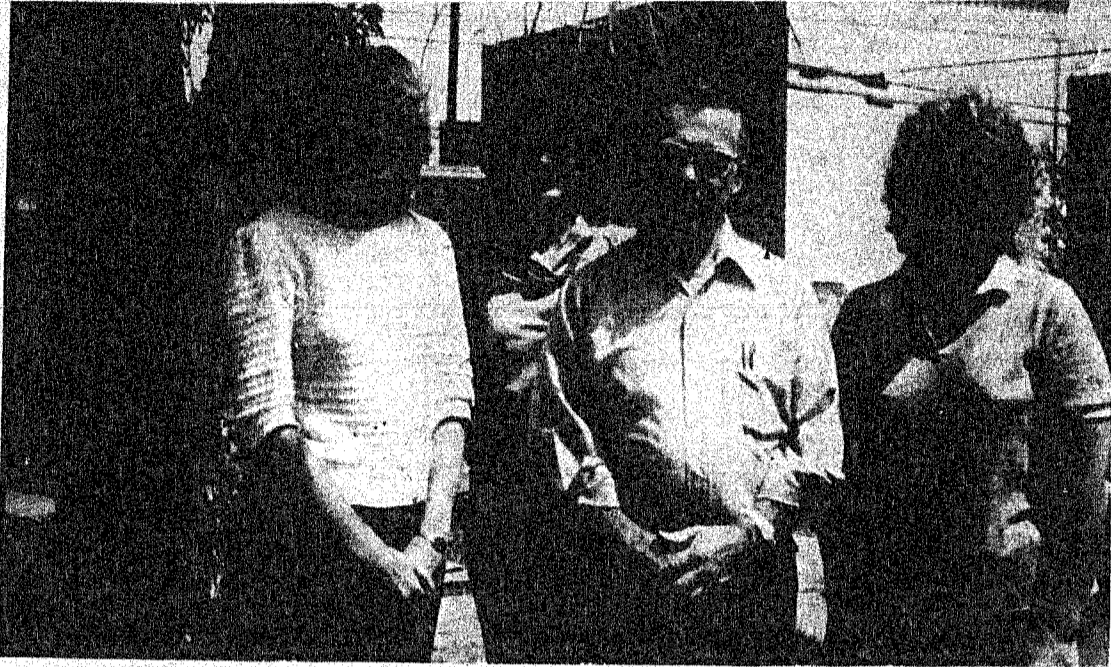

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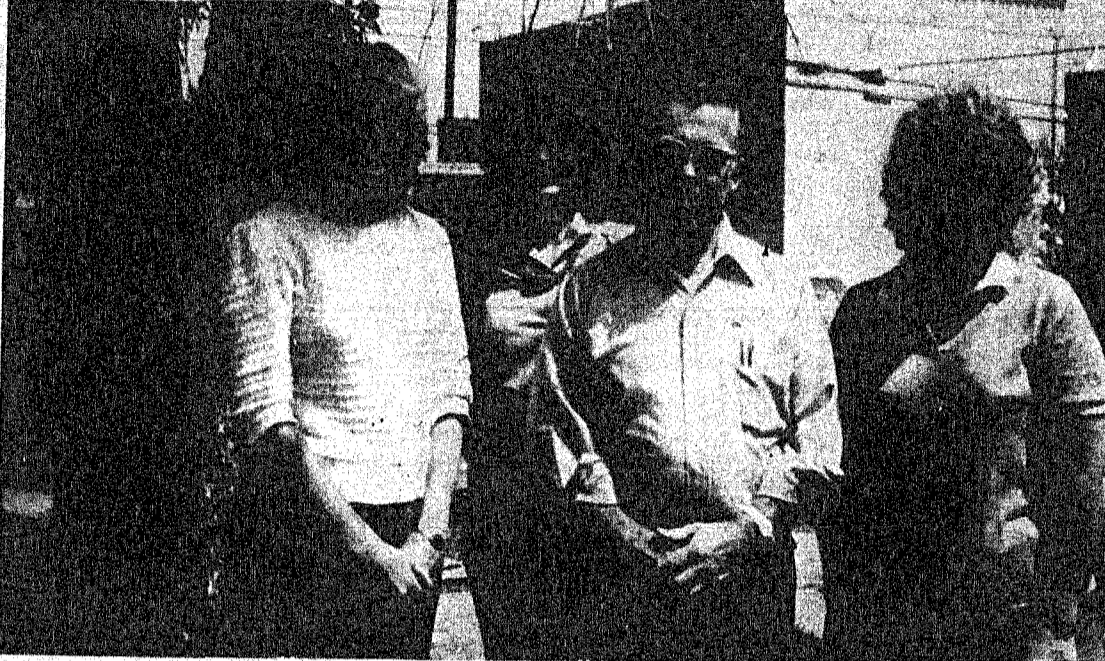

# Letter to the editor

Dear Editor:

The recent article in the  
News concerning Carl Ben-  
ton's position in the "sewer  
suit" contains some points  
to which I must respond.

Mr. Benton believes the  
waste material was  
"pumped or dumped" into  
the waters leading to his  
private water supply and  
that the situation continues  
today. It would appear Mr.  
Benton feels the city was  
deliberately and knowingly  
contaminating his water  
with untreated waste. I do  
not believe such malice on  
the part of the city, nor do I  
believe the overflow was a  
health hazard.

The city has admitted to  
a 3-day runoff during an  
exceptionally wet period. In  
spite of standard treat-  
ment, because of rain-filled  
streams, treated water  
that would normally have  
soaked into the ground had  
no where to go but to run.  
When this runoff occurred,  
the city immediately began  
the process established by  
the State of Texas to certify  
the quality of water in the  
runoff. S & K Engineers of  
San Angelo periodically  
checked water quality and  
found only one four hour  
period was minimally over  
the acceptable standards.

In addition, the city check-  
ed the samples twice daily  
using its own equipment to  
insure that no health  
hazard exists. This testing  
continues today.

A situation such as Mr.  
Benton describes is not  
unusual. Many small  
towns handle excess water  
in such a manner. Some  
towns discharge its run-off  
into Jim Ned Creek; Other  
towns into the Colorado  
River. However, a

discharge permit is re-  
quired. At the time of the  
3-day overflow, the permit  
held by Santa Anna had ex-  
pired. The city was at-  
tempting to have it renew-  
ed. Now such a permit will  
be of no use to Santa Anna  
since the injunction issued  
by the court prohibits such  
run off under any cir-  
cumstance. I would sup-  
pose that an extremely  
heavy rain would leave the  
city sewer farm in such a  
situation and we would  
again be liable for  
damages, questionable  
though the damage might  
be.

The real issue is not the  
legality of the discharge,  
but the type of water that  
was discharged. The water  
was not untreated raw  
sewage with solid waste,  
but water treated by  
methods acceptable to the  
State of Texas, and similar  
to water legally discharged  
by other towns.

This treated water  
presents no health hazard.  
My family lived within 200  
yards of the open discharge  
stream from 1952 until 1965  
when the new system was  
installed, piping the  
sewage underground. We  
did not find the stream a  
"nuisance."

Our neighbor across the  
road, Bert Tabor, used the  
stream for stock water.

Another neighbor used the  
water for irrigation for his  
vegetable farm. Common  
sense would dictate that  
these men would not use  
water they felt was  
dangerous. Water is  
limited in Texas, but it isn't  
that limited. Certainly the  
Texas Health Department,  
the Texas Water Quality  
Control Board, and our own

city officials would not con-  
done pumping or dumping  
hazardous sewage into  
what little water we do  
have.

Another point I feel needs  
clarification is Mr. Ben-  
ton's allegation that some  
of the people who testified  
in court were "not even  
able to supply the court  
with answers to basic ques-  
tions about the city's  
business." Since the ques-  
tions concerned the suit  
before the court and not  
general city operation, it  
might do to remind Mr.  
Benton that since the ad-  
mitted 3-day overflow, the  
city has had three mayors,  
at least four easily iden-  
tifiable councils, and nor-  
mal employee turnover.  
Since some of the people  
called to testify were not on  
the council at the time of  
the incident, naturally  
their ability to testify on  
that incident was limited.  
Perhaps Mr. Benton would  
care to answer questions in  
court concerning an inci-  
dent to which he was not a  
party.

Some unanswered ques-  
tions in my mind at this  
point is would the govern-  
ment build a dam that  
would have contaminated  
water in it? Would you  
build a house in a place  
where it would be flooded?

Mr. Benton insists he  
"used every possible  
means of communication"  
to resolve the problem. Yet  
a search of the city council  
minutes (open to the  
public) reveals no mention  
to "work things out." In-  
stead he chose to appeal for  
help to the Texas Depart-  
ment of Water Resources.  
Perhaps he would have  
done better to sit down and  
"have a cup of coffee" he  
mentions and talk about it  
before going to the State.  
In fact, the first mention in  
the council records of this  
problem is August 13, 1979  
when the suit had already  
been filed and the city was  
forced to hire an attorney  
and place a surcharge of \$4  
on the water bill to fund our  
defense.

He further insinuates  
that the city spokespeople  
have misrepresented con-  
cerning the filing of an ap-  
peal. He "produced a let-  
ter from district court in  
San Angelo that says the ci-

ty asked for a new trial in  
this case, but their peti-  
tion was denied because they  
did not act in the allotted  
time period."

What Mr. Benton failed  
to reveal was that in order  
to ease the financial burden  
on the city, a petition was  
made for a new trial or an  
amended judgment that  
would allow the city (that is  
you and me) to make pay-  
ment in installments. I  
understand that these mo-  
tions are always made  
together, even though the  
intent was to ask for an  
amended judgement. In  
fact, the city chose not to  
appeal on attorney's advice  
because of expense. Cer-  
tainly a new trial would be  
no less expensive than an  
appeal. This would seem to  
be the case of a man not  
understanding the  
language of the law. In any  
event, the original judge-  
ment stands and the  
amount is due in full today.

I cannot believe the  
situation was the  
"nuisance" Mr. Benton  
describes, and I certainly  
have faith our city did all  
humanly possible to pro-  
tect its citizens. Mr. Ben-  
ton obviously feels other-  
wise. At any rate, Santa  
Anna has to bite the bullet  
and hand over the money  
that we really can't spare.  
It seems that now we are in  
for another bit our of our

# DAY CARE GUIDELINES

Choosing a day care  
center can be one of the  
most difficult tasks a  
parent faces. A wrong  
decision can be damaging in  
many ways.

1. A good way to start  
is by asking friends and  
colleagues what center they  
use. After you have a  
number of recommenda-  
tions, you will need to set  
aside time to visit various  
facilities. Nothing beats  
personal inspection by the  
parent.

2. The Department of  
Human Resources licenses  
day care centers which  
provide care for 13 or more  
children. Other state-  
regulated day care pro-  
grams are registered with  
the DHR, but only licensed  
homes or centers are actual-  
ly inspected by the state.  
The manager of the  
registered home is required  
to give you a copy of  
"Parents' Guide to  
Registered Family Homes."  
The pamphlet lists stan-  
dards for registered homes.

3. The most important  
person in the care center or  
home is the director. You  
should discuss what you  
want for your child with the  
director. You should also  
observe other employees of  
the day care center and ask  
about the staff-child ratio.  
Too many children and too  
few child care workers can  
result in unintentional  
neglect of the children.

4. You will probably  
want to inquire about meals

and snacks for the children.  
Try to visit the day care  
center while food is being  
served. You will also want  
to find out what kinds of  
activities the center provides  
for mental and social  
growth of the children.

## BABYSITERS

You may decide that  
you would prefer that your  
child be cared for by a  
babysitter who works from  
her home or yours, and only  
cares for one or two  
children at a time. If this is  
your choice, you will still  
want to ask the same kinds  
of questions: Will this per-  
son provide affection and  
attention to my child? Will  
my child be safe and  
healthy? Will my child  
receive mental and social  
stimulation? Can I afford  
this kind of care?

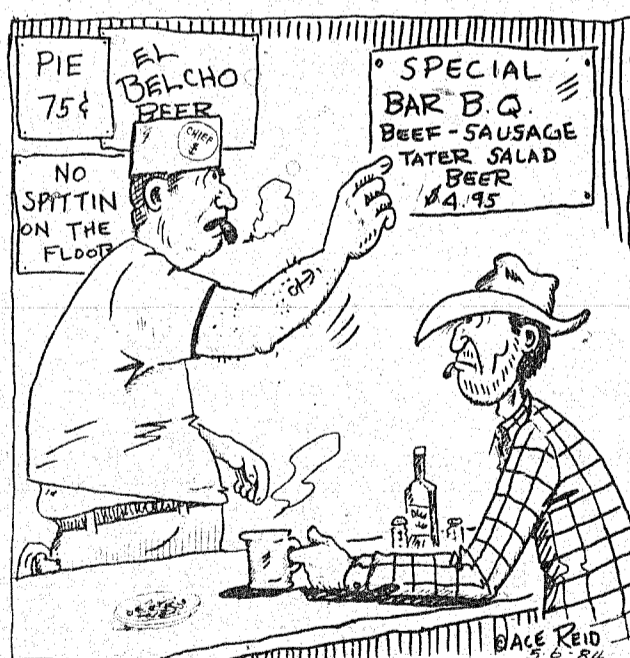
Talk to other parents

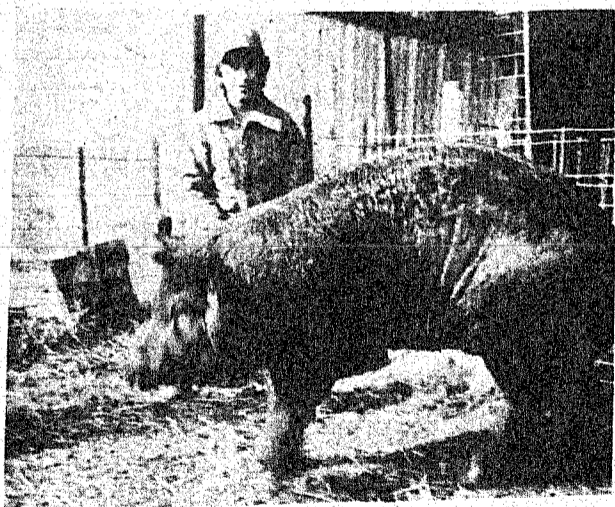

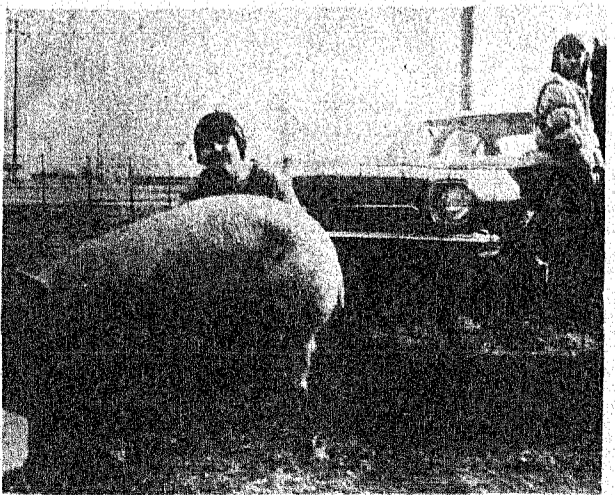
