## Area Workshop Focus

for Amarillo, March $28-29$ 1988, which will help farmer and ranchers learn how to reduce taxable estates and learn new methods for passing their

ation without tax and administrative burdens.
"Of major importance is how
every farm estate will be affected after the recent estate tax law changes," points out
Dr. Wayne Hayenga, a lawyer Dr. Wayne Hayenga, a lawyer
and Extension Economist. "The best tax planning of the pas may be the worst under the new
aw."
The seminar will begin with a discussion on estate taxes,
includng deductions, expenses and tax rates.
Basic estate planning devices will be explained in depth
Among these are wills, by-pas trusts, gifts, disclaimers and property titles.
