

Santa Anna Receives Check for \$3,820.38

AUSTIN-State Comptroller Bob Bullock sent checks out Friday that totaled \$115.2 million in local sales tax to the 1,010 cities that levy the one-percent city tax.

Santa Anna's check for \$3,820.38 brought this year's payment to \$26,699.48, down .34 percent from last year's payment of \$4,326.34.

Houston's check for \$17.7 million was the largest, bringing total payments this year to \$141.1 million, up 4 percent over last year. Dallas' payment was \$13.4 million for a 1985 total of \$104.7 million, a 13 percent

San Antonio received \$7.4 million, pushing 1985 payments to \$52.7 million, up 14 percent over last year. Austin's check for \$5.5 million brought total payments this year to \$41.3 million, a 20 percent increase. Fort Worth's payment was \$4.3

million, bringing this year's total to \$31.8 million, up 11 percent. El Paso's November check for \$2.6 million pushed total payments to \$19.6 million, 16 percent over 1984 payments.

Bullock also sent checks totaling \$50.2 million to the state's five Metropolitan Transit Authorities.

Houston's MTA received \$20.9 million for total payments of \$162.5 million iln 1985: Dallas' DART check was for \$19.2 million, bringing 1985 payments to \$144.6 million. Austin's Capital Metro's third check for \$5 million brought yearly payments to \$9.9 million. VIA in San Antonio received \$3.9 million for a 1985 total of \$29.1 million. Fort Worth's MTA check for \$1 million pushed payments this year to \$7.5 million in


Rumor has it that the Eagles will use this game as a warm-up for the state playoffs as they are favored by 13 points and are Number 2 in the A.P. poll.



They Came In Peace by Leona Bruce

THE BECKS

From the highlands of Eastern France to the highlands of Central Texas is a long way, six thousand miles, and Henry Beck didn't finish the journey.

A native of Alsace, he came from a family who had been sheepman for generations, blonde northerners with the name said to have been spelled Becque. When the German hordes overrode Alsace and Loraine, the easternmost French provinces, in 1871, many French retreated before the invaders. But the agricultural life in the western lowlands was not suited to the raising of sheep. Why not go to America? Henri Becque and his young wife had not really taken root in their new home, and they now set their faces to the land of opportunity in the new world.

They came first to Missouri, went into the sheep business, and there, at the small town of Black Walnut, two sons and a daughter, Henri, Firmin and Mary, were born. During this time, their name was Americanized to become Beck, and the cultured couple learned English in addition to the French and German which they had spoken all their lives. Beck made his will, naming as adminsitrator a close friend, Ezra Overall, an attorney whose brother, Richard, had owned a ranch in Texas for several years.

Beck kept hearing of the fine grasslands in Texas which were free for the preemption or sold at a nominal price, where the winters were not much colder than Missouri but free from snow; he thought he would be more successful there, and the flock of sheep were started on the long trek, driven by the two sons, now in their late teens, and a hired man, Jospeh Thide. Beck planned to go by train ahead of them and find a range which he could buy.

But he took suddenly ill and died. This created a dilemma for Ezra Overall, as the terms of the will were that the sheep be sold at public auction and the money paid to the wife and children. The sheep were already in Texas, a herd representing a tangible fortune, while in the new state some disaster might befall and the value be lost. A man of highest honor, he was not willing to accept the price bid at the auction, as he felt that in response to the trust of his friend he must assume the risk himself, and he bought the faraway

He then took the train to Texas. and going with him was a nephew, Wilson Overall, who would take care of the sheep if the Beck sons had other plans. There was an antipathy to sheep on the part of many cowmen, and to drive them, even on free land, held some danger. Ezra Overall went ahead of them, making arrangements for their grazing, until he reached the ranch of his brother, Richard, on Home Creek, and here the sheep could be herded until some land could be bought.

At last the slow-moving flock, herded along by Henri and Firmin Beck. Wilson Overall and Joseph Thide, reached the Pecan Boyou, then saw and passed near the Santa Anna Mountains, and went on to upper Home Creek. Now that they had arrived safely, it seemed strange to have a day in which they did not have to drift the sheep farther west. They could hardly believe that any country could have so few inhabitants, and they marveled at the long distances which they could see and travel without meeting anyone. Henri and Firmin usually spoke French, their mother-tongue and the language easiest for them, and the Texas settlers enjoyed their interesting accent and quaint usages of English.

Ezra Overall realized that the Beck brothers were on the way to a fortune, and he returned to Missouri; Mrs. Beck and the daughter had remained there, and Mary soon married a Frenchman named Pierron from the town of Pierron, Illinois.

The sheep did well on the hills of Home and Mustang Creeks, and the great bags of wool accumulated in the sheds, as there was no market for it nearer than Fort Worth. When the freighters' wagons started east with their high loads, Richard and Wilson Overall rode their horses ahead to choose camping places for the weeklong drive. They returned with wool-bags, sheep medicines and other needs, and Richard bought a nice new spring wagon; now his wife could attend church services, picnics and other functions which she had not wanted to go to in the big clumsy freight wagon, their only vehicle.

The first land bought by the Becks was Section 100, where there was and still is one of the best and deepest waterholes in West Texas on Elm Creek; they put up corrals and pens for the sheep and a house of sorts to live in, but did not fence the range since so much of it was free. The dislike of cattlemen for sheep was shown when three cowmen came by one day and warned the brothers against staying, threatening them with trouble. It was pointed out that the land where they were was owned, and that the Becks wanted to get along with their neighbors at all times, and they never had further trouble.

Before long, Firmin was riding to the Tom Pauley's, up in the postoaks, to visit the lovely Melinda Pauley and to escort her wherever he could find a pretext. She loved his attracitive French accent, and saw him for the fine man he was, as well.

When their wedding was planned. Mrs. Overall helped her with the cutting and sewing of her wedding dress. Very few brides at the time could afford a dress which could be worn only once, and Melinda chose a practical dark wool which could be worn for years and then cut down for a child's dress. Rev. W. B. Bloys, the beloved Presbyterian minister, was notified, the cakes were made, and when the day came the whole community was there to see the ceremony.

As there was money to spend, more and more lands were bought and the herd was increased. The children came along, Oscar, Louis, Edgar, George and Curtis, and girls, Mary and Maggie; to the three languages which they all spoke was added another, Spanish, easy for them with their use of French, and it must have been amusing to hear them go from one language to another. Among their tursted employees were the Nixon brothers. Bill McClure, the Jackson, and Roy Bennett, and many fine Latin herders and shearers. On a hill southeast of the ranch headquarters are the graves of three Latin men,

one drowned and the other two died of natural causes. One of these was found dead by Curtis when a boy of

The Becks prospered well and all the children were given educations. One son, John Charles, died at the age of seven. The practical dark wool wedding dress was never cut up for a child's dress, as there was plenty of money, and it was saved as a from people living out of town not keepsake.

It was a good day for Coleman County when the Beck sheep came straggling across the Santa Anna Mountains and up Home Creek. Through the years, Firmin Beck and his family have set the example of hard work, steadiness of purpose and character, and good citizenship. And then just think of the attractive Beck granddaughters, all blue-eyed blondes, who listen to the stories of the long journey from Alsace, and would not go back there if they could. They were Americans. They



Pets don't rely on chewing for digestion, so small bones may be swallowed whole and may lodge in the esophagus or intestine and require surgical removal.

However, in domestication of the dog and cat, they became omnivores (eating meat and vegetables); therefore, this digestive ability has diminished. This can lead to constipation, blockage, or perforated intestines. 
