The fourth annual Coleman Air Show will be held this Saturday, April 20th from 10:00AM until 4:00 PM at the Coleman Municipal Airport.

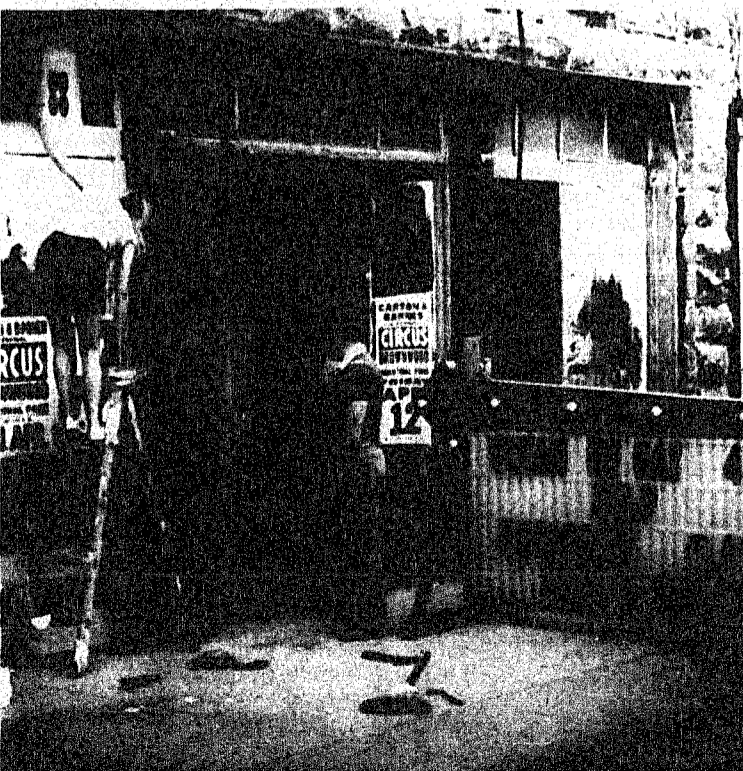

Farmer's market

AUSTIN--Eleven new farmers markets--including one in Brownwood--will open this summer, the Texas Department of Agriculture has announced.

Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower said in a statement that more than 30 such markets will be open across the state this summer.

Farmers markets let agriculture producers sell their products directly to consumers and bypass the middle man, often resulting in lower costs to consumers, he said.

'Last year,' Hightower said, 'nearly 600 farmers participated in the 19 Texas Department of Agriculture-assisted markets, selling to roughly 350,000 consumers and putting an additional \$1.6 million into their pockets. That averages out to about a 30 percent increase in participating farmers' income due to these new markets.'

The agency's marketing director, John Vlcek, said most of the markets will begin opening in late May and will be in full swing by early June.

Bell was said to be the fifth man in the rendezvous near the Jennings oil field, when the officers approached the house on the morning of January 16, a short time after the robbery of the Lohn Bank. Olice E. Woods was killed and the other man was thought to be seriously wounded.

Three Rice brothers were taken in charge, two of them are now out under bond and another one, who was arrested in California and brought back to Brady, is now in the McCulloch County Jail.

Ice cream freeze-off

Entries are being sought for the ice cream freeze off to be held during the Frontier Day activities on Saturday, May 4, 1985. 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Jr. Mounties 2nd in District Tennis team advances

The Santa Anna Junior High boys track team fell one point short of the district championship. Irion County scored 103 1/2 points and Santa Anna had 102 1/2. Eden was third with 80 points. Other teams in the top six were Christoval, Novice, and Lohn.

The 400m relay team of Alonzo Hernandez, Bobby DeLeon, James Hartman, and Reece McIver posted a time of 49.56 seconds for second place. Irion County was first with 48.20 seconds.

Jackie Duquette performed extremely well. He placed second in the 110m hurdles with a time of 19.74 seconds. He and Scooter Myers both qualified for the finals in the 300m hurdles. Jackie placed fourth and Scooter placed eighth.

In the 100m dash, Bobby DeLeon placed third and James Hartman finished sixth.

Santa Anna was represented in the 400m dash by McIver, Lonnie Kirven, and Scotty Anderson. McIver won first, and Kirven took third place.

Bobby DeLeon took fifth place in

the 200m dash and Pablo Rodriguez finished eighth.

Rodriguez, Hernandez, and Robert Duus ran their best times in the very difficult 800m run. Rodriguez placed second (2:19) and Hernandez finished seventh.

In the 1600m run, Shane Simmons placed sixth, Robert Duus was seventh followed closely by Rhett Guthrie. It was their best performance of the year.

The 1600m relay team of Hernandez, Rodriguez, Kirven, and McIver gave their best performance as they took first place in a time of 3:57.

In the field events, Reece McIver won two blue ribbons. He won the shot put and the discus. Bobby DeLeon won sixth place in the high jump.

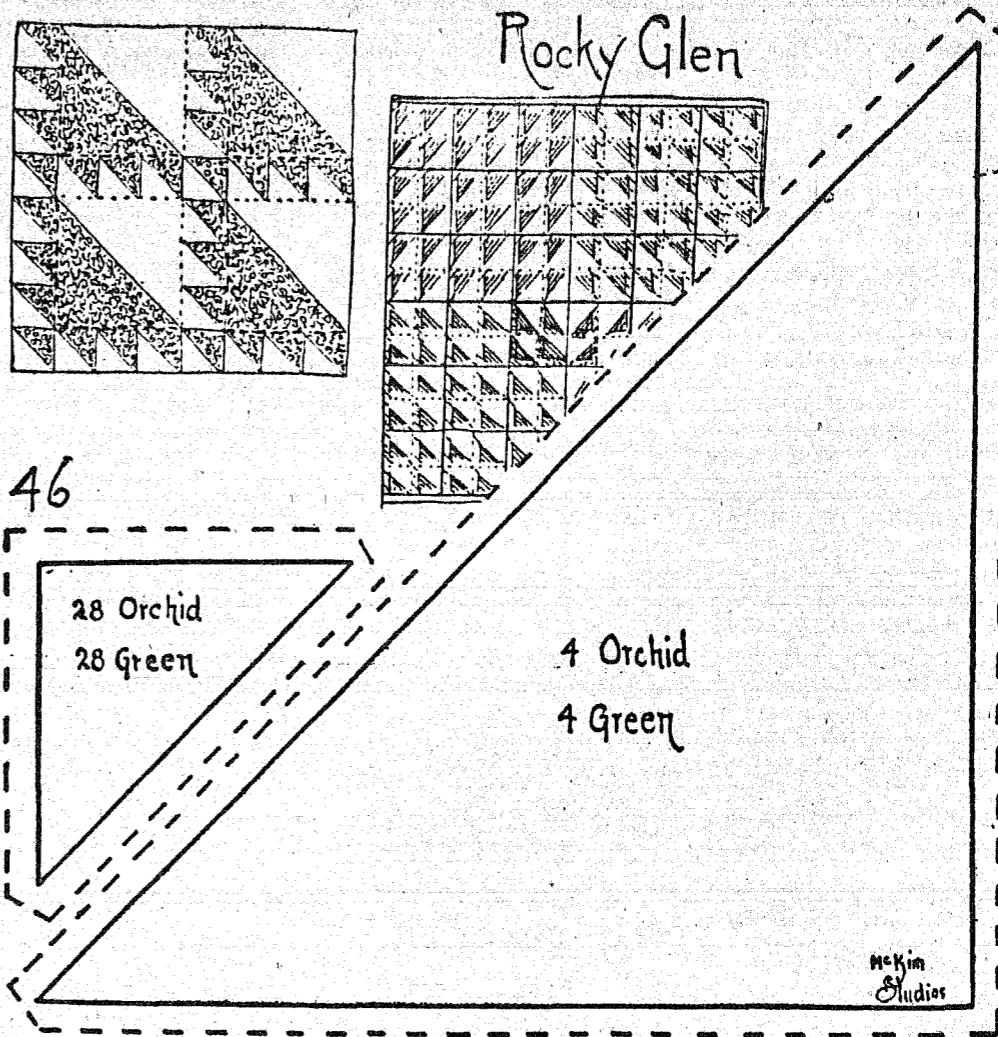
Surprise party for Bobby

THE STATES PATCHWORK QUILT PARADE



Quilt for West Virginia

Since 'Rocky Glen' was an especial favorite in the South, and since West Virginia is so rich in rugged scenery, we dedicate this charming patchwork to that sturdy State. By the way, this same pattern is called 'Lost Ship' in some of the seaboard states.

It is entirely an affair of right triangles, sewed long edges together into squares; the little two-color squares then combine into strips and are added to the larger squares about 15 inches square.

Setting the blocks together might be done in a variety of ways, they place diagonally to good advantage with all the large dark triangles

below the light ones, and the edges of the quilt filled in with half blocks. We sketch an unusual horizontal placing with 36 blocks all turning in toward the center.

Any two colors of material may be used; a full size quilt will require about six yards of each. The quilt sketched is 90 inches square.

There is no sewing in making these; the handwork is held firmly in the hoops, the harmonizing or contrasting lace or edging is glued in place, with a small loop for hanging on the back. Observe Pet Week

May 5-11 is both National Pet Week and Be Kind to Animals Week. This year, as a gesture of affection for your pet, take steps to ensure that the animal is not suffering from otitis externa.

Otitis externa is an ear infection which commonly affects cats and dogs. The disease can be diagnosed by your veterinarian and treated successfully in most cases. However, if the infection reaches an advanced stage without treatment, obstructive swelling of the ear canal can occur, which may result in hearing impairment.

Signs of otitis externa which may be displayed by cats and dogs include a foul odor in the ear area, a head tilt, frequent head shaking and ear scratching, or distress when the head is touched. In addition to regular physical examinations for the animal once or twice a year, owners should regularly use a flashlight or penlight to check their pet's ears for abnormal debris or odd-colored wax.

Dr. Boraski stressed the importance of consulting a veterinarian if you suspect that your pet has otitis externa. Observe the week-long tribute to animals by checking for and, if necessary, treating otitis externa in your cat or dog. Be sure that your pet can hear your expressions of affection.
