DPS To Enforce Seat Belt Law Beginning Sunday, Dec. 1

AUSTIN—Department of Public Safety enforcement of the new Texas safety belt law begins on Sunday, December 1, 1985. The law, expected to save hundreds of lives a year in Texas by encouraging more motorists to buckle up, took effect September 1. Drivers and front-seat passengers of cars and trucks up to three-quarter ton capacity will be subject to fines of \$25 to \$50 for violations committed on or after December 1. The State Board of In-

urance's also has decided to grant a reduction in automobile insurance rates based on an assumed 65 percent belt usage rate.

"Informal observations by DPS troopers indicate that two-thirds of Texas motorists are already complying with this law," said Colonel Jim Adams, DPS director. "Those motorists who are not observing this statute are risking losing their lives or being seriously injured in a vehicle accident, and soon they'll also be

facing the prospect of paying a fine for their oversight."

Adams said that in most instances, troopers will be checking for compliance with the safety belt law during routine traffic violator contacts. However, he pointed out that troopers will have the option of stopping motorists if the officers have probable cause to believe the law is being violated.

"The possibility of paying a fine for failing to use a safety belt should

increase the incentive for observing this law, but much greater consequences could be involved for motorists who don't use this proven, lifesaving device," Adams said. "What value can be placed on the loss of a human life or a long-term, serious injury resulting from a crash in which a safety belt could have made the difference?"

The new law did not change the child safety seat statute, which provides that children under two years

of age must be secured in a federally-approved child safety seat system when they are riding in a passenger car or light truck (¾ ton capacity and less). Children from two to four years of age must be secured by a safety belt or safety seat system when riding in a car or light truck.

The only persons exempted from the safety belt law are U.S. Postal Service employees while performing their carrier duties and motorists

who possess a written statement from a licensed doctor stating that the person cannot wear a safety belt for medical reasons.

The law is on the books. Fines begin December 1. Fines and the insurance reduction are extra incentives to buckle up.

With lives and money hanging in the balance, the few seconds required to buckle up seems like a good investment with a significant return.

County Tax Board Members Chosen

Taxing entities in Coleman County have cast votes for members of the Tax Appraisal Board for new terms starting in January 1986.

Each of the nine taxing entities made nominations and cast votes in November, selecting five persons to serve for three-year terms.

Barbara Kingsbery of Santa Anna was the only current member of the board re-elected, receiving 1085 votes. Others named to the Board were Dwight Nanny of Gouldbusk, 976; Mrs. Billie Wright of Novice, 837; Lang Martin of Coleman and Jake McCreary of Santa Anna, 834

each.

Current members of the Board who did not choose to serve another term were Harold Pittard of Novice, Harold Bragg of Talpa, Bill Sneed of Coleman and Jerry May of Coleman. Kingsbery, Pittard, Bragg and Sneed have served on the Appraisal District Board since its organization in 1980. Jerry May has served one term.

The retiring board members will be recognized for their service at a get-together on Monday, December 9, prior to the monthly business session. New members will begin their terms at the January 13 meeting

when officers will be elected for the new year.

TDHS to Have Hearing

The Texas Department of Human Services, the state agency which provides assistance to needy families and children and aged and disabled persons, will conduct a hearing in Abilene to obtain public comment regarding program directions, budget priorities, and expenditure of federal block grant funds including Title XX and Low-Income Home Energy Assistance.

The hearing is scheduled for 9:00 a.m., Thursday, December 5, 1985. It will be held at 4880 Spindletop Drive, Abilene. Facilities are accessible to disabled persons and interpreters will be available for deaf or Spanish-speaking persons.

Conducting the hearing will be members of the department's advisory committees and staff of the agency. Comments from in-

dividuals, representatives of interest groups, and recipients of providers of agency services will be recorded for consideration by department executives in establishing a program and funding plan for 1987 through 1989.

Almost one out of every nine Texans use one or more department services. During Fiscal Year 1985, the

agency provides services for 1.7 million people or about 10.6 percent of the population. Services include financial assistance, health care, day care, family planning, employment services, nursing home care, community care, licensing of child-care facilities, and protective services.

1986 Time Capsule To Be Buried At State Capitol

On December 5, 1986, the Texas Historical Foundation will commemorate Texas' 150th birthday by burying a 50 year time capsule in Austin's Sesquicentennial Park located in the Capitol complex adjacent to the State Capitol building.

All Texans are invited to submit their names, at a cost of only \$1.00 year, to be included on a scroll and enclosed in the 1986 time capsule. Fifty years from now (during our 200th birthday celebration), our future generation will unearth the capsule and display its contents. By contributing your name to the capsule you will be supporting and preserving Texas culture and reminding your children and grand-

children of the unique history we as Texans share. Sesquicentennial year memorabilia representative of our unique state in 1986 will also be included in the capsule but the most important document to be enclosed will be those names and locations of over 10 million living Texans.

The time capsule will be buried under an official plack along side the

planned Sesquicentennial Monument also to be erected in late 1986 on the State Capitol grounds. This capsule will remain untouched for 50 years.

During Texas' 200th birthday celebration the capsule will be uncovered and presented as a gift to the State. In addition, this valuable historic drama and document will be on exhibit in Austin throughout Texas' 200th birthday celebration.

All entries must be received no later than October 1, 1986 and will be accepted effective immediately. For each entry send a check or money for \$1.00 with your full name and address to the Texas Historical Foundation, P.O. Box 2950, Austin, Texas 78769.

The Texas Historical Foundation is a private, non-profit, statewide organization dedicated to promoting and preserving Texas' unique rich history and culture. All money donated will be used to administer this project and enhance and develop Texas preservation programs statewide for years to come.

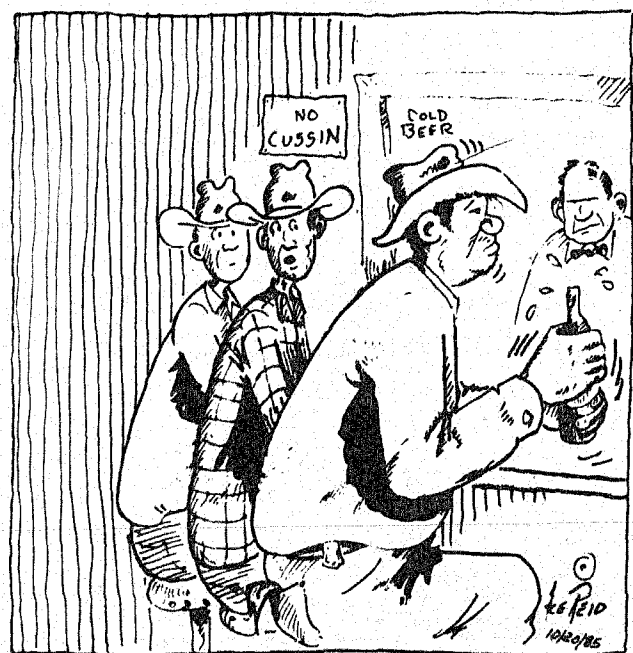

CHAPTER 22 CLEVELAND

The story of a house must be the story of the people who have lived in it.

The house still stands. A two-story house of well cut stone, in what is left of its three-acre park, among some of the big live oak trees which used to surround it. The front door with its fan-lights is still in use, but is now the side door, as it is on the east and the south side is now used as the front. The big central chimney which has three fireplaces, the good rock walls, two feet thick, the hall and stairway, all are there, and have been in use every day since the early 1880's, before the railroad was built up Home Creek toward Fort Concho.

The Cleveland family came in wagons from Galveston, George P., his wife, and their two little boys and two little girls, and settled just west of the curve of Home Creek where Valera now is. Farther and farther west they had drifted sheep, followed by the wagons with the fine old furniture and linens and the many things they would need in setting up a home on the frontier. In one wagon, bedded in sand, were rose bushes and lily bulbs, azaleas, magnolias and ferns. Mrs. Cleveland was willing to go west, but she was going in style. Besides the children, who were Caroline, Lucy, Dexter and another boy, there were herders and servants, so it was quite a big camp which they made on the creek while they were waiting for the ox teams to haul lumber from Fort Worth and rock masons to quarry and cut stone from a bluff to build a house.

Down the creek several miles, the Overalls were living in one room with loft and lean-to; but Cleveland had visioned a fine, large, house, and that is what he built.

A long narrow structure, the house had the front porch and door on the east, as we have said, facing the trail which may have been the stage road from Fort Worth to Yuma. The door opened into a wide hall; the door to the left entered a nice bedroom which had its own fireplace and a large closet, probably used as well for the wash-tub of those days. The other bedrooms were smaller but very comfortable.

The drawing room had windows on three sides and a stately fireplace in the dividing wall of the house; this wall was of solid stone, more than two feet thick, extending from ground to roof, built in that was because of Cleveland's dread of storms.

Mrs. Cleveland did not wish the kitchen to be a part of the house. Two reasons are given for this, a custom of all the southern states. Either the mistress did not want the many children of the kitchen-women to be in the house, or the fact that most house fires started in the kitchen, where there would be a better chance to contain them if the cook-room were a little apart. The Cleveland kitchen at first was a room of lumber where all the foods were cooked and then taken into the house, though later a stone room was built for that purpose.

The grove of oak trees, higher than the house, beautified the park; the roses and azaleas grew well, and the magnolias and lilies. The gardener had no other work than to tend the park and flowers, and three donkeys were kept to graze down the grass and weeds. North of the house was the flower garden, with roses and other flowers in rock beds around the bases of the oaks.

In 1885 began the hubbub of the

railroad construction, with hundreds of laborers and many teams plowing, grading, laying ties, making bridges. Their camps were along the right-of-way, and in their spare time the workers killed or drove away all the game for miles on either side. A herd of antelope which the ranchers had prized and protected entirely disappeared at this time. The railroad passed up Home Creek just below the Cleveland's park, the first trains running there early in 1886.

Cleveland was a sheepman, running his flock on his own lands and on the free grass. The money which the wool brought they spent like water; a governess for the children, the finest of clothes, open-house hospitality, and every now and then a big ball for everyone who wished to come. The foods and liquors were of the finest, musicians to a cultured taste, floors and furniture polished and gleaming. In summer, the refreshment tables for the balls were set up in the flower garden, with torches in the trees to light up the gay crowd.

Caroline was tall and distinguished looking, while Lucy was smaller and a real beauty. The girl's natures were as different as their looks: Caroline was friendly and smiling to everyone, poised and self assured, while Lucy was retiring, shy, and quite.

At the balls at the Cleveland place many romances had their start, as guests from Coleman, Ballinger and for miles around came there. The story is told that at least two young Coleman men met there the young girls who were to be their future wives.

As the girls grew up and their were more visitors, Cleveland added another room, this one of lumber, on the north of the front porch. This room is no longer there as it was torn away and moved to another place while Billy Anson was owner.

The Cleveland family knew sadness as well as gaiety. The older son, Dexter, was accidentally shot on the top of Bead Mountain, a mile or so to the west. He was carried

home and up the stairs to the middle room where he died at sixteen years of age.

You could never give a party like at least one that the Cleveland's gave. As the park became more beautiful, many picnics and lawn parties were given there, open to anyone who wished to come. For one of these he invited every member of every Sunday school in Coleman and Ballinger, and of course all the neighbors; he chartered two special trains to bring the people, having them sidetrack just below the park.

Long barbeque pits had been dug, and on the coals his cooks prepared four beeves, thirty muttons, and other meats. Iced lemonade was served by the barrel, and these with the picnic baskets brought by the women provided a lavish meal.

What a picture that must have been! Can you imagine the shriek of the whistles as the chugging little engines came near, the merry picnickers jumping down the steps and coming in a stream from the siding into the deep shades of the oaks where their hosts were waiting. Chairs, benches and logs were there for seats, rope swings in the trees for the children, laughter and games and delicious smells while the steam locomotives breathed gently like resting horses.

Late in the afternoon there must have been laughing and squeals with the good-byes when the engineers mounted their cabs and the conductors called "Boooooord!" and late goers ran for the steps. It was a party unique to its place and time, and one like it can never be given again.

Not far up Home Creek from the Cleveland's was the ranch of two young brothers from England, Francis and Claude Anson, younger sons of the Earl of Litchfield. Their older brother would succeed to the title and most of the estate, but they came to Texas with plenty of money to invest, and they bought land, cattle and sheep, although they were accustomed to a country estate which had a grand house with a staff of 50 house-servants, they liked the ways of the frontier, and before long they were friends of everyone and were called Frank and Claude in the casual Texas manner. When a third brother, William, joined them, he soon was called Billy, and he also attended the gatherings of the settlers, livening up the crowd with his banjo-playing. The brothers recorded their cattle-brands in Coleman, helped the neighbors with the roundups, and

having ridden good horses all their boyhood, they soon acquired strings of fast polo ponies and introduced the game to the area.

The open hospitality of the Cleveland's attracted the young Englishmen, an attraction heightened by the beauty of the daughters.

The story is told that at one of the big balls given frequently in Ballinger, this one in the county court-room, Caroline Cleveland was chosen to lead the Grand March with Joe Wilmeth, a popular banker. It was customary then as now to lighten the spirits with spirits, and Wilmeth had sampled them several times before he led the lovely belle out on the floor, which was "as slick as glass." Her gown was of pink satin with train, and the low-cut bodice had a ruffle or berthia of imported pink point-lace; poised and proud, she put her train over one arm and began the march.

But the place was thrown into confusion when Wilmeth's feet slipped and he fell, pulling the train and disarranging the skirt of the pink satin gown. While the men helped Wilmeth to his feet, the girls crowded around her and the skirt was refastened. She was not flustered; although she was furious, she smiled steadily and said, "It was nothing! It was nothing!" and she danced and chatted the evening away.

The younger sister, Lucy, was wearing at that ball a simple white organdy gown, with no adornment except a single rose from her mother's garden. A contest to choose the prettiest girl was held, the prize a big white cake. In true Cinderella fashion, the girl getting the most votes was Lucy, who had been more or less a wall-flower all the evening. Frank Anson looked no farther for a bride than to Caroline. What a

courtship that must have been, one can imagine the pair walking under the great liveoaks, or driving his team of matched horses along the winding trails, or sending and receiving letters from his aristocratic family in England. The Cleveland's were delighted at the engagement and made big plans for the wedding.

Francis, who was to become Lord Anson, stood before the mantel in the drawing room, the very mantel which is there now, and Claude was with him. They were members of the Church of England, of course, and with them to hear their wedding vows was Charles Thorp, the Episcopal rector from Lampasas. The guests stood all around the big room, as from the hall came Lucy and then Caroline and her father. There must have been flowers and music and fine foods, but all are as dim in the past as the words they spoke or the description of the wedding gown. The record is in the book of marriages in the Coleman Court house; the old-fashioned script of Jonathon Miles, then county clerk, authorizes "the rites of matrimony between Francis Anson and MIFS (sic) Caroline Cleveland," and the certificate of marriage was signed by Thorp, "Rector of St. Mary's Church, Lampasas, Texas."

It is said that four wedding ceremonies have been performed before that fireplace, probably including that of Lucy Cleveland to H. H. Doss. When she was the mother of four small children Doss died and she remarried, living in Coleman. One day her buggy-horse became frightened on Commercial Avenue, and she was thrown to the street and killed; this occurred in front of where Penney's store now is.

Poor Mrs. Cleveland was asked about this hidden treasure, and she scoffed at the story, saying they had spent money too freely ever to have put any side.
H. Z. Parrott and his family enjoyed the fine old house; Parrott in his old age became quite feeble, the worst part of which to him was that he was unable to saddle his horse. But he was a man of determination, and he trained his favorite horse to come when called, to stand under the pulley which drew up the saddle, and to sidle up to oaken blocks so that the old man could mount. Once in the saddle, Parrott could ride to Valera, where the post office porch was the right height, or around his ranch. Back in the barn, the well-trained horse stood at the steps under the pulley while the unsaddling took place. But Parrott had thrown a saddle over the back of a horse too many years, he could never get over the frustration of makeshift.

A young neighbor, Emzy Brown, came by often, and one morning he was there when Parrott was just through with the routine.
"I'll tell you, young man," he said, pointing for emphasis. "It's hell to get old!"

This historic house has been owned by the Hoovers since October, 1943, and Mrs. Nettie Hoover, now widowed, lives there still. Some changes have been made for modern living; the drawing-room has been divided, making a large living room and a spacious kitchen with all conveniences, and an addition contains a bath and carport. As we have said, the south is now used for the front, and a concrete-floored porch with white columns faces the driveway.
But the house is largely untouched from the proud way in which Cleveland designed it; the deep cistern for rain water is beside the porch, the fine stair-rail, polished with the years of use, is the original one, the three fireplaces seem ready for big fires on cool days, and much of the furniture consists of treasured family pieces. The house has been in good hands for most of its ninety years, the object of affection and pride. Mrs. Hoover's son, Thomas Earle, is a research scientist living in Connecticut and working on his Ph.D. at twenty-seven; the house is home to him, and he and his mother feel it will be standing for another ninety years.

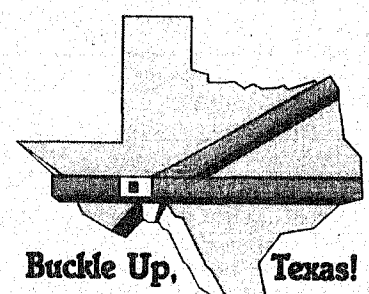
