# CHANGES DUE AT SCHOOL

The Special Session of the Texas Legislature passed House Bill 72 that will have immediate implications on Santa Anna Independent School District. Some of the changes that will affect the Santa Anna Schools are as follows:

a.) Beginning with the 1985-86 school year pre-kindergarten classes shall be offered for one-half day. This will be for four-year-old children and only if 15 or more eligible students are identified. Eligible students are those who are unable to comprehend the English language or those whose family income is at or below subsistence level.

b.) Each teacher and administrator must pass a competency test provided by the State Board of Education by June 30, 1986.

c.) The Texas Assessment of Basic Skills (TABS) will be expanded to include grades 1, 3, 5, 7, 9, 11 and 12 in 1985-86. The twelfth grade test will be administered next year to both 11th and 12th graders. Those not passing all sections will be given opportunities to be retested in the 11th and 12th grades. A STUDENT MAY NOT GRADUATE UNTIL HE OR SHE HAS PASSED ALL SECTIONS OF THE EXIT TEST.

d.) To participate in any extracurricular activity during the fall (1984) semester, a student must have passed at least three academic classes the previous semester and be currently passing four academic classes seven days before the activity. No student may miss more than 10 days during the year for school related or non-school related activities. To participate in extracurricular activities during the spring semester, a student must pass

ALL subjects with a grade of at least 70. If a student makes below 70 in one subject he or she may not participate for the next grade reporting period (six weeks).

e.) A student who has not maintained a grade average of at least 70 during the school year may not be advanced from one grade level to the next.

f.) A student may not be given credit for a class if the student has more than five unexcused absences during a semester.

g.) Grade notices will be sent to parents each six weeks. Grade reports MUST be signed by the parent and returned to the school. If a student is failing a class, a parent teacher conference must be scheduled during the conference period of the teacher.

h.) Beginning September 4, 1984, all teachers and aides, except coaches, will remain in their rooms on Tuesdays and Wednesdays until 4:30 to provide tutorial service for students. Coaches will meet with athletes at 7:15 a.m. on Tuesdays and Wednesdays for tutorial service. Beginning the second six weeks, any student failing will be required to attend these tutorial services until a passing grade is obtained. The Santa Anna Independent School District is NOT required to furnish transportation for these students.

These are but a few of the changes that have become STATE LAW. All provisions of House Bill 72 and all other Education Laws and SBOE rules apply to all school districts in Texas.

# Lone Star Files Rate Increase

Lone Star Gas 'Co. Manager, J. C. Wilkerson, today filed an appliction for a rate increase which would raise the average residential customer's monthly bill in Santa Anna about \$2.91 in the winter and .91 cents in the summer.

Based on Lone Star's rate application, a residential customer who uses an average of six thousand cubic feet of gas a month paid \$38.65 for gas service in the winter. Under the requested rate, that same customer would pay \$41.96.

Commercial gas customers rates would also increase under the requested rate schedule.

Our customers are accustomed to dependable natural gas service," says Wilkerson. 'This rate increase is necessary to continue a high performance level and for other necessary expenses, such as maintaining and improving the local pipeline distribution system, which are vital to dependable service.'

Lone Star's last rate increase in Santa Anna became effective in January, 1984.

Since that time, every business, including Lone Star, has experienced increased operating expenses,' says Wilkerson. 'And, of course, unlike other businesses that can raise their prices as expenses go up, we must apply to the city council for a rate increase. No one likes rising prices, but any business must earn enough money to meet operating expenses and still achieve a reasonable profit. Even though our expenses have gone up, Lone Star still has one of the lowest average operating costs per customer when compared to any of the other major gas utilities in Texas.'





## Dept. of Health

A case of primary amebic meningoencephalitis has occurred in a twelve-year-old-Uvalde boy who, reportedly, swam in the Frio River at Garner State Park, Uvalde County. This form of meningitis is caused by free-living Naeglaria or Acanthameba amebas, normally found in many fresh-water ponds, lakes, and rivers. They multiply rapidly in stagnant waters at temperatures between 85 and 100 degrees F.

Human illness may result within seven to ten days after exposure to the amebas. Infections may be acquired when infested water gets into the nasal passages. Primary amebic meningoencephalitis is characterized by sudden onset of headache, fever, nausea, vomiting, and stiff neck; almost always, death occurs within ten days.

Any body of water which is or becomes stagnant can support rapid growth of these amebas. This includes lakes, ponds, rivers, and even swimming pools which are improperly or inadequately treated.

There is no way to predict who might become infected. It is not practical to attempt to place all potential sites of exposure off-limits for swimming. The actual risk is lower than many risks the public accepts every day. Therefore, the Texas Department of Health can ony warn of the possibility and request that local health departments and the news media join it to inform the public regarding the conditions of local bodies of water used for swimming. Each individual and, in the case of children, parents must make the decision as to whether swimming in stagnant water under present conditions is worth the risk involved.

### Vital Records

Vital records are just that . . .

In this age of bureaucratic documentation, everyone has need of copies of records of birth, death, marriage, or divorce. An application for benefits from the Veterans Administration or the Social Security or for a passport must have the information contained in these records and sometimes copies of the records

These records are stored permanently by municipalities, coun ties, states and the Federal government.

The Consumer Education Research Center found that there was little uniformity on where the records were available. In some states birth records are kept by the city and some by the county. To further complicate matters, often older records are held in a different place than current ones.

The non-profit consumer group found many people had great difficulty in locating the records they needed. In many cases it was necessary to make expensive long distance telephone calls. For that reason CERC is publishing a book



THE STATES PATCHWORK QUILT PARADE



QUILT FOR CONNECTICUT Charter Oak

Back into Colonial history we go again for this picturesque pattern. There are many interpretations of oak and acorn, this being one of the most naturalistic versions that we have found. However, it is so gracefully conventionalized in its placing that the most critical will approve of the design.

Background blocks may be white, cream or pale green, cut 18 inches square. Dotted lines in the sketch indicate center creases only for help; in arranging the leaves and acorns.

All appliques cut a seam larger than these patterns; baste back this edge except where it is to be covered as the top curve of the acorn nut. Place the four groupings identically. basting carefully into place, and finally blindstitch down with threads

matching your materials.

Twenty blocks would finish a quilt center 72 x 90 inches to which an 8-inch or wider scalloped border would be added at foot and sides. The larger leaf with the acorns might be placed right and left on this for applique repeat.

Eight yards of background material with 1 2-3 yards of dark and one of lighter green would be needed for the quilt with 4 yard each of dark brown and ecru.




