Parade, Other Activities During the Day

Holiday Opening Friday

Santa Anna will be a busy place Friday as the annual Christmas Opening is held in the community. Several events and activities are planned during the day, sponsored by the Santa Anna Chamber of Commerce.

A downtown parade will be held at 3:30 p.m., headed by the Mountaineer Band. Decorated floats and vehicles will be in the line-up, with the floats competing for cash prizes of \$100, \$75, and \$50. Santa Claus will be in the parade Friday, making his first appearance in town this season.

The Chamber of Commerce is encouraging groups and organizations to decorate downtown windows, but there will be no cash prizes awarded this year as in years past.

Several merchants will have their stores open until the evening hours for the convenience of local shoppers.

A major attraction on Friday will be the Lions Club Pancake Fiesta, with serving from 10 a.m. through the supper hour. Pancakes, ham and all the trimmings will be available at the Lions Club Building, with door

prizes awarded at intervals during the day.

Danny Kellar, Lions Club president, is general chairman of the event, with club members and other volunteers taking on the cooking and serving chores.

There will be several bake sales held by different organizations downtown on Friday morning and afternoon.

Area people are invited to join the festivities Friday as the holiday season opens in our community.

Vocational Nursing School To Begin Classes 4-H Meeting February 12, 1986

Cisco Junior College Licensed Vocational Nursing Program Ballinger-Coleman Extension is now taking applications for the February 1986 Class.

A prospective student must be at least 17 years of age and must either be a high school graduate or furnish a GED equivalency. 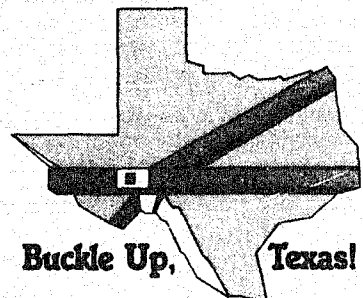

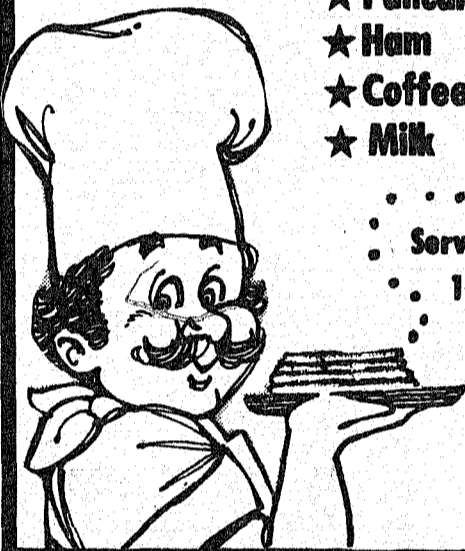

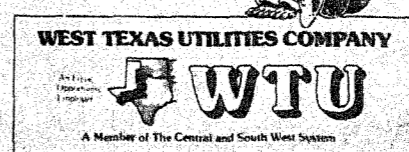
