at Hoelscher Bait Shop, Rock Ridge Grocery and Elm Creek Village.

There are camping areas at Concho, Padgitt and Kennedy Parks, with restrooms, picnic units and boat ramps.
