Dosh T. McCreary of Austin will be honored during the 1985 Santa Anna Ex-Student Homecoming as the "Ex-Student of the Year." He is a member of the Class of 1935, one of the special groups to be recognized during the October 11-12 event.

A native of the Rockwood community, McCreary attended elemen-

tary and high school in Santa Anna. He entered Texas Tech University that year, graduating in 1939 with a degree in Petroleum Engineering.

In November of that year McCreary was employed by Texaco, working on a seismic party exploring for oil and gas in Texas and parts

of Colorado and Wyoming.

In 1954 he was named Division Geophysicist headquartered in Fort Worth, and later served as Chief Geophysicist and Assistant General Manager of Texaco's Production Department in Houston. In 1970 he was appointed Manager of the Tulsa Division of the Producing Department, and in 1977 transferred to Midland as Manager of the division.

Following early retirement in 1980, McCreary and his wife, Gail, moved to Lake Travis near Austin where they enjoy gardening, golf, square dancing and traveling.

A sister of Mr. McCreary, Mattie Ella McCreary Gray, now of Rockwood, is a former teacher of English at Santa Anna High School.

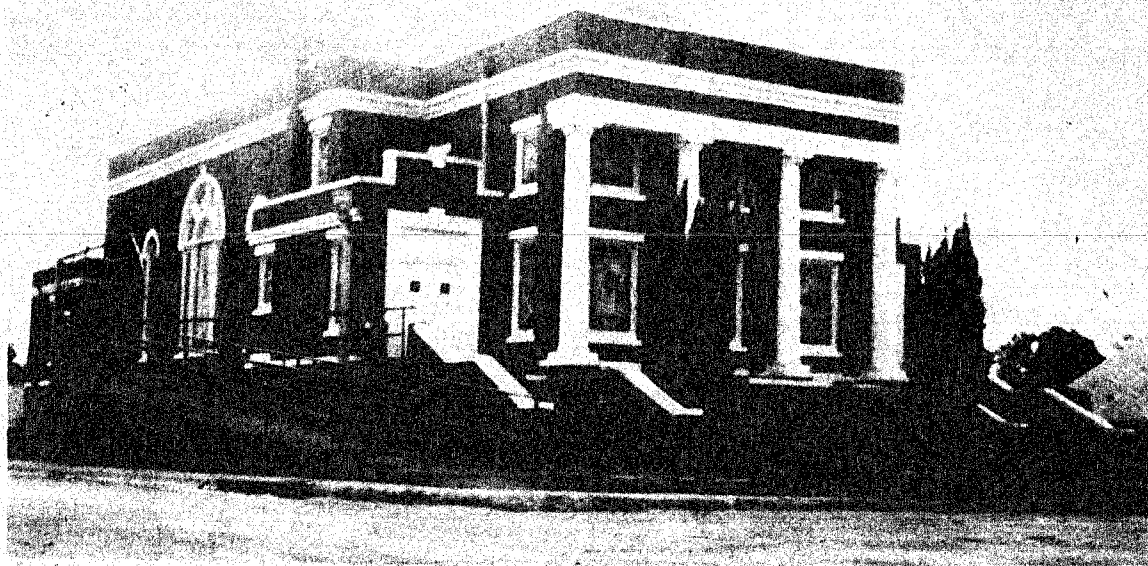

History of First Baptist Church



First --1st Baptist Church, 1889-1921 under construction

The Rev. Averitt founded fourteen Baptist churches in Central Texas during his many years as a missionary in the frontier area. He died in Robert Lee December 1895.

From the small beginning, the church began to grow after the railroad came here in 1886. The first church building was constructed in late 1889, with the congregating meeting for several years in the little school house built in 1882.

The first full-time pastor was W. B. Holland, who moved to Santa Anna from Coleman in 1906. With the longest tenure was S. R. Smith, who was pastor for eight and one-half years. Hal C. Wingo was pastor here for seven years, and Raymond Jones was pastor of the church for six and one-half years.

The present-day building was erected in 1921 during the pastorate of J. M. Reynolds. Peak membership of the church was reached in 1942 with 831 members.

The fellowship hall was built in 1948, and additional space added in 1964.

The new parsonage was built in 1980, replacing the home on South First Street that had served as the pastors' home since 1939. The new parsonage is located south of the former home.

A Christian Life Center was built in 1983 with kitchen facilities, classroom facilities, pastor and secretary offices and a gym.

Present pastor of the church is John Stanislaw who came here in April 1979. Deacons are Ray Barnett, chairman, William Brown, vice-chairman, Wayne Langford,

secretary, V. H. Russell, Joe Barnes, Frank McCary, Pete Rutherford, Vernon Rowe, Dickie Horner, Donnie Neff, Scott Patterson, R. D. Treadwell, and L. L. McCullough.

No historian or group of people would be able to tell of all the dedication, commitment, prayers, gifts and sacrifices that have gone into making the First Baptist Church of Santa Anna. The church has wielded a great influence in the community during its first one hundred and five years. People of the community are invited to join with the congregation in celebrating the joyous occasion on Sunday, October 13.

Charter members of the congregation were Rev. Averitt, Mr. and Mrs. Willis C. Brooks, Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Brooks, R. L. Brooks, and Mrs. E. A. Taylor. The group met in the home of the Willis Brooks family, a log cabin of two rooms near the gap of the Santa Anna Mountain.

Management team named by Wal-Mart

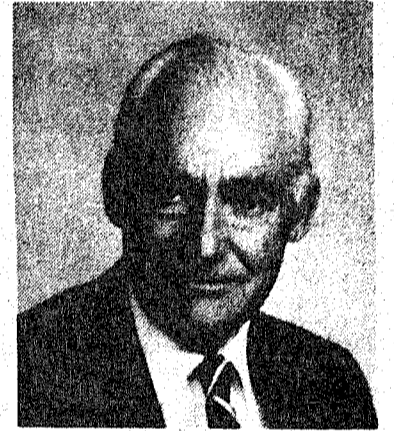

Jr. Mounties Display Character

The Santa Anna Junior Mountaineers and the Miles Junior Bulldogs had a touchdown contest last Thursday. When the game was over, the Bulldogs were on top with a 32-26 score.

The Bulldogs scored first on a 64 yard run and completed a pass for the two-point conversion. After only two minutes and 20 seconds, the score was 8-0. The local team entered the contest four plays later as Herbert Jackson raced untouched 41 yards for his first touchdown of the day. The try for extra points was unsuccessful. Miles quietly answered with two more

touchdowns to take a 24-6 lead at the end of the first quarter.

Midway through the second quarter, Jackson ran 75 yards for another score. Again the try for the two point conversion was unsuccessful. At half time the score was 24-12.

The Junior Mountaineers displayed great character as they came back against a much larger team. The Santa Anna defense controlled the Bulldogs in the third quarter. Meanwhile, Herbert Jackson ran 8 yards for his third touchdown of the day. Alonzo Hernandez added the two-point conver-

sion. Four plays later, Jr. Garza intercepted a pass to give Santa Anna another scoring opportunity. Luis Padillo responded with a 23 yard touchdown to give Santa Anna the lead at 26-24.

In the fourth quarter, Miles scored again on a 35 yard run to end all scoring.

Herbert Jackson had an outstanding day. He ran for 192 yards and scored three touchdowns. Alonzo Hernandez, Luis Padillo, Ken Brixey and Armando Mata combined to add another 65 yards rushing. Alonzo Hernandez and Scotty Anderson accounted for 18 tackles. Other defensive standouts were Ken Brixey, Wesley Baugh, Scott Valdez and Jr. Garza.

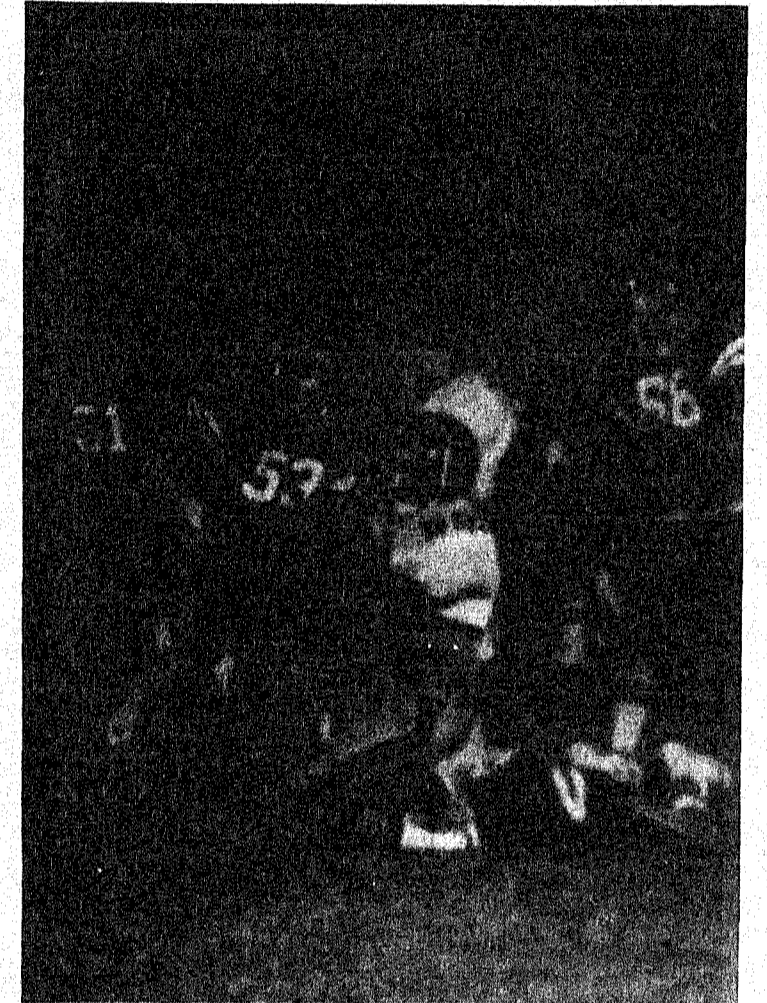

Mountaineers Dominate Bulldogs 33-6

MILES - The Santa Anna Mountaineers totally dominated the Miles Bulldogs here Friday night as they worked their Black Magic for a 33-6 win. The Mounties defense proved tough once again as the Bulldogs managed only 73 yards total offense. A fourth quarter Miles drive of 54 yards accounted for most of that total after the game had already been decided.

The Santa Anna infantry marched up and down the field for 427 yards during what proved to be a long night for the Bulldog defense. Bebe Vasquez bulled his way through the Miles defenders for a season high 244 yards on 19 carries. That comes to almost 13 yards every time he touched the ball. In the process, Vasquez scored three TD's and kicked two ex-

tra points to total 20 points for the night.

Shelby Tuttle opened the scoring for Santa Anna by capping off an 18 play, 62 yard drive with a one yard stab into the endzone. With 3:49 remaining in the first quarter, Vasquez booted true on the PAT to put the Mountaineers in front to stay 7-0.

With only 55 seconds left in the first half, Vasquez ripped off a five yard TD run that completed a 7 play, 75 yard drive. Vasquez's kick brought the score to 14-0.

The third quarter scoring belonged to Bebe Vasquez. He dashed 10 yards at the 9:24 mark to finish off a 7 play, 66 yard drive and up the score to 20-0. Only five minutes lapsed before Vasquez chipped in a 26 yard run that was almost half of the 6

play, 53 yard march. With 5:24 left in the third quarter, the game was out of the Bulldog's reach, 26-0.

Miles became the first opponent to cross the Santa Anna goal line this year as they put on a 12 play, 54 yard drive that was capped by Roger Havlak's six yard run at the 7:01 mark of the fourth quarter.

Santa Anna came back with a

vengeance as the Mounties covered 72 yards in only two plays with Craig Duquette blasting in from 12 yards out. James Hartman got in on the scoring when he booted the PAT to close out the scoring for the night with 6:26 left in the game.

The Mounties had a great night defensively and seemed to find themselves offensively. The shortest drive of the night for the Mountaineers was the 53 yarder in the third quarter.

This Friday, Santa Anna will host the Eden team that seared Irion county last Friday in a tight game.

The Mountaineers will celebrate Homecoming with a 7:30 p.m. kickoff.

Livestock projects will be validated Saturday, October 19 at the rodeo grounds. Livestock has to be validated to be shown.

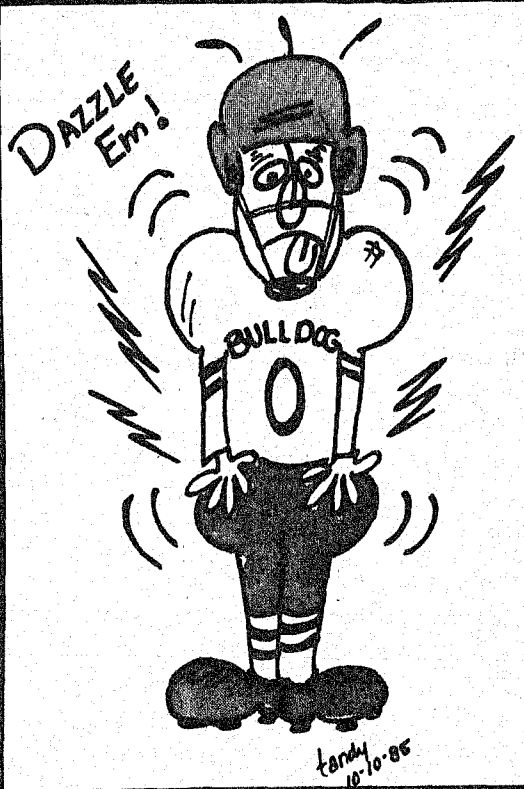

They Came In Peace *by Leona Bruce*

Chapter 17 continued

We have a copy of a copyrighted article written in 1933 by the Home Color Print Company, telling about a Christmas dance given in the Kin Elkins home, which was unusually large, with a spacious parlor and a swinging chandelier, the only one in the neighborhood.

Although a blizzard was raging, big fires blazed in all the chimneys, pots of coffee simmered on the coals, a whole beef had been roasted, and the skillet of hot biscuits seemed inexhaustible. As the people arrived, a servant took their horses to the stables; Jep Brown, the fiddler, tuned up, the banjo took the bass, and beautiful Mary and Martha Elkins and other belles of the community walked out in their homemade dresses, and the fun was on. Throughout the night the music and dancing kept up with intervals for visiting the long kitchen table with its plentiful holiday foods, and at daybreak the coats and wraps were put on and the tired guests began to leave.

Elkins was a highly respected pioneer, of the intrepid and inventive type who became leaders on the frontier. Of the young men attending the Christmas dance, many also became prominent; Clay Mann, who was then courting the lovely Mary Elkins was there, as were Son McNamara, Henry Sackett, Frank Alexander, and various cowboys from the ranches up and down the creeks. Everybody went to these dances, and any girl from thirteen on could become a belle. While the parents danced or talked, the babies were put to bed wherever there was space for them, and some amusing stories have been told of families getting the wrong child from among those sleeping under the quilts.

Of the pioneer families many were related by marriages as the years passed. The daughters of Dudley Johnson all were wed to early settlers; Laura married Capt. McNamara of the army, Jennie married M. M. Callan, of the post commissary, Emma married Capt. John Elkins, who was later a Ranger captain as well, and Annie married Luke Williams, a former soldier.

Melvina St. Clair married R. C. Morgan, a freighter, Nancy married L. D. Greaves, later county clerk and sheriff, Polly married F. M. Alexander, who had been an army blacksmith and later lived in Coleman, and Hattie, the youngest, married Ike Chrisman, a former soldier, but soon died. Mary Elkins was married to the courtly Clay Mann, and her sister Martha chose Jim Jackson, a cowboy who became famous as a breeder of fine horses.

Coleman County remained under the jurisdiction of Brown until 1876, when the county seat was moved to the site of the Hord's Creek chosen for it.

The community of Camp Colorado continued to prosper, and although the cemetery nearby was begun as a burial place for soldiers before 1860, the families of the settlers have continued to use it for their burials, and do so to this day.

The Brooke family had a tragic incident soon after their arrival at their ranch on the Jim Ned.

The mother of the children hung out a washing on bushes up the hillside from the house, which was a one-room cabin of logs. Going late in the afternoon to get the dry clothes, she was followed by her baby boy, some eighteen months old, who stepped on a little rattlesnake and was bitten. Mrs. Brooke heard the baby scream and ran back in time to snatch him up before the coiled

snake could strike again.

The little fellow said over and over the only hurtful thing he had known, "Grassbur! Grassbur!" But this was far worse, and they did not know what to do for him.

Brooke rode for a neighbor, who blew his hunting-horn to warn those within hearing that there was trouble somewhere; others blew their horns and the settlers on the creeks came riding to help the parents and to do whatever they could.

Everybody had a remedy and in desperation they tried them all. The mother had put the little foot into coal-oil, and bound the leg as she had heard it should be; then tobacco juice was tried, and moving the cord, and making a cut to let out the poison. Someone said that if a black hen were killed and the warm insides pressed on the wound it would draw the venom; everybody had chickens, but no, it had to be a black hen. A neighbor a few miles away rode wildly to his hen-roost and back again with the required fowl.

Kind-hearted men and women held the baby, walked the floor and the yard with him; some cooked and served food, all showed deep concern. This was a thing that could happen to any of them and their sympathy was deep. One ranchman had a cigar-lighter, a thing that used flint and steel, and gave it to the baby to hold, to take his mind off his pain for a moment. In handling it, the baby accidentally lighted the plaything and burned his little hand seriously. The women knew what to do for this, a soda poultice, but what had been terrible was now even worse.

By the next day, the whole little body was swollen and discolored. Neighbors went home and came back again, hesitating to ask his condition, but as the week passed the child suffered less and became alert and even playful. It seems a miracle that he finally recovered with no crippling, but he did.

Camp Colorado was a bigger settlement than Coleman for some years. Church services were held almost every Sunday, in the schoolhouse, a former army post building, and a school of five to six months each winter was thought to be plenty of education for any child. The standard books were the Blue-backed Speller and the McGuffey Readers, most of which were owned by every family and passed down from child to child. Penmanship was studied and highly valued, and now and then some traveling teacher would announce a "writing school" to be held for a few nights in the schoolhouse. It was more or less a social occasion, and all who were able to pay the \$1 fee would go with pen, ink and paper. With poor lighting, it was easy to commit the cardinal sin of making a blot or writing with a scratching pen, and the teacher would walk around, calling attention to all mistakes. The net results was that penmanship was respected and good handwriting much admired.

When there was no fiddle and banjo available, the young people had great fun at "play parties," where the games went on accompanied by singing, and everyone knew all the songs—Weevily Wheat, Shoot The Buffalo, Miller Boy, Coffee Grows On Whiteoak Trees and dozens of others. The games included lots of running and catching of chosen part-

ners, and the happiness and the heartaches were just about the same as they are now.

The Brooke family all attended the dedication of the new courthouse at Coleman in 1884 and marveled at the tall tower and clock which could be seen for miles over the prairie, bare of mesquites at that time. They also went to Santa Anna, just about as near as Coleman, to see the first train come in to that town in 1885.
