In April 1984, 176 tornadoes were recorded across the country, the most for the month in 10 years. Overall, 908 tornadoes were
counted last year. While that is slightly fewer than the 931 of the year before, the 123 deaths is more than triple the 34 fatalities of 1983.

Hackney. "II the child is on any medication or has had any specifl
anacuities, diabetes, asthma, hyperactivity, allergies, etc., it is
mportant to give the physician this information.". "If the child has fallen from a tre countertop, stairs, trampoline, some distance from the ground, or if he has been thrown trom a car, a possible neck injury could have oc-
cured, and this needs to be brought to the attention of the physician or medical personnel," says Dr. Hackney.
