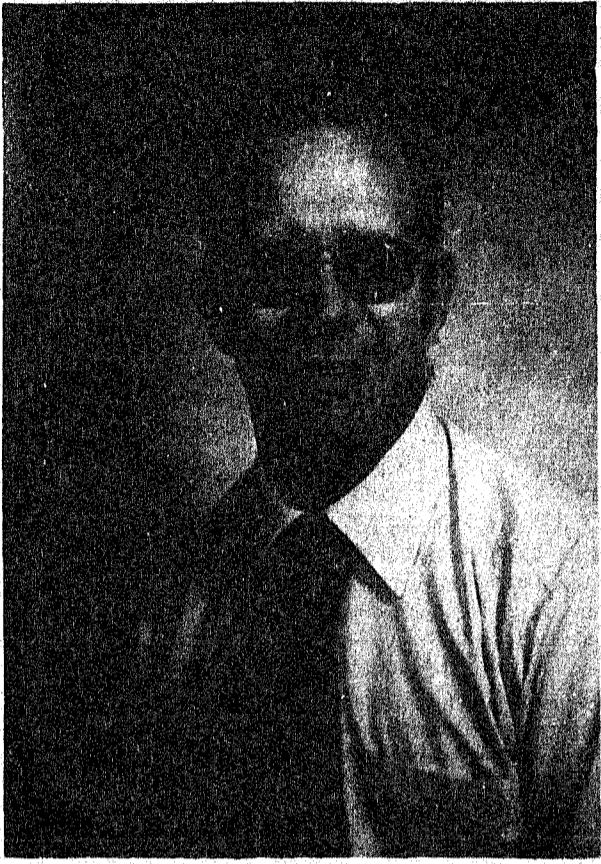

Candidates Deadline Nears

John Pearce, the first candidate to apply for the city ballot, withdrew his application for a city council position and has filed to run for mayor of Santa Anna. Edd Hartman, incumbent mayor, has not indicated if he will seek another term of office.

Joe Guerrero has filed for re-election to the city council. Garland Morgan has also signed an application for a place on the ballot. Dickie Horner is the other incumbent, having served two terms on the council.

Deadline for filing a place on the ballot is Wednesday, March 6. Applications for council or mayoral positions should be completed at Santa Anna City Hall.

The race for the Santa Anna School Board continues with five men running for two positions.

The positions of board members Bill Martin and Max Eubank will expire.

Bill Martin has applied to run for re-election. Others joining him in this race are Gary Absher, Danny Kellar, Wade Jones and Don Bible.

Thursday, March 7 is the date for the regular monthly meeting of the Santa Anna City Council.

A special session of the council held on February 19, 1985 at 6:30 p.m. in the Mountain City Community Center.

After the session was called to order, an installment agreement prepared by Harrell Feldt of Stubbeman, McRae, Sealy, Laughlin and

Browder, Inc., Attorneys at Law in Midland, Texas, was presented to Mr. Benton and Mr. Starnes. This installment agreement was prepared to set up an arrangement of payments for the city of Santa Anna to make to Mr. Benton and Mr. Starnes regarding the civil action which occurred nearly a year ago. The gentlemen, who have received \$4,250 to date, are still owed \$11,900.20 in principal by the city.

Mr. Benton and Mr. Starnes have at this time refused to sign the agreement until some of the legal terminology used in the agreement is cleared up.

In other matters occurring in the special session, Mr. Griffin was told that they would check to see if repairing his driveway was their responsibility.

Santa Anna City Secretary Pat Rutherford, filling in for Glenn Copeland, presented the standard Reaffirmation of Commitment for the Housing Authority of Santa Anna.

Three workshops were held during after this session.

Les Wilkerson of the COG spoke to the council regarding a Reserve Police Force. The council learned much but has made no decision to follow through with this type force at the present.

The position of Dog Catcher was a second topic of discussion in the workshop. The final topic was the Fannin Street opening.

Rural Heroism Nominees Sought

Nominations are now being sought for the 1985 Rural Heroism Award.

The award is designed to recognize individuals who have risked their lives at an accident scene to save another. The act of heroism must have taken place during 1984.

The Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council annually sponsors the award program to help promote rural safety, says Dr. Gary Nelson, safety engineer for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System, and a council member.

All nominations must be submitted by March 15 to Nelson at 303 Scoates Hall, Texas A&M University, College Station, TX 77843.

Individuals who performed acts of life-savings heroism in a farm or

ranch environment during 1984 are eligible for the award, points out Nelson. The nomination should be a thorough report of the incident, including names of all persons involved, the location and date. News pictures and stories also will be helpful if available.

According to Nelson, highway or transportation accidents, industrial accidents or recreational accidents on public property are among those not considered eligible. However, exceptions may be made when the incident involves farm and ranch families or employees.

The recipient of the 1985 Rural Heroism Award will be announced at the annual meeting of the Texas Safety Association at the Shamrock Hilton Hotel in Houston on April 1.

Judges School

On Tuesday, March 5, 1985, staff from the office of the Secretary of State will be in Abilene to conduct an Election Judges School for persons who will be involved in conducting upcoming local elections.

The school will cover all aspects of the elections process which fall under the administrative jurisdiction of Election Judges. A video visual presentation, covering pre-election preparations, will be featured and a time for questions and answers will be provided. Handbooks for Election Judges and Clerks will also be provided.

The session will run from 10 a.m. to 12 noon; there is no charge for the

school. City Secretaries and designated Election Judges, School Superintendents and Board officials, and officials from Soil and Water Conservation Districts and Special Districts from throughout the area are among those toward whom the school will be directed.

West Central Texas Council of Governments will be hosting the session in its Administrative Offices, 1025 East North 10th Street at the corner of Judge Ely Boulevard in Abilene. Persons interested in attending should contact WCTCOG at (915) 672-8544 for further information.

Junior Miss Competition

Plans are being finalized for the West Texas Junior Miss Scholarship competition to be held in Abilene on April 26 and 27. The program will be in Cullen Auditorium on the campus of Abilene Christian University.

The Junior Miss Program has held scholarship competition nationwide since 1958. The program is sponsored locally by Western Horizon Chapter of the American Business Women's Association, a non-profit organization of working women dedicated to giving scholarships to girls beyond the high school level.

Attractive scholarships to the top 5 winners are being offered by McMurry College, Abilene Christian University, Hardin Simmons University and Western Horizon Chapter of ABWA. Other awards and prizes are being offered by local businesses. Young ladies will be judged on five categories: Scholastic Achievement (15 percent); Physical Fitness (15 percent); Poise and Appearance (15 percent); Judges Interview (35 percent); and On-Stage Presentation of Talent (20 percent). Prizes or trophies will be awarded to the winner in each of the 5 categories.

Winner of the local contest is eligible to participate in the state contest in New Braunfels next August, where they will be competing for even more in scholarships. The national competition will be in Mobile, Alabama.

Deadline for contestants to enter is March 8. Letters regarding the competition have been mailed to the principals of all the high schools in the eleven-county area covered by the West Texas competition. These counties are Coke, Coleman, Fisher, Haskell, Jones, Knox, Mitchell, Nolan, Runnels, Taylor and Throckmorton.

The contest is open to girls who are now juniors in high school (seniors in the 1985-86 school year).

Rehearsals will be in Cullen Auditorium on Friday evening, April 26, and Saturday, April 27. The show will be in Cullen Auditorium, located on the campus of Abilene Christian University, on Saturday night, April 27. The public will be welcome for \$3 per person.

Contestants need a sponsor, sponsorships sell for \$50. The sponsor may be an individual, a business or an organization. We urge each girl to find her own sponsor if she can. If she can't and wants to participate, we will endeavor to help her find a sponsor. The sponsor has no other obligation besides the \$50 entrance fee, which would be tax deductible since Junior Miss and American Business Women are non-profit organizations and the money is used to pay for scholarships. Each sponsor will receive two free tickets to the Saturday night performance and will be recognized publicly during

the program and also in the souvenir program booklet.

Michelle's Fund Reaches \$1,405.00

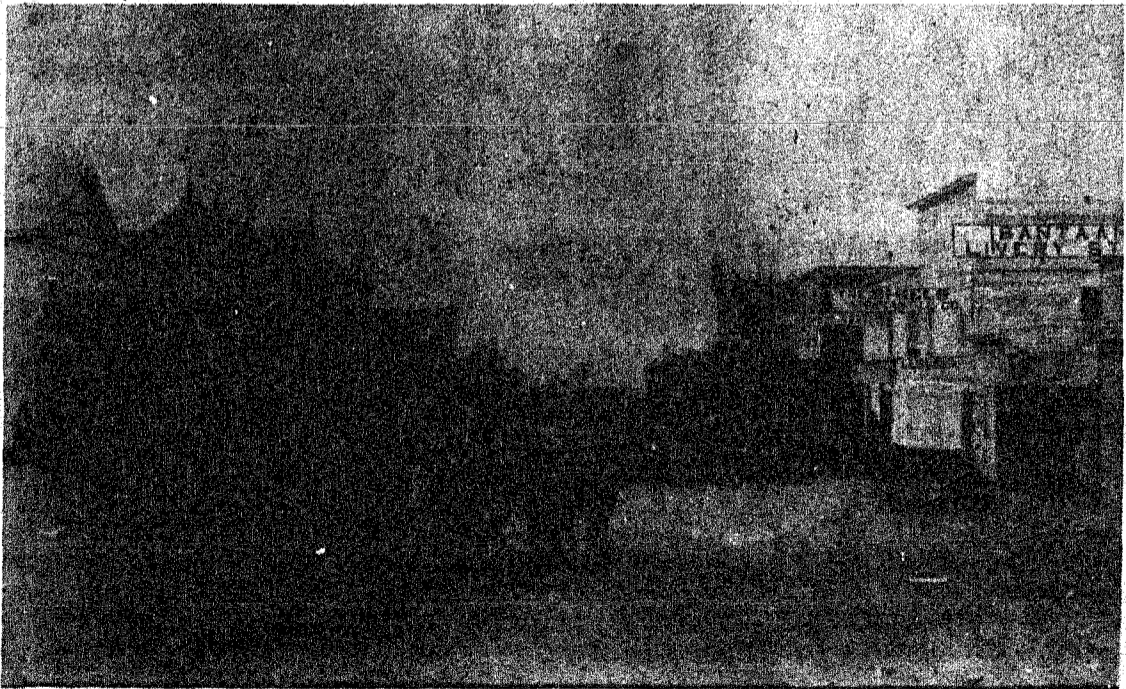
The family of Michelle Sindt express their appreciation to those who have assisted in various fund raising and blood drives for Michelle.

The Santa Anna Blood Drive was very successful as reported last week with 65 pints donated with a one for one replacement basis.

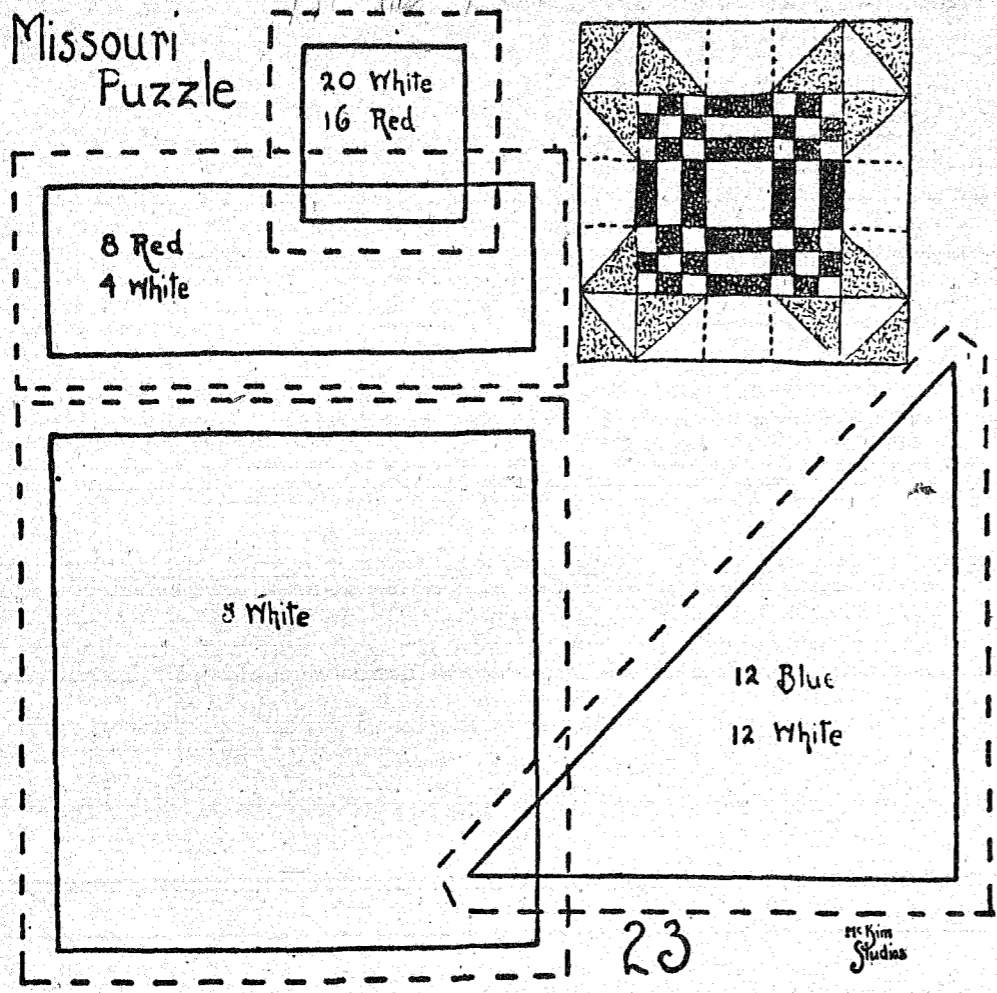

THE STATES PATCHWORK QUILT PARADE



There are 'stars' named after many States and 'puzzles' after quite a few. And nearly all of these as well as hundreds of other patchworks are simply combinations of squares and triangles, diamonds and oblongs.

Each Missouri puzzle block is built of 25 3 inch squares; 12 of these are two triangles sewed together, four are tiny nine patches, four three pat-

ches and five plain squares. Putting these together is the 'puzzle' but not such a bad one if the diagram is kept before you. Then putting together the finished 15 inch blocks may again be the question, solved in a most unusual manner. For this we suggest strips of white cut 3 2-3 x 9 3-8 inches with a square of blue the size of our large white square pattern at either end. This will finish

exactly as long as you block, make a large white octagon for fancy quilting and with a block of blue at each corner. Corner intersection blocks could be tiny nine patches again, and then we'd guarantee that your finished coverlet would 'puzzle' even the old time quiltmakers as well as being a very lovely coverlet. Allow 3 yards of red, 4 of blue and 6 of white for the plan described above in full sized quilt.

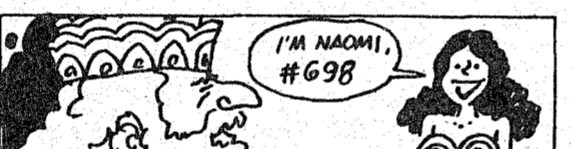

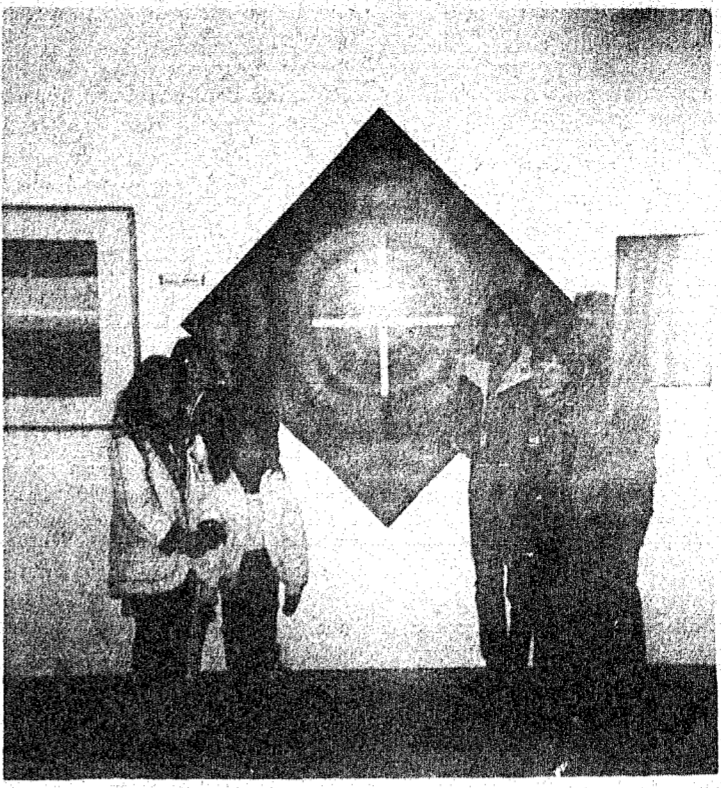
