## CITY LANDFILL PASSES INSPECTION

The Santa Anna Landfill had a surprise enforcement inspection on January 23, 1985, by Texas Department of Health Representative, John H. Butler. For the first time in at least three years, the city which has had many struggles to try to conquer, received a satisfactory

report. The inspector found the access roads and routes satisfactory, the drainage controlled, fire protection, proper unloading of waste. The next inspection for the city landfill was set for July 23, 1985.

## TEXAS MOST WANTED

After more than eight years of running from the law, Joseph Patrick Costello was arrested Saturday, January 12, 1985. Costello, who was to be featured as a Texas Most Wanted Fugitive No. 2 by the Texas Crime Stoppers Advisory Council, was apprehended by deputies of the Winkler County Sheriff's Office.

The news of this capture created even more excitement from Santa Anna's local police department about the new Crime Stoppers Texas Most Wanted list. With releases such as the one above, people can see the effectiveness of the program.

Fugitive No. 3, Anthony Ginnetti was a super salesman say people around the West Texas town of Coahoma, FBI Investigators, the Texas Department of Public Safety, the Swisher and Howard County Sheriff's Departments. The only problem, they say, is that all Ginnetti sold was a 'bill of goods.'

Ginnetti, who also goes by the names of Terry Lee Ginnetti, Terry Lee Prero, Anthony Culpert and Tony Argus, is wanted by state and federal law enforcement officials on charges of defrauding the Coahoma State Bank out of \$260,000 and a private individual out of some \$150,000.

The dapper-looking 37 year old fugitive began negotiating with Coahoma State Bank in October, 1982, to secure an automobile 'floor plan' for his Car City Auto Sales and Service business. The original agreement, say investigators, was for \$38,000 worth of automobile purchases. A total of \$20,000 was to be secured by a Certificate of Deposit held by the bank and the rest of the loan was to be secured by automobile titles held by the bank as collateral.

Detectives say that between October, 1982, and April, 1984, Ginnetti was able to get the 'floor plan' raised to \$80,000, with \$30,000 in CD's and the remainder in automobile titles.

During the same period of time, say investigators, Ginnetti was able to defraud the bank in the following manner: (1) replacing all good automobile titles held by the bank with illegally acquired titles, thereby effectively reducing a portion of the collateral held by the bank; (2) passing insufficient fund checks, which were honored by the bank; (3) having the bank release liens on automobiles by telling them he had the vehicles sold and would return with the money. He would never deposit the money in the bank; (4) by writing checks on collected funds which subsequently had

'Stop Payment' placed on them; (5) by purchasing a large number of automobiles or customer drafts which were honored by the bank, despite the fact there was not sufficient funds on deposit at the bank; (6) forging signatures on vehicle titles held by the bank; and (7) forging his partner's signature to checks and drafts which were honored by the bank.

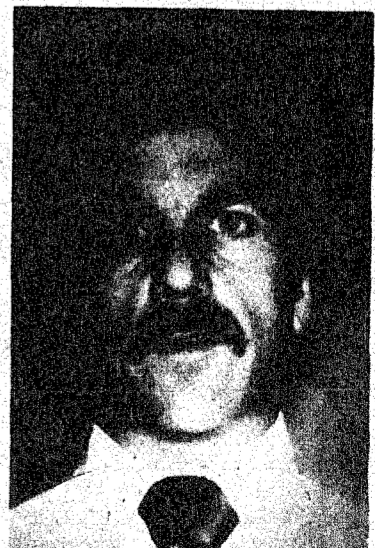
Investigators caution that while Ginnetti might have left the state, there is a possibility that he might still be somewhere in Texas operating in the same manner.

Ginnetti is described as a white male, 5-9, 175 pounds, with blonde hair and blue eyes.

As of January 16, 1985, the Department of Public Safety reported that Ginnetti is wanted on the following warrants: Swisher County No. 1796, dated April 18, 1984; Howard County No. 3948 and No. 3949, dated April 27, 1984; and FBI warrant dated May 14, 1984, Unlawful Flight to Avoid Prosecution.

This week Texas Most Wanted is offering a \$1,000 reward for information leading to Ginnetti's capture. Citizens are asked to call Texas Crime Stoppers Advisory Council tollfree at 1-800-252-8477 or their local Crime Stoppers program. Callers do not have to reveal their identities.

Texas Most Wanted is a weekly cooperative effort between Crime Stoppers and the Department of Public Safety and is designed to enlist the support of citizens in capturing dangerous fugitives.

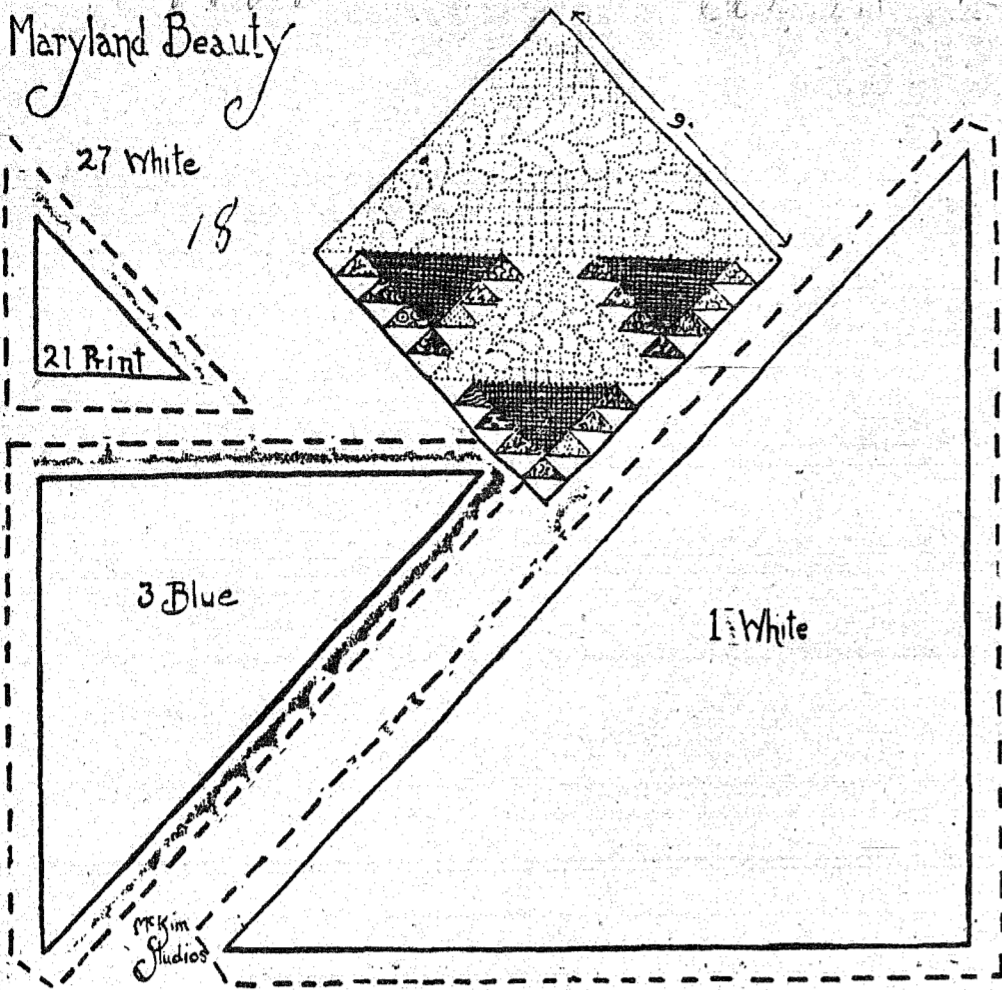
It seems sad in a way that we no longer have the old services. Especially, since I finally learned to use them. But that is progress I guess, you learn to do something and someone has to change the system.

THE STATES PATCHWORK QUILT PARADE



**QUILT FOR MARYLAND**  
**The Maryland Beauty**

Some quilt enthusiast may come forward with quite a different name for this charming old quilt, but as we saw the original of our pattern at the Rockville Fair in Maryland, we are giving it the Maryland name. It is akin to the Los Ship and Lady-of-the-Lake designs; also similar to 'Flying Birds,' but not exactly so. Colors were very lovely, a soft horizon blue with tiny triangles in variegated gay prints alternated with whites. We

have even tried to show you the quilting of curved plums with its dainty check background. Sizes could be enlarged for this, using the dotted lines to sew back to, and adding a seam width all around. However, those extremely small print triangles were responsible for the charm of the original quilt. Each block pieces by first making tiny squares of two triangles, by adding these into strips of 4 and 3 with

the extra white triangle, then joining these onto the blue triangle. The assembling of such blocks into the finished square is simple. Blocks are set diagonally together for the top. As each measures about 12 1/2 inches across this way, you will need 72 pieced squares with 22 half squares to fill in at the sides for a quilt top 75x87. For this size allow 7 yards of white and 1 1/2 of blue, the prints cutting from scrap material.

# COMMUNITY NEWS

In different times throughout this newspapers history several community news columns have appeared. Among these were Buffalo News, Watts Creek News, Cross Roads News, Coleman Junction, Concho Peak News, Plainview News, Leedy News, Liberty News, Mayo News, Red Bank News, Milligan News, and the Longview News. The list continues with the Eureka News published in 1949 by Joe C. Brooke, the Mukewater News in 1946 by Mrs. Casey Herring, the Gouldbusk News in 1946 by A. W. Crye and by Alene Menges in 1947, the Shield News in 1947 by Mrs. J. B. Weathers and in 1965 by Mrs. E. S. Jones, and the Nivot News in 1961 by the Nivot Kids.

The Santa Anna News has a host of people to thank for making it to the beginning of our 100th year. I believe that congratulations go to these ladies for their dedication to the news. Though some have only written for a short time and others for a number of years, it is a job that takes alot out of you and sometimes it is hard to see that it is putting anything back.

There's more to come on this newspaper. Stay tuned for the next feature of the series titled, 'What Happens Next.'

## THE WHON NEWS

Records at the Santa Anna News Office show that the Whon News Column appeared in this newspaper as early as January 5, 1934. Unfortunately, no name appeared on the column heading at that time.

Mrs. Tom Rutherford began writing this column in June of 1941. She says different people had been sending in news and that there had not been a news letter in the paper for awhile.

'It seemed to me that we had good news in the community for no one to send it to the paper so, I did. That was my start,' says Mrs. Rutherford.

A few days later she received letters from Mr. John Gregg Sr. of the Santa Anna News and Mrs. Autry of the Coleman paper asking for a regular letter. That was the beginning.

'You can guess I had a lot of discouragement,' says Mrs. Rutherford, 'because at that time we had very few telephones.'

People of the community left news for Mrs. Rutherford at their local stores or the post office. She says it is hard to imagine that Whon had

stores then and still has a post office.

Mrs. Rutherford did not feel that she could continue writing weekly news. Mrs. Autry of the Coleman paper talked with her and encouraged her and she continued. She says she has enjoyed the work.

'It seems that Mondays are not complete until I sit myself down to paper writing.'

For 27 years Mrs. Rutherford drove the Whon School Bus, 3 of these years were in Whon before they lost their school. She retired from this in 1978.

Many people ask her when she had time to write the news letters, while you are asleep? Her answer, 'As most or lots of people know, I am by writing like I am by talking. Not much trouble for me to write letters and I enjoy writing.'

She says there are discouraging times still. 'Sometimes folks are not at home. Sometimes they don't have news. Then someone will have some very encouraging words and I keep going.'

'As I have said many times before, I know I bother people but I could not carry on without your help. So many thanks to each and everyone.'

When Mrs. Rutherford began writing, Mr. John Gregg Sr. was publisher of the Santa Anna News. He was so nice and all the others to follow until, the Gregg's leased to a man who refused to print the Whon letters. 'He had to write about his dogs,' says Mrs. Rutherford.

She continued to write when Mr. Gregg again resumed publishing. 'The publisher's have been so nice. We loved Barbara Kingsbery and others before her and I do hope we can feel the same way toward the publishers to follow.'

'As in everything, we have our ups and downs but, don't forget I cannot do my little part without your help.'

## THE RANGER PARK INN NEWS

The Ranger Park Inn News first appeared in the Santa Anna Newspaper on November 18, 1965. It was at that time written by Mrs. Cliff Herndon. Early records of writers are vague but it is thought that Myrtle Hill also wrote this news column at one time.

Mrs. Annie Mae Brimer began writing the column on December 20, 1976, when she began her position as activity director for the nursing home.

She says, 'It has been a joy to write the news for Ranger Park Inn because the community heavily relies on the newspaper to keep up with local people and events. Many people have remarked at their dependency to keep up with what's happening through the local articles.'

Annie Mae has lived in Valera, Texas most of her life. She married J. C. Brimer on September 6, 1936. They have three children and five grandchildren. She has worked for Ranger Park Inn for 10 years.

Mrs. Brimer says, 'I feel good to be able to add to the readers enjoyment by informing them of events here at Ranger Park Inn and listing all our visitors. I am glad to be a part of it all.'

## THE TRICKHAM NEWS

The Trickham News letters have left us with several writers. Records show that Beula Kingston wrote the letters from 1945 to 1947. Lea Mitchell and Verna Mae Stearns wrote in 1948. In 1949, Lea Mitchell and Mary Catherine Fellers wrote. Mrs. J. E. York and Edna R. Dean continued the letters from Trickham from 1961 until 1965. There may be others, but as mentioned in another article, early records on writers are vague.

Mrs. O. R. Boenicke began writing the Trickham News on June 17, 1967.

She says, 'I am helping my community by writing the news. I am letting others know what we are doing down in Trickham.'

That she does! She informs us of church activities and activities at the community center. 'The Trickham Cemetery Association meeting,' she reports 'is the biggest thing we have. It is held the Sunday after Easter each year and three or four hundred people come. The fifth Sunday singings have drawn lots of people here too.'

## THE CLEVELAND NEWS

A few names appear in the history of the Cleveland News. We find copies dated as early as 1932, but the first name appearing was Doris Jane Henderson in 1943. Loyce Blanton wrote the Cleveland News from 1944 to 1946. In 1949 and 1950 Mrs. M. F. Blanton continued the news. Keeping with the Blanton name, although we are not sure if a relation exists, Mrs. Sid Blanton wrote the Cleveland News from January of 1963 until August of 1966. Mrs. John Perry began writing this column in 1966.

The next writer we found was Mrs. Clara Cupps who began writing the Cleveland News in 1972. 'It hasn't been easy,' says Mrs. Cupps, 'seems every Sunday afternoon at 3 p.m. it is time to start getting the news together. I write until around 10 p.m. Monday I write most of the

day. I am sure my friends get aggravated at me, I do all calling.'

Mrs. Cupps has three children, Carolyn Covey of Georgetown, Patsy Brooke of DeLeon and Billy Don Cupps of Trickham. She has eight grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

When asked why she writes the news Mrs. Cupps replied, 'I guess because there is no one else to write it. I sure wish there were. I would love to read someone else writing for a change.' Changing her tone a bit she adds, 'Anyway I enjoy getting the news together. I am sure all our friends enjoy it. Especially those who live away.'

She has a brother and sisters who live in other states. She says, 'They love reading the Santa Anna News because this is home to them.'

## Teachers Move Up Career Ladder

On January 17, 1985, two Santa Anna ISD teachers were named to Level II of the Career Ladder by local school administrators. Named were Coyita Bowker and Roland Nicholas.

Mrs. Bowker teaches first grade in Santa Anna. She is a graduate of McMurry College in Abilene and has her Masters of Education Degree. Mrs. Bowker taught fourth grade in Fort Worth her first year. She moved on to Talpa-Centennial where she taught first and second grade for ten years. She has been with the Santa Anna School for 14 years, three of which she has taught third grade.

Mr. Nicholas teaches high school math, computer math and physics. He is the senior sponsor, science sponsor and NHS sponsor. He has been with the Santa Anna School for 9 years.

Level II assignment is based on job-related education, experience and classroom performance. To enter Level II, teachers must have at least performance exceeding expectations during the preceding year, satisfactory performance the other year(s) and must have: (1) a B. A. or B. S. degree, three years teaching experience and nine hours of higher education course work or 135 hours of advanced academic training or an equivalent combination so that one semester hour of higher education course work is equivalent to 15 hours of advanced academic training; or (2) an M. A. or M. S. degree in the subject taught and two years of teaching experience.

Assignment to Level II results in an automatic salary increase. Other teachers may be assigned to Level II later in the school year.

## Scholarships Available

Junior and senior class high school students who are interested in applying for \$1,000 college scholarships should request application by March 15, 1985 from the Educational Communications Scholarship Foundation, 721 N. McKinley Road, Lake Forest, Illinois 60045.

To receive an application, students should send a note stating their name, address, city, state and zip code, approximate grade point average and year of graduation.

Fifty award winners will be selected on the basis of academic performance, involvement in extracurricular activities and need for financial aid.

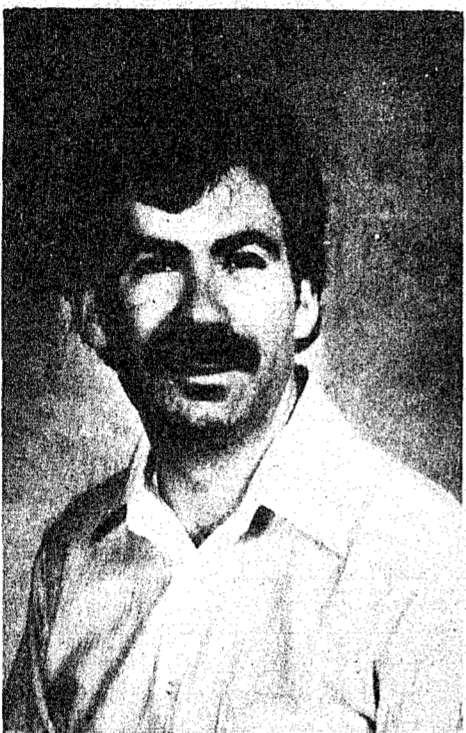
