

## Santa Anna Receives \$1,520.11 Check

AUSTIN-State Comptroller Bob **Bullock Friday sent checks totaling** \$56.6 million in local sales tax to the 1,010 cities that levy the one-percent city tax.

Houston's check was the largest --\$9.1 million--bringing total payments in 1985 to 123.4 million, up 4 percent over 1984. Dallas received \$6.9 million for a total of \$91.2 million in total payments for the year, an increase of 13 percent.

Our own city of Santa Anna received \$1,520.11, making the 1985 payments to date a total of \$22,879.10, an increase of 1.85 percent over last year. Coleman County as a whole is down 6.85 percent from this time last year.

San Antonio's payment of \$3.5 million increased that city's 1985 payments to \$45.3 million, up 13 per-

cent over last year. Austin's check for \$2.8 million pushed payments to \$35.8 million, a 20 percent increase over 1984 payments.

Fort Worth received \$2.1 million for a 1985 total of \$27.4 million, up 10

# City Council Meets

#### Receives Grant

The city council met on Thursday. October 10 in regular session with Mayor Guerrero presiding and all members present.

Fred Teagardon of S & K Engineering met with the group to discuss the upgrading of the sewer treatment plant. It was the conclusion of Mr. Teagardon that he had found no fault with the system but would write a letter to the state asurring them that any necessary upgrading would be done in order to keep permits.

Eddie Voss spoke on behalf of the Chamber of Commerce to express their thanks to the city for allowing them to use equipment and materials for their pothole project. A check in the amount of \$356.30 was presented to the city to re-imburse for materials used.

Councilman Gary Fleeman spoke on behalf of Roy Buse who had asked to be on the agenda but could not be present. A requst was made that in the future, the city would require

more detailed specifications when receiving bids for street repairs. The council agreed to the request.

A letter from Governor White was read informing the City that they had received a grant for the landfill project. Mayor Guerrero thanked Former Mayor Ed Hartman for the work he had done in instituting the work toward the grant during his term in office and Hartman in turn expressed thanks to former city secretary Pat Rutherfor for the many long hours she worked on the project.

A discussion was held concerning work order contracts with Todd Engineering and Traylor Engineering who had worked with the city in securing the grant.

Bill Allen Discussed the police reserve and awarded certificates to Paul Martin, Ken Brixey, Ben Morris, and James Morris.

Bids were opened on the lot 4 block 22 and lot 3 block 21, that had been advertised for bid. Billy Diaz was

awarded the bid at \$400 per lot.

C.R. Owen received the bid on the 1977 Chev. pickup at the bid of \$103. In other action The council agreed to a request from Udell Copeland specking for the Nutrition Program asking for a handicapped restroom to be installed next to their space in the Civic Center.

After an excutive session the council returned to take care of some routine business and to read an ordinance forbidding hunting, fishing, and swimming in or around the property owned by the city in the Santa Anna lake area.

The council agreed to pay John Pearce, dogcatcher, a fee of \$10 per animal impounded.

Stanley Hartman made a request on behalf of the Chamber of Commerce for the city to take action to verify ownership of what is known as the Blue building next door to the Lions Club. The Chamber wishes to fix it up and use it for their offices.

## **Baptists Observe Anniversary**

Members and former members of Santa Anna First Baptist Church met Sunday, October 12, to observe the 105th anniversary of the church. Theme for the day of celebration and worship was Celebrating the Past, Present and Future.

Over 250 people were present for the morning service with the pastor, Rev. John Stanislaw, as speaker. Special music for the service was presented by the church choir, directed by Patrick Hosch; a mixed quartet composed of Marty Donham, Ray Barnett, Gail Horner. and Leanna Hartman; and the Master's Men, composed of Donnie Neff, Patrick Hosch, Dickie Horner and Marty Donham.

A buffet lunch was served by the the Adult II Sunday School department, with tables arranged in the

gymnasium of the Christian Life Center and decorated in anniversary theme. Members of the food committee were William Brown, Bessie McDonald and Oma Dean Horner.

During the afternoon the former pastors present each spoke briefly, as well as two Santa Anna natives who are in the ministry. They included Harry Wigger of Bentonville, Arkansas, who was pastor from 1949 to 1953; H. G. Verner of Lubbock, pastor in 1954 to 1955; and Raymond Jones of Sidney, pastor from 1960 to 1966. Lyle Pearce of Louisville, Kentucky was ordained in the ministry at the local church, as was Don Rutherford of Arlington.

Rev. S. R. Smith served as pastor the longest time, eight years. Others with long tenure are the late Hal C. Wingo and Raymond Jones, who were pastors serving six years and

five months each. The Rev. John Stanislaw, has served the second longest, with six and one-half years.

Other former pastors who were unable to attend were A. G. Purvis of Cross Plains, who served from 1955 to 1957; Maurice Smith of Atlanta, Georgia, pastor from 1958 to 1959; and Wright Price of Brownwood, pastor from 1973 to 1978.

Taking part in the afternoon program were children's choir groups directed by Ann Langford and Gail Loyd, and Ray Barnett, chairman of the deacons. gave the benediction.

Special guests included Rev. Moses Padilla and several members of the Cordero Baptist Mission in Santa Anna, the Mexican Mission sponsored by Santa Anna First Baptist Church.

Ms. Clifford displayed a copy of Texas History by Mrs. P.B. Pennvbacker, used for many years in Texas schools, from 1876 to around 1916. Annie Webb Blanton was elected State Superintendent of schools in 1916, though women did not have the vote at that time.

Jane Gustavus told of Texas women in government. When the first constitution was adopted. women had a very low status, with no vote, no jury service, no right to start lawsuits, not accepted as a witness for wills, no right to become lawyers. A married woman could not buy or sell property, not even what she had inherited. The eminent lawgiver, Blackstone, ruled that husband and wife were one, and that one the husband. The Earliest effort to gain citizenship for women was in 1898, by Minnie Fisher Cunningham and Anna Webb Blanton, but with men only in the legislature, the effort was dismissed with scorn. Through the years, eminent women attempted to enfranchise all adults mentally capable, but not until Februrary, 1918, was the preliminary idea signed by Governor W.P. Hobby. The next year, the Texas Legislature urged national suffrage for women, and it became law in 1920.

The amusing career of Miriam A Furguson was told. After the impeachment of her husband, Jim Ferguson, she was elected to the office of governor by the loyal followers of the impeached Jim, in 1924. Defeated in 1926, she ran again and again and was elected in 1933.

Not until 1954 were women allowed on jury service, and it was in the 1970's before women could own separate property. Barbara Jordan of Houston was the first Texas woman elected to the Congress, and Ann Richards first elected as State Treasurer.

Present for the meeting were Mmes. Hardy Blue, Fred Williams, C.D. Bruce, James Spillman, Earl Chapman, A.D. Donham and Frank McCary besides those previously mentioned.





The first doctor to live at Camp Colorado in Lula Harvey's memory was a Doctor Lane, and the Dr. Cochran, who moved on to Coleman after the town was started. Housing was no problem at Camp Colorado, as the many buildings of the post were still standing and fairly habitable.

The grist mill on the Jim Ned was the community meeting-place, where the men rode with corn and wheat to be ground for bread. The sawmill made green trees into lumber, rawhide lumber, which was tough and hard and soon shrank and curled, but was the only building material at hand except stone, and the rocks of some of the post houses were hauled away for this use.

The blacksmith shop which the soldiers had used was still a necessary part of community life; horses for riding and using for the rocky roads must be kept shod, now



## Mountaineers Win Fight, 31-16

The Mountaineers gained a hardfought 31-16 win over the Eden Bulldogs Friday night to set the stage for this Friday's clash with Irion County. Irion County shares the top spot in District 8-A West with the Mounties, at least until they host Santa Anna for a 7:30 p.m. kickoff.

Eden gave Irion County a scare only a week ago and provided the Mounties with a closer game than the score indicates. For Eden, it was a case of too little, too late.

The Mountaineer defense turned in another great performance as they pressured the Bulldogs into mistakes that let the offensive unit strike for paydirt. The defense set up the first TD when Craig Duquette swiped a pass at the Bulldog 27. Four plays later, Russell Williams hit

Johnny Herrod with a 27 yard dart for the score. After Bebe Vasquez booted the PAT, the Mountaineers were in front to stay, 7-0 with 9:12 remaining in the first quarter.

At the 6:25 mark, a Mountie drive stalled and Vasques was called on to kick a 40 yard field goal to up the score to 10-0. Before the quarter was out, Vasquez capped off a 6 play, 62 yard drive by punching in a three yard TD. The Vasquez PAT with 1:59 remaining boosted the score to

Curtis Puckett jumped on an Eden fumble in the end zone at the 5:29 mark of the second quarter to stretch Santa Anna's lead even further. With the Vasquez PAT, the score inched up to 24-0.

Eden came storming back with an




