In Profile

Young, Multi-Talented; He's Reydon Stanford

(Editor's Note: This week's *In Profile* will be spotlighting one of the most talented young persons in this area.)

He is a songwriter, a published author and poet; some of his cartoons have been published; and he is a talented musician. Reydon Stanford is one of the special people who can be found in this area.)

What is success? It could be a good feeling about a new song -- it could be a good feeling about yourself -- it could be an idea -- or it could even be the praise received from some individual whose life has been touched.

Listening to the unique sound of *The Anchor Brothers Band* is an experience most people don't forget. And inevitably, their attention is drawn to the pianist and lead singer, Reydon Stanford, who embodies commitment with every note that comes from his mouth -- or from his piano.

Reydon, who has been employed at KMUL Radio in Muleshoe since June, 1983, is one of the two co-founders of the Anchor Brothers Band about 13 years ago. He and Kenneth Richards, attending the same

church, The Church of God of Prophecy in Sudan, started singing together, and liked the music that came forth.

As a youngster in Amarillo, where he was born nearly 27 years ago, Reydon sang some specials at his church and at music camps, but for the past five years, has been putting much intensive effort into his music, arranging music and singing.

To date, he has written some 30 songs. Eight of the songs he has written, have been published, along with two songs he has co-written.

He says that most of his music is written in his car to and from work. He drives to Muleshoe from Sudan six mornings a week, to sign on at KMUL. At this time, he is studying songwriting as an art, as he is preparing for more and more lyrics and music to flow from his fingers in the future.

First, Reydon gets his 'hook line' which he explains is what you are talking about, or the message you are trying to get across to the listener.

From there, he starts his lyrics, doing his lyrics long before he gets a tune in his

County Participating In Water District Election

Bailey County voters will have an opportunity to go to the polls, Saturday, April 2, 1988, to ratify the annexation of a portion of eastern Crosby County into the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1.

Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. at the Bailey County courthouse in Muleshoe. Mar-

grethe Taylor will be the presiding judge.

The proposed Crosby County addition includes the parts of County Commissioners Precincts One, Two and Four located above the Caprock. The western precinct of Crosby County above the Caprock joined the Water District in April 1969.

Residents of the Crosby

County annexation area will be asked to approve a maximum tax rate of \$0.05 per \$100 assessed valuation, even though the current Water District tax rate is \$0.007 per \$100 valuation. This will provide the same maximum tax rate previously approved by residents of the Water District in 1951. The Cont. Page 6, Col. 5

Area Workshop Focus Lower Estate Taxes

Farmers and ranchers have been concerned for years about high taxes that erode their estates. To help take the bite out of their high estate taxes, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service is planning several educational programs.

A two-day seminar is planned for Amarillo, March 28-29, 1988, which will help farmers and ranchers learn how to reduce taxable estates and learn new methods for passing their operations to the next generation without tax and administrative burdens.

"Of major importance is how every farm estate will be affected after the recent estate tax law changes," points out Dr. Wayne Hayenga, a lawyer and Extension Economist. "The best tax planning of the past may be the worst under the new law."

The seminar will begin with a discussion on estate taxes, including deductions, expenses and tax rates.

Basic estate planning devices will be explained in depth. Among these are wills, by-pass trusts, gifts, disclaimers and property titles.

Relating estate plans to income tax savings can be of even greater benefit than just thinking about an estate plan. In fact, sometimes income tax savings can even be greater than estate tax savings for people with commercial farm and ranch businesses.

There will also be a separate segment of the program devoted to treating beneficiaries fairly. This is a most important subject when there is a farm or ranch in the family and only part of the heirs want to run it.

Another discussion will center on estate planning tools for agriculture and will deal with corporations, partnerships and selling part of the business to heirs.

The second day of the

program will be devoted to special estate tax rules for agriculture. These include special farm land valuation, deferred estate tax payment rules, life insurance, "flower" bonds and other property.

"Estate planning is a step toward reduced taxes," points out Hayenga. "This process should start when you plan to inherit substantial property, when you have an active and growing business, when you still have time to take tax-saving actions, when you have minor children, and when your children marry or divorce."

Water Group Annexation Vote Starts

Bailey County voters may cast absentee ballots from March 14 through March 29 to ratify the annexation of a portion of eastern Crosby County into the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1.

The proposed Crosby County addition includes the portions of County Commissioners Precincts One, Two and Four located above the Caprock. The western precinct of Crosby County above the Caprock joined the Water District in April 1969.

Residents of the Crosby County annexation area will be asked to approve a maximum tax rate of \$0.05 per \$100 assessed valuation, even though the current Water District tax rate is \$0.007 per \$100 valuation. This will provide the same maximum tax rate previously approved by residents of the Water District in 1951. The annual tax rate is set by the Water District's Board of Directors and levied uniformly throughout the District.

The Water District Board called the elections after receiving petitions and hearing testimony from Crosby County landowners in January and February.

Separate elections for the proposed annexation area and for the 15-county area presently served by the Water District are required by the Texas Water Code. A majority vote favoring the annexation in both elections is required before the proposed area can be added to the Water District.

Absentee ballots may be cast during normal business hours at the High Plains Water District Office, 224 W. 2nd Street, Muleshoe, TX 79347. Doris Wedel is the election clerk.

for a homestead exemption if you owned your home on January 1 and used it as your primary residence on January 1. It doesn't matter whether your home is a house, a condominium or a mobile home.

Exemptions are available
to all homeowners on their school taxes. Additional exemptions are available to homeowners who are disabled or age 65 and over. Other exemptions may be offered to homeowners by school districts, counties, cities, and special districts. All taxing units offer exemptions to disabled veterans.

Apply to
your local appraisal district office at the address shown below for all exemptions you may qualify for. Application forms are available at this office.

If you received a homestead exemption on your present home in 1987, you won't need to apply again for 1988 unless the chief appraiser requires you to reapply.

However, if you passed your 65th birthday or became disabled before January 1, file a new application to receive the additional exemptions.

If you haven't received an exemption on your present home, or if you've moved to a new home, make a new application for 1988.

The deadline
for applications is April 30, 1988. Contact your appraisal district before then if you need more time.

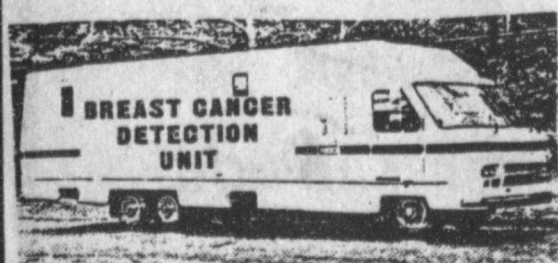

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Postage Stamps Rates Increasing

On April 3

Today, Muleshoe Postmaster Abel Arguello announced that a decision has been reached by the Board of Governors of the United States Postal Service concerning the proposed increase in postage rates.

Effective April 3, 1988, Arguello says the new rate for first class postage will be 25 cents. This is the first increase in postage costs in three years.

The postmaster said although no one welcomes an increase in postage, it should be placed in perspective.

For example, in 1932, a first class postage stamp cost 3 cents. With adjustments for inflation, that same stamp would now cost 25.5 cents.

He also said the new "E" stamp, which will cost 25 cents, will go on sale March 23. The Post Office will also have an ample supply of 3 cent stamps and other postage to meet your mailing needs, according to Postmaster Arguello.

Memorial Scholarships Set Up At Lazbuddie

Three Memorial Scholarships have been established through the Lazbuddie Schools to honor three young men who lost their lives last year from the Lazbuddie Community.

In June, 1987, David Dale Seaton, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jimmie Dale Seaton, lost his life in an accident.

This was followed in August by the death of Philip B. Jesko, also due to an accident.

Then on December 11, 1987, Russell Scott Redwine lost his life in an accident.

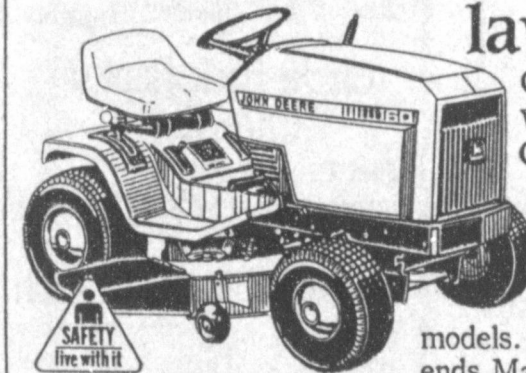

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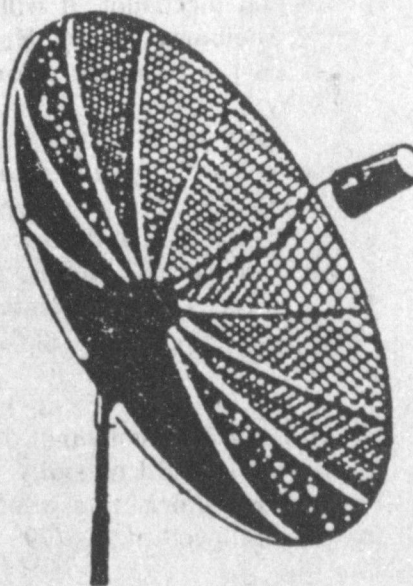

How much do you think a taxi ride would cost today if you wanted to flee New York ahead of a nuclear attack?

Commuters in New York, stranded downtown by the blizzard, had to spend the night sleeping on floors, on billiard tables and in closets in hotels, for which the hotels charged them profitably. How much do you think a hotel room will cost in cities where they Republicans and Democrats hold their national conventions this year?

But for the ultimate proof that things don't change much, the weather forecast for that night in 1888 called for clearing weather.

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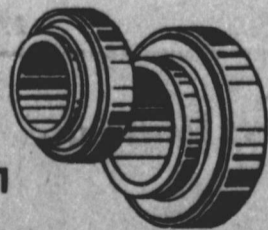
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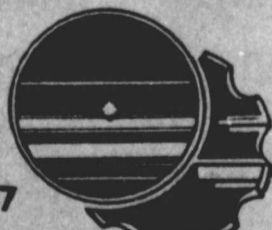

However, under PCG by-laws, only current dues-paying members of PCG will be eligible to be elected a director or to vote in the election. This provision of the by-laws will be fully explained at the meeting.

A PCG staff member will conduct the election and review and answer questions about recent and planned PCG activities.

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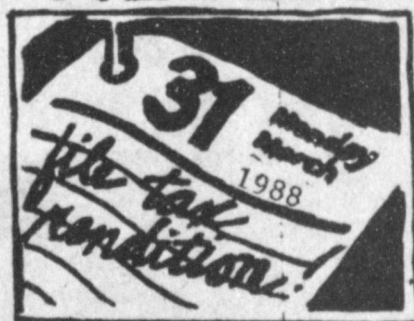
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PROPERTY TAX RENDITIONS



HELP YOU PROTECT YOUR RIGHTS AS A TAXPAYER

A rendition is a report to the appraisal district that lists all the taxable property you own or control on January 1, 1988. You may also give your opinion of the property's value, if you wish.

You must file a rendition if you own tangible personal property used to produce income—such as the machinery and equipment used by a business.

The appraisal district may require any taxpayer to file a rendition by sending the taxpayer a written notice and a rendition form.

You may want to file a rendition, even if you aren't required to file, to preserve some of your rights as a taxpayer:

- You put your correct mailing address on record so your tax bills will go to the right address. Even if your bill goes to the wrong address, the law still holds you responsible for paying your taxes on time or else paying extra charges for late payments.
- You can put your own opinion

of your property's value on record. If the appraisal district then places a higher value on your property, it must notify you in writing of the higher value and explain how you can protest that value to the appraisal review board.

- By filing a special type of rendition called a *report of decreased value*, you can notify the appraisal district of significant damage to your property that occurred in 1987. The district will send someone to verify the damage and take it into account when assigning a 1988 value to your property.

File renditions with your local appraisal district at the address shown below. Forms are available at this office.

The new deadline for 1988 renditions is March 31. You can get an extra 30 days if you ask for it in writing before the March 31 deadline.

For more information, get a free copy of the pamphlet, *Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies, Responsibilities*, at your appraisal district office or from the State Property Tax Board in Austin.
