## City Council - School Board Meetings

### City Council

The City Council met in regular session at 7:00 pm on June 6 at the City Hall, with all members present.

Mayor Guerrero announced the appointment of Rod Musick as municipal judge, stating that he was chosen from a list of four candidates. It was the Mayor's intent to encourage the younger citizens of Santa Anna to become involved.

Monte Guthrie III spoke to the council on behalf of the Chamber of Commerce to ask the council to sell the Hardy Blue Building to the Chamber. The council took no action on the request in order to check legality of the sale.

Glen Copeland spoke to the council about upkeep and condition of the armory building. The council agreed to be more watchful of the building and renters of it.

The council agreed to remove 6 foot of curbing in front of the Henry

Griffin residence on Highway 84, in order to allow a safer driveway, with the condition that the property owner would repair the curb.

Police Officer Bill Allen spoke to the council concerning missing traffic signs, blind intersections, and abandoned cars on the streets. Council approved action by the police to correct the problems. Allen also requested approval for a reserve police force. The request was granted with final approval upon application to the council. Reserve police will be volunteers.

Ray Owens was hired to do blade work for the city on the dirt streets.

The Council agreed to a request by the mayor to start replacing specified fire hydrants. Three will be replaced during the first year. It was explained that this is a costly project and will take some time to make all replacements needed.

The television cable service was discussed and note made that the Brownwood Cable service does not have an existing franchise with the city. Brownwood Cable TV has requested to be on the agenda for the next council meeting.

Mayor Guerrero cited Patrick Hosch for rendering aid to a local woman recently. The woman was ill and Hosch rendered aid and transported her to the hospital and made arrangements for her children to be cared for during the crisis.

Councilman Garland Morgan spoke to the council about the condition of railroad crossings in the city. It was determined that the railroad is responsible only for the area inside the length of the railroad ties.

A discussion on a night watchman brought no action.

Meeting time was changed to 7:00 p.m. for future meetings.

The Santa Anna School District Board of Trustees met in regular session on Monday, June 10, at 7:30 p.m. with all members present.

The board receded a previous motion to provide alternate kindergarten for the 1985-86 school year. They then approved full day, every school day, kindergarten classes. This action being made possible because the legislature did not lower the funding as had been expected, when the previous plans were made.

The annual evaluation report of the 5-year priority plan was studied and approved.

The board approved a plan to install new quartz lighting fixtures on

existing poles at the football field. With the help of several local persons, the project can be accomplished for approximately \$5,000. Previous bids had ranged as high as \$20,000 to \$30,000.

The resignation of Nancy Gooch, a math teacher, was accepted. Mrs. Gooch wishes to take a year off from teaching to be at home with a small child that she and her husband, Jim Gooch, plan to adopt.

Jerry Ellis was employed as a half-time science teacher. Ellis is a Santa Anna native who is engaged in farming and ranching. Recent teaching employment was with Howard Payne University.

Sandra Guthrie, also a Santa Anna native was employed as a half-time language arts teacher in Jr. High and High School. Mrs. Guthrie has previously taught in the Santa Anna Schools.

Betty Smith, who did her student teaching in the Santa Anna Elementary School this past year, was employed as an elementary teacher.

Jan Ellis, a teacher in the Garner ISD the past year was employed as elementary teacher.

Lonnie Baker, recently with the Raymondville ISD was hired as Band Director.

Other routine business matters were discussed and acted upon.

### Beautify Highways

Washington, D.C.—Senator Lloyd Bentsen introduced legislation Wednesday to encourage states to plant native wildflowers along the nation's highways.

Bentsen said a state wildflower project in Texas has resulted in a reduction in littering, mowing, and watering costs.

"The experience in Texas indicates that not only does this type of planting beautify the roadways, it has the potential of reducing mowing costs by 25 percent or more," Bentsen said.

The wildflower provision was included in legislation approved by the

Senate earlier this year, but the bill did not achieve final passage through Congress.

Under Bentsen's legislation, states would be required to spend at least 25 cents of every \$100 they receive in federal-aid highway construction landscaping funds to plant wildflowers. The requirement could be waived for agricultural areas or areas where it is difficult to raise the flowers.

"Anyone who has seen the Blue Bonnets along the Interstates in Texas knows how effective this type of planting could be throughout the nation," Bentsen said.

### May Rainfall

### Court Change

Two changes for the court system and prosecution in Coleman County were passed by the Texas Legislature, being presented by Senator Grant Jones.

The first change moved Coleman County back to a single district county to the 42nd District with Don Lane as district judge. For some time this county has been in both the 35th and 42nd districts. Judge Lane has been handling all the cases here due to Judge Gordon Griffin being ill.

The other change, which came quite late in the session, provided that the County Attorney will have

the option of prosecuting felony cases, and if he does, to receive \$5,000 additional salary, this to come from the state.

It has been pointed out with the county Attorney prosecuting both misdemeanors and felonies, the Sheriff would not have to drive to Abilene to file a complaint.

### Judge Griffin Resigns

District Judge Gordon Griffin of the 35th District Court, Brown, Coleman and Mills Counties, has tendered his resignation to Governor

Mark White effective July 8, 1985 or on such date thereafter as his successor may be appointed by the governor.

Judge Griffin said today that "I want the voters of this District to know how much I have enjoyed serving as their Judge and regret that due to a stroke suffered in September of last year that I am

unable to continue. During the time I have served as Judge of the 35th

District the dockets have been substantially reduced and many cases have been disposed of, both civil and criminal. It is my hope that

many of the innovations I began in the selection of juries and in the rapid disposition of cases can be followed in the future. My ex-

perience has convinced me of the truth of the old adage: Justice delayed is justice denied.

"I appreciate the opportunity that the voters of Brown, Coleman and Mills Counties have given me and of

my chance to serve as District Judge."

### Firms Charge for Free Services

Responding to numerous inquiries, Priscilla Ely, Social Security manager in Brownwood, said today that several firms are operating in the Brownwood area soliciting people through direct mail and advertisements in various publications. These firms are selling services which are provided at no charge by every Social Security office.

These firms are generally involved with two different services, Ely said.

The most common is the company which obtains local marriage records and then mails new brides an offer to change their name in Social Security records for a \$10 fee. This service can be obtained without charge at any Social Security office. In addition, the bride has to do everything for the company she would have to do if she contacted Social Security in the first place.

For a bride to change her name in Social Security records, she needs the original or certified copy of her marriage certificate showing both her new and old names. The bride can contact the Brownwood Social Security office simply by calling

646-7533 to start the process.

The other service being sold is to obtain a copy of a person's record of earnings covered by Social Security or providing an estimate of future Social Security benefits. These, too, can be obtained through any Social Security office without any charge.

To get a statement of earnings covered by Social Security, all a person has to do is get Form SSA-7004PC, available free at any Social Security office, complete it, and mail it. In return he or she will receive an extract of his or her Social Security record.

People younger than 60 can get a benefit estimate by making the request on the form. People 60 or older can get an immediate benefit estimate at any Social Security office. There is no charge for these services, Ely said.

The Brownwood Social Security office is located in the 300 N. Main Bldg. and the telephone number is 646-7533.

A representative of the Brownwood office visits Santa Anna once a month on the 1st Wednesday from 10:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon.

## Letter To Editor

Dear Editor,

Your readers cover many miles, as proved by the response to my recent story on the Stacy family whose name will be on the Stacy Dam.

Mrs. M. D. Stacy of Coleman County cleared up the untold burial place of Morgan Stacy; he is buried in the Santa Anna Cemetery, his dates of birth and death being 1863-1931. His wife, Lula died in Ballinger, but was buried beside him; her dates are 1865-1960. Jess, the younger son, lies in the family plot, and the dates are 1899-1952. Wanda, the younger daughter was married to a man named Boulden; she was born in 1905 and died in 1982.

Dorothy Baxter Thompson writes from Dallas that her grandmother was Frances Stacy Vollenline, a sister of Morgan, Clemmie and Mollie Stacy. Frances Stacy married Henry Vollenline, a prosperous stockman of the Line community, but the family lived in town, and had several attractive daughters: Jess, Frankie, (Frances), Lucile, Emma, Ruby and Lula. Dorothy was the daughter of Ed and Lucile Baxter; Ed was a business man and longtime mayor of Santa Anna. She also tells

the burial place of the Stacys.

Thomas Campbell, son of Henry and Bell Kirkpatrick Campbell, writes from Harrison, Arkansas, that Morgan Stacy's body was brought from—he thinks—Lampasas and buried here, about 1931. Campbell was away from Santa Anna at the time, and as a teacher and educator he was later president of Bethel College in Tennessee, besides serving many churches as pastor.

Mrs. J. P. McClellan also told of the funeral of Morgan Stacy, which was held in the First Baptist Church, with Rev. M. L. Womack of the local Presbyterian Church assisting in the service. The choir of the Presbyterian Church were singers.

The strong response to the article shows the influence of your fine newspaper. This letter will answer most of the questions and also thank all those who have written, telephoned and expressed their interest in the Stacy story. Other writing keeps me from answering each one personally, but the information they gave adds to the completeness of the family history.

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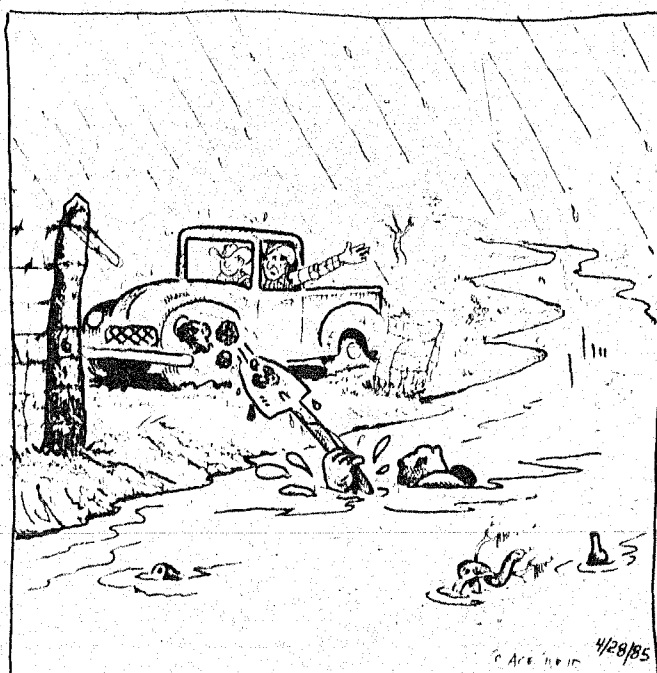

## Freezing Reminders

Home frozen foods can have a color, flavor, texture and nutritive value much like the fresh product, if you follow recommended practices for freezing foods, she points out. If you have questions about those practices, you can get detailed information on freezing fruits and vegetables from your county Extension office, she adds.

## THE STATES PATCHWORK QUILT PARADE

Ohio Rose



OHIO ROSE.

We are indeed proud to present such a lovely applique rose design in this small space. The heirloom quilt from which this design was taken alternated 15-inch applique squares built formally, like the block shown above, with the squares that had a very simple spray, something like the grouping suggested in the other small sketch.

Sprays would also be interesting

on a wide scallop border with this design, surrounding a quilt center 4 blocks wide by 5 long. Twenty 15-inch blocks would be 60 x 75; with a 12-inch border scallop the size would be 84 x 99.

Make a set of accurate patterns of cardboard or emery paper. Cutting sizes are the dotted outside line with seam allowance. Colors may be either two or three values of pink, orchid or yellow to orange if you

prefer. Pattern for the center circle is not given but it cuts 2 inches in diameter. The stems are narrow width bias tape in a green that blends well with your leaf color although it may be a value lighter.

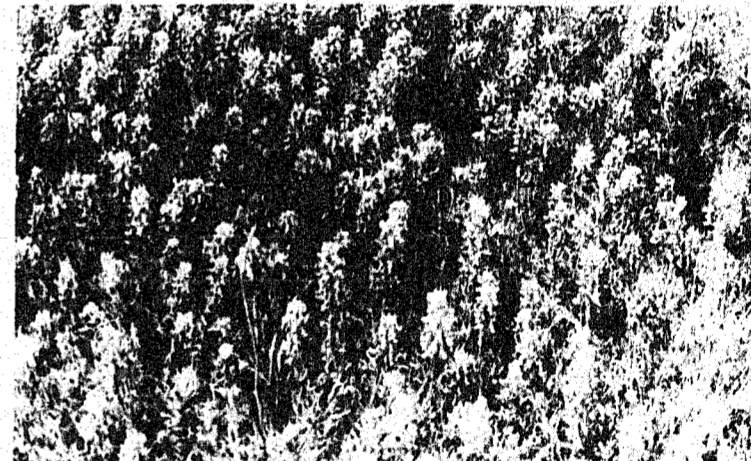
Allow seven yards of white or ivory, 2-3 yard of rose, one yard of pink, 1 and 1-3 yards of green and six inches of a scrap of yellow for the center circle.

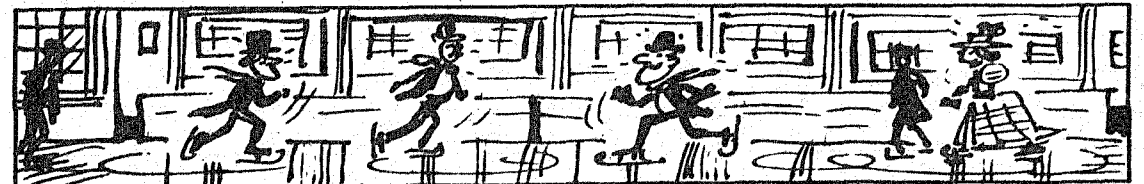

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## Cotton Crop

### Insurance

GEORGETOWN, TX—June 10 is the final planting for insured cotton in Coleman County, Texas, according to Ardell Kalmbach, District Representative for the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC).

Insured cotton planted by June 10 must be reported by June 30 in order to receive full crop insurance coverage. The acreage report reflects the actual acreage planted and reported by the farmer.

In order to provide some flexibility on planting dates, a late planting option may be exercised by farmers who find themselves unable to plant their crops on time due to adverse weather. The late planting option provides insurance coverage.

For insured farmers, "Entering into the late planting option is not automatic," Kalmbach said. "Farmers wishing to use the late planting option must sign an agreement prior to the final planting date in order to have coverage under the late planting option."

"Increasingly, our insured producers are discovering that with yield guarantees which reflect production capability, crop insurance establishes a farm income floor. Thus, cash flow and the ability to repay a loan can be more accurately projected," explained Kalmbach.
