Coleman Co. Tax District Meeting

Routine business was on the agenda for the monthly meeting of the Coleman County Tax Appraisal District when the group met in Coleman on Monday, May 13 Harold Pittard, chairman, led the session.

Chief Appraiser John Skelton reviewed the financial status of the District and preliminary study was made on the 1986 budget that is to be prepared in June. Changes were discussed and plans made for a small increase to cover expected costs.

The group agreed to delay at least

one year the purchase of a computer system for the District as the present arrangement is less expensive and adequate.

Mr. Skelton reported on staff members who have attended training sessions related to certification as appraisers. It was also decided to use temporary outside appraisers during 1986 to comply with the regulations for reappraisal of all property in the county.

The next meeting of the group will be on Monday, June 10.

School Board Meets

The regular monthly school board meeting was held on Tuesday, May 14 at 7:30 p.m. with all members except Polly Warnock present. Eddie Hartman presided. April minutes were read and approved. A certificate of appreciation was given to Max Eubank for his many years of service as a school board member.

Scott Patterson approached the Board concerning an alarm system for the school, but no action was taken.

Accounts payable was approved and the financial report reviewed. Needed budget amendments were approved by the Board.

Final decision for kindergarten

was made and classes will be held on alternating days (First semester Monday, Wednesday, and Friday, Second semester Tuesday and Thursday).

Don Pritchard was contracted by the Board as inspector for the building now under construction, and he will make periodic inspections and reports of the building process.

The Board set a salary schedule for clerical and instructional aides and then discussed the position of Business Manager and an annual salary was set for that position. The position of Band Director was discussed.

Charlie Jordan Here

He gave some new thoughts on what to do as well as some we are familiar with.

Mr. Jordan said, naturally, a storm cellar is the best place to go during a tornado. A basement is the next best place to be. If neither of those are available, go to a small, interior room.

Mr. Jordan said he had always heard "go to a bathroom" but if the bathroom has an outside wall, this is not the place to go. The tornado takes the outside walls first, working toward the center of the house. So, any small, interior room is where you need to be. Mr. Jordan also said to have something to cover your head.

If a person is outside, Mr. Jordan said to go to the lowest spot possible, whether it be a hole, ditch, or just a low spot in the area, and always cover your head, even if it is just with your hands and arms.

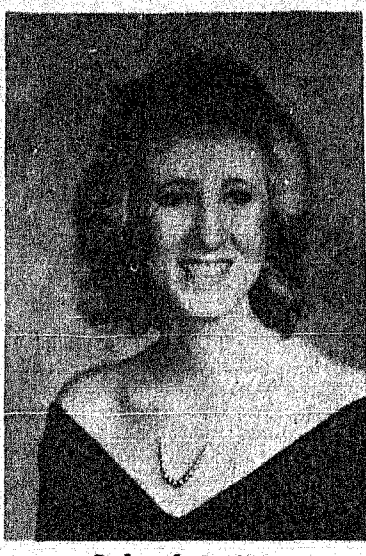
Charlotte Garrett

The History of Coleman County Electric Cooperative

Editors' note: This article is a continuation of the article run last week

After the United States entered into World War II, material became increasingly hard to get. War activities were using more and more resources, including cooper wire, the conductor needed to build new electric lines. Lines that were begun in 1941 were not completed until several years later. Deposits had been taken from hundred of new members, who during the war lived within easy view of the new poles standing naked of the cooper wire. All construction was at a standstill.

The war's end brought a surge of growth unexpected by all connected with the cooperative. From 1943 to 1950, membership increased from

865 to 2,061. Today that figure stands at 3,745. The cooperative to date services some 7,900 meters for an average of about 2 meters per person.

The new cooperative office was just about completed when Mr. Hale suddenly died of a heart attack in 1950. C. L. Newton was then elevated to the managers post and served in that capacity until April 1981. James Barr who had been Member Service Director for 16 years was appointed the new manager. The oil activity began to increase in 1951 in the area the cooperative served. The first oil wells served were in the Cross Plains area. This brought on the task of replacing the original lines with a larger conductor to take care of the larger load. Request for electric service for oil field pumping grew more numerous and in 1960 more than a

schedule. The Coleman County Electric Cooperative serves the rural areas in Coleman, Callahan, Concho, Brown, McCulloch and Tom Green Counties.

In February of 1939, a total of 6,668 third of the meters conected were serving oil wells.

At the present time over 56 percent of the total revenue comes from electricity serving oil wells, 39 percent from farms, and 5 percent from large users of electricity.

In several loans the cooperative has borrowed \$13,361,000.00 from R.E.A. At the present time a total of \$2,371,435.00 has been repaid on the principal and the cooperative has paid the government \$267,220.00 in interest. Figures reveal that \$425,000.00 has been paid ahead of term by the members at each annual meeting. The directors elect their officers after the annual meeting.

kilowatts were used by the members of the cooperative as compared to 2,905,000 kilowatts used in January of 1966. Today that total is 6,107,974. In February of 1939 the cooperative had 133 miles of line and in January of 1966 had 2,697 as opposed to 3,468 today. In February of 1939, the average kilowatt hours used that month by members was 35, as compared to 345 in January 1966, and is currently averaging 398 of the farm and 1,417 by commercial users as compared to 1,143 in January 1966.

The cooperative is governed by a board of directors consisting of nine member consumers. Three directors are elected for a three year

secretary, of Coleman, Texas, tenure began July 1951; Wilma Davis, of Winters, Texas, tenure began January 1970; Roger Bryan, of Winters, Texas, tenure began August 1984; Johnnie Henderson of Coleman, Texas, tenure began July 1958; Tom Kingsbery, of Santa Anna, Texas, tenure began May 1962; Harold Pittard, of Novice, Texas, tenure began August 1983; and Clinton Tounget of Miles, Texas, tenure began August 1980. James C. Barr of Coleman, Texas is the manager of the Cooperative, and his tenure began May 1981.

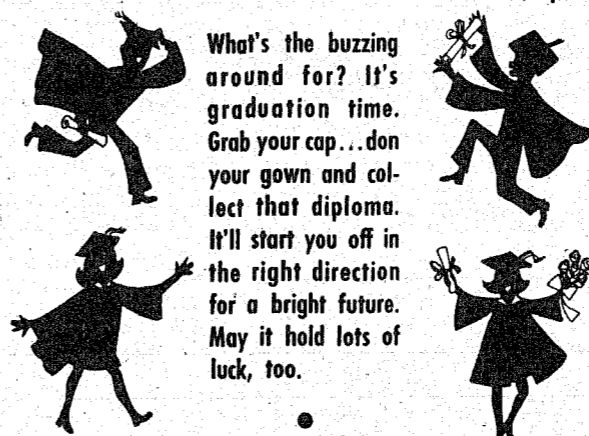


