



Purple Belts

After eight months of hard work Kelly and Steve Malaer of Santa Anna received their Purple Belts from Jerry Spearman, instructor for the Kempo Karate class in Coleman.

Kempo is Japanese style Karate as opposed to Tikwondo which is Korean style. Mr. Spearman stated that the average person would not note a difference but that the experienced belt could tell by the stances and approaches.

The l0th-7th levels are White Tip, Yellow, Orange and Purple Belts, respectively. Each of these belts takes approximately a month to achieve, sometimes longer depending on the person, but rarely, if ever. less.

The series that Kelly and Steve will be working on next are the 6th-3rd or Green, Green Tip, Blue and Brown Belts, respectively. Each of these belts takes at least two months to achieve.

The 2nd and 1st or Brown II and Brown III take approximately six months to achieve.


After 1st level or Brown III is achieved work begins on the lowest level Black Belt or 'Shodan'. Several degrees of Black Belts



PENSIONERS MAY OWE TAXES, INTERNAL REVENUE CAUTIONS

Pension income may be either fully or partially taxable, IRS says; and federal income taxes may be withheld from pension payments. Many retirees may find the withholding a convenience that can spare them penalties when they file their federal income tax returns. Withholding is not compulsory, and any person can apply to their payor for exemption. However, without tax withholding, a retiree who owed \$400 or more for 1984 may be liable

for an estimated tax penalty. A retiree who chooses not to havetax withheld from pension payments may pay quarterly estimated payments to avoid the penalty. Additional information can be found in Publication 505, 'Tax Withholding and Estimated Tax,' which is available free from the Internal Revenue Service.

From the Department of Health and Human Services we are told it is easy to take good hearing for granted, but in the world of the hearing impaired, words in a conversation may be misunderstood, musical notes might be missed, and a ringing doorbell may go unanswered. Hearing impairment ranges from difficulty understanding words or hearing certain sounds, to total deafness.

Because of fear, misinformation, or vanity, some people will not admit to themselves or anyone else that they have a hearing problem. It has been estimated, however, that approximately 30 percent of adults age 65 through 74 and about 50 percent of those age 75 through 79 suffer some degree of hearing loss. In the United States alone, more than 10 million older people are hearing

If ignored and untreated, hearing problems can grow worse, hindering communication with others, limiting social activities, and reducing constructive use of leisure time. People with hearing impairments often withdraw socially to avoid the frustration and embarassment of not being able to understand what is being said. In addition, hearingimpaired people may become suspicious of relatives and friends who 'mumble' or 'don't speak up'.

Hearing loss may cause an older hearing-impaired person to be wrongly labeled as 'confused', 'unresponsive', or 'uncooperative'. At times, the feelings of powerlessness and frustration experienced by elderly individuals trying to communicate with others

result in depression and withdrawal. While older people today are, in general, demanding greater satisfaction from life, those with hearing impairments often find the quality of their lives diminished. Fortunately, help is available, in the form of surgery, treament with medicines, special training, a hearing aid, or an alternate listening

Some of the common signs of hearing impairment include: words are difficult to understand; such sounds as the dripping of a faucet or the high notes of a violin cannot be heard; a hissing or ringing background noise is hear continually; another person's speech sounds slurred or mumbled; and, television programs, concerts, and social gatherings are less enjoyable because so much goes unheard.
