Effective

New rates for West Texas Utilities Company customers became effective Friday, November 16, by order of the Public Utility Commission of

The Commission earlier had approved a settlement agreement reached by WTU, the intervening cities and the PUC staff. The agreement gives WTU an annual base rate increase of about \$12.4 million and a fuel charge decrease of about \$13.3. million. This would result in a net decrease in revenue for WTU, to allow for an expected decline cost of boiler fuel during the coming year.

The new rates, which include a winter-summer differential, will raise average residential rates by about 4.2 per cent. The rates will be slightly lower than current rates during the November-April period, but higher during the rest of the year. This feature was insisted upon by the PUC staff to encourage conservation during the peak usage months.

Bills for all electric meter readings recorded after Friday will reflect the new rates, according to Holman King, WTU vice president and director of corporate relations.

# Plant Place

### by Edith Martin

I have had several requests to write about the care of the Christmas cactus. I have done quite a bit of research on the plant and msot all sources agree that few house plants are more rewarding than the Christmas cactus. It is not only a prolific bloomer, but the plants have been known to live for generations. Its botanical name is 'Schlumbugera Budgessui'. They are a easy to care for plant, but do require year round care. They will adapt to a sunny window indoors, a sunporch, a hanging basket under a shade tree, or bury a pot to the rim under shrubery in flower beds in warm weather. They must be protected from frost. An abundance of Christmas blooms depends on the kind of care you give throughout the year. Owners of these plants offer different kinds of advice, but basically the proper light and moisture are the secret of sucess. Over exposure to light is one reason most plants do not flower. The plant should be in its permanet home for

blooms when day light time is about

The plant does wellin a light poreous potting mixture of garden soil sand and peat moss, preferrably in unglazed clay pots. Soil shold be shoghtly moist to the touch dring growth and blooming stage. If your palt gegins to drop its buds, look for insects, insuficient or too mujch light, or the air may be too warm

and dry. After heavy blooming don't be surprised if your plant branches lose their shine and become pale. There may even be some of the branches die back. When this happens trim away any parts of branches that have turned yellow. Cut these away at the joints so as not to leave a

piece of plant to die. Generally plants do not like to be disturbed but repotting is necessary when roots begin to grow from drainage outlet. Transfer the plant to slightly larger pot. Never transplant while the plant is in bloom. You can start a Christmas catcus by rooting jointed cuttings in moist peat moss or moist poting soil in which yhou wish the plant to grow.

Although lotteries are legal in Dickson will be remembered here as some states, they are still illegal in Texas. In addition, it is illegal to send lottery information into the United States from other countries. At least one Canadian organization is sending gambling information into Texas. Those who respond through the mails are also in violation of federal laws, according to postal authorities.

The post office is conducting an inoperation and will attempt to stop any mail going back to the lottery operators. So, if you have tried to enter such a lottery, don't be surprised if your entry is returned to you marked "Return to Sender."


Most people do not realize that lotteries conducted for charitable purin order to help collect money for refugees or other needy people.

Either way, the law is the same. Persons who set up the lottery and persons who buy lottery tickets are committing criminal acts.

## **Fabric Softeners Affect** Flame

# Retardance

The flame retardant children's sleepwear you buy may not stay that way unless you take care in laundering it, says a Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service clothing specialist.

'Normal home washing is not a problem,' says Alma Fonseca, 'But several research studies indicate that using fabric softeners will reduce the effectiveness of flame retardant finishes.'

Tests have been conducted on 100 percent cotton children's sleepwear that was treated with wash-cycle fabric softeners, rinse-cycle softeners and softeners added to the dryer, she explains.

The best performance for fire retardance occured when repeated launderings took place without use of a fabric softener at all, reports Fonseca. The sleepwear treated with a dryer fabric softener still met standards for flame retardance, although it did not perform as well as those without fabric softener.

The rinse-cycle softener caused some reduction in fire retardance and the wash-cycle softener had the greatest effect, she says.

"The wash and rinse cycle fabric softeners have the most effect on flame retardance because they build up in the fabrics over repeated washings,' Fonseca observes. 'In the case of wash-cycle softeners the fabrics will actually gain weight during launderings.

Additional test of different fabric types, show that 100 percent cotton sleepwear is more likely to be affected by this build-up of fabric softener, she notes. Sleepwear made from 80 percent acetate and 20 percent polyester still met the children's fire retardance standard even after the use of rinse cycle

fabric softeners. Parents who buy 100 percent cotton sleepwear should wash it without the use of fabric softeners for maximum flame retardance, says the specialist. Unfortunately, this will result in a less soft feel to the garment. If you find it necessary to use a softener, stick to dryer-cycle product, she advises.

For acetate, polyester sleepwear either rinse, or dryer cycle fabric softeners will not affect the flame retardance qualities of the garments, Forseca says.

### Parvo Virus

The virus which is highly contagious has been detected in several animals in Santa Anna. One of such cases was a liter doberman pups. The liter was a total loss.



THE STATES PATCHWORK QUILT PARADE




Since Georgia honors the Cherokee Rose as her State Flower, we are happy to here show a beautiful old quilt designed from the blossom. There are many heirloom quilts from this design, carefully saved because they were too beautiful to use for common wear.

Blocks as planned here are 8 inches square, the flower and outermost leaves placing about 3/4 inches from the block edges. Appliques always baste back seam, except where they are to be overlapped, place carefully, baste down and finally are blindstitched with matching color thread. To turn back an even fold around small circle of yellow, run a tiny gathering thread as close the edge as possible, and

draw in to size. Petals slightly overlap each other and in some antique quilts were padded a bit with

The setting together of this quilt is very lovely; lattice strips of lighter green or tan border all of the 68 blocks which are placed obliquely. Large corner double the design, centering with a third applique rose. Plain half blocks and border of shallow scallops complete a beautiful plan.

### Turn Turkey Leftovers

### Into Exciting Meals

(AUSTIN)--Whether you love it or hate it, eating leftovers is a regular part of the holiday ritual. For most of us that means turkey--several times in as many guises--until the bird has been picked

clean.

At 85 cents a pound, a 14-pound turkey will cost \$11.90. At today's prices that's still a bargain, but it is also an investment that requires planning to get the most for your money. Allowing 1 pound of ready-to-stuff turkey per person, a bird this size will comfortably feed a gathering of six to eight with food to spare. If you prepare leftovers with care and imagination, you will keep the family happy and stretch your turkey dollar at the same time.

Gobblers are valuable birds. Last year they carned Texas producers more then \$45 million. Turkey production nationally was valued at \$1.2 billion. Though more turkey is eaten during the holidays than at any other time of year, increased demand for further processed products such as turkey weiners and turkey ham has greatly increased year-round consumption.

It is during the holidays that tradition holds sway, and whole roasted turkeys become the center of dining attention.

Turkey that is not eaten the day it is cooked must be stored carefully to reduce the risk of food poisoning. Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA) home economists recommend-refrigerating or freezing turkey leftovers within two hours after serving. Bacteria that cause food poisoning can multiply to undesirable levels on perishable food left at room temperature any longer than that.

Large quantities of leftovers should be divided into smaller portions and stored in several small or shallow covered containers. The smaller the portion, the more quickly food will chill. Leftover turkey will keep in the refrigerator about four days, stuffing and gravy, two. For longer storage, package items in freezer paper or

heavy-duty aluminum foil and freeze them. Proper wrapping will prevent "freezer burn"--those white, dried out patches on the surface of food that makes it tough and tasteless. Gravy and broth can be placed in plastic freezer containers, with a half-inch space at the top. Gravy and stuffing should be eaten within a month. Turkey placed in airtight containers and frozen will keep up to six months.

Turkey is a good addition to diets, especially if you want to cut back on fat. Though it has about the same amount of cholesterol as an equal portion of lean red meat, turkey has no marbling, which lowers its fat content. Most of the

fat in turkey is contained in its skin. By removing cooked skin, you can reduce the amount of fat in a cup of diced light and dark turkey to nine grams. Keeping this in mind, TDA home economists tested two recipes using leftovers minus the sauces and gravies that enhance the flavor of turkey but increase a dish's fat content. One is a stir-fry, the other a Mexican dish. Try them this season and avoid the post-holiday, eating doldrums.

### TURKEY TAMALE PIE

- 2 C. chicken broth
- 2 tsp. salt, divided 1 1/2 C. yellow cornmeal, divided

While Thanksgiving holiday festivities are a time for celebration, gaiety and feasts, the possibility of food poisoning can turn a pleasant family get-together into an unhappy event.

Because of the handling of large amounts of food, the preparation of food in a busy kitchen, and the serving of buffet style meals, the possibility of food poisoning is increased during the holiday season.

According to Dr. C. David Morehead, Director of the Division of Infectious Disease in the Department of Pediatrics at Scott and White Clinic and Hospital in Temple, 'The nation's foremost food hazard is food poisoning due to bacteria. The initial symptoms may include diarrhea, vomiting and stomach cramps, and the major contributing factors to this illness are faulty food handling practices in the home or at food service establishments.'

Bacteria are widely distributed in nature but are usually harmless. To grow and reproduce, they require warmth, moisture and a source of food. Certain bacteria are normal inhabitants of the gastrointestinal tract. Unwashed hands can transmit these bacteria to food. Normal bacteria of the skin, nose and throat can be spread by a cough or a sneeze or just by touching foods.

'Many cases of food poisoning are unreported, but over half of all reported cases of food poisoning are caused by such bacteria as salmonella, staphylococcus and clostridium perfringens,' explained Dr. Morehead. 'Another form of food poisoning is clostridium botulism,' he added. 'It is rare but sometimes fatal.'

Staphylococcus aureus organisms are most frequently found in the nose and throat, on the hair and skin and in skin infection. When in food,

the bactera multiplies rapidly at room temperature and produces a toxin. Cooking does not destroy the toxin. Reheating leftovers that have been at room temperature for hours is not a safeguard against staphylococcus toxin poisoning.

'The best way to deal with food poisoning is to prevent it,' noted Dr. Morehead, listing the following information which may help.

 When shopping, meat, poultry and dairy products should be picked up last to minimize the time they remain unrefrigerated in transport.
 Go directly home to refrigerate perishables. Freeze fresh meat and poultry immediately if you plan to keep them longer than 3 to 5 days.

2. Do not buy foods stored above the frostline in store freezers. These foods may have been partially thawed.

3. Do not buy eggs with cracked

4. Thawing of meat and poultry should be done in the refrigerator or in a microwave oven on the defrost cycle. If it is necessary to hasten thawing, use a watertight wrapping under cold water. Keep water cold by changing it frequently. Cook promptly after thawing.

5. When preparing foods, be sure to keep hands, utensils, cutting boards and counter tops clean by using hot, soapy water.

6. Dispose of food from cans that leak or bulge.

7. While preparing or storing food, keep hands away from mouth, nose and hair. Do not use hands to mix foods. Avoid using fingers or utensils you are cooking with to taste food.

8. Persons with infectious illnesses or skin infections should not prepare food.


9. If stuffing poultry, do so just prior to cooking it. To avoid undercooking, use a meat thermometer. Remove all stuffing after cooking. Stuffing left inside the poultry stays warm for a long period of time, allowing for easy and rapid bacteria growth.

10. When serving buffets, keep servings small and replenish dishes as necessary from the refrigerator or stove. When guests have finished eating, put perishables into the refrigerator. Foods left on the buffet table for more than 2 hours increase the risk of food poisoning.

 Leftovers should be refrigerated promptly and thoroughly heated before serving.

12. Throw food out if you know it has been handled carelessly or left out more than 2 hours. Foods seldom change in taste, odor, or appearance when unsafe to eat.

Dr. Morehead concluded with three simple rules which should be followed to increase the likelihood of food safety during the holidays: Keep food hot (above 140 degrees F or 60 degrees C), keep food cold (below 40 degrees F or 4 degrees C) and keep food clean.



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


