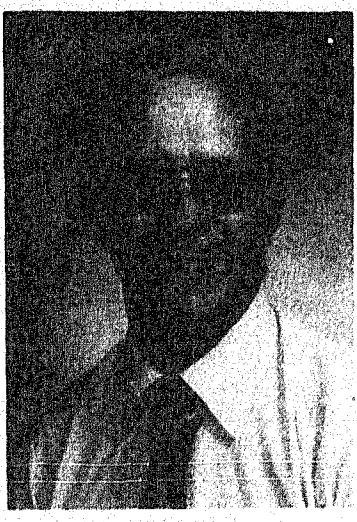

JOE GUERRERO
MAYORAL CANDIDATE
Joe Guerrero has been employed by the Santa Fe Railroad for 30 years, the past fourteen as track supervisor. He attended Santa Anna schools.
Guerrero and his wife, Yolanda, have six children, four sons, Raul, Benny, Joe, Jr. and Donny, and two daughters, Dora and Rachel.
He had the following responses to these questions posed by the Santa

Anna News:
(1) What would you like to see accomplished?
'For the city to become financially stable, work progress toward a grant for a new land fill, replace or repair fire plugs around city, and look at a proposed water rate change.'
(2) Why are you a candidate for this office?
'I am a concerned citizen. My years on the city council give me the knowledge of where we were, where we are, and where we need to go. Work is needed in a number of other areas - clean up around the city, make repairs to our streets, cut down waste, level salaries at 3 1/2 percent increase per year.'

(4) Equipment maintenance program for all city vehicles and work equipment.



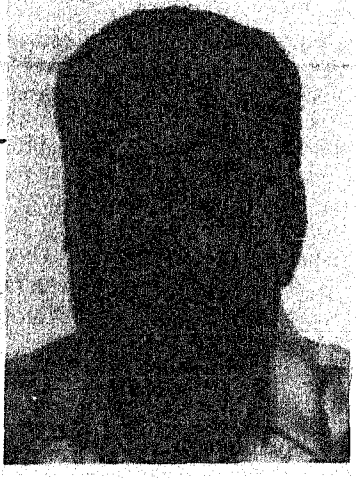
JOHN PEARCE

(3) Pave or repave all city streets.'



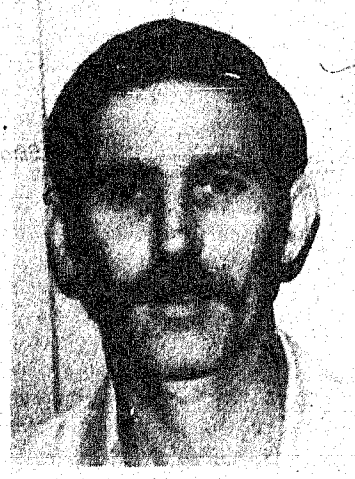
ROY BUSE, CITY COUNCIL

I want Santa Anna to be a city that we can be proud of.



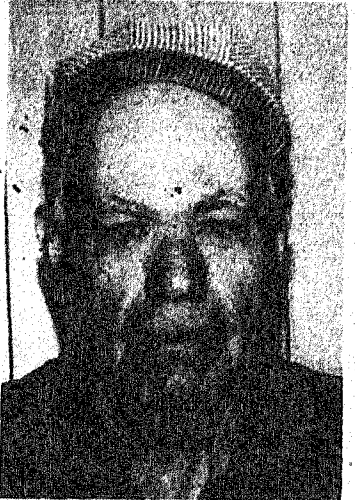
GARLAND MORGAN, CITY COUNCIL

Both polling places will open at 7:00 a.m. and close at 7:00 p.m.
Montie Guthrie III will serve as election judge in the City election while Rose Bass will be election judge for the School Board election.

Council meets tonight

The City Council will meet tonight in regular session at 6:30 p.m. at the Mountain City Community Center.
The agenda includes Joyce Wilkerson, who will present an ordinance for second reading on the rate increase from Lone Star Gas. The ordinance passed the first reading at the last council meeting.
Patty Musick, representing the Epsilon Sigma Alpha Sorority, will come before the council concerning Clean Up Day. Other items will be the Police report and routine business.

Police very busy

An estimated \$700 to \$800 in damage was caused to tires on several pieces of equipment at the Santa Anna High School over the March 9th weekend. Chief of Police Russ Ellis said that the tires on two riding lawn mowers and an FFA trailer were punctured with a knife through the side walls. The investigation has led to the apprehension of a 10 year old youth. Chief Ellis said the juvenile has been referred to Juvenile authorities.
Sgt. Bill Allen investigated the reported theft of a \$100 bill, Saturday, March 30th. The same 10 year old youth was apprehended in this incident also, according to Chief Ellis. Ellis said Sgt. Allen was able to trace the youth's spending spree which included a new pair of shoes, a new wristwatch, and a big meal at a local restaurant. The watch, shoes and \$52 in cash was recovered. The youth was again referred to the Juvenile authorities.
Two 15 year old youths were apprehended late Friday, March 29th on charges of Burglary of a Habita-

tion. Chief Ellis said the youths allegedly entered the home of an elderly Santa Anna man Friday morning and took two bottles of prescription medicine. Chief Ellis said he was investigating a prowler report Friday evening when he discovered an empty medicine bottle in a vacant house. The ensuing investigation led to the discovery of the burglary and the apprehension of the youths.
One of the youths had already been charged with burglary of a vehicle in an incident occurring March 19th. Ellis said that a shotgun had been taken from his patrol car at about 3 a.m. He said the weapon was recovered about 15 minutes later. But the youth wasn't found until four hours later, hiding on a roof of a vacant house, several blocks away. The youth has been turned over to the Juvenile authorities in both incidents.
A 20-inch bicycle was reported stolen from a residence on March 11th. Another 20-inch bicycle was reported stolen from the school

grounds on March 29th. Sgt. Bill Allen recovered the second bicycle on Saturday. He said the investigation is continuing, but it is believed that the first bike will be recovered also. He said that several youths, ranging in age from 9 to 14 years old are involved. The recovered bike was intact, but Sgt. Allen believes the first bike was taken apart and sold or given away to various other children.
The Santa Anna High School building was vandalized again over the past weekend, according to Chief Ellis. He said Superintendent Gerald Brister contacted him Sunday morning following discovery of the incident. Ellis said that the fire extinguishers had been removed from their brackets and sprayed throughout several classrooms and hallways. It appeared that four extinguishers were used, Ellis said. One empty extinguisher was found in a hallway, but others are missing. No other damage was noted, but the clean up would be quite a problem.

School board meeting nets changes

The Santa Anna ISD is governed by policies and guidelines set by the local Board of Trustees. At the regular meeting of the Board held on March 12, 1985, changes were approved to make current policies in compliance with present legislative requirements. Policies are public record and are available in the Administration office for review.
Next meeting of the School Board will be April 9 at 7:30 p.m., with routine business on the agenda along with the swearing in of new board members.

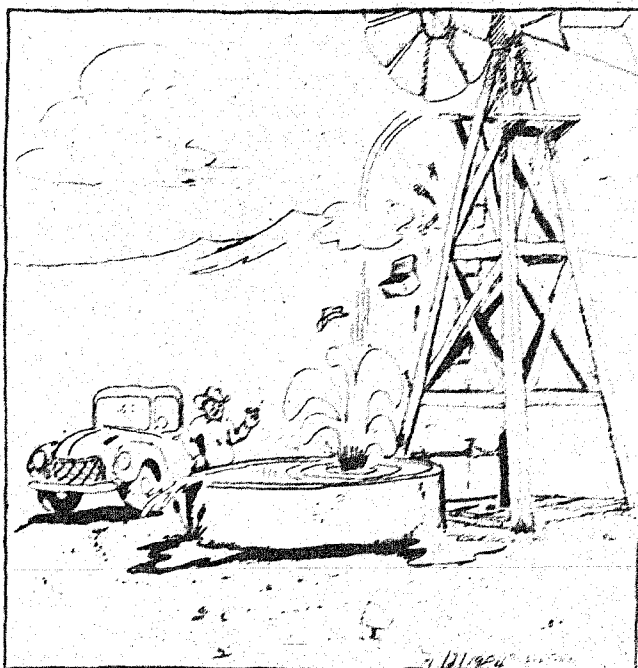

Taxes due

April 30 is the deadline for employers who must report on Social Security and withheld federal income taxes for the first quarter of 1985. If the quarterly tax due (less any deposit made during the quarter) is \$500 or more, the unpaid tax must be deposited.

This deadline does not apply to employers who make timely deposits of the full amount of tax due in Federal Reserve or approved commercial banks. They are allowed until May 10 to file Form 941, 'Employer Quarterly Federal Tax Return.'

If employers have not received Form 941 by mail, they can order one through the Tax Form or Information number listed in the phone book under U. S. Government. IRS Publication 15, 'Circular E--Employer's Tax Guide,' is also available through this number.

24 have served Santa Anna since 1906

Twenty-four men have served as Mayor of Santa Anna since S. J. Pieratt was first sworn in on June 7, 1906. Two men served more than once with W. E. Baxter being mayor from January 1924 to July 1928, serving again from June 1929 to April 1933 and again from November 1933 to April 1935 while Leman Brown was sworn in during April 1933 and served until November 1933. Brown was elected to office again and served from September 1937 until April 1939.

Following S. J. Pieratt was E. E. Polk, who served from April 1908 to April 1910 followed by W. B. Woodward, serving from April 1910 to February 1913. W. F. Holland came next, serving from February 1913 until April 1915.

Lewis A. Robertson was elected mayor in April 1915 and completed his service in January 1917. S. H. Phillips then served from January 1917 until August of the same year. S. W. Childers became the third man to serve during 1917 when he took office in August. He served until April 1920.

F. C. Woodward then served one year with his term ending in April 1921. He was followed by J. O. Martin from 1921 until January 1924.

Baxter then had his first stint as mayor to be followed by G. W. Faulkner, who served from July 1928 until June 1929, only to be followed by Baxter's second tenure.

Leman Brown was sandwiched by Baxter's second and third terms. E.

D. McDonald then broke the Baxter-Brown regimies by serving from April 1935 to September 1937, only to be followed by Brown's last term.

George M. Johnson then served nine years and nine months as mayor. He served from April 1939 until January 1949. J. Edd Bartlett then served from January 1949 until April of the same year.

F. Z. Payne, who served from April 1949 until April 1951 was followed by Jesse K. Barton, who served the shortest time of any Santa Anna mayor. He served one month and 29 days from April 2, 1951 to June 1, 1951.

C. E. Flint then was mayor from June 1951 until April 1953. He was replaced by Charles M. Henner, who served from April 1953 until

September 1955. W. Tilden Jones came next, serving from September 1955 until April 1957.

The longest serving mayor was W. F. Barnes, who served 12 years to the day, earning the longevity title. Barnes was followed in April 1969 by Thomas Wristen, who served until September 1976.

Glen Copeland was mayor from September 1976 until April 1979. Thomas M. Hays then served from April 1979 until current mayor, Ed Hartman was sworn in during April 1981.

April, 1985 will mark another change as Hartman is not seeking re-election. This year's mayoral candidates include Joe Guerrero, John Pearce and Donald Hosch.

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Easter Eggs and ham

COLLEGE STATION--Hard-cooked eggs and ham are familiar foods that get special treatment at Easter. It's this 'special treatment' of decorating and hiding Easter eggs or serving fresh ham for a large family gathering that raises questions about food safety, says nutritionist, Dr. Dymple Cooksey.

According to Cooksey, a specialist with the Texas A & M University Agricultural Extension Service, consumers commonly have the following questions about food safety for these Easter treats:

Q: Is it safe to eat the hard-cooked eggs used in an Easter egg hunt?

A: Yes, but they must be handled properly. First, cool hard-cooked eggs in cold water immediately after cooking and then refrigerate until they cool all the way. If any eggs crack while cooking, do not use them for the hunt since bacteria can easily get through the openings and contaminate the eggs.

When you plan the hiding and hunting of Easter eggs, remember that they should not be out of the refrigerator for more than two hours.

Q: How long will hard-cooked eggs keep in the refrigerator?

A: Hard-cooked eggs in the shell

should be used within one week. Use eggs with cracked shells or those with the shell removed within one day.

Q: Is there any danger of trichinosis from hams?

A: If you choose a fully cooked ham, there is no danger. They are specially processed according to USDA guidelines to kill trichinae organisms. These hams are ready to eat without further cooking.

If you choose a fresh ham, take extra care in preparation. Cook the fresh ham until the center reaches a temperature of 170 degrees F. To make sure this temperature is reached, insert a meat thermometer in the thickest part of the cut, not touching the bone or fat.

Q: How long can ham be safely refrigerated?

A: Uncured ham will keep in the refrigerator from 3 to 5 days. It will keep in the freezer from 4 to 8 months.

Cured ham will keep in the refrigerator for one week. Leftover cooked ham that is tightly wrapped and refrigerated 1 to 2 hours after cooking will keep 4 to 5 days. Both uncooked and leftover ham can be kept in the freezer up to two months before losing flavor and texture.

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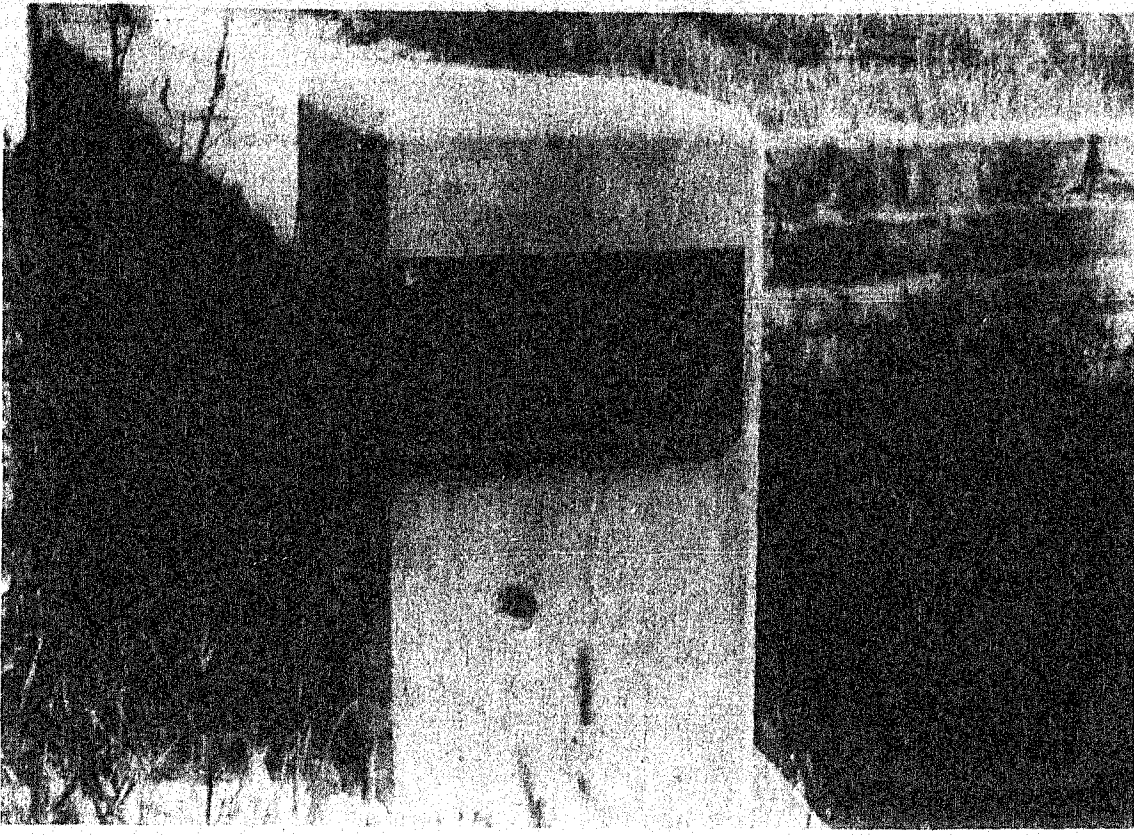
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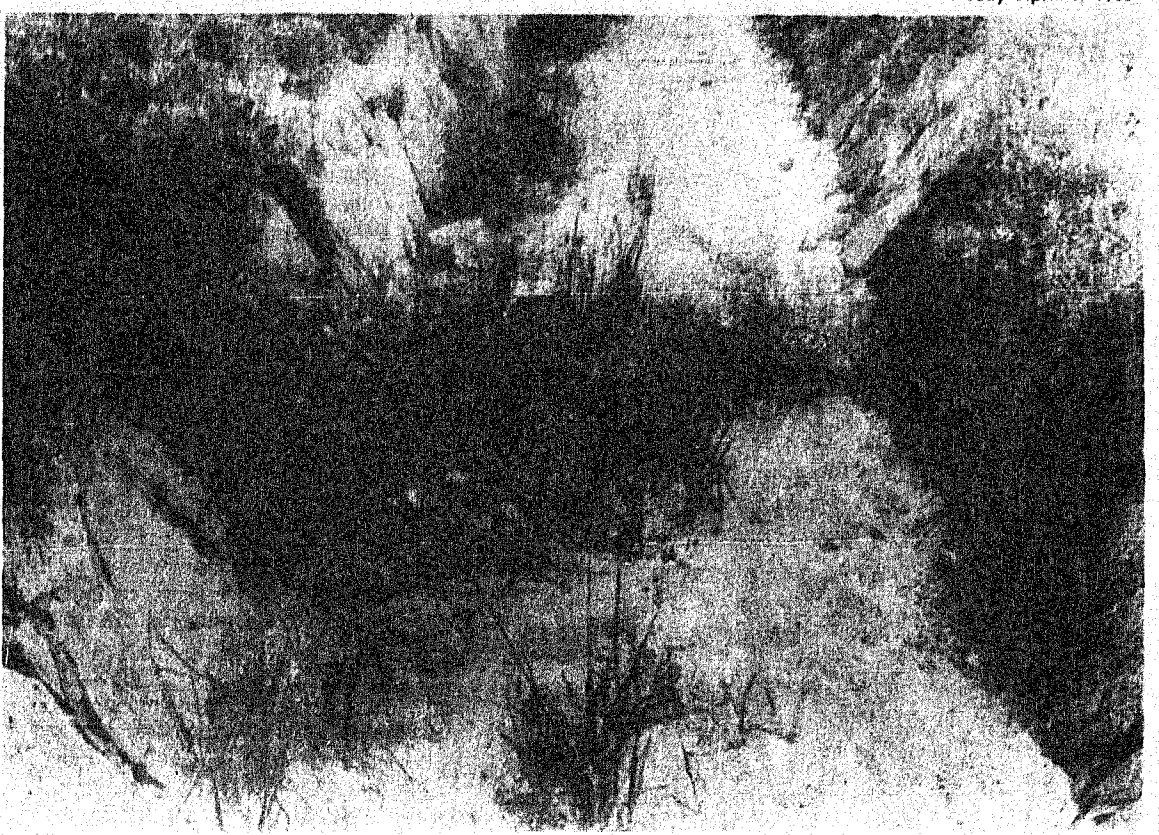

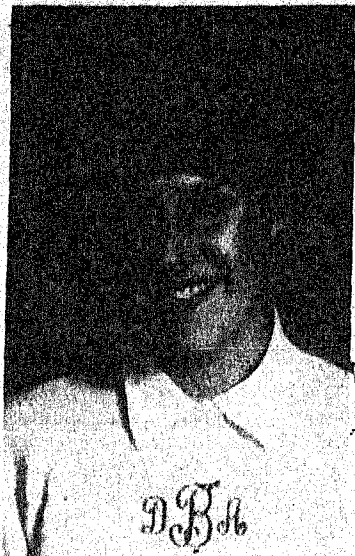

Early college credit

Qualified high school juniors may now apply to participate in the 1985 High School Scholars Program and earn up to 14 semester hours of college credit during Abilene Christian University's Summer.

Taxpayers can extend deadlines

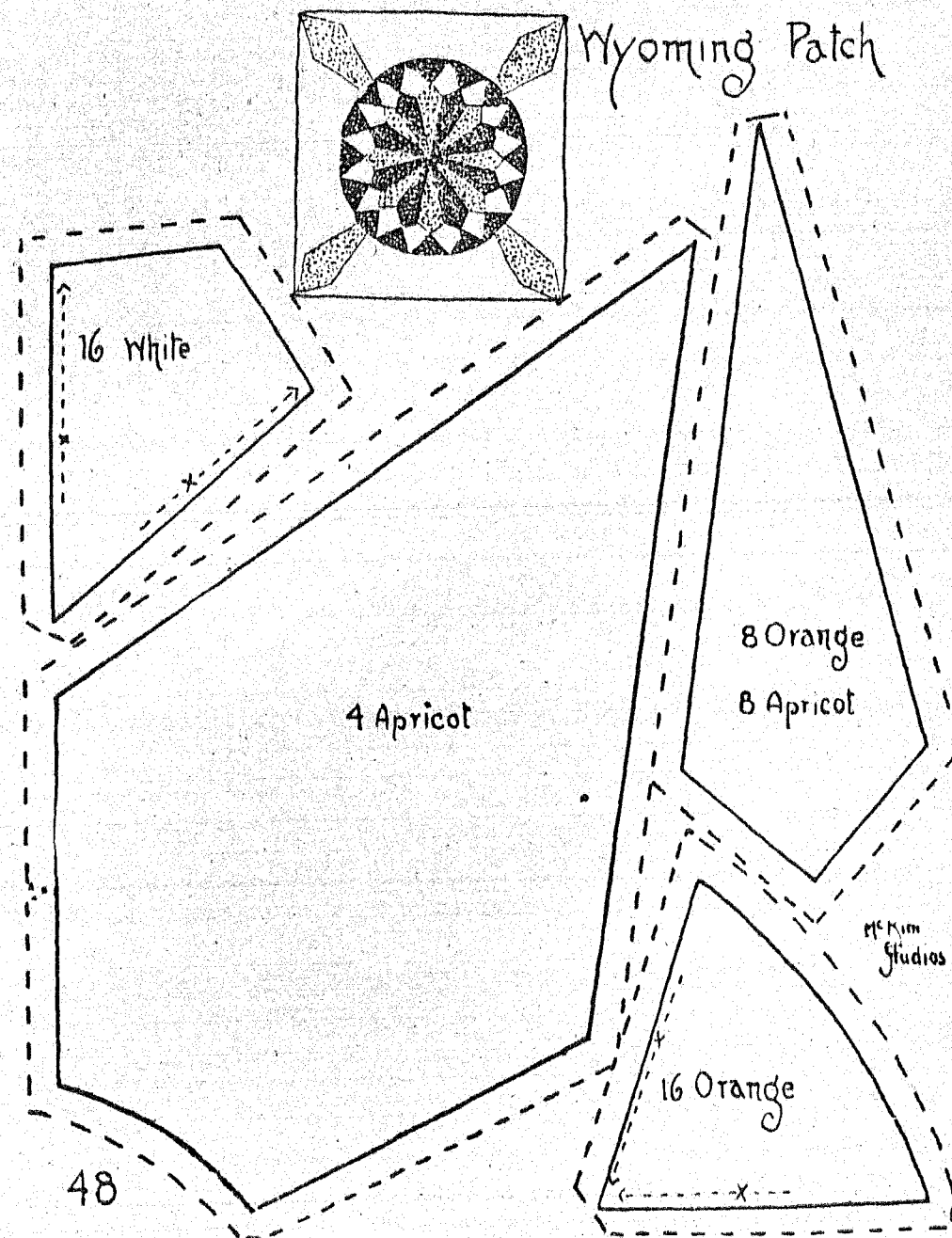
The Internal Revenue Service says you may receive an automatic 4-month extension of time to file your 1984 federal tax return. The application for the extension, Form 4868, must be filed by April 15.

The IRS stresses that this is an ex-

ension of time to file your return--not an extension of time for payment of taxes due. When filing for the extension, the taxpayer must estimate their tax owed for 1984 and send that amount with the Form 4868 to avoid interest and late payment penalties.

The IRS notes that a deduction for an IRA contribution can be claimed on a 1984 tax return only if the contribution is made on or before April 15, even for those electing an extension to file.

Wyoming Patch--Here is an intricate block that is exceedingly lovely when neatly pieced, but really no project for the amateur. If you will piece a white 'kite' onto the end of each orange petal, then join the

apricot petal on with a seam that has to stagger when it meets the white

you will have neat little kite shapes which again join to form the flower-like center.

Then sew two small orange pieces onto each of the remaining eight edge blocks which fit in an easy angle to complete the center circle. These will be about 13 inches square, with the large corner 'leaves' spaced to suit.

It is always better to trim out underneath any large applique as

the quilting is easier and much more beautiful this way.

All blocks should be alike for the added beauty of the corner repeats; there will still be ample white space for ornate quilting. Borders add greatly to a quilt like this of definite design. Pieced triangles of each color with white might make a handsome double border with a line of white between.

For a double bed quilt, we suggest 7½ yards of white with 2½ yards each of two colors.
