Over the last decade, education levels of both war veterans and nonveterans increased, but the difference between them has diminished.

In 1973, the proportion of veterans completing at least high school was 24 percent greater than nonveterans, the proportion finished college was Il percent greater, while the proportion not reaching high school was 47 percent lower. The median years of education for veterans was 12.5 compared to 12.2 for nonveterans.

By 1983, the education profile of both groups was very similar. The median years of education for both was the same, 12.7. Significantly, a slightly higher proportion of nonveterans were college graduates than veterans, which reverses the picture of a decade earlier. This is attributed to the increased educational achievement of the Vietnam era age group, 25 to 39, where the

proprotion of veterans declined.



NonVeteran compared

For the most part, male war veterans have higher personal income and higher educational attainment than their nonveteran counterparts but the differences have diminished over the years, according to a report compiled by the Veterans Administration.

The veterans studied were those with defined wartime service from World Wards I and II, Korea and Vietnam.

The median personal income of male war veterans in 1982 was \$18,760, nearly 50 percent higher than the \$12,710 median income for male nonveterans. Since 1972, this difference has remained fairly cons-



the relatively high-income-earning middle and older ages Vietnam era veterans, aged 25 to

39, have a median personal income 16 percent higher than that of their nonveteran counterparts: \$19,640 for veterans compared with \$16,870 for nonveterans.



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

Over the last decade, education levels of both war veterans and nonveterans increased, but the difference between them has diminished.

In 1973, the proportion of veterans completing at least high school was 24 percent greater than nonveterans, the proportion finished college was ll percent greater, while the proportion not reaching high school was 47 percent lower. The median years of education for veterans was 12.5 compared to 12.2

for nonveterans. By 1983, the education profile of both groups was very similar. The median years of education for both was the same, 12,7. Significantly, a slightly higher proportion of nonveterans were college graduates than veterans, which reverses the picture of a decade earlier. This is attributed to the increased educational achievement of the Vietnam era age group, 25 to 39, where the proprotion of veterans declined.

The quilt show, which has a deadline for entries of December 1 will be a feature of the second annual Rolling Plains Cotton Show, to be held those dates at the Activity Center. The Cotton Show is conducted by the Texas Agricultural

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Extension Service to promote cotton, a major commodity in the Rolling Plains.

In addition to the 21 counties of the **Rolling Plains District, the contest is** open to residents of: Scurry County in the South Plains District; Clay County in the North Central District; Stephens County in the Central District; and Callahan, Coleman, Concho, Mitchell, Nolan, Runnels, Taylor and Tom Green Counties in the West Central

District.
