This year marks the 41st annual observance of National Farm Safety Week, cosponsored by the National Safety Council and the US Department of Agriculture. Farm Safety Week was founded in 1944 to fight accidents impairing wartime food and fiber production. The theme, MANAGE FOR BETTER SAFETY AND HEALTH, recognizes that safety and health must be a management goal if losses due to farming accidents and illnesses are to be controlled. Duvall states, 'I urge every man and woman engaged in farming and ranching to make basic

National Merit Scholarship

The names of some 15,000 high school seniors representing all 50 states are being released today as Semifinalists in the 30th annual Merit Program, which is conducted by National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC). NMSC is publicly recognizing students in this select group as a means of spotlighting their academic talents and broadening their higher education opportunities. These Semifinalists must advance to Finalist standing in order to continue in the competition for about 5,500 Merit Scholarships, valued at over \$20 million, to be awarded in the spring of 1985.

Three distinctly different types of awards will be offered. Every Finalist will be considered for one of the single-payment 'National' awards that are allocated by state, in numbers proportional to each state's percentage of the total US high school graduating class. Winners in each state will be the finalists judged to have the strongest combination of academic and extracurricular accomplishments. In 1985, these nonrenewable awards will be increased in value from \$1,000 to \$2,000 and 1,800 National Merit \$2,000 Scholarships will be offered. More than one-third of them will be sponsored by cor-

Only Finalists who meet preferential criteria of award grantors will compete for about 3,700 four-year Merit Scholarships of two types. About 1,400 will be corporate-sponsored awards which provide between \$500 and \$2,000 (or more) per year. Corporate sponsors may specify their four-year scholarships for Finalists who are children of their employees, residents of an area served by the sponsor, or students with career goals the company or business organization wishes to encourage. The remaining 2,300 four-year Merit Scholarships will be financed by colleges and universities for Finalists who will attend their institutions: winners of these awards receive stipends ranging from \$250 to \$2,000 for each undergraduate year of study at the sponsor college.

The 1985 competition began last fall when over one million juniors attending some 18,000 secondary schools throughout the nation took the qualifying test, the Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude **Test-National Merit Scholarship** Qualifying Test. The top scorers

To be considered for Merit Scholarships, Semifinalists must become Finalists by documenting high academic performance throughout high school, receiving the unqualified recommendation and endorsement of their principals, and confirming their earlier PSAT-NMSQT scores on the Scholastic Aptitude Test, They also must provide information about themselves, including school and community activities and achievements, interests and goals. Over 13,500 of the Semifinalists are expected to meet the rigorous standards required to become Finalists, and about 40 percent of the distinguished Finalists will be offered Merit Scholarships.

NMSC is a non-profit organization whose activities are financed by over 600 independent sponsors, without federal or state funds. The 1985 class of Merit Scholars to be announced next spring will join some 84,000 other academic champions who have received Merit Scholarships worth \$247 million since the first Merit Program was completed in 1956.



Express mail was created by the postal service to provide customers with overnight or next-day delivery. The price for express mail is \$9.35. This price includes insurance and next-day delivery to destinations where overnight connections are available. For cities not on next-day network we guarantee second day delivery. If the postal service guarantees next-day delivery by 3:00 p.m. and the letter is delivered at 4:00 p.m., what recourse do I have? The highlight of todays Postal Pointer is that we stand behind our express mail guarantee 100 percent. If we don't deliver on time, we refund the entire \$9.35. What kind of success and accuracy has the postal service experienced over the last few years with express mail? We maintain a success rate of better than 95



As much as \$3.6 billion a year in Social Security benefits is taken from older Americans who are incapable of caring for themselves. This is the conclusion of a re-

cent Social Security Administration investigation prompted by United States Senator Lloyd Bentsen's legislation to crack down on fraud committed by 'representative payees.'

Representative payees are agents authorized to cash Social Security checks for individuals unable to handle their own financial affairs. The 'rep-payee' can be a member of the family, a friend or neighbor, or an outside agency such as a nursing home.

Rep-Payee Problems

The vast majority of reppayees are honest, caring people who selflessly give their time and energy to help people who can't help themselves. They are to be commended.

But the investigation found that about 10 percent of rep-payee situations are 'problem arrangements.' In a system that affects tens of millions of people, that indicates a tremendous potential for fraud.

Back in 1981, Bentsen asked the General Accounting Office, an investigative arm of Congress, to study procedures for monitoring rep-payees. They reported back that, incredibly, there was no effective system.

The GAO advised the Senator that the affairs of some 1.5 million elderly, enfeebled or retarded Americans were being handled by rep-payees who are not members of their family. In

Texas alone, there are an estimated 93,000 recipients whose Social Security checks are cashed by rep-payees not related to them.

Senator Bentsen introduced legislation requiring the Social Security Administration to develop an effective monitoring system. His bill also increased penalties for rep-payees who unlawfully abuse the trust placed in them.

In response to this legislation, and to pressure from subsequent court decisions, the Social Security Administration did its own investigation recently and now has developed a system to monitor and audit rep-payees.

But effective policing of the system is only half the solution. We need to provide a more effective deterrent against fraud by a rep-payee. The penalties should be tougher. Second offense would become a felony, with a maximum of five years and a \$25,000 fine

The Senate has approved Bentsen's legislation. A House-Senate conference has included it in legislation amending our Social Security disability laws,

Elderly, infirm or retarded Americans, who cannot manage to pay their own bills, cash their checks or provide for their own needs, are among our nation's most vulnerable citizens.

We must act decisively to deter unscrupulous individuals who would prey on those least able to protect themselves.

Flood of '36 Remembered

September 1936, some 48 years ago, the Colorado River came down reaching the highest point remembered by old timers. Huge trees washed away that had stood for many years.

The flood waters kept building up until they covered the roadbed of the new bridge on Highway 283, which had been completed in 1933. It rose nine feet and seven inches above the floor of the bridge, a supporting beam had slipped about half an inch and a giant river where two spans meet, a concrete chip weighing possibly two pounds slivered, the middle of the span slipped about one inch down stream.

The amendment creates a tribunal to review recommendations of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct for removal or retirement of a judge or justice. The amendment also provides for appeal of the review tribunal's decision to the Supreme Court of Texas and grants an accused judge the right to discovery of evidence. The proposition will appear on the ballot as follows: The constitutional amendment relating to the membership of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct and the authority and procedure to discipline active judges, certain retired and former judges, and certain masters and magistrates of the courts."



House Joint Resolution 19 prooses a constitutional amendment that restructures the Permanent University Fund to provide: (1) for the expansion of the institutions eligible to participate in the bonding capacity of the fund to include the components of The University of Texas and Texas A&M University systems that have been added to those two systems of higher education since the Permanent University Fund was last restructured by constitutional amendment; (2) for the expansion of the purposes for which bond proceeds can be expended from new construction to include major repair and rehabilitation projects and the acquisition of major capital equipment (e.g., computers and laboratory equipment) and library books and materials; (3) for an increase in the bonding capacity from 20% (2% for The University of Texas System and 13 for the Texas A&M University System) to 30% (20% for The University of Texas System and 10% for Texas A&M University System) of the value of the assets (exclusive of real estate) in the Permanent University Fund in order to provide sufficient bond proceeds to care for the addition of 10 new institutions to those authorized to participate in the Permanent University Fund bonding program and to care for the expanded pur-poses for which the bond proceeds can be spent; and (4) for the dedication of the dividends, interest, and other income from the Permanent University Fund remaining after payment of principal and interest due on bonds and notes issued, to the provision of support and mainteance (over and above normal legislative appropriations) for Texas A&M University in Brazos County, Prairie View A&M University, and The University of Texas at Austin. If the Senator who is elected ceases to be a Senator before the next general election, another Senator must be elected according to the above procedure to perform the Lieutenant Governor's duties. The President pro tempore would be required to perform the Lieutenant Governor's duties pending the election of one of its members by the

committee of the whole Senate. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the state senate to fill a vacancy in the office of lieutenant governor.

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 73 proposes a constitutional amendment that permits the use of public funds and credit for payment of premiums on non-assessable life, health, or accident insurance policies and annuity contracts issued by a mutual insurance company authorized to do business in this state. The constitutional prohibition against a grant of public money to an individual. association, or corporation or against becoming a stockholder in a corporation, association, or com-pany has limited life and health group policies of political subdivisions to non-mutual insurance companies. PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 22 proposes a constitutional amendment which increases the per diem of members of the Legislature. The amount of per diem allowed during calendar year would be equal to the maximum amount set in federal income tax statutes as of January 1 of that same year as a deduction for ordinary and necessary business expenses incurred by a state legislator. Current per diem is \$30; the maximum deduction is now \$75.



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On Saturday, October 20, 1984, West Texans will have an opportunity to attend a Texas Sesquicentennial Oral History Workshop. Organizers of the daylong meeting are the Texas Oral History Association, the Texas 1986 Sesquicentennial Commission, the Texas Historical Commission, and the Texas State Library. The local cosponsor for the workshop will be the Fort Concho Museum.

Held at the Fort Concho Museum in San Angelo from 9 a.m. to 3:30 p.m., the workshop will focus on teaching oral history skills-recording memories of past eventswhich can be used between 1984 and 1986 in observing the Texas Sesquicentennial. The workshop is open to the public without charge, and

each participant will receive a free learning packet.

The workshop will cover such subiects as beginning an oral history project, using local sources, conducting historical interviews, transcribing and editing oral memoirs, and working with recording equipment

and advanced techology. Sessions are planned for both beginners and experienced oral historians, with attention give to using oral history in

Others) and editor of ' The Loblolly Book': Dr Thomas L. Charlton, director of Baylor University Institute for Oral History, president of the Texas Oral History Association, and author of 'Oral History for Texans'; and Ms. Rebecca S. Jimenez, assistant director at the Baylor institute, specialist in technical processing and editing of oral memoirs,
