Gustaf son, Executive Vice President of TSA, announced today Long-time advocates of man datory child safety seat usage Texas Safety Association is acting to help citizens somply with the new occupant protection law passed during the recent special session of the Tegislature,' said Gustafson. 'The to be operational within the next fex weeks,' he said.In announcing the Texas Safety Association programs, Gustafson issued a challenge to other organizations in the private sector to act swiftly to set up loaner programs to help citizens protect their young children even before the law manfect October 31, 1984
A total of 200 seats will be available at the Texas Safety Association locations. The programs will begin with 50 at the Austin headquarters office and 50 at the Safety Council of Greater Dallas and the Safety Council of Greater Houston, which are TSA affiliates.
Seats appropriate for both intants and todders have been chosen for the program. The three models available will be Century 100, Century 200, and the Questor One-Step. All three models can be used in either the front or back seats of vehicles and in either the frontward or rearwar
The new law will require residents of Texas to transport children up to two years old in federally approved child safety seats and children from two up to four years old in the child safety seats or safety belts
An offense is punishable by a fine of $\$ 25$ to $\$ 50$, and the Court shall shows proof of acquisition by purchase, loan, or rental within 10 days atter the offense.
The law exempts violations involving a person operating a vehicle for hire and a person transporting a child in a vehicle in which all seating positions equipped with the child
passenger safety seat systems or safety belts are occupied. safety belts are occupied.
The law is effective 1934, but only those offenses committed on or after January 1,1984 , will be prosecuted.
