State Supervisor Expresses Doubt Plan Will Work For Long

AUSTIN, June 16 (AP)—R. D. Parker, supervisor of the oil and gas division of the railroad commission, said he "saw no harm" in the approval of the commission of the Cranfill oil stabilization plan for East Texas. He expressed doubt, however, that the plan would work permanently since new violators of prohibition might appear.

For the first time in the oil production controversy, all factions involved were represented when more than 500 producers and lease and royalty owners assembled at a lay's meeting in response to a call from Tom E. Cranfill, president of the Independent Producers Association of Texas, and author of the new plan.

Cranfill, chairman of the meeting, opened with a statement that "fairness must be done to all hands involved in this controversy, which has become nationwide in its dimensions and has led the oil industry into the danger zone."

"I appeal to all factions to subordinate personal opinion with relation to prohibition," Cranfill continued, "and to refrain from indulging in personalities."

Cranfill then called on P. H. Burt, head of a drilling company, to read the plan to the assembly. In addition to providing an allowance of 260 barrels daily per well one well to be located on 24 acres the plan provides for an arbitration committee of seven.

Capone Pleads For Compromise As Time for Court Action Nears

CHICAGO, June 14 (AP)—Al Capone, the most famous modern criminal boss in the United States, stripped of money, power and fighters.

The near-faced gang leader was almost alone in his attempt to plead for a compromise with the government. His "offer" was in prison or appealing to escape. His lawyer, W. J. Brennan, said that Capone was almost alone in his attempt to plead for a compromise with the government.

Both of the individuals are backed by maintainers of evidence, including a list of names and addresses of the individuals who are alleged to have been involved in the Capone case.

At the office of District Attorney George E. Q. Johnson, whom goes most of the credit for running Capone to earth, there appeared no disposition to compromise. Instead, prosecutors were whipping into shape the last bits of evidence they rely on to convict Capone from the nation's crime picture one and for all.

The government prosecutors are veterans in the business of convicting gangsters of evading income tax laws. Within two years after high gangsters have come before the federal court and the government has not lost a case.

Not will we lose this one, the prosecutor told the United States jury in the world wide trial of Capone.

And Capone can't escape a prison unless Johnson agrees, according to a recent ruling of the supreme court. Johnson says he'll never agree.

Capone is the last big prize among the gang leaders to fall a victim to the government's drive. His brother, Ralph, was convicted of income tax evasion and sentenced to three years; Frank Nitti, his cousin, was sentenced by Al Capone to a 10-year term in prison without a trial.

Small Rifle Bullet Kills Jack Jones, 16



A bullet wound received by Jack Jones, seventeen year old high school freshman, while he and W. H. "Duke" Cooks, high school student, were hunting on a farm 27 miles northwest of Big Spring at 4:45 p. m. Tuesday, almost instantly killed Jones.

The bullet, from a 22 caliber rifle, penetrated Jones' right arm midway between the elbow and the shoulder. The opinion was advanced by undertakers at Eberley Funeral Home where the body was taken, that the bullet struck the arm, traced upward, striking the jugular vein. A mass of blood which covered Jones' face led those who brought Jones to Big Spring to believe the youth had been shot in the temple. The bullet did not lower the boy.

Fruit Flies Offer Railroad Problem

DALLAS, Texas, June 16 (NS) — Considering the matter, it is a little hard to see any connection between fruit flies and flat wheels on box cars.

But F. H. Combs, superintendent of claims for the Burlington Rock Island railroad, sees a very definite connection, and expects to do something about it.

Local Maguey Cactus In First Blooming Stage
The maguey cactus in the yard of Mrs. Jones' home at 405 Hannels Street is now in the first blooming stage. Its flowers do not appear to be as large as those of a plant in its native wild state.

This maguey belongs to the family of the American aloe and is also called the Century Plant because it is a slow bloomer and dies after it blooms. It does not necessarily require a hundred years to reaching the blooming stage.

If this plant were in old Mexico, the blossom stalk would probably have been cut off several weeks ago, the lower part left to form a bowl to catch the sap of the plant which is a sweetened juice. This

juice would then be suctioned out of the bowl until the plant was exhausted, and fermented to make the Mexican drink, pulque.

Tequila and mescal are also made from the maguey. They are, however, a distillation of the root and lower leaves after roasting; whereas, pulque is nothing but the fermented sap of the plant.

There are dozens of these plants blooming now in the Madera Canyon of the Davis Mountains.

Historical Society Raises Museum Quota
CANYON, Texas, June 16 (NS) — Eighty per cent of the \$25,000 which members of the Panhandle to take raise if the state legislature appropriated a similar amount for a museum on the campus of West Texas State Teachers college has been raised.

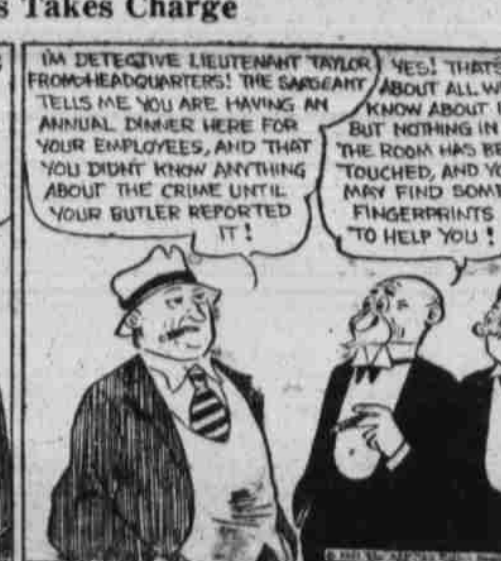
