

Police Report

The theft of a collection container for the Muscular Dystrophy Association from Allsup's was reported to Chief of Police Russ Ellis, last Thursday. LABOR DAY SAFETY

The Department of Public Safety is estimating that as many as 54 deaths will result from traffic accidents during the Labor Day holiday. DPS Director Jim Adams said the estimate is based upon previous holiday experience.

'During the last Labor Day period, we had 52 deaths reported in both urban and rural accidents. The inclusion of subsequent deaths due to traffic-related injuries which occurred during the period brought the final count to 55,' Adams said.

'Obviously, we would be pleased to have no fatal accidents during this 78-hour holiday, but our statistics show that is not probable. We know that some drivers will insist upon driving while intoxicated, others will deliberately exceed the speed limits and still others will drive in a careless or reckless manner,' he said. 'Unfortunately, fatal accidents can be expected.'

'DWI and speeding are always the biggest contributing factors to our traffic deaths, but the failure to use would simply stay sober, drive within the speed limits and wear seat belts, fatalities would decline still further,' said Adams. DPS statistics for the year to date

reveal a two percent decrease in fatalities statewide. Adams says the decrease in total deaths may indicate more people are using seat 'While the decline in fatalities is

not as substantial as we'd like to see, we do feel that seat belt use is increasing and may be a factor in this decrease. It is an obvious lifesaving device that is available in the vast majority of our vehicles,' noted Adams.

DPS will conduct two major programs during the Labor Day period. Operation Motorcide will provide updated numbers of traffic deaths to the news media as the accidents occur. Operation Holiday stations troopers at locations where high volumes of traffic are anticipated or where violations are expected.

The boosters are presently considering several projects that would benefit the most athletes; among these, indoor-outdoor carpet in all dressing rooms used by junior high and high school athletes and the



POSTMASTER'S POINTERS

By Gary Absher

I have never lost anything in the mail. Why should I bother to pay the price of insurance?

Regardless of the accuracy and good service you have had in the past, the Postal Service handles up to 10,000 packages daily. We have an accuracy of better than 97 percent. That means some where along the way 3 percent of the parcels we handle are lost or damaged.

What can be insured?

Insurance is available for thirdclass, firstclass and priority mailed items. All parcels must bear complete addresses and be properly packaged to withstand normal handling in the mail.

What type of package preparation do you recommend for assuring that all items presented to the Postal Clerk will be acceptable for insurance?

A good packaging box is useless if it is wrapped with masking tape. Only use packaging tape or nylon reenforced strapping tape. Packaging labels have a habit of coming off even in normal handling. Simply use a felt tip pen to place the address and return address on only one side of the package. Place that mailing label on the inside of the package in case something happens to the address on the parces.

How do I file a claim for postal insurance?

For damaged claims, bring the parcel to any post office. Be sure to include the wrapper and all contents in the parcel. To file a lost claim, you must first wait 30 days after mailing, then bring the mailing receipt to any post office. Be sure to keep your receipt. The post office does not keep any record of mailing for insured mail.

The highlight of this weeks postal pointer is the cost of postal insurance. 45 cents covers liability up to \$20. 85 cents covers liability up to \$50. The insurance fees ingrease to cover the maximum insurance available \$400. A pamphlet is available from your Postmaster that explains insured mail in greater detail

He was a member of the First Baptist Church of Santa Anna and in Masonic Lodge No. 661.





Firewood

Firewood cut now will be dry by the time cold weather rolls around, says a forestry specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A & M University System. Dry firewood produces more heat and burns easier than freshly cut wood. Stack wood off the ground, in an open area to allow air circulation and cover to keep off the rain. When buying firewood, know the difference between a standard cord of wood and a 'face' cord. A standard cord is a stack 4 feet wide by 4 feet high and 8 feet long. A face cord is a stack 4 feet high and 8 feet long, but the pieces are only 18 to 24 inches long, making it only one-third to one-half a standard cord.
