Those attending spent the day visiting and reminiscing about the years in training and reporting of their careers and families in the intervening years.

The nursing school was started in 1926 and continued until 1938. Students in school at that time went to other nursing schools to finish their training. The smallest class had two students, and the largest was the Class of 1935 with eight.

The Sealy Hospital was the boyhood dream of the late Dr. T. R. Sealy, who was honor graduate of the University of Texas at Galveston, with class of 1904. He was left an orphan and raised by Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Culverwell of Milam County, who brought him to Coleman County in 1897.

After graduation he returned to Coleman County with a little Spanish pony, a few obstetrical instruments and a little bag of pills and began practicing at Santa Anna in 1904.

He again opened the Sealy Hospital in 1919, later units were added to each end of the building.

The first class of the School of Nursing was in 1919, discontinued in 1938, due to health of Dr. Sealy.

All records are not available: only classes of 1929 through 1936. A plaque placed on the front

porch, before it was enclosed for rooms read: Santa Anna Hospital, erected A.D.

The History of Coleman County Electric Cooperative

Editors's note: This article is a continuation of the article run last

After the United States entered into World War II, material became increasingly hard to get. War activities were using more and more resources, including cooper wire, the conductor needed to build new electric lines. Lines that were begun in 1941 were not completed until several years later. Deposits had been taken from hundred of new members, who during the war lived within easy view of the new poles standing naked of the cooper wire. All construction was at a standstill.

The war's end brought a surge of growth unexpected by all connected with the cooperative. From 1943 to 1950, membership increased from

The new cooperative office was just about completed when Mr. Hale suddenly died of a heart attack in 1950, C. L.
