## City Council action

## Emergency session

In a called meeting of the Santa Anna City Council on Friday, April 26 at 7 pm, the council voted not to re-appoint Russ Ellis as Chief of Police.

According to a council member present at the meeting, the Chief of Police is to be appointed at the beginning of each mayoral term and Ellis requested the meeting in order to determine his status as Police Chief.

The Council met in executive ses-

sion, as required by law when discussing matters of personnel. Upon returning to open session the vote was two for and three against re-appointing Ellis whose present term expires on May 15.

No other items of business were on the agenda and no other action was taken. All members of the Council were present.

Regular council meetings are scheduled each month on Thursday after the first Monday of the month.

## 2 Indicted

A pair of Coleman men were indicted by a 42nd District Court grand jury in connection with the December burglary of Phillips Drug Store, while a Bangs resident was indicted for theft by the same jury.

Three other felony indictments were returned by the grand jury, which also no-billed a Santa Anna man who had been accused of burglary of a residence.

## Spillman 2nd in U.I.L. State meet

Monique Spillman came away from the state literary UIL meet in Austin over the weekend with a second place in the ready-writing competition and a 6th place in science.

Because of the scheduling of the two events, Monique was allowed to start earlier than planned in the science competition in order to finish and make it across the University of Texas campus to the location of the ready-writing event. She arrived with two minutes to spare. Apparently the rush did not cause any problems for the young lady as her efforts netted the second place honor.

According to high school principal, Dale Freeman, there were no competitors in the ready-writing events earlier in the year when the UIL competition was about to begin and Monique was encouraged to enter and advanced through all the required meets and on to the state meet.

## Board accepts bid

### Building project

The Santa Anna Independent School District board of trustees met in called session at 7:00 p.m. on Thursday, April 25 to open and review bids submitted for the construction of the multi-purpose building being added to the school plant.

ILCOR, (Industrial Laminates Corporation), of Austin was low bidder with a bid of \$130,000, for construction of the 5452 square foot building, averaging a cost of \$23.84 per square foot.

The only other bid submitted came from Brownwood Construction, Inc. Their bid amount was \$173,000 or \$31.73 per square foot.

After the board accepted the bid from ILCOR, the company representative, David Kehrer, presented floor covering and wall covering samples for the selection of colors to be used. Selections were also made for lockers for the new building.

The site for the building is to be slightly south and west of the Perry Gymnasium, and will house 4 Jr. High classrooms, the office of the

superintendent and the business office, as well as a conference room which will also be used as a meeting place for the school board.

Construction is expected to begin by May 6 with a completion date in August. The new building will be occupied in time for the fall school term.

In other action the board extended contracts to Russel McGough and his wife Kathy. The McGoughs will be members of the coaching staff and will be assigned classroom teaching duties. Mr. McGough's teaching field is history while Mrs. McGough has a degree in science and in english. Both have coached basketball and Mr. McGough has served as an assistant football coach. The pair come highly recommended by those schools they have previously served, both as teachers and as coaches. They have two daughters, Amy age 14 and Nikki age 13. The McGough's are presently employed in the Santa Fe ISD, a 4-A school just south of Houston, and will move to Santa Anna during the summer.

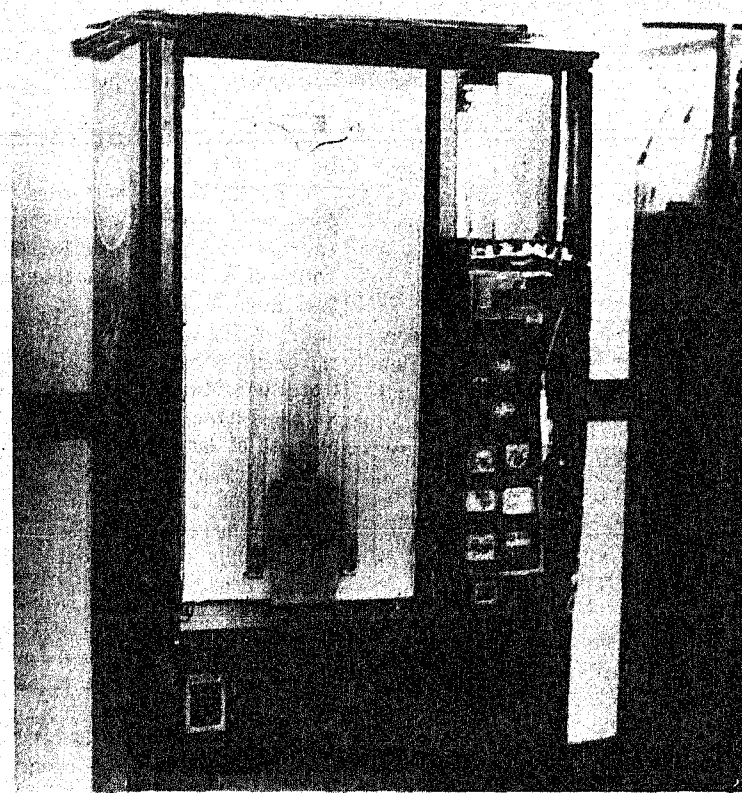
The Proclamation reads as follows:

Long awaited book goes to printer this week

## County history by Ralph Terry

As I have not written any news of the progress of the Coleman County and Its People book as of late, many folks have been asking how it is going or when will it be out? These are fair questions, as it does seem that the three editors have been working on it forever-actually it has been less than two years. We had the first story deadline June 15, 1983 and the second one August 1, 1983. We began to edit and research the general histories in September 1983. Of course, I thought that the book could be put together much faster than it turned out...just like building a house or doing a remodeling job, it took three times as long and cost twice as much as figured. In the case of the book, it did take a lot longer, but even though it is nearly four times as large, we have not had to raise our prices to the early purchasers. The book is still not out, but it is getting closer to that end every day. It now appears that it will be ready for delivery sometime this summer. You will be the first to know when it comes out!

Many ask if I have heard anything about the book lately. We work on it every day! We are still proofreading the last part of it and I am going through it for the umpteenth time in order to make it easy for you to use. We are in San Angelo usually every other week picking up something to be checked or returning some checked work.

Another good question that we get is, "How much are you getting paid to do this book?" I make the same thing that I make for being the county historical commission chairman...nothing! This book has actually cost me money...in phone calls, gas, copying and taking photographs for use in the book and in time that I could have spent in other ways. So anyway, to those who think we are being too slow in getting the book out...why didn't you do it thirty years ago? I feel that this will be a book that all of you can be proud of because we did stick with it and read and re-read it to get all the errors out.

The publisher has now hired the

fourth typesetter since beginning our book. Fortunately, he is an old time publisher and is not rushing through it to get it out, but is taking his time and doing it right. Editing this book had been very trying at times and most of you have given us nothing but encouragement, but it only takes one complaint to ruin a good day. Hang in there...it won't be long now!

We are expecting to start printing the first volume this week and the second will follow shortly. There will be approximately 1400 pages in the two volumes.

As of right now, we have sold about 1400 books. We are having the publisher print 1800 books for us. If you want a set, please purchase it as soon as possible, because we feel that when the book is in our hands, the extra copies will go fast. 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**Fourth annual competition**

Congressman Charles Stenholm announced plans today for the Fourth Annual Art competition for high school students, grades 9 through 12, in the 17th Congressional District. The contest will culminate May 25, 1985 with an awards luncheon in Abilene. The winner will be displayed in a corridor leading to the United States capitol for one year. All winners in the local contests will receive a Congressional Certificate of Appreciation.

"Over 30,000 students from all over the nation have participated in this contest during the past three years. We have had outstanding talent from the 17th District and I believe it is very important to encourage these creative energies which are so vital to our cultural traditions," said Stenholm.

This nationwide search for excellence, conducted with no Federal funds, is open to every high school student. Artwork must be no larger

than 30 x 30 inches (unframed) and two-dimensional. Landscapes shall portray Texas scenes. Eligible categories are paintings, drawings, collages, and prints.

The regional show scheduled in Abilene will be on Saturday, May 18th, at the Cooper High School Cafeteria. Counties to be included are Callahan, Coleman, Haskell, Jones, Nolan, Runnels, Shackelford, Stonewall and Taylor. All entries must be in place by noon on the 18th with appropriate entry forms completed.

This is one of seven (7) regional shows being held over the vast 17th District. Five (5) top winners from Abilene will compete with those from similar contests in Big Spring, Gainville, Graham, Snyder, Stephenville, and Weatherford. Here it is midnight! I am taking eight boys to Lake Texoma tomorrow afternoon. We are going on a camping and fishing trip. There are so many details to take care of!

It seems like everytime I tried to work on the campout something came up. And now here it is late and I know from experience that there will not be much sleep tomorrow night.

I know many of you have had the same experience and sometimes wonder why you do what you do.

But then I remember the words: "It is easier to help a growing boy than to mend a broken man." Then all the hustle and hassel is worth it all.

**Weather alert**

After being awakened by the siren blasts on Sunday night or early Monday morning, it seems appropriate to mention the weather warning system. The local fire department works with the Civil Defense on the warning system.

According to local fire officials who sound the alarm, three blasts of the siren indicate that a tornado has been sighted in the area and there is a possibility of its moving in the direction of Santa Anna.

The alarm was sounded in the early morning hours of Monday when a tornado was spotted about 6 miles out toward Valera and was moving toward our area.

**Your child's life is riding on you**

Safety is important not only to you but also to your child. Each year more children are killed or crippled in car crashes than from all other causes combined.

Children depend on you to keep them safe. Using a child restraint device or a seat belt is the best protection you can give a child when they are riding in your vehicle.

As an adult, you can choose whether or not to protect yourself with a seat belt. Children can't. They depend on you for their safety. Follow the Child Restraint law in your state. Remember, your child's life is riding on you.

**Minute Men**

On November 25, 1871, the legislature ratified an act to muster minute men into service for the protection of the Texas frontier from the Indians and other dangers. The men were to be paid \$2 per day, but were not to work more than 10 days each month. The governor was to provide the men with arms and ammunition, but the men were to supply their own horses.

**Largest tree in Texas**

The largest tree in Texas is at Rockport. The live oak, thought to be 2,000 years old, is 442 inches in circumference, 44 feet high, and has an 89 foot crown.

**Tornado season here**

WASHINGTON..The spring months are peak tornado season, and weather experts are urging additional caution this year following a sharp jump in tornado deaths in 1984.

The violent whirlwinds claimed 123 lives last year, the most in a decade, the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration reports.

In April 1984, 176 tornadoes were recorded across the country, the most for the month in 10 years.

Overall, 908 tornadoes were counted last year. While that is slightly fewer than the 931 of the year before, the 123 deaths is more than triple the 34 fatalities of 1983.

National Weather Service scientists are experimenting with new types of radar in an effort to detect these violent storms as early as possible, but sometimes little or no warning is available.

Tornadoes strike suddenly and their strong winds can uproot trees, lift houses off their foundations, twist steel frames and cut wide swathes through cities and countryside.

Generally, tornadoes move along the ground at between 25 to 40 miles per hour, although they may stand still or accelerate to as much as 60

miles per hour. They can move in any direction, although it is most common for them to travel from the west or southwest toward the east or northeast.

On average the width of the path of destruction is about 250 yards. Half of all tornadoes travel less than five miles on the ground, although a few have been tracked for as far as 200 miles.

Safety experts warn that if a tornado threatens people should stay away from windows, doors and outside walls of their homes.

The safest areas are likely to be the basement or an interior area on the lowest level, under some sturdy object.

Do not try to outrun a tornado in a car or truck, but leave the vehicle for low ground, lie flat and protect the head with the arms. Mobile homes are generally unsafe in tornadoes, the experts warn.

If local forecasts announce a tornado 'watch', that means conditions are favorable for the formation of a twister so be prepared to react quickly if needed.

A tornado 'warning', means a tornado has been sighted or observed on radar, go quickly to a sheltered area.

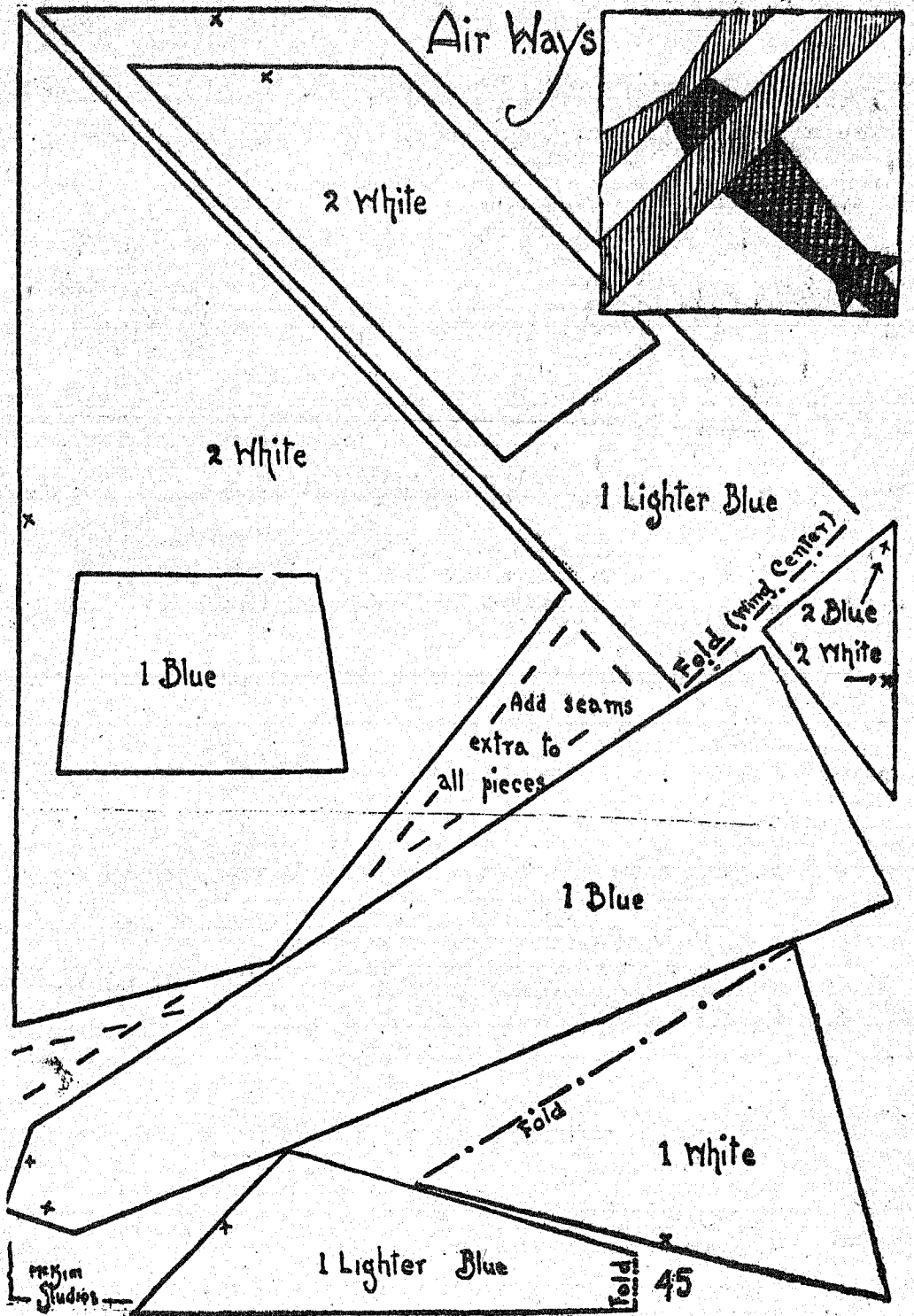

## THE STATES PATCHWORK QUILT PARADE



A QUILT FOR WASHINGTON "Airways"

For a far-seeing progressive State, whose borders have been brought close by airways, we choose this most modern travel symbol, the airplane. What a fitting symbol! choice this would be for a boy's quilt! If grandmother or Aunt Sue will sew the blocks, perhaps sonny himself can plan an original formation on check paper for the whole quilt top. We suggest plain white squares or, by the way, the sky of background and plain squares might

be light blue, with red airplanes and silver wings.

The cutting shapes are rather unusual for this block, so the first thing to do is to make a careful set of cardboard patterns exactly 3-18-inch larger than the units here given. Mark the X to correspond on each one as this is to indicate the outer edge of the block each time. If your material should happen to have a right and wrong side, some pieces would have to be cut reverse to fit

both sides of the airplane. To piece a block sew the tiny blue and white triangles together so they will have a straight base to join the airplane after they have first completed the large sky piece into a triangle; this step with right and left placing, completes half of the block. The other large triangle is a series of stripes as shown to complete that half block. Allow eight yards of white, two of each blue for a full size quilt.

**PROBLEM:** Neuroblastoma Studies-The most common malignant solid tumor seen in children at St. Jude Children's Research Hospital is neuroblastoma.

**INCIDENCE:** 1 in every 100,000 live births will develop neuroblastoma.

**SYNOPSIS:** Neuroblastoma is a malignant tumor of the sympathetic nervous system and is particularly difficult to treat effectively. Although children with localized disease, that can be surgically removed, have a good prognosis, those with disseminated (wide spread) disease respond less favorably. Approximately 70 percent of children have disseminated disease when diagnosed.

Previous treatment for

Shanna Hensley will compete in the girls regional track meet to be held in Abilene beginning at 4 pm on Friday at McMurry College.

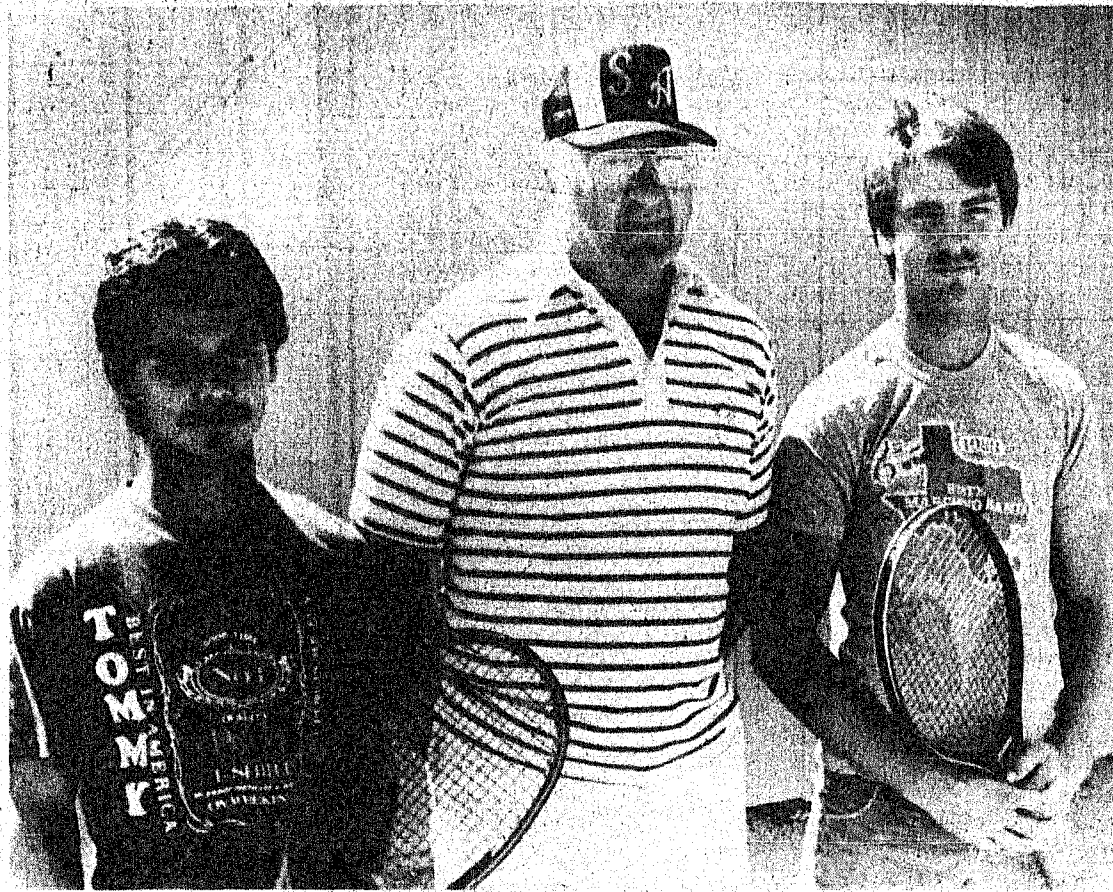
Shanna placed third in district in the 400 meter run and gained an alternate position as only first and second places advance in the playoffs.

## Head injuries to children

TEMPLE-The most important question parents or witnesses can answer for a physician following a serious head injury to a child is whether there was a loss of consciousness and for how long, according to Dr. Kenneth U. Hackney, Chairman of the Department of Emergency Medicine at Scott and White in Temple

"Important information also includes the child's age, weight, immunization status or when he had his last tetanus shot, and the presence of any cuts. Any noticeable changes in the child's behavior are also important and are best detected by the parents," says Dr. Hackney.

"The time the injury occurred should be noted by the parents or witnesses," emphasizes Dr. Hackney. "If the child is on any medication or has had any specific

problems since birth, such as learning difficulties, diabetes, asthma, hyperactivity, allergies, etc., it is important to give the physician this information."

"If the child has fallen from a tree, a countertop, stairs, trampoline, or some distance from the ground, or if he has been thrown from a car, a possible neck injury could have occurred, and this needs to be brought to the attention of the physician or medical personnel," says Dr. Hackney.

"In any serious accident, the victim should be moved as little as possible to avoid worsening possible neck injuries before trained medical help arrives," Dr. Hackney adds.

Dr. Hackney suggests that if a child must be moved from a dangerous area, several people together should lift the child as one

unit with the head and neck immobilized and have him lie still until a paramedic arrives.

If a child sustains a facial or scalp laceration that appears serious enough to require stitches to close the wound, the child should be brought to a physician within 24 hours, preferably within 8 hours.

Dr. Hackney stresses that "we're here to help you in an emergency, but you can help your child if you can remain reasonably calm to reassure him and try to have some of the information available which will help us treat your child more efficiently and effectively."

## Step back

Travelers going west from Fort McPherson in Canada to the Fort Yukon, Alaska, a distance of only 300 miles, should be prepared to step back in time.

According to the 1985 Rand McNally "Road Atlas", travelers of the route will pass through three different time zones in the course of their journey-Mountain, Pacific, and Yukon time zones.

## New wilderness

Texas nature lovers can enjoy thousands of acres of new protected woodlands this year. Five areas totaling 34,400 acres were recently added to the national forests of East Texas.

The tracts are hard to distinguish from the forest land around them, but because timber cutting is not allowed in the wilderness areas, environmentalists expect larger trees and a greater variety of species to result. Although Federal law prohibits vehicles from the preserves, it permits hiking, picnicking, camping, and other activities.

The five new wilderness areas include: Upland Islands, 12,000 acres in the Angelina National Forest; Indian Mounds, 10,000 acres on the Toledo Bend Reservoir in the Sabine National Forest; Turkey Hill, 5,400 acres in the Angelina National Forest; Little Lake Creek, 4,000 acres in the Sam Houston National Forest; Big Slough, 3,000 acres along the Neches River in the Davy Crockett National Forest.

COLLEGE STATION—Raw milk has become one of the newest—and most hazardous—fad foods for the health-conscious.

'Raw milk has always been available to consumers who went looking for it,' says nutritionist Dr. Dymple Cooksey, 'but now it is being promoted as a 'Health' food.'

Some people claim that raw milk has a higher nutritive value than the pasteurized kind, says the Texas A & M University Agricultural Extension Service nutrition specialist. In addition, it supposedly protects against dental decay, provides

greater resistance to disease, contains a higher enzyme and hormone content and includes an 'anti-stiffness' factor, she says.

The Texas House of Rep. has given its tentative OK to a state employee limit that could do away with 20,000 jobs through attrition and save the state \$800 million over the next four years.

A Friendswood teacher who wants to experiment with files and an Austin high school instructor who doubles as a tennis coach are Texas's nominees for the first teacher in space.

Houston Public school officials are considering offering up to \$10,500 in bonuses to teachers who choose to work in low-income schools. The Proposal would give bonuses to teachers in the schools that qualify for federal aid to the disadvantaged.

Governor White signed into law last week an extension of the state law requiring that the Department of Public Safety get a copy of every prescription written for dangerous drugs.

The law, effective Aug. 26, re-enacts a 1961 law that requires the use of special triplicate prescription blanks. One copy is kept by the doctor, one by the pharmacy and the third goes to the DPS, which keeps a file on purchasers of drugs such as Quaaludes and amphetamines.

## Santa Anna News history

Callan was the next publisher.

A fire in 1919 destroyed Santa Anna News. The first early newspaper files and accurate records of ownership, but early owners and publishers were G. W. Faulkner, J. J. Gregg and his son, John, who headed the newspaper over 49 years, and in late years, Johnny Valentine, W. T. Rowland came to Santa Anna in the '80s to get well of the "Dread White Plague" so prevalent on the coast.

Since there was no home on the property on the north side of the mountain, he spent the winter in a sort of dugout. By spring he was much improved and decided to go home and get his printing press, to start a newspaper. The first edition was published in January 1888 and called the Santa Anna News. It remains the oldest continuous business in the community.

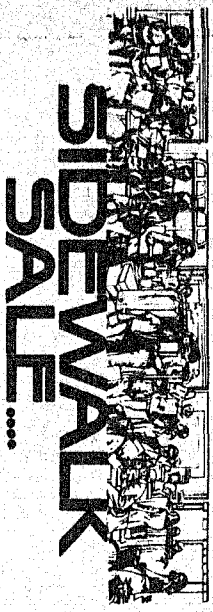
Rowland sold out to Charlie Spain, then Will Hubert and his sons were owners in the 1890s, selling the business to move to Colorado to establish the Colorado Democrat. Austin people.

The railroad came to Santa Anna the same year the newspaper was established, and the town moved from the gap in the mountains to the railroad right-of-way. The Santa Anna News was published in several locations but has been located in the same restored brick building for over 60 years, recording the activities of the small rural community and its people.

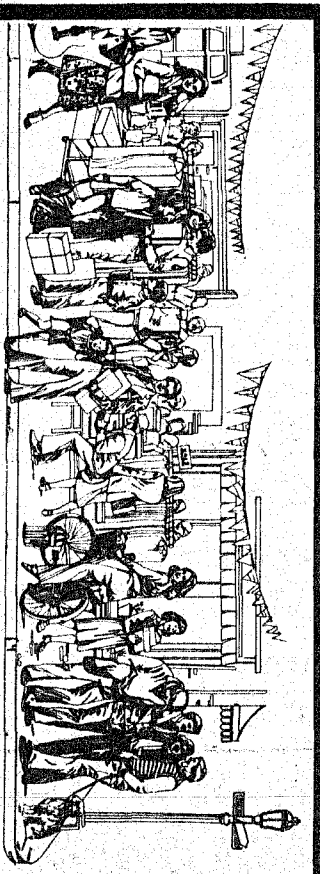
