COLLEGE STATION-Hard cooked egss at ham are familiar Easter. It's this 'special treatment' of decorating and hiding Easter eggs
or serving fresh ham for a large or serving fresh ham for a large

tions about food safety, says nutritionist, Dr. Dymple Cooksey. Accoding to Cooksey, a specialis with the. Texas A \& M University Agricultural Extension Service, con
sumers commonly have the follow ing questions about food safety for these Easter treats:
Q: Is it safe to eat the hard-cooked eggs used in an Easter egg hung?
A: Yes, but they must be handled properly, First, cool hard-cooked eggs in cold water immediately atter cooking and then refrizer ${ }^{-\dagger}$ until they cool all the w. thr gh any eggs crack white kin. d
use them for the hunt since bacteria can easily get through the openings and contaminate the eggs. When you plan the hiding and hunting of Easter eggs, remember that
they should not be out of the they should not be out of the
refrigerator for more than two hours.
