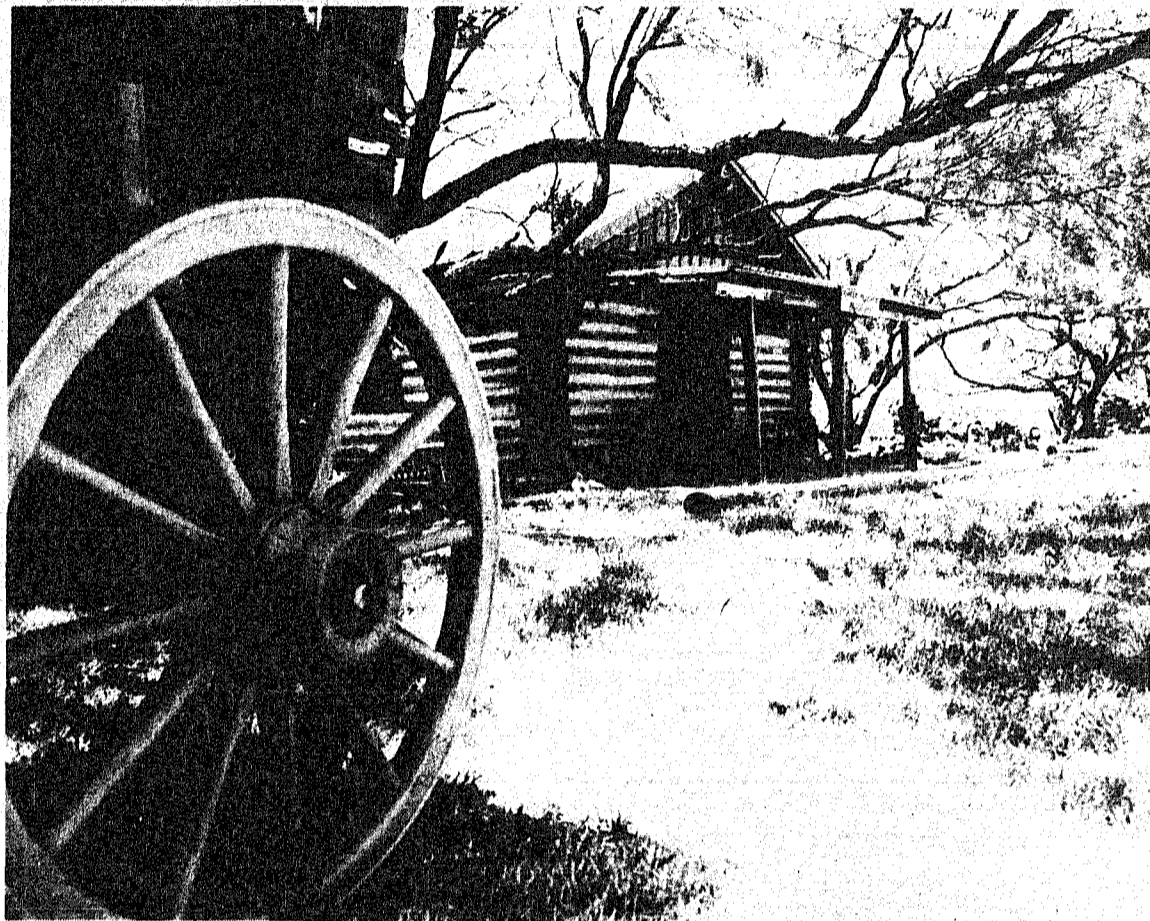

School District's Gifted and Talented Program. Early this month he participated in a unique learning experience when he was selected as Sheridan School's fifth grader to attend a week's nature

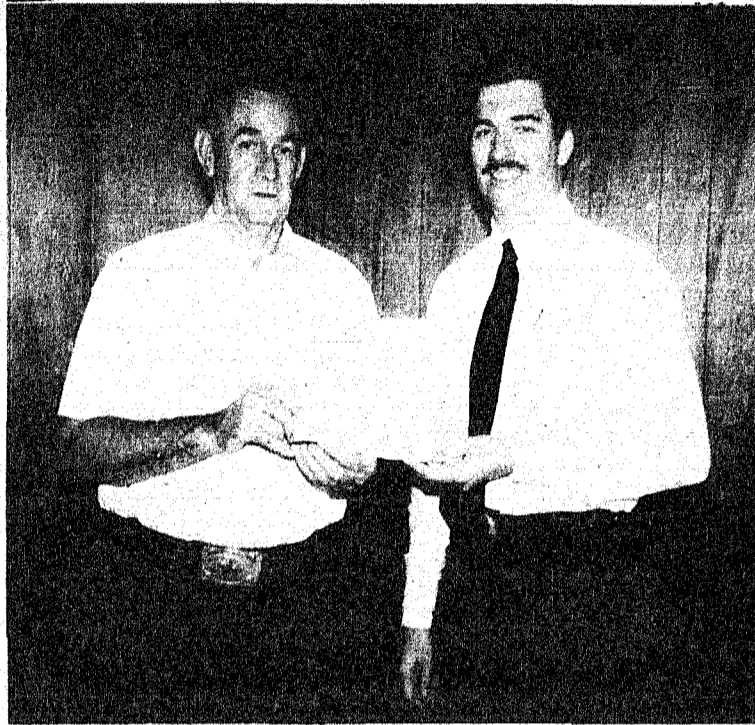

## County Historical Report

To enlarge on recent writings of the Stacy family and their part in the history of Coleman and McCulloch Counties, here is the story of the older Stacy's as it will appear in the forthcoming book, "The History of Coleman County and Its People" as written by George A. Page of Brigham City, Utah. This appears to be a concise history and well researched, giving the entire family of seven children and stating that the land where the town of Stacy was established was owned by Jesse Stacy, not the son Morgan. The Coleman County Historical Commission has not researched the town of Stacy as it is not in Coleman County.

Jesse Braswell Stacy was born April 18, 1822 in Pittsylvania County, Virginia, a son of Keziah Stacy. Nancy Caroline Leonard was born January 28, 1826 in Maury County, Tennessee. They were married December 5, 1848 in Maury County.

They left Tennessee on August 20, 1853 to settle in Fayette County, Texas, October 12, 1853. During October, 1882, they sold their farm and moved to the Trickham area where they bought five sections of land. They later sold this and moved west of Rockwood to buy land on both sides of the Colorado River. The town of Stacy was established on this property. J. B. died June 20, 1910 and Nancy, January 28, 1914, both buried at Trickham. Their children were (1) Sarah E. Frances, October 1, 1849 in Maury County-February 3, 1922 married Henry Volentine, Jr. They later bought 640 acres of land on Pole Cat Ridge, north of Trickham. The Mukewater school was organized on Pole Cat Ridge and later moved to Cross Roads. They sold this land to James T. Bowden in 1903. (2) Josephus, July

11, 1851 in Maury County; -August 16, 1870. (3) William T., April 29, 1853 in Marshall County, Tennessee-May 21, 1923, married M. E. Worthing, January 3, 1883 in Lavaca County, Texas. He was also married to Nettie Hill on November 18, 1898. (4) Arkansas Clemmie, February 28,

1856 in Fayette County, married William David Watson on December 23, 1875 in Lavaca County.

Four of their children died during the tornado on March 16, 1894 and W. D. died from injuries suffered during a storm March 31, 1894. Aunt Clemmie died November 10, 1937. All of the family are buried at Trickham. Their children were:

(4a) Lula Barbara, October 25, 1876-March 16, 1894; (4b) Callie Anna, August 23, 1882-March 14, 1883; (4c) Elizabeth Frances, March 4, 1884-March 16, 1894; (4d) Mollie Lee, December 8, 1885-March 16, 1894; (4e) Malcolm Buie, December 12, 1887-March 16, 1894; (4f) James Robert (Jim. Bob), August 31,

### Chapter I HIS NAME WAS ROBERT COLEMAN

Robert Morris Coleman was a native of Kentucky, born in 1797, who came to Texas in 1832. A veteran of a Kentucky military company, he was appointed captain of the first Ranger company in Texas. He rode in defense of the frontier, and about 1835 a log blockhouse on the Colorado below Austin was Coleman's Fort.

## Stanislaws Attend Convention

There were over 45,000 messengers in attendance from all over the United States. It was the largest attendance of messengers in the history of the Southern Baptist convention and the largest convention ever held in Dallas.

dependence of Mexico on March 2, 1836, he signed the document. He was aide on the staff of General Sam Houston at the battle of San Jacinto, and was prominent in the formation of the new republic. His home was a plantation near Velasco, and with his wife and four children he seemed destined for happiness as well as fame and wealth.

But seldom in history has a family suffered such disaster. In 1838 Coleman was drowned in a boating accident off the coast, and the following year a raiding band of Indians attacked the settlement and fell fiercely on the Coleman household. Mrs. Coleman and the oldest son were killed and scalped, and the three younger children were carried away by the raiders, never to be heard from again.

Among counties in 1858 by the Legislature was that from Travis and Brown, named Coleman for the San Jacinto hero. Near the center of the state, it is drained by several noteworthy creeks, including two named for Comanche chiefs, the Jim Ned and the Mukewater. During the ten years of the Texas republic, many explorers came up the Colorado and its branches, and at that time the Indians were generally friendly to them.

The first maps of Central Texas made with detail showed a round mountain between the Colorado and the Pecan River, called High Peak. By 1829 a map made for Stephen F. Austin and now in the Alamo Museum has the round mark, evidently located from an oral report of some explorer, and it is called Santa Anna's Peak. Moses Austin and his son, Stephen, had come up the Colorado in 1820 on a tour of inspection with a view to settlement of colonists.

What may have been the Indian name for Jim Ned is not recorded. Most of the well-known Indians of the time had one or more names, spelling them in different ways; thus the Mukewater was an attempt at the name of the Comanche, Mukewarrah, Mukewaka or Muguara.

The eminent settler and trader, Noah Smithwick, who was also a Texas Ranger, wrote his memoirs, "The Evolution Of A State," which has become a classic of its type and time. Smithwick was asked by two Comanche chiefs to meet with them in council on Brushy Creek, above Austin, in 1837, and he agreed to go. On his packhorse he took articles for trading with the Indians and for gifts to them. While the Comanches wanted the whites to stay out of their territory, they wished to have a trading post near enough to obtain the cloth, iron goods and other things they could not produce.

Reaching the place of council, Smithwick found about fifty lodges, with some one hundred warriors and many women and children. The head chief of this band was Muguara, who received the white man civilly, and as the days passed they achieved friendly relations. For about three months he stayed with them, making at least two moves to new campgrounds. They had a common language, Spanish, and the

observant Smithwick noted carefully their customs, possessions, people and language, and he learned some words of the Comanche tongue.

This band had six prisoners, a white woman, two white children, a Mexican woman and two Mexican children. After a time, Muguara made no effort to keep Smithwick from communicating with the white woman, and he asked her if she did not wish to return to her people; but she had been captured as a child and was one of the wives of a warrior, and did not care to leave the Comanches.

It has occurred to this writer to wonder if this woman could have been the daughter of Robert Morris Coleman. What bitter irony if the poor girl had grown up in slavery and degradation along the Mukewater Creek, in the very county later named for her illustrious father, while a rich estate belonging to her at Velasco was unclaimed.

With this issue, the Santa Anna News is beginning the publication of one of Mrs. C. D. Bruce's books, "They Came In Peace", which is about the settlers who came to Coleman County. The book will be published serially and this issue includes Chapter I.

Mrs. Bruce waives her copyright for this publication in preparation for the 1986 Texas Sesquicentennial.

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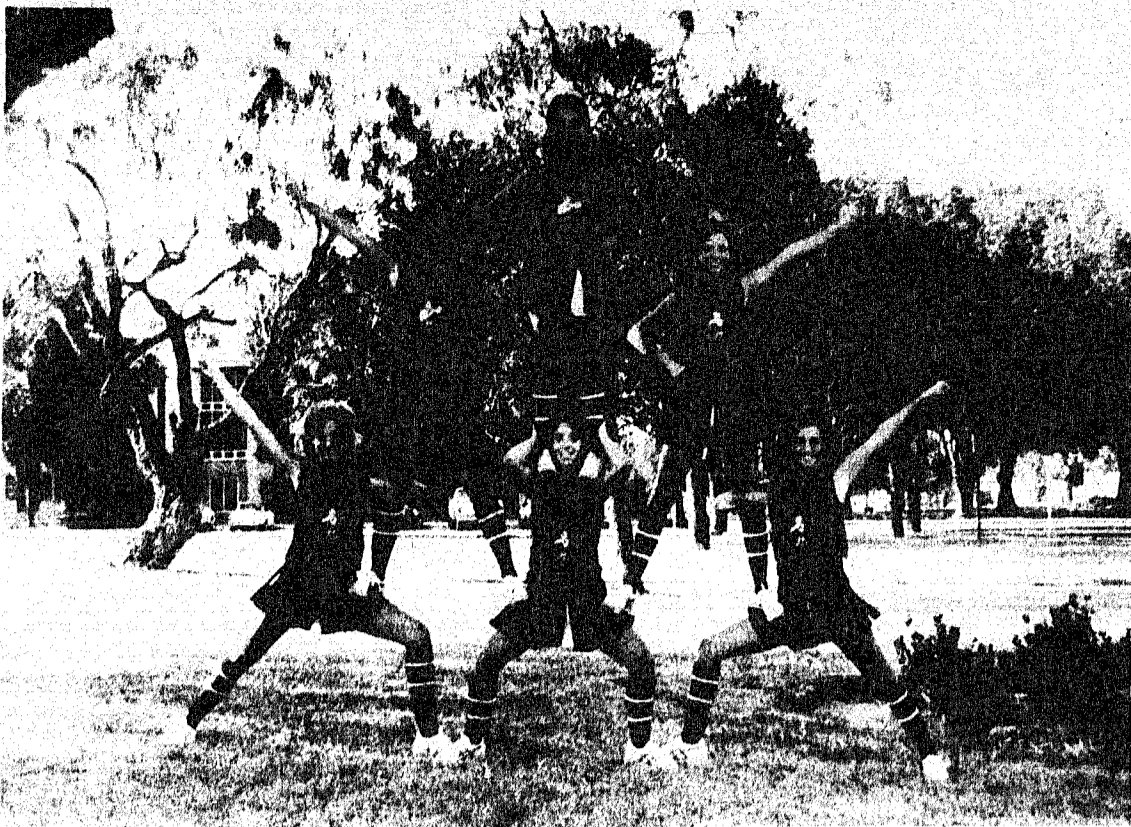

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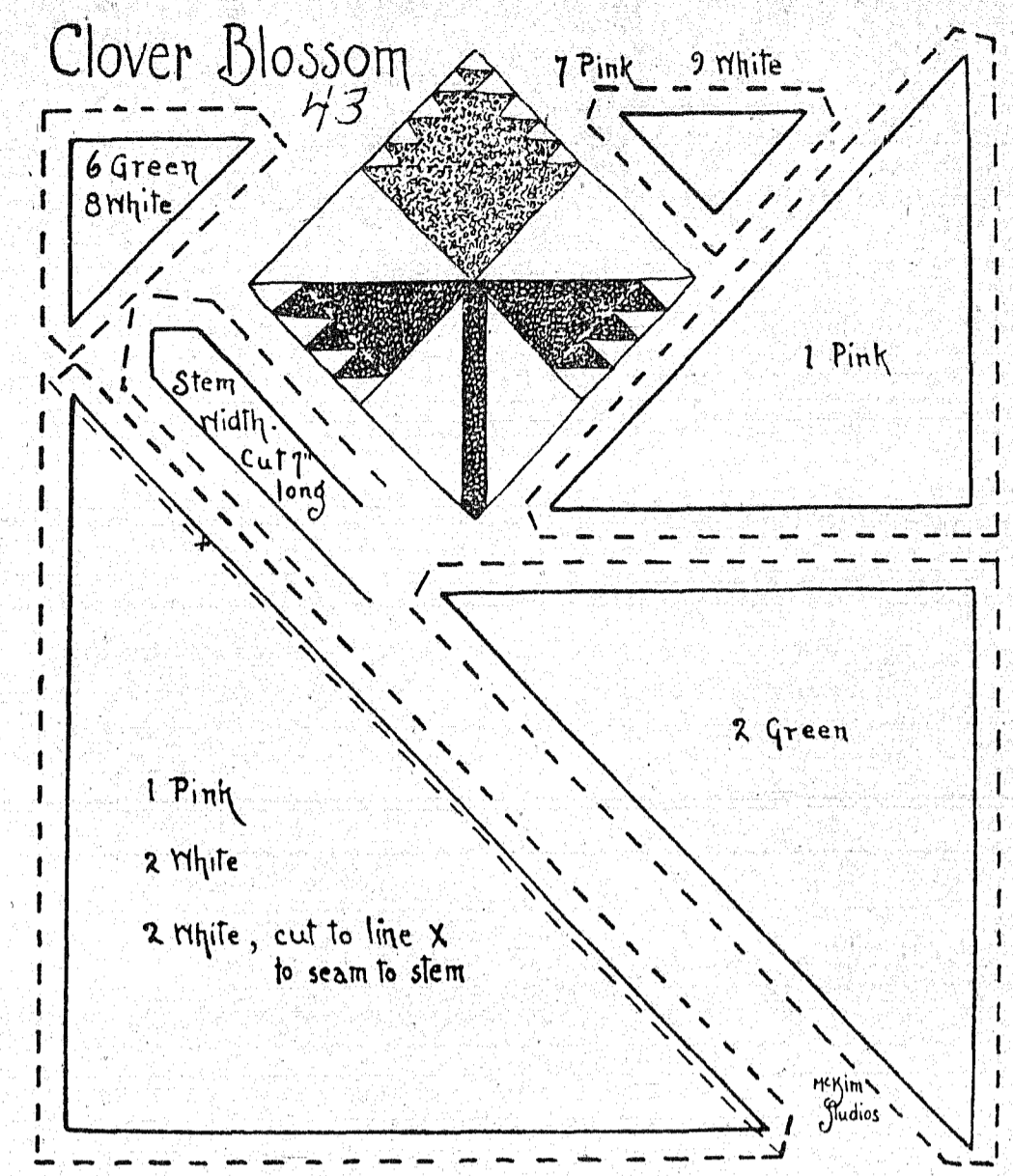

## THE STATES PATCHWORK QUILT PARADE



**A QUILT FOR VERMONT.**  
Clover Blossom.  
This fragrant little flower that serves so beautifully was chosen by Vermont as a state emblem. Conventionalized into a patchwork of triangles it makes a prize winning quilt, dainty, unusual and not too difficult to make. Of course, tiny pieces mean lots of work, but they do pay in effect.

Pieced blocks from this pattern will finish about 9 inches square, or 12 1/2 inches across diagonally. If set together with alternate plain squares with half squares of white at the sides, you will need 30 pieced blocks for a quilt center 62x73. Around this we suggest a 6-inch border made from the clover blossom half of the block alternated with plain triangles the same size. A narrow additional border of white could still be added for a larger size quilt, with green binding to finish after quilting.

The clover block is all straight sewing but cutting and seam width must be very exact. The white triangles that join the stem are cut one seam smaller than those used above. Yardage allowance for a full sized quilt is 2 yards of pink, 2 green, which includes binding, and 9 yards of white.

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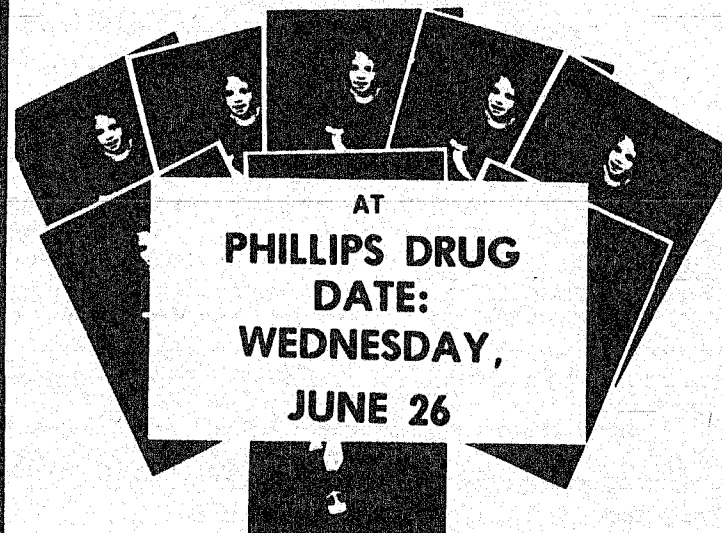
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# WHON NEWS
