Representative payees are agents authorized to cash Social ecurity checks for individuals unable to hande their own financial affairs. The 'rep-payee' can friend or neighbe, or anmy, a gency such as a nursing hor

The vast majority of rep. payees are honest, caring people whergy to thly give their time and help themselves. They are to be conmended.
But the investigation found that about 10 percent of reppayee situations are problem arrangements. In asystem that af ects tens of millions of people, potential for fraud.
Back in 1981, Bentsen asked the General Accounting office, an investigative arm of Congress, to study procedures for monitoring rep-payees. They reported back that, incredibly, there was no effective system.
The GAO advised the Senator that the affairs of some 1.5 million elderly, enfeebled or retarded Americans were being handled by rep-payees who are
