Freestone County in 1874 was thin ly settled and improvements were primitive, but the people ther and Eliza Brooke, living there with and Eliza Brooke, living there with
several small children, welcomed a several small children, welcomed a new baby daughter that year, naming her Lula. Their home was a par
of the Brooke plantation, a proof the Brooke plantation, a pro-
sperous place, where the farming was done by negroes who had before the Civil War belonged to J. G.'s father and most of them had been born there.
The settlement of lands to the west, in Central Texas, made J. G wish to go there too; it was uprooting his family to leave for the open range, but he liked horses and cattle
more than cotton-farming, and he more than cotton-farming, and he
had a sizeable herd to start. He plan ned to drift them west until he found
grassland to his liking, where he Could preempt or buy a homestead. This was in 1879, the Indians were by that time on reservations, the future looked bright. As they packed their by oxen, it amazed them how few of by oxen, it amazed them how few of
their lifetime possessions they could take along.
Lula was by this time five years old. Almost the only thing she emembers of Freestone County is the myriad of wild pigeons which infested in clouds of birds that took hours and even days to pass a given point, and when they roosted, hug weight. They weure break with thei weight. They were a deadly menace to the poor farmers, whose very
lives depended on their crops as the iirds, larger than our trops, as the would leave their roosts at dawn settle by thousands in the fields, and literally strip the crops to the bare ground. That they could be exter minated, or even controlled, seemed impossible, but the farmers would go to their roosts at night and club as many as they could, to save their elds. Their numbers in flight wer he marvel and the despair of that forgotten the noisy cloud of birds that marked their passing, going on

Lula had known these good colored people all her life, they were her loved friends, and she and the other children cried bitterly when they turned to go back to their homes after telling them goodbye. From Freestone County they trailed the herd to Waco, and then bore to the southwest to strike the Colorado River near Richland Springs. In no hurry, as the cattle were fattening on the fine grass, they kept watch on
the livestock and enjoyed the scenery. The work of the camp, the cooking and bedmaking, washing clothes at the creeks, and other chores, went on just aboint as they would have done at home. At night the family and the hired drovers would gather around the campfire, singing or talking until bedtime. The mother was an unusual and gifted woman. A natural musician,
she could play several instruments she could play several instruments
and sing many of the ballads of the time, some of them brought from Europe 200 years before. The
