Board to review bids tonite

The Santa Anna School District Board of trustees will meet tonight at 7:00 PM to review bids for construction of the new multi-purpose building to be added to the school campus. Plans are for the building to be ready for occupancy for the fall school term.

ILCOR Corp. of Austin are designers of the building and also drew up the bid specifications. The building will house four classrooms,

the offices of the superintendent and school business manager, and a conference room.

According to school officials, more space is needed due to the continued growth in student population and additional educational requirements. During the past several years, most elementary classes have required two sections.

Space made available in the high school building when the new

building is occupied, will be used for additional classroom and office space. The superintendent and business manager currently have offices in the high school building.

The multi-purpose building will be constructed from available local funds and construction is expected to begin within a few weeks.

The building will be of brick construction to blend with other structures on the campus.

Jam for St. Jude

PROBLEM: Quality of Life of children and their parents during their treatment for malignant disease. This hospital's policy of helping the total human being rather than aiming treatment in the diseased organ only.

SYNOPSIS: Recent studies at St. Jude Hospital by the department of psychiatric services (psychologists, psychiatrists, social workers) have begun investigating the neuropsychological effects of cancer treatment on a cross-section of long-term survivors.

Many children and their parents suffer from intense anxieties and depressions in addition to physical pain and discomfort during their catastrophic illness and its treatment.

The children's school attendance suffers because of their hospitalization and repeated visits for outpatient care in this hospital and because their whole body, including their nervous system, suffers due to their malignant disease and intensive treatment. Some children are hesitant to return to school due to their worries about their changed appearances e.g., amputation, loss of hair. Because of this they frequently show academic problems with resulting feelings of inferiority, vocational uncertainty, depressions, and decrease of motivation for achievement in school and work.

Parents exhausted by their struggle for the child's survival are faced with an additional burden to help their child to readjust to satisfactory functioning among their peers who are living healthy and normal lives.

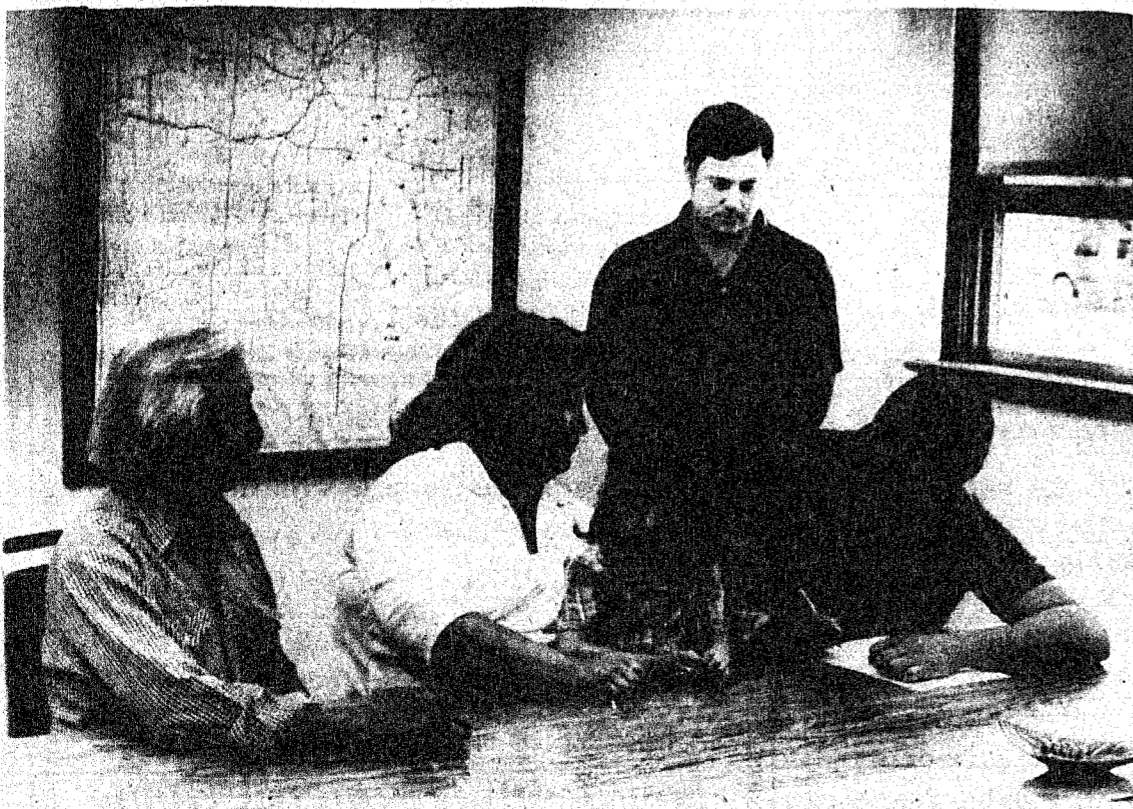
School solicits parent input

Don's Diary

Have you ever been lonely? Silly question isn't it? Of course we have all been alone and have been lonely! Have you ever been in the midst of a crowd and still been lonely?

Loneliness is a universal experience. We have all experienced loneliness to one degree or another.

There is that physical loneliness. When separation because of miles or time puts loneliness into our vocabulary. This kind of loneliness is best pictured by a solitary owl perched on some bare branch in the darkness of night in some dreary place of desolation.

There is that personal loneliness when we put up barriers between ourselves and those around us. These barriers lead to the worse kind of loneliness. Being lonely in the midst of people; now that is lonely. A feeling of being cut off from people around us is the worse kind of being alone.

Barriers often lead us to loneliness. The barrier of self. When we think we are better than others we can be so lonely.

The barrier of love. When we love those who will love us back to the extent that we do not venture out to those unlovely people who may not love us back we can be lonely in the midst of people who may need love.

The barrier of religion. Did that surprise you? Some religious folks put up barriers. Some people have just enough religion to keep them miserable. They have enough to keep them from reading "Playboy" but not enough to keep them reading the Bible. They have enough to trust Jesus but not enough to trust God in all the "personal" elements of life.

There are ways we can break down these barriers. We have been offered the abundant life through the lifestyle of Jesus.

One way is to cultivate empathy. Empathy means standing in another's shoes and looking at life through their eyes. As the Indian saying goes "Do not criticize until you have walked in his shoes."

Learning to give ourselves in love to others helps us to overcome loneliness. A man of the New Testament named Zacchaeus was a lonely man. He was short of stature and was the brunt of cruel jokes as he was growing up. To compensate for this he became a rich and powerful man. He was going to show them! He used every trick in the trade to become rich and powerful. Then it happened, Jesus showed him a new lifestyle. Jesus showed him how to love rather than impress and exploit. And in this love Zacchaeus was released from his self imposed prison. When we rise to the occasion of giving ourselves in love we are released from defensive and "mesism" and to a great degree are released from loneliness in a crowd.

Knowing God's companionship helps us to overcome. In John's gospel, chapters seven and eight we read of a lonely time in the life of Jesus. He had lost the popular following. Jesus was not bringing a sugar stick but a lifestyle and this caused many of the easy followers to abandon him.

The attackers of those in authority were become worse and worse.

Even his close followers began to slip away. John records that even his brothers did not believe in him.

In this midst of terrifying loneliness a great truth came over Jesus. "He who sent me is with me, he has not left me alone."

The constant love of God can help us through the loneliness.

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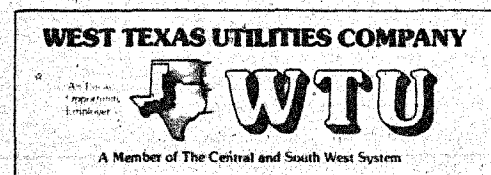

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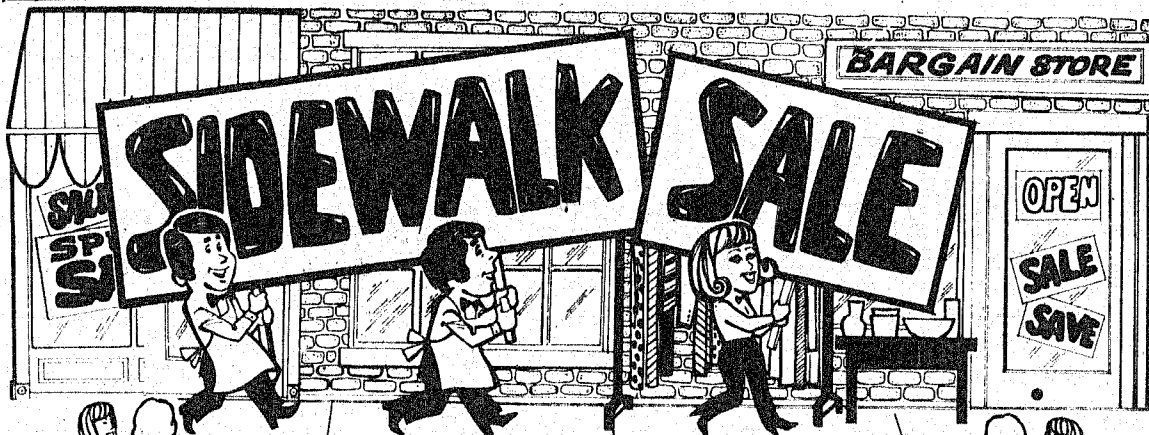
